

THE OLDEST RELIC? - - This bell was cast in St. Louis, Mo. in mid 1800's and brought from Bowling Green, Kentucky by John T. Townsend in a covered wagon in 1869. The bell was used on the Towsend Ranch, and at the Baptist(First) Church before being installed in the First Church of God in 1923. The bell is the oldest relic of Eastland County still being used. The bell measures 36 inches by 36 inches. There is a proposal being considered to install plate glass in the belfrey of the church on Lamar St. so that the bell can be viewed. Preliminary estimates are that the louvers could be removed and plate glass put in their place, and with proper lighting, the bell would become another historical viewable landmark. Estimates are that the costs might be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$350 including the securing of a historical marker depicting the bell's history. 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AN ORDINANCE

TAN ORDINANCE REPEALING ALL OR-DINANCES, OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES, OR AMEND-MENTS THERETO, THAT CONFLICT WITH THE TERMS OR CONDITIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ENACTING IN LIEU THEREOF A NEW OR-DINANCE, REGULATING PLUMBING WORK IN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS: DEFINING CER-TAIN TERMS: PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN EXEMP-TIONS: PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE AND THE SSUANCE OF PERMITS AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN FEES: PROVIDING FOR SPECIFICATIONS,

MATERIALS AND METHODS PLUMBING STALLATIONS: PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS OR-DINANCE: PROVIDING A SEWER - ABILITY CLAUSE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Eastland:

CHAPTERI TITLE CITED

1.1 This ordinance shall be known as the Plumbing Ordinance of the City of Eastland, and may be cited as such.

It shall be unlawful for any person, association of persons, co - partnership or corporation to engage in the business of plumbing, or do or perform any. plumbing as defined in this ordinance, without first having procured the necessary icenses and permits as hereinafter provided for, and all plumbing, plumbing work and workmanship and materials shall meet the requirements of this ordinance and shall pass all inspections required in this ordinance in regard to the work done.

CHAPTER2 INTENT AND PURPOSE

1 PURPOSE: For the protection and preservation of ife and of the public health, safety, property and the general welfare of the people, the following provisions are enacted relating to the installation, alteration or repair of pipes, fittings and fixtures for water, sewage and natural gas in all buildings and structures and all property now erected or to be erected. changed, constructed. reconstructed, repaired or altered in the City of Eastland. if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems. The intent and purpose of this ordinance is to regulate the construction, erection, enlargement. alteration, maintenance or repair of all piping. fittings, fixtures, etc., about any and all premises in the City of Eastland, and outside the boundaries of the City of Eastland, if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems.

26.3 PENALTIES: Any person. either by himself or agent, and any firm, corporation or other entry who violates any of the privisions of this Coee shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction of any such violation. shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS ! (\$100.00); and each day during which such violation continues shall constitute a separate and distince offense. In any case of a violation of any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actively in charge of the business of such the business of such corporation, shall be subject to the penalty herein provided. Any offense defined herein which has been defined by laws of the State of Texas as an offense and for which penalty has been described shall be punished as provided in said State Law, and nothing herein shall be held as fixing

any penalty contrary to a penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

(Chapters 3 through 26.2 of such ordinance are omitted herefrom for publication purposes.)

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


