FOR THOSE WHO don't particularly believe in talking to flowers here is what Science has to say according to a Reader's Digest story.

If you're interested in a greener, thicker lawn next summer, one way may be to give it lots of love along with the water and fertilizer.

Sound absurd? Perhaps. But, says an article in the February issue of the Reader's Digest, there's a growing body of scientific evidence that indicates that plants, like humans, have feelings and respond to such emotions as love and fear.

Much of the basis for this belief stems from experiments conducted by a New York lie-detector expert named Cleve Backster. Writes author James Lincoln Collier in the article: "Backster is convinced that plants 'feel' things; that they know who their friends are, and who their enemies; that they react to stress - so much so that they will actually 'faint' in the presence of a dangerous person.

Consider this experiment conducted by Backster with a lie-detector - or, as he prefers, "polygraph." He put two plants in a room, then handed slips of paper to each of six volunteers. One of the slips ordered a volunteer to "murder" one of the plants - to tear it out by the roots and stamp on it. The only "witness" to the murder was the remaining plant.

Backster connected a polygraph to the remaining plant, then presented the six men to the plant, one at a time. "Unerringly," writes Collier, "the polygraph needle jumped when the plant was confronted by the murdered!"

Another time, Backster attached a polygraph to a plant and then made a mental decision to burn one of its leaves. "At the very moment I made the decision," he says, "there was a dramatic and prolonged upward sweep in the tracing pattern. I hadn't moved or touched the plant." Backster is convinced that the only possible answer is that the plant, in effect, read his mind!

How about that?

reinstating the death sentence, change that he approved of that will include, Murder of a policeman or fireman in the line of duty; Murder committed while in the act of committing robbery, burglary, kidnapping, forcible rape, or arson; Murder for remuneration; Murder committed while escaping from a penal institution; Murder of an employee of a penal institution (Guard); and Murder committed with extreme atrocities, cruelty, or showing exceptional depravity on the part of the accused.

Walton said that in his opinion "utter chaos" will result if the entire present penal code is changed. However, there were other proposed changes that Walton favored, including the admission of oral confessions, sending defendants to state correctional institutions while awaiting their appeals, and a broader scope in present DWI laws to include sniffing of glue, paint, or other pressurized hallucinogens.

At the committee meeting plans were made for the spring district 8 THDA convention which will be held on Tuesday, March 20th at Cisco Junior College campus in

Eastland county. Theme for the meeting was announced as "Home - A Beacon Light". Plans for hosting this event will be made definitely at the February H.D. Council meeting.

Special Hints on Taking Care of Carpets:

Don't ever get a rug too wet. Water alone can sometimes cause brown or yellow stains. Never use soap on carpets. Clean up spills immediately. Here's a formula for one of the best rug cleaning solutions you can have. This solution was tested on many kinds of stains and it really worked. The solution is simple to make... 1 teaspoon dry detergent, 1 teaspoon white vinegar, and 1 quart warm water. Pour a little of this cleaning solution on the spot or stain. Don't use too much for a little bit should be sufficient. Wipe the spot gently. Work from the edge towards the center of the spot. Then you

won't spread the spot.

A new technique is being used in our grocery stores to insure wholesome foods. It's OPEN DATING. The phrase open dating generally refers to any date on a packaged food product that can be read and understood by the shopper. The date may be shown alphabetically and numerically as Feb. 23, or in numbers only as 2-23 or 0223. It may or may not include the year. Usually this date means the "pull date" or in other words it is the last day a store may offer the food item for sale. Of importance is that this date is designed to allow the consumer a

reasonable amount of time to store and use the food item at home even if she bought it on the pull date.

What food products do we see the open dating code on? Some the items are meat, produce,

dairy products, bakery items as canned biscuits, cake mixes, instant coffee, pickles, peanut butter jars, jellies, etc.

It is to the consumers advantage to check these dates when purchasing food for this

As rich in natural resources as it is in natural beauties, the Gulf makes a fascinating subject for a recent study, THE GULF OF MEXICO, written by Bern Keating with photographs by Dan Guravich, a new title in the Exxon Shorelines of America series (126 pages, 64 in full color, \$14.95, Viking).

Travelling separately by car, plane and boat, author Keating and photographer Guravich surveyed thousands of miles to see if, and how, the beauties of the Gulf were standing up against the ravages of

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progress. They posed this question: Considering all the damage done by man and nature, is there enough natural beauty left around the Gulf to make it worth fighting to save? To find an answer, they covered a lot of ground and a lot of water. They found that Florida still offers the Cry Tortugas with their sooty terns and rare green turtles, the Keys with their coral reefs, the mangrove swamps along the West Coast, the zero-energy beaches along the Big Bend, the Spanish moss thriving in the Panhandle. In Alabama, they found Mobile Bay teeming with oysters and shrimp (in season) and the beautiful dunes of Dauphin Island. Much of the Mississippi coast is still scarred from 1969's hurricane Camille but now the govern-
