We feel mighty good at the moment. It's raining outside (very lightly) and our spirits — like yours — are up.

Well, it didn't take long for Lee Harr over Ranger way to get in his rebuttal testimony. We pondered the question, you may recall, why the Bulldogs didn't enter the track meet this year. We used four lines in asking our question, and Mr. Harr's reply used up most of the front page of The Times.

He replied: "Moore doesn't have a chip on his shoulder just over the fact that Ranger has no track squad. It goes back to something last year when sign boards leading into Eastland began displaying the "Home of Lake Leon" slogan, at which time we printed a few disparaging remarks over the affair. What Eastland wants the world to know is that they conceived and single-handedly built the lake.

"But not so. This has prompted the slogan 'Birthplace of Lake Leon' at the top right hand corner of The Times."

"The Telegram has," Harr continued, "in the past year taken their wrath on The Times. The Telegram is a graphic tab on the pulse of Eastland. For instance, when we made these remarks over the 'Home of Lake Leon' affair, deep wells were heard all over Eastland County from the Eastland direction.

"The situation has boiled for nearly a year and now has spilled into the open. If the writing had been published while Moore was still in the saddle in Eastland, we would have heard the repercussions sooner. However, the real dig in Moore's most recent writing is hidden from only those who know and understand Moore best.

"His article possibly was incited through the Chamber of Commerce.

"However, we feel that we can stand his journalistic onslaught, as we believe that we adequately coped with Norman Wright, also of The Telegram, last year. The odd part was that we drew support from Jerry Clarke down in Gorman, who suddenly jumped into the picture from the side, attacking Wright with his might.

"In fact, since these running arguments have been in progress, both Moore and Wright have their first time to draw support from outside interests."

This word of advice to our readers: don't ask for a half cup of coffee at the White Elephant Cafe.

You thought we were gonna skip that argument, didn't you? We are not. Just wanted to think a second before we replied ever so gently to the Column One writer over at Ranger.

First let us say that Eastland doesn't believe that we built Lake Leon by ourselves. Ranger is due equal credit and we will be the last to deny it.

Secondly let us say that the "Home of Lake Leon" slogan was not indeed dreamed up by The Telegram. The Eastland National Bank first used it on their beautiful sign, and they are due credit for doing so.

And third may we say that if we were indeed incited, it possibly was brought on by our Chamber of Commerce, which is a complement to them. (Although among those who know Moore best, it's two to one he needs no help in getting his feathers up.)

And as our fourth reply, may we say we are pleased to see our sister paper at last begin to take advantage of Lake Leon and give it the plug it needs, even if they did have to play copy-cat to do so.

The Lake is Ranger's and the lake is Eastland's. We say, let both cities spend as much time and money as they can afford in giving it the publicity it needs.

For if you remember, when you purchased your license, it was given to you, but when you were married, the minister or judge who read the ceremony had to take the license so that it could be recorded with the clerk. ## Camp Gibbons To Open To Scouts June 4

Camp Billy Gibbons, located on Brady Creek near Richland Springs, which draws a number of Boy Scouts and Explorers from this area each year opens its twenty-fifth season June 4 and closes June 24, it has been announced.

Activities at the camp include swimming, canoeing, boating, nature study, Indian lore, archery, marksmanship and special stress is placed on Scouting skills.

Highlighting this year's program will be a wagon trip to an outpost camp for overnight camping with preparation of two meals.

## Rotary Club Is Second Best In Attendance Race

Eastland Rotarians ranked second in attendance in the 34 club districts during the past month, it was announced this week.

The local club was second only to Ounah, having a monthly attendance average of 98.28 among their 37 members. Queen's average was 99.31 with 29 members. Mineral Wells ranked third, Cisco fourth and Goshum fifth. Dublin was listed as thirteenth, Breckenridge as fourteenth, Abilene as seventeenth, Brownwood as eighteenth and Ranger twenty-second.

## Five Indictments Returned By Jury

### Wildcat Spotted Near Desdemona In Cooker Survey

A wildcat try has been spotted five miles northeast of Desdemona in Eastland County.

It is the Blue Danube Oil Co.'s No. 1 R. L. Slaughter, located 330 feet from the south and east lines of the M. Cooker Survey. Proposed depth is 2000 feet with casing to the Strawn sand.

