COUNTY AGEN: De Gordon files the following report on the low temperature bit of the past weekend - - and it doesn't sound too good - -

Go back to "go" and do not collect \$200 dollars. Those words represent disappointment and indicate you must start over again in a familiar game. But it also describes the feeling of people in Eastland County who had so much hope for a good fruit, nut and vegetable crop this year. After the freezing temperatures that covered the county April 9, 10 and 11 all home gardeners must start over again. In the case of fruit growers- - - wait till next year. Hundreds of families inthe county had great pride in their apricot, peach and plum trees this spring. They had a heavy set of fruit on the trees. The soil has plenty of moisture and this would have been an excellent year for fruit production. But the freeze almost totally destroyed the fruit crop in spite of much effort to save it. Some people covered their yard trees and some sprayed water on the trees through Monday and Tuesday nights, but nothing did years

any good as the temperature

dropped to 26 degrees early

Tuesday morning. For the back yard fruit growers it is a disappointment, but for the commercial fruit growers it is a big financial loss- - almost 50 thousand dollas across Eastland County. Tommy Rice of the W.H. Smith orchard, said they had about 90 percent loss in theorchard which is the largest in Eastland County. Mrs. Chester Marrso of the Chaney Fambrough, owner of one of the largest "city" orchards in the Lions Club and had served Eastland said he had 100 percent kill of his fruit. Herman and Dora Schaefer of Nimrod reports that this will be the first time in 20 years that they will have a complete loss of fruit.


Reindale Enterprises of Arlington is the general contractor.
