COUNTY AGENT De Gordon files the following report on the low temperature bit of the past weekend -- and it doesn't sound too good --

Go back to "go" and do not collect \$200 dollars. Those words represent disappointment and indicate you must start over again in a familiar game. But it also describes the feeling of people in Eastland County who had so much hope for a good fruit, nut and vegetable crop this year.

After the freezing temperatures that covered the county April 9, 10 and 11 all home gardeners must start over again. In the case of fruit growers -- wait till next year.

Hundreds of families in the county had great pride in their apricot, peach and plum trees this spring. They had a heavy set of fruit on the trees. The soil has plenty of moisture and this would have been an excellent year for fruit production. But the freeze almost totally destroyed the fruit crop in spite of much effort to save it. Some people covered their yard trees and some sprayed water on the trees through Monday and Tuesday nights, but nothing did any good as the temperature dropped to 26 degrees early Tuesday morning.

For the back yard fruit growers it is a disappointment, but for the commercial fruit growers it is a big financial loss -- almost 50 thousand dollars across Eastland County. Tommy Rice of the W.H. Smith orchard, said they had about 90 percent loss in the orchard which is the largest in Eastland County. Mrs. Chester Marrso of the Chaney Community said they received much damage from hail the previous week as well as damage from the freeze. Dave Fambrough, owner of one of the largest "city" orchards in Eastland said he had 100 percent kill of his fruit.

Herman and Dora Schaefer of Nimrod reports that this will be the first time in 20 years that they will have a complete loss of fruit.

Home gardeners report they lost tomatoes, pepper, squash, beans and corn, even those that were covered. Potatoes were also top killed, but most think they will come out again from the same roots.

It's difficult to tell how much damage has been done to the pecan crop. The new growth containing the flowering parts were frozen in most cases, but dormant buds will now come and some of these reduce the pecan crop. Some estimate a 50 percent loss of yield of pecans will result.

County O.K.'s \$3,000 Tax Break

Homeowners over 65 years of age will get a county tax break as a result of action taken this week by the Eastland County Commissioners Court, it was announced Wednesday by County Judge Scott Bailey.

An order granting a homestead exemption in the amount of \$3,000 of ad valorem value for persons 65 years of age or older was passed Monday by the Court.

This action in compliance with an almost two-to-one vote last November on a Constitutional Amendment which would permit such action. Eastland Countians voted 3,156 for the amendment in

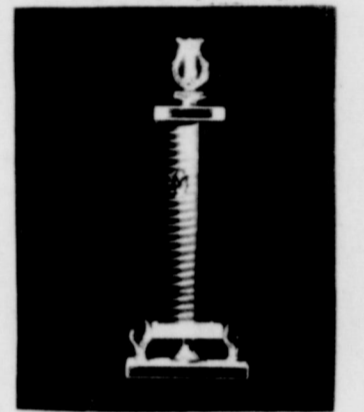

Ramada Inn 'On Schedule'--Opening Mid-June

Construction on the new \$750,000 Ramada Inn on Interstate 20 is progressing on schedule according to officials of Trans-Texas Motels, Inc., builders of the facility.

The addition to Eastland will have 71 rooms, a restaurant and club, meeting room facilities and a swimming pool.

Over 600 square feet will be devoted to the meeting rooms and may be divided into two rooms capable of holding 30-35 each.

Eastland Club President Mrs. Dan Childress swept the top honor in winning the first place President's report prize.

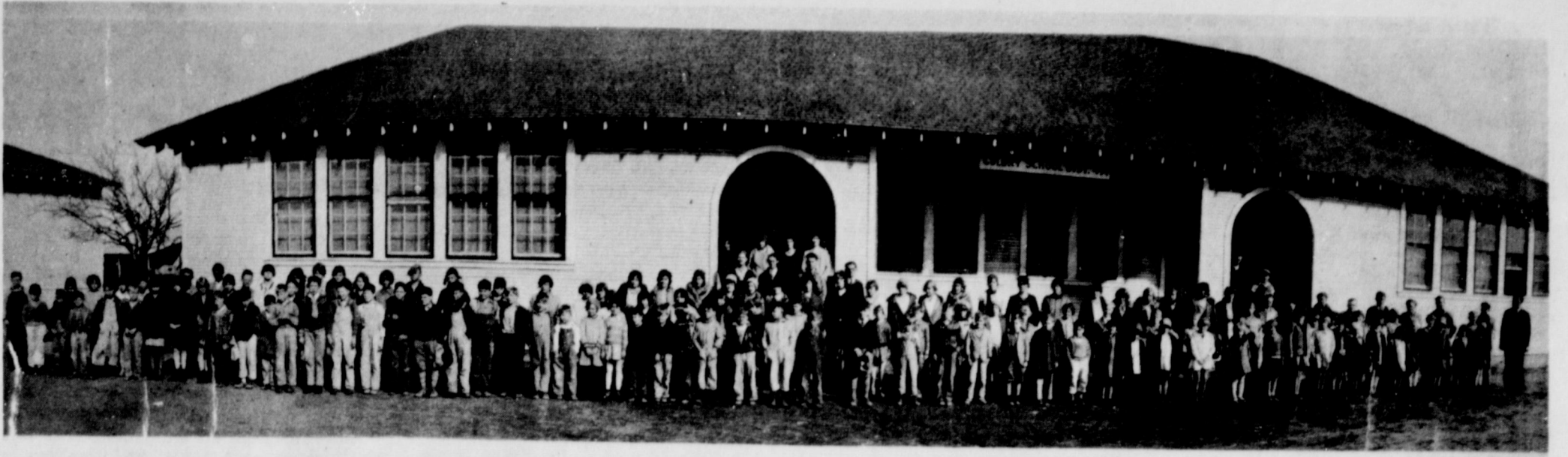
The local club extended an invitation in association with the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the