One-fourth of a mile south of Caddo in Stephens County, J. H. Elder of Cisco plans to deepen the No. 1 R. J. Carey, et al, from 32-00 feet to 3800 feet with rotary. The try is 660 feet from the north and west lines of Section 45, Block 5.

The E. E. Thate No. 1 Walter Fry has been spotted four miles southwest of Brownwood.

Location for the try is 1020 feet from the north line and 1040 feet from the east line of Section 43, Kerr Survey, Brown County. Proposed depth is 1000 feet with cable tools.

In Callahan County, Feldt and Robinson of Colorado Springs, Colo. have staked the No. 1 A. E. Young.

The planned 2000-foot rotary project is five miles south of Clyde, 2418 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of Section 3, BBR&C Survey. Kendrick and Tipton's No. 1 Watt R. Matthews, et al, A, has been spotted 150 feet from the north and west line of Section 3, ETRR Survey, 4 1/2 miles north of Albany. Its proposed depth is 1500 feet with cable tools.

In Throckmorton County, J. Roy Derrick, et al, has spotted the No. 1 N. L. B. Davis 467 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of the S-2 Section 943, TE&L Survey. Proposed depth is 4600 feet with rotary.

## Game Association To Protect Doves

Sabanna Valley Game Preserve Association members Tuesday night adopted an amendment to their constitution which adds doves to their list of protected wildlife.

At the meeting, held at the Center Point community house, five miles south of Carbon, Article XIII of the Association's constitution and by-laws was amended to read: "To protect and regulate the shooting of quail and doves on members' farms and ranches. Each landowner or long-term tenant to have the exclusive right to say whether or not they shall be hunted. If he allows hunting, he is requested to save at least 50 percent of the total number for seed stock."

The group also voted to offer a reward of \$25 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons unlawfully removing, damaging or defacing any of the Association's official signs. Any information of this nature should be turned in to an officer of the Association or M. S. Dry, game warden, a spokesman said. The action was taken because a number of members

Barton was indicted for assault with intent to murder. The true bill resulted from a family fight.

One count of burglary at night and another of theft of an automobile were the charges that resulted in indictments against Huey. The Cisco man is charged with taking at least two automobiles.

