BET SHE doesn't need to be reminded but maybe we do-- County Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout and her staff will begin issuing auto license plates Thursday, Feb. 1.

Motorist can pick up license plates for the faithful family car starting February 1 at the county tax office in the county in which they live.

The motorist may register his vehicle in person at his county tax office or substation by bringing in the entire handy three-part form received in the mail from the Texas Highway Department. It takes only a few minutes to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on his way with new plates.

Drivers also can get new plates by mail if they send in the complete three-part form, the registration fee plus one dollar for each vehicle to their county tax office prior to March 1.

After March 1 it will be necessary to go to the county tax office or substation in person as 30 days are required for mail delivery. In any case, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the computerized forms.

With the form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt are not needed.

EXXON Begins Construction New Bulk Plant in Eastland

The Exxon Company USA, formerly Humble Oil & Refining Company, has started construction of a new bulk plant facility in Eastland.

Property being developed is 145 ft. deep with a frontage on Roswood of 212 ft. (just north of the JRB store).

The area will be fenced with a 6 ft. chain link fence. The warehouse will be of masonry construction with 1920 sq ft (32'x60') including office space and rest rooms. Facilities will have central heating and air conditioning and loading dock facilities for both pickups and highway freight cans.

Storage tanks totaling 54,000 gallons will be underground and equipped with submersible pumps.

Front portion of the site will be landscaped. Oil-water separators will be installed to prevent any accidental spill from polluting the grounds or reaching any stream.

All new overhead loading rack facilities will be installed. Driveway will be graveled.

Total construction of the bulk station area will meet or exceed requirements set forth by federal and state occupational injuries and illness Act Osha no. 100 and Osha 102 safety codes.

This facility will service all of Eastland county and a part of Palo Pinto County.

This will mark the third large investment the Exxon company has made in this area in the past year. Two super service stations were opened on Interstate 20. This company has been widely accepted in Eastland and this area and this is further proof of their faith in the continued growth and progress of Eastland County.

General contractors are the Alber T. E. McAlister Construction Company of Abilene, with an estimated completion date of May 1.

The present bulk plant facility is located at 512 North Seaman.

Nolan L. DeFord is commission agent for the Exxon Company in this area.

Eastland Booms '73

The year 1973 stands to be the year of blossom for Eastland. It was a marked year of growth just completed, but indications are that the new year could even be bigger and greater.

Several major developments now in the at-work or planning stage give rise to optimism.

The EBAA Iron Co. which announced in 1972 that it would locate a major facility at the Eastland Industrial Foundation's Leon Plant Site is now under construction, and indications are that the operation here will be even greater than originally announced.

Instead of one giant furnace, the company plans to eventually have two in operation here. And instead of the originally scheduled 25 employees, guesses are now that at least some 72 will be required, local Supt. Earl Bullock reports.

Work is well underway, and the first furnace would arrive in the spring. The second furnace probably will be brought in early next year. The company presently has three men employed here making preparations for the company's operations here.

Another major development for the east interchange area where the Winston Boles Dairy Queen has been such a success, is the relocation of the House of Webster Retail Store on a track of land immediately west of the Dairy Queen, facing Highway 80 (north).

Local Manager Jimmy Little reports that the construction will begin soon, and the new store should be ready and open later in the spring. The firm will broaden its stock and display more merchandise at the new location, he said.

Already operating in the area is the new Robert Mangum garage.

The 72-unit Ramada Inn is under construction on the south side of Int. 20 at the Lake Leon Interchange and is due for completion in the spring.

Eastland City Manager Lewis Tiner reported this week that work will probably begin Monday on the new sewer line extension which will provide city services to the new businesses at the east interchange intersection.

Development of the city's part of the Crestwood Living Center on the west side of town is nearing completion, he said, and the crews should be able to move right onto the sewer line job.

A representative of the engineering firm of Yeatts and Decker is due right away to confer on some right-of-way changes on the line eastward, and hopefully to consider the possibility of taking sewer service northward. The T & P Railway Co.'s refusal to let the city go under their right of way has caused delay in getting badly-needed service in that direction.

Countians Hopeful In Cease-fire

The peel of church bells and the whine of sirens in Eastland County marked the beginning of the cease fire at 6 p.m. local time--the long, long war in Vietnam.

