HOMESTEAD MAY BE SOLD FOR TAXES

Many Texans have the mistaken on that their homestead cannot be seized and sold for delinquent taxes. In many cases, this idea has led to considerable have been paid. Otherwise, the grief and monetary loss which ould have been avoided. A homestead should be rendered to tax issessors like any other property, and taxes assessed against it hould be paid as faithfully as hose on any other taxable prop-

In a previous column, it was inficated that the deadline for renagencies are concerned. The last date for rendering real and personal property for state and county taxes is April 30. State taxes are collected by the County Tax

Under the Texas Constitution, each family is entitled to claim with the county tax assessor on or erty, whether homestead or not. before April 30, each and every agency cannot do so, even though it may actually pay the annual

When the homestead affidavit s properly filed, the owner beomes entitled to an exemption of state taxes up to the value of \$3,000, or 200 acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from payment, not a complete exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to county or city taxes. The homestead claimed for tax

surposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by he owner as his residence.

When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200-acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be equired to pay.

Forestry Kits To Be Given **To Boy Scouts**

Texas Boy Scouts this month will paractice at becoming young foresters.

Through more than 5,300 forestry kits being donated to the Lone Star State's Boy Scout councils by wood-using industries, the Scouts plan to learn about conservation of Texas forests and the role that timber plays in the state's economy.

Announctment of the forestry kit distribution was made by Geo. Stanley, Houston, chairman of the Texas Forest Industries Committee. He said Boy Scouts across the nation will participate in the program and that projects in most troops will get underway in April, Forestry Month for the nation's 1.5 million Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts.

Tht kit was prepared by American Forest Products Industries, Washington, D. C., educational organization supported by the nation's wood-using industries. More than 86,000 kits are currently being distributed to all U. S. Boy Scout councils.

A Loggers' Field Day, a Boy Scout forestry forum for radio and television, forestry games, visits to Tree Farms, sawmills and paper mills, demonstrations of forest management and fire prevention are among the projects suggested in the kit.

Stanley, whose committee represents AFPI in Texas, said national Scout officials report that demand for the kit is "unprecendent ed," and that they expect it to be as popular as a similar kit preparfor Cub Scouts last year by

Scout executives are conducting training schools in use of the forestry kit.

Barbecue Corned Beef Medley (4 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, ½ cup chopped onions, ½ cup chopped celery, 1 cup tomato sauce (8 ounces), ½ cup catsup, 1 cup water, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons kitchen bouquet, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 cups cooked corned beef, julienne style (½ pound), 1½ cups cornecut off cob or one 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, drained; 1 tablespoons waters water.

spoon cornstarch, 2 tablespoons water.

Heat fat in 2-quart saucepan. Cook onion over moderate heat until soft but not brown. Add celery, tomato sauce, pepper, sugar, vinegar, kitchen bouquet and Worcestershire sauce. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add corned beef and corn and cook until thoroughly heated. Serve over toasted picnic buns or split, hot biscuits.

Dark Chocolate-Frosted Cake

Three squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 package instant fluffy frosting mix, two 9-inch devil's food layers, baked and cooled, made of instant mix.

Melt chocolate over hot water. Remove from heat and COOL TO ROOM TEMPERATURE. Prepare frosting mix according to package directions, using ½ teaspoon vanilla (optional). Then, with a spoon, carefully fold in the COOLED chocolate.

Spread generously between layers and cover top and sides of cake. Cover cake to keep frosting soft and glossy.

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



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
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
