## Van Geem earns masters degree in EE

Neil Van Geem, senior electrical engineer in GO engineering, recently received his masters degree in electrical engineering from the University of Texas at Arlington.

He took a two or three hour course each semester for six years. This made two nights out a week and Van Geem smilingly admits his wife, Mary, and two young sons, Steven, 8, and Alan, 4, were "pretty pleased to have him home every night again" after he graduated at midterm.

Van Geem started with TESCO June 15, 1959, after getting his undergraduate degree in electrical engineering from the University of Texas at Austin. He was born and reared in Eastland.

Questioned about his studies, Van Geem typically answered, "I can almost draw a picture better than I can explain." Mrs. Van Geem typed his thesis, "quite a job," as he says. Its imposing title was "Computer Analysis of Protective Device on Radial Application Power Circuits."

TESCO's usual distribution system can be described as a radial system since the substation is the only source of power for the distribution lines which "radiate" from the substation to the customers. This is different from the transmission system where the transmission lines form a network connecting multiple sources of power.

Van Geem called the graduate program "power-oriented" and, comparing it with his undergraduate study, offered the opinion that his college learning experiences were more "theory-oriented and more general."

"The trend now is toward basic theory in colleges," Van Geem added. "The teachers expect the students to learn practical application on the job. With a strong emphasis on general theory, the student is not 'locked-in' to a particular industry, but can pick up the more practical or specialized aspects after making a job choice."

Van Geem enjoyed his association with Dr. Mo-shing Chen, head of the Power Systems Research Center at UTA. The research center is sponsored by a number of utility companies in Texas. Dr. Chen worked at TESCO's GO engineering office several summers ago when the graduate program was started with UTA and "sold" several engineers on working for a graduate degree.

The engineer continued, "Most of us in the graduate program now work in the systems planning or distribution planning offices of the engineering department here in the company. What we learned will help in making systems studies and it gives us a better feel for the work."

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Van Geem of Eastland.

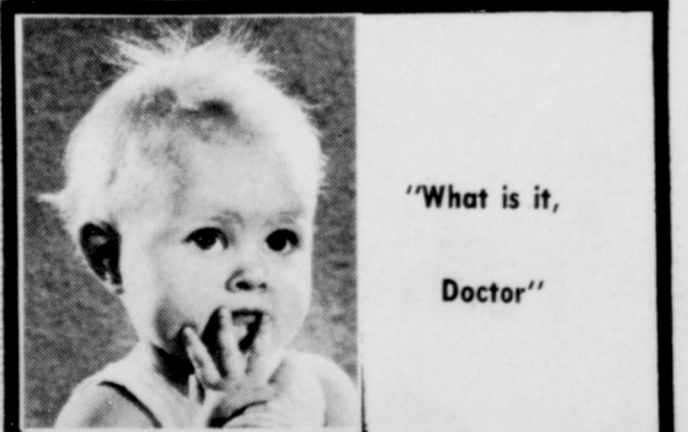

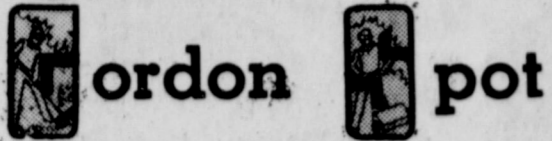

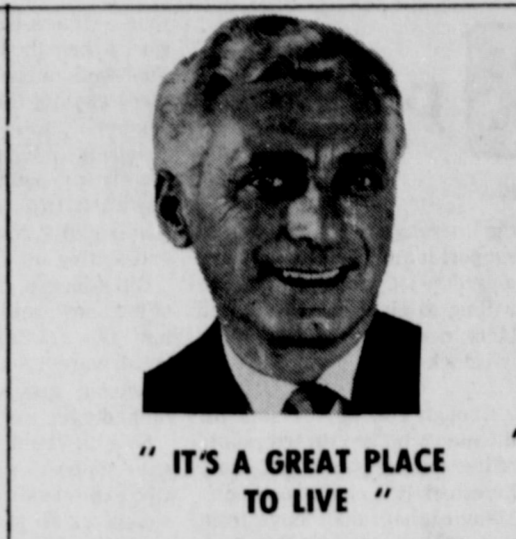

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- OPPONENTS OF THE 1968 GUN CONTROL LAW had a slogan saying, "Guns don't kill people -- people kill people." THE TRUTH IN THAT LINE IS NOW PRETTY OBVIOUS. In spite of the law governing gun registration and transportation across State lines -- in spite of sizeable Federal funds to upgrade local law enforcement -- in spite of additional law enforcement officers in many places, crime is still rampant. It is true that some categories of major crimes have shown a decline in