Like the rest of the nation and the world, Eastland County paid dearly for "that war" in Southeast Asia, and the hope for peace is much on the minds of all.

In the after-days of the official signing, there still are reports of treaty violations, but there's a general feeling locally from everybody, that it's good "to be getting out of that war."

Some 25 men from Eastland were sent to Vietnam.

The fighting took the lives of at least four.

Killed was Bubba Everett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Everett of Olden. He was a Navyman assigned as a Marine medic.

Also killed was PFC Larry Joe Rodgers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Barrow of Ranger. He was a member of the Marine Corp.

The other man, Major Willie Donald Tyrone, son of Mr. and Mrs. H.A. Tyrone, Cisco, was killed.

Command Sgt. Maj. Joseph A. Venable of Cisco was killed in 1968 in a helicopter crash in Vietnam.

It was believed that a Texan was the last soldier killed before the cease-fire went into effect.

The agreement to end the war was signed in the ballroom of an old Paris hotel near the Arc de Triomphe. The signing took 18 minutes and ended with champagne toasts. The conflict was paid for in the lives of

nearly 46,000 American fighting men and billions of dollars.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers signed for the United States and Foreign Minister Tran Van Lam for South Vietnam. On the other side, Foreign Minister Nguyen Duy Trinh signed for North Vietnam and Mrs. Nguyen Tri Binh for the Viet Cong.

The main agreement signed by all four parties calls for the end of the fighting in Vietnam.

Eastland To Hold Cattle Course

A beef cattle shortcourse featuring cattle feeding, reproduction efficiency and forage programs will be held in Eastland County Jan. 29-31.

County Agent Dee Gordon said the extension service is conducting the short course to help cattlemen increase production efficiency. All three sessions will be held at night beginning at 7 p.m.

Monday and Tuesday night sessions will be held at the Farm Bureau Building, Highway 80 East in Eastland. Wednesday night's session will be held at the Gorman school cafeteria.

Three extension service specialists will conduct the Short Course, according to

at midnight Greenwich Mean Time - or 6 p.m. local time.

The delegates signed at a table and then walked back into an adjoining room. They did not shake hands. But one informant who was present said the atmosphere in the adjoining room was relaxed and all four parties exchanged champagne toasts to peace and friendship.

Each delegation was given a copy of the documents, bound in different colored, gold-embossed leather.

The U.S. copies were in navy blue; the South Vietnamese in brown; the North Vietnamese in red, and the Viet Cong in green.

The close of the ceremony was delayed a bit because some copies had to be taken back to the envoys for signatures inadvertently missed in the original rotation.

The toasts lasted about 15 minutes and the envoys then left the conference hall without making any statements and returned to the waiting cars just as the sun broke through an overcast sky.

In Washington peace negotiator Henry A. Kissinger has reportedly assured members of Congress that the United States will not get embroiled in Vietnam again if fighting flares up after the cease-fire.

The presidential counselor also told about 45 senators that Congress will be consulted before any decision on U.S. aid to help rebuild North Vietnam.

The return POWs are to be flown by medical evacuation planes to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines from Hanoi. There they will be given medical checkups and will be sent on to the United States as soon as they can be released.

The Pentagon lists 591 captured American servicemen - 476 in the North and 109 in the South and six in Laos. The State Department lists 51 civilians missing or captured.

Those were good years.

Mr. Peanut continues to be the county's top revenue producer, and estimates are that in 1972, gross money from the crop amounted to \$6,500,000. In 1968 and 1969, peanuts yielded \$5,396,100.

Fruit and nuts revenue is up too, recorded on estimate at \$245,000 last year as compared with \$181,600 in 1969.

These are figures reported by County Extension Agent De Gordon, who also shows sorghum in 1972 worth \$310,000; small grains at \$65,000; and hay at \$500,000 (last year was bad for hay with the summer drought.)

Now listed as one of the top ten turkey producing counties in the state, Eastland County had gross revenue from turkeys and eggs, estimated at \$1,065,000; but wool and mohair revenue is down, guessed at \$82,000.

Another big gainer is beef cattle production which estimates show to have earned \$4,830,000 in '72. Dairy cattle production is down but hog revenue is up at \$260,000; and sheep and goat money down.

