Terry Mahoney will show a Hereford bull on Monday, Jan. 29th.

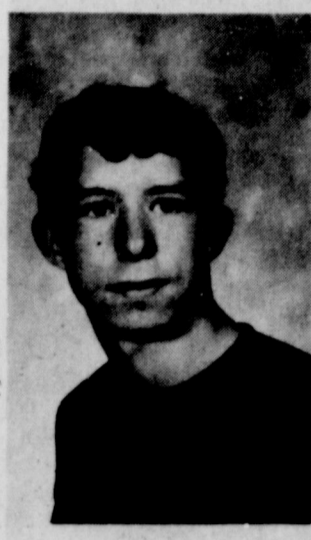

Dr. Gray Funeral Service Held Monday

Funeral for Dr. Hob Gray of 1710 Cromwell Hill, who died Saturday at Austin at the age of 83, was Monday at 4 p.m. at Weed-Corley Funeral Home. The Rev. Sanford Coon of University Methodist Church officiated. Burial was in Austin Memorial Park.

Dr. Gray was principal of Eastland High School the years 1921-22, 1922-23, and 1923-24. Dr. Gray, a professor emeritus of the University of Texas, was associated with UT from 1933 to 1959. He was Professor of Curriculum and Instruction and director of the Teacher Placement Service. Before coming to UT Dr. Gray taught at Daniel Baker College, Brownwood and Texas State College for Women.

He received a diploma from the then Southwest Texas Normal, B.A., Daniel Baker College; M.A., Columbia University; Teachers College; and Ph.D., the University of Texas. He was Awarded an honorary LL.D. from Southwestern University at Georgetown.

He was awarded the Peabody Scholarship in 1927; was chairman, Committee on the Evaluation of Secondary Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, 1944-48; and Vice President 1956 and President 1957 of the National Institutional Teacher Placement Association.

He has had numerous articles in the professional education magazines and has written several monographs in the fields of curriculum and teaching.

Dr. Gray was a member of Phi Delta Kappa and was the director of Teacher Placement.

Memorial contributions may be made to the Heart Fund, the University Methodist Church or a favorite Charity.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Mary T. Gray of Austin; a daughter, Mrs. Sam Alison Kimberlin, Jr. of Austin; a son Robert W. Gray of Richardson; four grandchildren, Samuel Scott Kimberlin and David Winston Kimberlin both of Austin, Susan Patricia Gray and Lauren Ashley Gray both of Richardson; several nieces and nephews also survive.

City Commissioners Meet

At the regular City Commission Monday, all commissioners were present except Commissioner O'Brien.

Mr. John Nevill representing Southern Television Systems appeared before the Commission and answered questions about their operation in Eastland. Mr. Nevill was questioned about numerous interruptions in service recently and Mr. Nevill stated that they were in the process of replacing the main line into the City from their tower East of Town and that it was preventative maintenance and that they were trying to be best of their ability to replace the line with the least possible interruption to normal service.

Mr. Nevill further stated that they tried to interrupt service at a time not considered to be prime time and hopefully at a time that the programing could be duplicated on another network at a later time.

Mr. Nevill stated that anytime there was interruption to regular programing that affected the entire town that their phone was extremely busy with incoming calls and that it was difficult to reach their office at such times simply due to the volume of inbound calls.

Green eggs? It's too early for the Easter bunny. But apparently some hens owned by Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Rollins think it's time to get started.

Not many folks keep hens to produce eggs for the family, but Monroe and his wife enjoy having fresh eggs to eat. They live north of Eastland.

Last week when Mrs. Rollins gathered the eggs she found a green egg in one of the nests. In fact, she has found six green eggs since then. She wondered if the cold weather had really been that bad on the hens. Whats wrong with that hen, she wondered. Monroe suggested they quietly dispose of the eggs and tell no one. "Other wise they'll laugh us out of town". Mrs. Rollins was more curious so she broke one of the

eggs and found the contents to be that of a normal fresh egg. She was relieved to learn that some breeds of chickens lay colored eggs. In fact, the Araucanas chickens lay blue-green eggs.

Mrs. Rollins said a relative gave them some baby chickens last year and they kept three of the pullets. One of the three pullets started laying several weeks ago. Her eggs are small, dark brown eggs. Now the second pullet's eggs are green. The Rollins are now waiting and wondering if the third pullet will lay pink eggs.

This must be the coldest winter folks have seen in this part of the state in a long time. Several have asked us if this cold weather will kill most of the insects.

It should have an effect on some insect populations. But some insects make their own anti-freeze. That's why cold weather doesn't kill many bothersome pests. When temperatures rise, they're ready to start givin g you trouble again.

Although sub-freezing temperatures slow down insect activity, nature provides many pests with ways of beating cold. Some manufacture their own glycerol, an effective anti-freeze similar to the product made for our cars.

When temperatures drop below the freezing point, these insects - by some process not yet fully understood - gradually adjust to it. The

glycerol they manufacture give them the hardiness to withstand all but the most extreme cold weather. Among the insects that can make their own anti-freeze are certain species of ants, beetles, aphids, cutworms and flies.

Nature gives insects another protection from the cold, too. Most go through ametamorphosis which includes a dormant period when they are completely inactive. If insects stay dormant - in the pupal or larval stage - during the winter, they often survive the cold weather. Some insects have been found frozen in solid ice and then thawed to full activity as the weather turned warm.

Insect pests, like man, have learned to live with their surroundings. Very cold weather rarely controls these pests effectively.

Dr. Robert White-Stevens in giving the key-note presentation at the recent Texas Conference on Insect, Plant Disease, Weed and Brush Control Conference said "All foods are Organic and with but a few exceptions natural; and to claim 'organically grown' goods are more nutritious than and superior to foods produced by scientific farming and thereby to justify charging substantially higher prices is a shabby fraud on a gullible and unsuspecting public."

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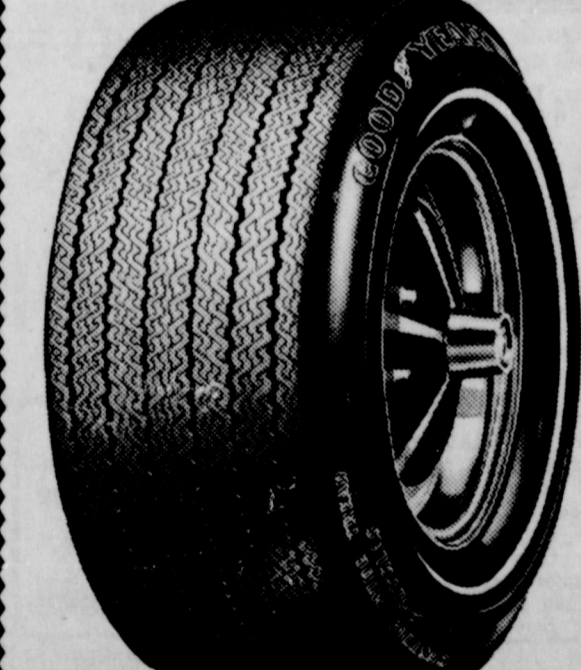