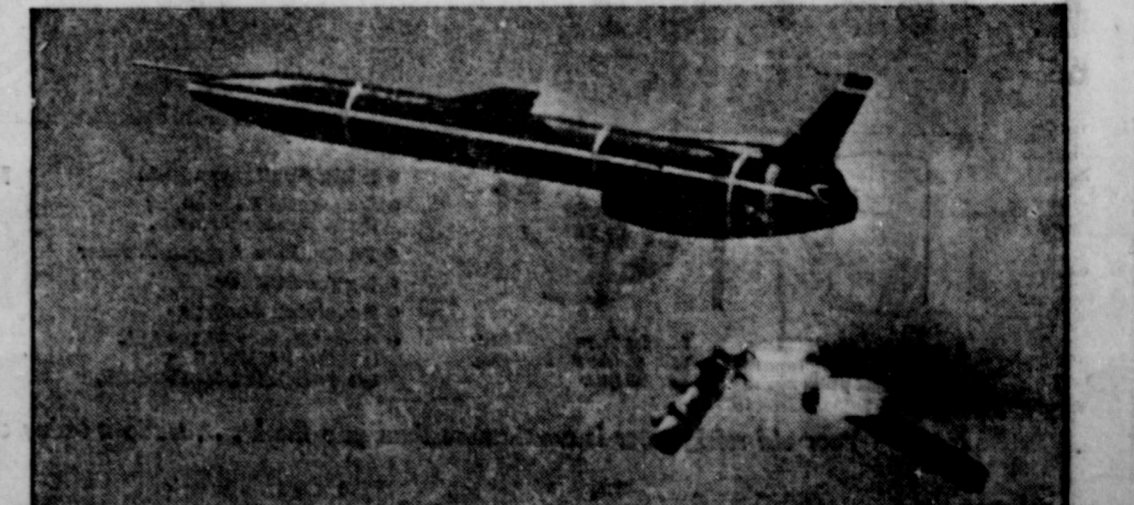

### 'Fish-Up' Lenten Treats With Tuna Dishes

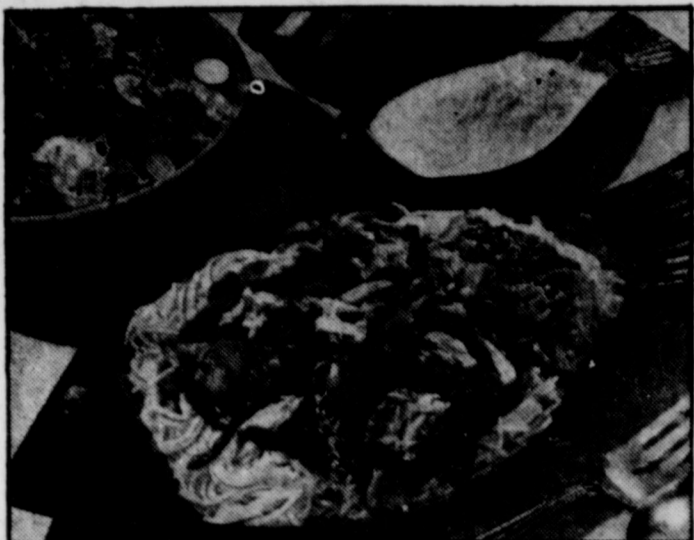

CANNED tuna has many interesting uses. In our house, we like it just "as is," served on a platter garnished with lettuce and lemon slices.

It is delicious, also, in a casserole with olives. Simply combine a can of condensed mushroom soup and one of condensed celery soup in a casserole and add a quarter of a can of milk to two cans of soup. Then add tuna, drained of oil. Also add lemon juice to taste and a small jar of small, pimento-stuffed olives (drained). Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) about 30 minutes. Serve with rice.

Spaghetti With Tuna Sauce (4-6 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, 1 small clove garlic, minced; 1/2 cup finely diced onion, 1/2 cup finely diced celery, two 8-ounce cans tomato sauce, 1 teaspoon kitchen bouquet, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon oregano, 2 cups sliced carrots, 1 pound spaghetti, cooked; 1/2 cup sliced green pepper, 7-ounce can tuna fish, 1 tablespoon minced parsley. Melt fat in saucepan. Add garlic, onion and celery. Cook over moderate heat for 5 minutes, stir-

ring frequently. Add contents of cans of tomato sauce, kitchen bouquet, water, salt, pepper, sugar, oregano and carrots (sliced diagonally, about 1/4-inch thick). Bring to boil. Lower heat and let simmer until of the desired consistency, about 15 to 20 minutes longer. Meanwhile, cook spaghetti in boiling, salted water until barely tender (about 10 to 12 minutes). When sauce is of the desired thickness, add green pepper, parsley and tuna, which has been drained and coarsely flaked, and let simmer about 5 minutes longer. Drain spaghetti, arrange on serving platter. Top with spaghetti sauce. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese.

### Forestry Kits To Be Given To Boy Scouts

Texas Boy Scouts this month will practice at becoming young foresters.

Through more than 5,300 forestry kits being donated to the Lone Star State's Boy Scout councils by wood-using industries, the Scouts plan to learn about conservation of Texas forests and the role that timber plays in the state's economy.

Announcement of the forestry kit distribution was made by Geo. W. Stanley, Houston, chairman of the Texas Forest Industries Committee. He said Boy Scouts across the nation will participate in the program and that projects in most troops will get underway in April, Forestry Month for the nation's 1.5 million Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts.

The kit was prepared by American Forest Products Industries, Washington, D. C., educational organization supported by the nation's wood-using industries. More than 86,000 kits are currently being distributed to all U. S. Boy Scout councils.

A Loggers' Field Day, a Boy Scout forestry forum for radio and television, forestry games, visits to Tree Farms, sawmills and paper mills, demonstrations of forest management and fire prevention are among the projects suggested in the kit.

Stanley, whose committee represents AFPI in Texas, said national Scout officials report that demand for the kit is "unprecedented," and that they expect it to be as popular as a similar kit prepared for Cub Scouts last year by AFPI.

Scout executives are conducting training schools in use of the forestry kit.



### HOMESTEAD MAY BE SOLD FOR TAXES

Many Texans have the mistaken impression that their homestead cannot be seized and sold for delinquent taxes. In many cases, this idea has led to considerable grief and monetary loss which could have been avoided. A homestead should be rendered to tax assessors like any other property, and taxes assessed against it should be paid as faithfully as those on any other taxable property.

