# Bank Deposits Reflect Improvement Over 1955

# **Increase Totals** \$184,724, Bank **Statement Shows**

An increase in bank deposit was reflected in the statement of the Eastland National Bank.

Deposits were \$184,724 higher a year ago as of April 10. the statement revealed. Deposits vere listed at \$3,753,612.30, as ompared to only \$3,568,888 in April of 1955.

The bank report was also favorrose. Loans and discounts totaled \$1,155,683 as of the tenth of this month, while they were listed at \$1,302,683 in April, 1955. That s a decrease in loans of \$147,255.

The bank's resources were listed at \$3,979,546.91, broken down as follows: Loans and discounts, \$1,155,683.90; stock in Federal Reserve Bank, \$3000; Banking House, \$13,500; furniture and fixtures, \$15,000; U.S. Government bonds, \$1,186,200; other bonds and warrants, \$169,038.06; cash and exchange, \$1,437,124.95.