An ever-increasing yield is the revenue from hunting leases. In 1972, it brought some \$8,000 to the pockets of the landowners.

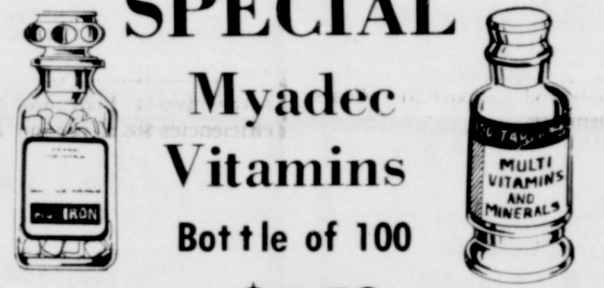

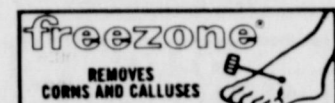

Between milkings Eastland county dairy farmers will get the latest research information on forages and ways of coping with today's high cost of dairy feed ingredients at the North Texas Dairy Institute session in Stephenville on Tuesday, Feb. 6.

The annual institute is being planned by dairymen to meet the current needs of dairy producers in the Ft. Worth Dallas milkshed, including Eastland County.

capitol capsule

By SEN. TOM CREIGHTON

In one of his first acts as the new Lt. Governor, Bill Hobby announced his appointments to committees.

I was extremely pleased with my appointment to the chairmanship of the important Economic Development Committee. Due to the many bills that will come before this group, this committee promises to be one of the most active in this year's Legislature. Falling under its jurisdiction will be BANKING, COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY, INSURANCE AND TRANSPORTATION.

Along with the above assignment I was again named a member of the FINANCE COMMITTEE. For the past six years I have served both as a member of the Senate Finance Committee as well as a representative on the sub-committee.

All appropriations are brought for consideration to this committee, and of course, you can recognize the magnitude of this job.

I will also participate as a member of the NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE. Under the new reform program, the water committee was consolidated with other groups to form the Natural Resources Committee. Specific areas to be considered will be AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK, OIL AND GAS, PARKS AND WILDLIFE, ENVIRONMENT as well as WATER and CONSERVATION.

Evidence that reform will be a word often heard in the walls of the Senate and House of representatives this year came first from Lt. Gov. Hobby in the way of new rules for the Texas Senate.

Of primary importance was the reduction of the number of committees and also the fact that seniority will now be considered in awarding the chairmanships and committee appointments to Senators.

As you will note, I lost none of my committees but added the responsibility of the Chairmanship of the Economic Development Committee. I am quite pleased to have maintained my past important assignments.

INTRODUCES DEATH BILL

In the final days of 1972, I filed with the Legislative officials a bill to reinstate the death penalty in Texas.

By submitting this bill early, I hope to bring it before the Senate early for its consideration and quick passage.

This law would meet objections raised by the U.S. Supreme Court by specifying the death penalty for all persons convicted of murder under certain circumstances.

The Supreme Court earlier this year ruled Texas' death penalty unconstitutional because the way it was enforced discriminated against blacks and the poor.

My bill would provide life sentences or the death penalty for the following crimes: murder of a peace officer or fireman on official duty, murder of the course of kidnapping, burglary, robbery, forcible rape or arson, murder for pay, murder while attempting to escape from prison, murder of a prison guard, or murder with extreme atrocity or cruelty.

