Morren, Chief of Police of Eastland, and Civil Defense Director, has just completed a special Civil Defense Director's Seminar at the Department of Public Safety Training Academy, Austin, Texas. The Seminar was held February 6- 8, 1973, with Civil Defense Directors from 18 locations in the state attending.

The primary purpose of the seminar was to provide information and guidance to local Civil Defense Directors and Coordinators so that local governments may achieve readiness capability to cope with any disaster or hazard. Instruction was provided in the organization of Federal and State governments in meeting disaster so as to inform local directors of assistance available and channels of communication to obtain the assistance. Staff members from the Division of Defense and Disaster Relief and the Defense Civil Preparedness Agency, Region Five, Denton presented the course of instruction. Chief Morren was presented a certificate upon completion of the course by chief C. O. Layne, State Coordinator, Division of Defense and Disaster Relief, Austin.



Eastland's newest business will be Tony's Cafeteria which is located on West Main. Mr. Webb said that a total of about 8 people will be employed at opening with a possible increase in employment later on. The main thing Mr. Webb wants in his cafeteria is for it to be clean and give the customer fast service and the right amount of food for which he is paying. The Cafeteria will open 6 days a week and will be closed on Saturday. Mr. Webb also stated that the meat that will be served will be changed frequently during the day to insure that everyone that comes by will be getting something he or she likes during the day.

## Could Lose ASCS

Eastland County farmers may be faced with another setback in the rural programs proposed by the Department of Agriculture with the plan to consolidate the Stephens County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office with those of Palo Pinto and Parker counties.

One of the proposed plans is a master two year outline to eventually reduce the existing 236 ASCS offices in Texas to 96.

With the recent cancellation of the rural environment Assistance Program (REAP) appropriations which totalled 69,300.00 in Eastland County, fewer employees are needed to administer the existing programs, thus, only one office is required.

As many as five offices will

be served from one location in the proposed plan.

In addition to the cancelled REAP program, the local ASCS office handles all government crop programs, including crop allotments payment and certification of crop acreage.

Another plan proposed by Washington will close 40 county offices in the state with less than 500 man days for operation each year without the REAP programs. Stephens county office has a total of 560 man hours according to Terry Harris, executive director, and is not included in the list of county offices to be eliminated.

No official announcement has been made to put either of the proposed plans into effect, the local ASCS office emphasized.

Lawmakers may be waiting to see what type of farm programs, if any, are proposed for 1974 when the current farm bill expires. If there is no farm program, none of the offices in any of the state's counties will be required.

However, from all indications it seems probable that the offices will be consolidated.

Only seven counties in the state will retain their own ASCS office and not be combined with other county offices: Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, and Hidalgo counties.

If and when the counties are combined all current employment will be terminated, which means that the three employees in the local ASCS office would be at least temporarily out of work.

However, if either of the proposed plans are adopted, hundreds of thousands of dollars in payrolls will be lost and hundred's of employees will lose jobs.

## Development Takes Balanced Approach

WASHINGTON -- A community must have a balanced approach to achieve development, according to William Erwin, assistant secretary of agriculture for rural development.

Too often, development is paralyzed by tough decisions on which problem to attack first. A small community that needs an industry for several reasons decides that it needs improved water and sewer service to attract the industry. But local taxes may be too high already. The community can't afford the system, even with assistance. So development is paralyzed.

A balanced approach can bypass such roadblocks. To help make rural communities better places to live and work, four things are needed, says Mr. Erwin. They include

- Community facilities
- Economic development
- People building
- Environmental improvement

Community facilities include more and better housing, improved transportation and adequate utilities and sewer and water systems. Economic development means not only making agriculture more profitable, but providing more job opportunities - farm and nonfarm.

People building is the term used for better educational opportunities for rural people, expanded health services, improved nutrition and more cultural opportunities. It also means helping the disadvantaged. Environmental improvement includes developing more recreational areas, using better conservation practices, protecting wildlife and, in general, more effective land use planning for rural areas.

I am the mother of students in Elementary School and am concerned about their lunch program there.

It is not so much the quality, although I feel this could be improved nutritionally, as the quantity of food the children are given which disturbs me.

As an observer, I know for a fact, that the children get very small portions, as little as one spoonful of many vegetables. One child complained of loving greens - many do not like this - and having only a bite on her plate.

My children will not hurt because they can eat when they come home but many cannot at least not much. For many the school meal could well be the best and the most they will get in a day.

Children's health to me seems more important than a little waste. To many, the combinations of food offered are not appetizing. It seems that if more chicken and fish (more healthy than pork and beef) could be used in various ways, the children would benefit.

I hope other mothers will let their feelings be known concerning this matter. a Concerned Mother
