Bomb Threat Clears County Courthouse

A state of emergency anxiety existed Wednesday morning at the Eastland County Courthouse as a bomb threat was being checked out.

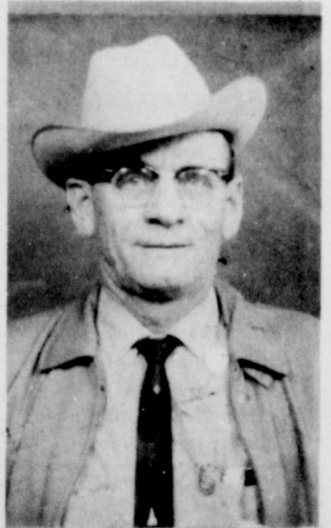
County Judge Scott Bailey's secretary received the call at 10:27 a.m., and she reported that a male voice told her that a bomb had been placed in the courthouse, and would go off at "something... 30." She said that she couldn't understand the hour given. The caller hung up.

City, county and other law enforcement officers were attending a special FBI fingerprinting school across the street at the Eastland National Bank Conference Room, and were immediately alerted, and

began a search of the courthouse.

Employees were cleared out of the building, and the lawmen were checking every possible site for the bomb.

Eastland Postmaster Marcus O'Dell was called and he retrieved all the mail which had been deposited in the mail box in the lobby of the courthouse.

Civic contributions, scholastic achievement and agricultural development were recognized and rewarded, as the 1973 Eastland Chamber of Commerce Golden Deeds Award Banquet Tuesday evening marked the beginning of a new year with new leadership in the further development of Eastland.

An in-depth report of the state highway conditions was given and a challenge issued by a noted state official, to the 215 persons attending the beautiful event at the Eastland Elementary Cafeteria.

Named for Golden Deeds Awards are Eastland National Bank Vice President and Director Grover Hallmark, and former Eastland National Bank Vice President Jeff Glazner, now of Graham.

Cited for Scholastic Achievement as class leaders at Eastland High School are Senior Becky Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Jackson; Junior Mila Kincaid, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kincaid; Sophomore Vivian Maxwell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Roy Maxwell; and Freshman Randall Frost, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Frost.

Recognizing the importance of agriculture to this area's economy, the Chamber named Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Tankersley the Outstanding Agricultural Family in Eastland County.

Retiring Chamber President Marcus O'Dell expressed appreciation to all for help during the fantastic 1972 growth period for Eastland.

New President J. T. (Buddy) Carter introduced other officers and directors and pledged himself to continue the programs of progress. First Vice President is Bruce Pipkin and second vice president is Emmett Lasater. Directors are Don Baird, Marie Boney, Clint Bray, E. A. Connel, Wade Freeman, Eugene Frost, James Fullen, R. P. Haun, Jr. Ann Jernigan, Don Martin, Marcus O'Dell, M. H. Perry, Saul Pullman, Monroe Rollins, Wendell Siebert, Lewis Tiner, Doug Underwood and Frank Sayre.

Featured speaker Charles Simons, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, called for support in the federal highway program, calling attention to the needs that exist. Citing the tragedy at the New Mexico narrow bridge recently, he pointed out that Texas has some deficiencies in that area too.

"It might shock you, also, to learn that we have 1,346 such bridges on the Texas Highway System. Fifty-five of these are on federal aid primary highways: 949 on federal aid secondary highways, and 342 on state highways and farm to market roads.

"It might shock you further to learn that in addition to this deficiency we have 3,685 bridges no wider than 25 feet which need to be widened or replaced. There are an additional 6,352 bridges on the interstate and primary systems between 25 and 40 feet wide which are deficient.

"We spent \$10 million last year to bring just 80 bridges up to acceptable safety standards. We have widened about 75 bridges a year since 1965 at a cost of \$6 million annually. If there is an engineer in the audience that has his slip stick with him, he might figure out quickly how long it would take and how much money it would require to take care of our bridge deficiencies alone."

"Between now and 1990 we estimate conservatively that we must construct about 12,000 miles to multi-lane or freeway standards to handle present and anticipated traffic. The price tag? \$13 billion at today's costs. Our total needs to 1990 for all purposes are estimated at \$20 billion, plus."

"In 1973 -- this year -- we should have a minimum program of \$1.2 billion to keep up with our needs. We will be shy of that amount by about \$500,000,000 and shy by a much greater amount unless Congress acts quickly to pass a new federal aid bill. And remember, work the Department doesn't do this year will have to be carried over, compounding the needs in later years."