the last two reports. Crimes committed with firearms continue to be a major concern. This situation gives rise to arguments on both sides of the question on gun control. The more criminal acts committed with firearms, the more the anti-gun proponents claim the need for more control, even to the point of some wanting to deny every citizen the right to own a gun. The other side is that we have the requirement for registration of certain types of guns, which has shown no improvement in the rate of crime in which guns are used. EACH INSTANCE OF HEINOUS CRIME GIVES IMPETUS TO THE GUN CONTROLLERS. Immediately after the vicious shooting of Senator Stennis of

Mississippi, newspaper editorials appeared in many city papers advocating more gun laws and more legislation was introduced in the Congress for this purpose. In a robbery in Washington, D.C., this past week, the robbers shot five people and pistol whipped others for no cause other than to demonstrate their viciousness. A SIMPLE FACT IS SEEMINGLY OVERLOOKED BY THOSE WHO THINK THAT FIREARMS can simply be eliminated. This is that firearms can be home produced without any great ingenuity. The criminal is going to have possession of guns while law-abiding citizens would not be

permitted to own one under some legislative proposals. The police recently warned people to lower their radio antenna when parking their automobiles on the street. This is because hoodlums can come by and with little effort, break off the antenna which can be used to fashion into a firearm. This is how easy it is to make a weapon and it will never be difficult for the criminal to find even easier ways to acquire a gun. Just as liquor was provided in prohibition and narcotics are provided today by organized crime, so would organized crime find guns for anyone who could pay the price while legitimate owners were denied the right of private possession. THE PRESIDENT SENT A PRETTY ROUGH ANTI CRIME BILL TO THE CONGRESS last week. Many of you probably heard his radio announcement. The recommendations emphasized deterrents to crime, including the restoration of the death penalty for certain Federal offenses. Probably no stronger language has been used on the subject than that contained in the message. IT IS TIME WE OBSERVE WHAT IS GOING ON AROUND US AND GO AFTER THE CRIMINAL and not the gun. All too often the law violator who has been apprehended in crimes of violence with firearms are returned to the streets, either under a light bond, probation, or parole after serving a brief time in prison. The number of repeaters is appalling. Those who contend that punishment of crime is not a deterrent indulge in strange reasoning. The individual who carries a gun during commission of a felony does so with absolute premeditation and with a willingness to use it to kill. CRIMES COMMITTED WITH GUNS IN THOSE STATES WHICH HAVE HAD STRINGENT gun regulations for some years are no different from those which have no laws. THERE IS SIMPLY NO WAY FIREARMS CAN BE ELIMINATED BUT THE FEAR of severe punishment can eliminate at least some of the theccriminals who use them.

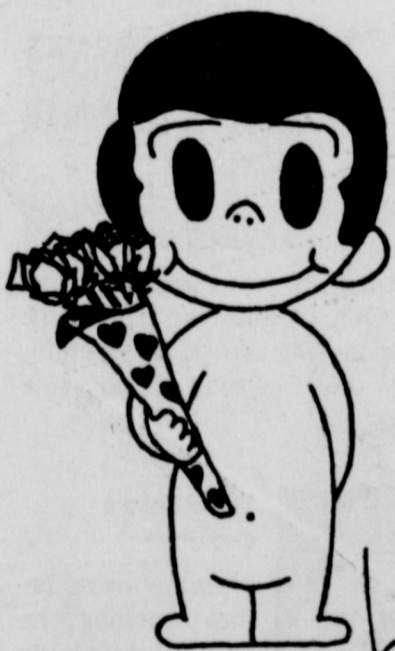

**Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.**

*You can get the most value from your electric range by following these tips.*

- Use flat-bottomed pans**  
The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.
- Don't open the oven door unnecessarily**  
Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.
- Use minimum amount of water**  
The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.
- Cook and freeze**  
Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at the same temperature.
- Thaw before cooking**  
Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.
