Indicative of the fantastic growth that Eastland is experiencing, is the fourth quarter report just released by

Eastland National Bank. The record-high total as of the close of business on Dec. 29, showed total assets at the

Eastland bank at \$15,136,664.54.

Deposits at the end of the year were pegged at \$14,047,870.47, and loans were at \$5,355,133.84.

These figures over the previous quarter compare with total year-end reports in previous years.

Fourth quarter totals over a million dollar increase in deposits over three months ago, and well over another million in assets, compared to the third quarter totals.

At the end of the third quarter, (Sept. 29) the bank reported \$13,004,815.38 on

deposit with \$14,094,814.04 total assets. Loan figure at the end of the third quarter was \$5,792,151.65.

A year ago, at the end of 1971, Eastland National Bank figures reported were \$1,743,861.13; \$11,611,679.46 on deposit; and total assets, \$12,613,461.19.

It was in September of 1968, that the bank first showed deposits in excess of seven million; hitting eight million at the end of that year; nine million in the third quarter of 1969; and ten million first at the third quarter of 1970; eleven million at the end of

1971; 12 million first in March of 1972; 13 million in September; and the year-end 14 million makes the overall

picture bright for Eastland and its trade territory.

It was a good crop year, and retail trades report a good

year here, with home building heavy during 1972, and prospects bright for even greater increases in 1973.

## THE OLDEST RELIC? - This bell was cast in St. Louis, Mo. in mid 1800's and brought from Bowling Green, Kentucky by John T. Townsend in a covered wagon in 1869.

The bell was used on the Townsend Ranch, and at the Baptist (First) Church before being installed in the First Church of God in 1923. The bell is the oldest relic of Eastland County still being used. The bell measures 36 inches by 36 inches. There is a proposal being considered to install plate glass in the belfry of the church on Lamar St. so that the bell can be viewed. Preliminary estimates are that the louvers could be removed and plate glass put in their place, and with proper lighting, the bell would become another historical viewable landmark. Estimates are that the costs might be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$350 including the securing of a historical marker depicting the bell's history. ## First Church Of God History

The First Church of God is located on the corner of Lamar and Valley Streets in Eastland. This land was first granted to Thornton Thatcher in April 1859 by Texas Governor, H. R. Runnels.

In 1876 Mr. Joseph B. Ammerman acquired the land. The land changed hands several times in the years following. In 1880 to J. S. Daugherty, then to C. U. Connelley, 1883 to Anna Woods, J. L. Tindall, 1885 to C. U. Connelley and Lula Connelley, in 1891 to William H. Parvin, in 1907 to George H. Parvin, to R. F. Jones, to Charlotte Parvin,

in 1918 to Mrs. Mamie Parvin Hill.

The Church bought the property October 24, 1922. Soon the new church building was built.

Located in the bell tower is one of Eastland County's oldest relics and maybe the oldest still in use.

The beautifully toned bell was brought to Eastland County in 1869 from Bowling Green, Kentucky, by John T. Townsend. The bell was transported in one of the covered wagons which brought seven families from Bowling Green to Eastland County to

homestead ranch land.

The bell was used on the Townsend Ranch and later at the Baptist (First) Church in Eastland.

The following Pastors have served the church since its beginning.

Rev. J. W. Batdorf, Rev. Adeock, Rev. T. H. McNeil, Rev. Barnett, Rev. Robert E. Bowden, Rev. Morrison, Rev. D.Hathcoat, Rev. W. E. Hallenbeck, Rev. Joseph L. Downs, Rev. Ben Stewart, Rev. O. R. Williams, Rev. William Gates, Rev. T. S. Whitesel, and presently Rev. Charles Whitton.

# Modernization Program Planned For Times

## New Offset Press To Arrive Soon

Installation of a new American Type Founders Chief 20 commercial printing press due this week marks the initial step in a long-range renovation project for the Ranger Times and its Commercial Printing Department. Editor-Manager Pat Collins has announced.

Hale Dunson, manager of the commercial printing department which does job printing at the Ranger office for all offices in the Eastland County Newspapers Co., said that the press is due to arrive and be installed this week.

The press, with its expanded capacity, will offer the firm a broader range of services and add extensively to the company's printing capabilities. It is an offset press and joins a smaller Chief 15 in the offset department. The plant also boasts five letterpress presses and allied commercial printing equipment including typesetting and bindery equipment. Physical modernization of the Times Building is also scheduled for this year, with plans calling for a complete

new decorative front on the building, as well as lowering of the ceilings inside from front to back to accommodate new heating and cooling facilities to be installed.

Removal of the historic glass front will also result in the installation of new lighting throughout the building.

Miss Anice Locke is Society Editor for the paper and will be instrumental in helping draft plans for remodeling, to achieve functional design as well as to provide the women's touch to the planning.

Bill Collins is Circulation Manager for the Times and his mail and route department will also be modernized.

Most of the building's beautiful panneling will be retained and painting decor will be in keeping throughout. The firm has during planning stages, considered relocation, but is fairly well convinced that renovation of the present building offers the most practical approach, utilizing existing building, brought up to modern standards. "We feel that this program is

in step with Ranger's present over-all growing conditions," Mr. Collins said, "and we hope that with our planning and modernization, we will be able to expand our services to the people of this city and its trade territory."