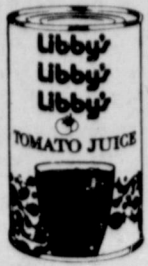

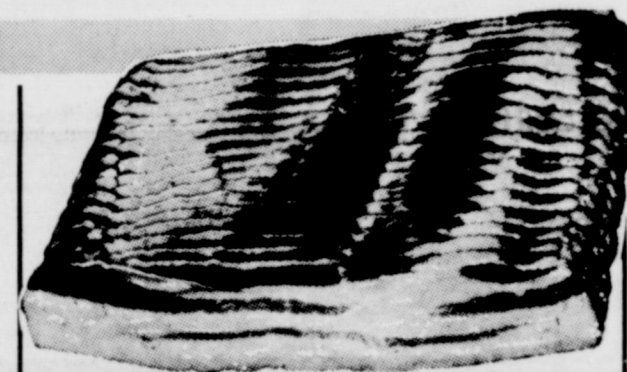

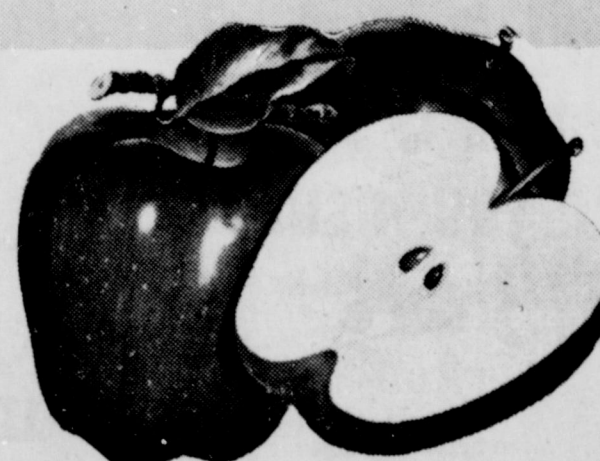

Many Things Affect Food Costs

The high cost of food is much on the minds of housewives and wage earners, but really, maybe cost is a matter of perspective.

Judging from a report given this week by County Extension Agent De Gordon who shows that Eastland County's agricultural economy is growing steadily upward, and nearly in reach of goals set for two years hence.

Speaking of the overall reports of high food costs, Agent Gordon reminded members of the Eastland Lions Club that we can all be thankful for the abundance of food available, as well as the variety and quality we depend on. "Naturally, we pay for the 'insurance' of safe, clean food," he pointed out, and later added that people's tastes are different than in earlier years. Today convenience and otherwise quickly prepared foods are much in demand, and their costs are high.

In reporting on the county's agricultural picture, which he called fantastic in 1972, Gordon explained that the big hitch is that as the total gross income to farmers goes up, so too do the costs of the supplies necessary to make this production, and the overall net to the farmer and rancher is disappointing.

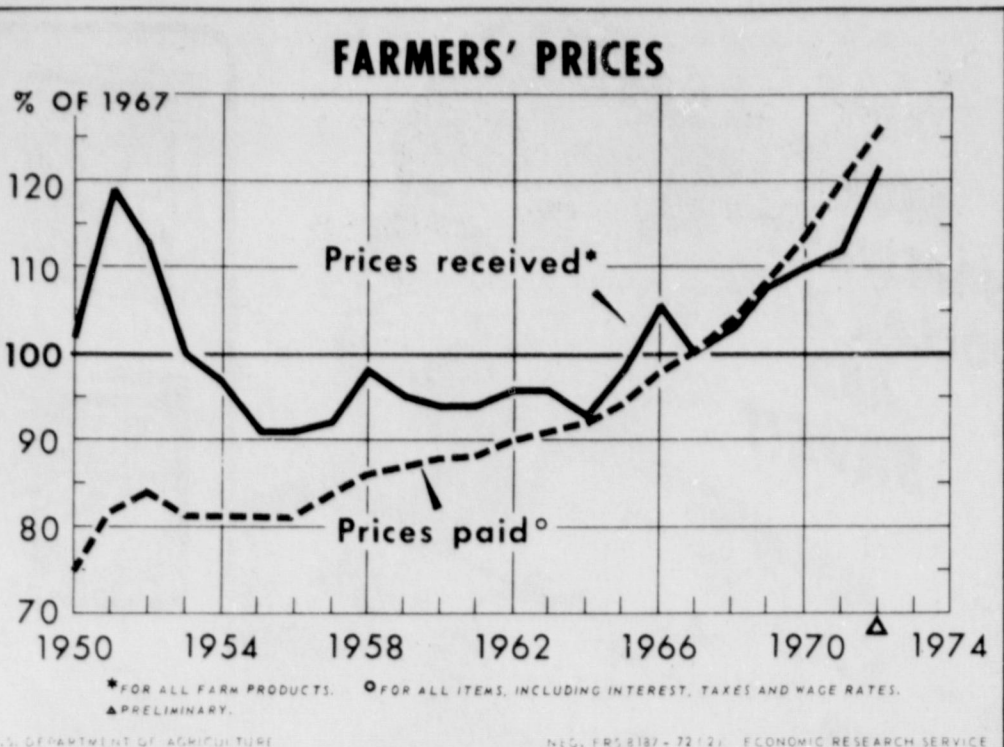
The Extension Service's 3.76 in '76 program in 1968 set certain goals to be reached by 1976. In 1968, 69 the county had gross incomes of \$11,934,910 and set as the 1976 goal total \$15,677,750.

