Eastland had a lot of weather in 1972 - - but not a lot of rain.

Total for the year according to official U.S. Weather Bureau figures is 18.79 inches, com pared to 31.53 during 1971.

The cold, dry month of December brought little moisture (.08 of an inch, with .05 on the 11th and .03 on the 29) but a record surprise low of 12 on Dec. 16.

High for the month was 81 and the mercury fell 66 degrees for a low night-time reading of 14. The high for Eccember a year earlier was 74 on Dec. 22.

High temperature for 1972 was 109 recorded on June 25 and the low for the year was Jan. 5, 1972 when eight degrees was marked.




Nancy Trout Becomes New Tax Assessor

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

Christmas is over but some of the stains may still remain as a reminder. If this is true at your house, you might try some of these remedies for removal: Candle Wzx: Scrape off as much as possible, then place the stain between paper towels and press with a warm iron. Next place the stain face downward on paper towels and sponge the back with dry cleaning solvent. Let dry, then launder. If the stain remains launder again with an oxygen bleach. If the spot is still not removed and color and fabric type permit, launder finally with a chlorine bleach.

A few general hints are to test any stain remover on a corner of fabric first, do not add chlorine bleach to an enzyme presoak product, and treat spots from the back of the fabric. Place the spot downward on some paperwowels so that the stain will come off the fabric instead of going through