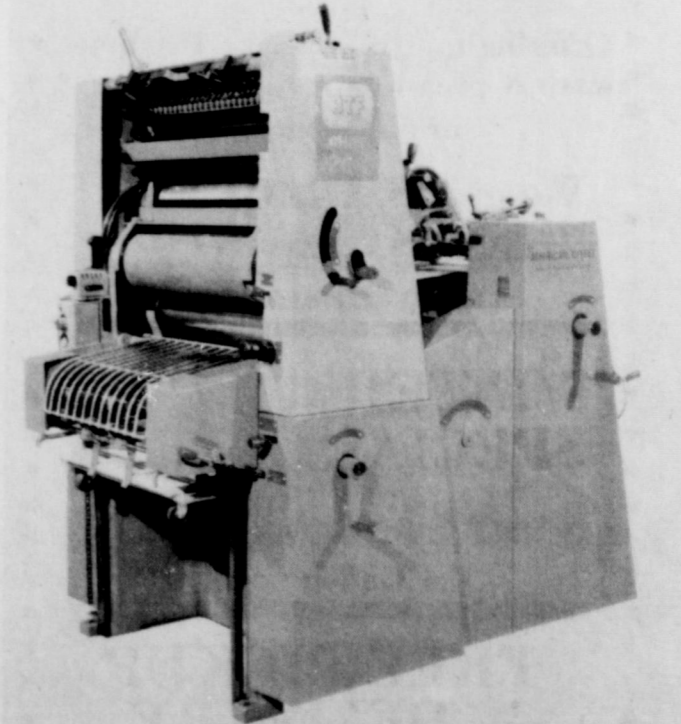

**IMPORTANT NOTICE!**

**AN ORDINANCE**  
**REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES, OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES, OR AMENDMENTS THERETO, THAT CONFLICT WITH THE TERMS OR CONDITIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ENACTING IN LIEU THEREOF A NEW ORDINANCE, REGULATING PLUMBING WORK IN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN EXEMPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE AND THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN FEES; PROVIDING FOR SPECIFICATIONS, MATERIALS AND METHODS OF PLUMBING INSTALLATIONS; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SEWER ABILITY CLAUSE.**

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Eastland:

**CHAPTER I**  
**TITLE CITED**  
 1.1 This ordinance shall be known as the Plumbing Ordinance of the City of Eastland, and may be cited as such.

It shall be unlawful for any person, association of persons, co-partnership or corporation to engage in the business of plumbing, or do or perform any plumbing as defined in this ordinance, without first having procured the necessary licenses and permits as hereinafter provided for, and all plumbing, plumbing work and workmanship and materials shall meet the requirements of this ordinance and shall pass all inspections required in this ordinance, in regard to the work done.

**CHAPTER II**  
**INTENT AND PURPOSE**  
 1.1 **PURPOSE:** For the protection and preservation of life and of the public health, safety, property and the general welfare of the people, the following provisions are enacted relating to the installation, alteration or repair of pipes, fittings and fixtures for water, sewage and natural gas in all buildings and structures and all property now erected or to be erected, changed, constructed, reconstructed, repaired or altered in the City of Eastland, if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems. The intent and purpose of this ordinance is to regulate the construction, erection, enlargement, alteration, maintenance or repair of all piping, fittings, fixtures, etc., about any and all premises in the City of Eastland, and outside the boundaries of the City of Eastland, if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems.

**26.3 PENALTIES:** Any person, either by himself or agent, and any firm, corporation or other entry who violates any of the provisions of this Code shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction of any such violation, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00); and each day during which such violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. In any case of a violation of any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actively in charge of the business of such corporation, shall be subject to the penalty herein provided. Any offense defined herein which has been defined by laws of the State of Texas as an offense and for which penalty has been described shall be punished as provided in said State Law, and nothing herein shall be held as fixing

any penalty contrary to a penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

(Chapters 3 through 26.2 of such ordinance are omitted herefrom for publication purposes.)

## I Remember

Dick O'Brien

Writing about Carbon last week reminded me of the changes which paved roads brought to the small towns. Before the road between Carbon and Eastland was paved, Carbon was a thriving center of activity. Not that it isn't alive and vibrant today, but in those days in the early twenties there were two strong banks, two large department stores, two drug stores and a number of grocery and dry goods stores. There were several strong churches, the Methodist and Baptist churches had Sunday school, attendance of around two hundred. And the Church of Christ was a strong organization for the spiritual welfare of the community, as was the Presbyterian church. Two barber shops and two black smith shops, two busy garages and two cotton gins. There was a time when Carbon boasted three physicians, a first class school system and a lively community spirit supporting social, moral and athletic activities. The M.K.&T railroad did good business and Carbon was the trading center for a rich agricultural region. But the paved highway tempted too many people to "go to the Big town," to shop. We have lived in homes from remote rural communities to the sixth largest city in the nation; and if we were permitted to choose the most pleasant and rewarding, we would choose the Carbon of forty years ago!