That would represent an increase of \$3,742,740. Preliminary figures for 1972 show that the county is not far from that '76 goal, with a total 1972 gross from agricultural products of \$14,573,200. He explained that statewide preliminary figures showed that the '76 goals were reached in 1972, but the cost factors are up 100, and the net profits for the raisers isn't what it could be.

Gordon's graph on the prices received and the prices paid by farmers showed that the two lines were near equal in 1967. The prices received line fluctuates and is just now equal to or slightly above the price scale. Americans spend about 16 1/2 percent of every dollar earned for food, and that's a far cry better than in other countries. For example: For example: 26 percent in Great Britain; 44 percent in Hungary; 37 percent in East Germany; 42 percent in Czech; 56 percent in Russia; and 50 percent in Cuba.

Gordon showed that a worker worked four and a half hours in 1920 for the following bill of groceries: lb. of pork, quart of milk, dozen oranges, dozen eggs, 10 lbs. potatoes and a pound of steak. Today, he could buy the same bill with about an hour and a half's worth. At the other end of the price spectrum, the local grocery retailers, also report a constant increase in costs, but to a man, report that they are still applying the same profit percentage factors to their whole sale prices to arrive at current selling prices. Same costs increase haven't been raised on to the consumer, the local merchant said.

And so it is a dilemma -- on the one hand, Eastland County's total economy is bolstered by increased



production and resulting gross revenue, but when the costs go up 100, it's making for a puzzlement. Some costs increases haven't been passed on to the consumer, one local merchant said. Wholesale milk costs are up approximately four cents a gallon and retail prices are yet unchanged, one retailer reports.

Some 25 people came to the party plus assorted other friends and relatives who called during the day.

He eats sparingly of wholesome foods, doesn't exercise to excess and neither smokes or drinks. He smoked cigarettes for 50 years or longer and finally quit when he decided his health was being impaired. Legislative Action On Bill Delayed In Austin

Legislative action halted abruptly in Austin last week with the death of President Lyndon Johnson. Only one bill of importance to this area was voted on and action on this measure was delayed, according to State Rep. Joe C. Hanna.

The bill as argued called for stricter rules in regard to open meetings of all governmental groups, including any board, commission, department, committee, or agency within the executive or legislative department of the state. This would also include all local governmental groups such as school boards, city and county commissions.

The bill as presented to the legislature would make it almost impossible for governmental bodies to function properly, Rep. Hanna said, but added that amendments would be introduced to modify the more stringent conditions.

"As the bill reads, if any two members of such a group met over lunch and discussed what was to come up at the next meeting, they would be subject to a heavy fine and 30 days in jail," Hanna said.

Delaying passage of the bill will give legislators a chance to study it, and to hear from their constituents concerning it, Hanna added.

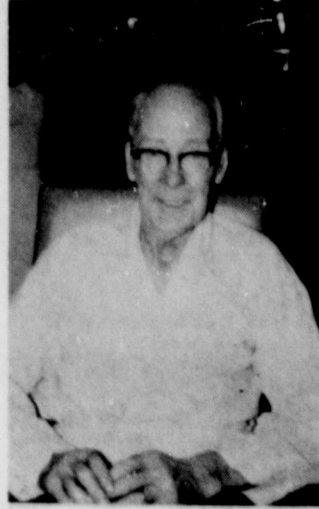

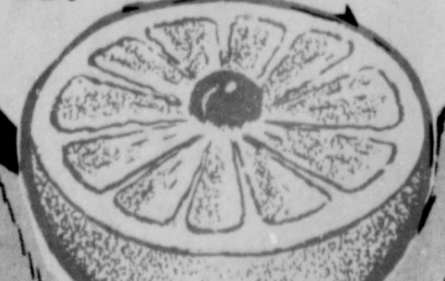