In a previous column, it was indicated that the deadline for rendering property for taxation is April 1, so far as most city taxing agencies are concerned. The last date for rendering real and personal property for state and county taxes is April 30. State taxes are collected by the County Tax Collector.

Under the Texas Constitution, each family is entitled to claim one piece of real property as their homestead. This claim must be established by an affidavit filed with the county tax assessor on or before April 30, each and every year. This affidavit must be filled by the owner himself. A lending agency cannot do so, even though it may actually pay the annual taxes thereon from a fund created by the owner's monthly installments.

When the homestead affidavit is properly filed, the owner becomes entitled to an exemption of state taxes up to the value of \$3,000, or 200 acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from payment, not a complete exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to county or city taxes.

The homestead claimed for tax purposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by the owner as his residence.

When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200-acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be required to pay.

Property taxes are assessed against the person who is the re-

cord owner of each piece of real and personal property on the first day of January of each year. Individuals purchasing property during the year should make sure that the taxes for all previous years have been paid. Otherwise, the purchaser may be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in delinquent taxes to protect his property. Unpaid taxes create a lien against the property which can be enforced regardless of change of ownership.

One should also keep in mind to make some arrangement for the previous owner to pay his pro-rata share of taxes for the current year. Otherwise, the buyer may find it necessary to pay the entire taxes for that year.

When taxes are not paid by the deadline prescribed for the particular taxing unit (city, county, state, or district), monetary penalties and interest are added from month to month. In addition, the property becomes subject to seizure and sale to satisfy the tax lien. This lien applies to all property, whether homestead or not.

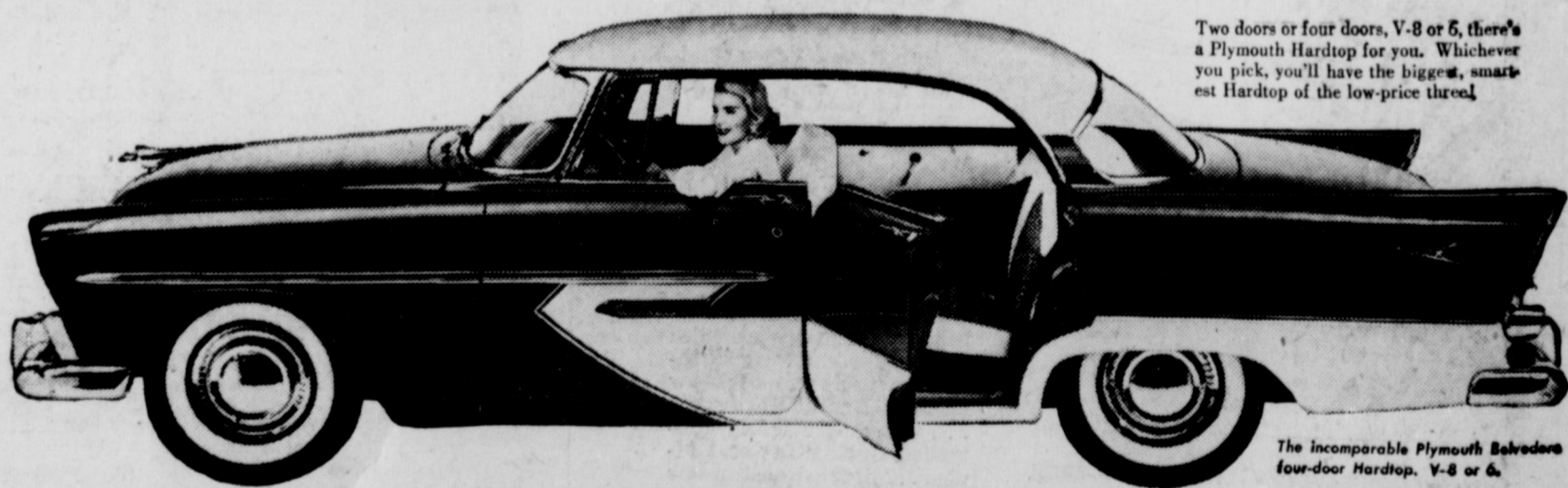

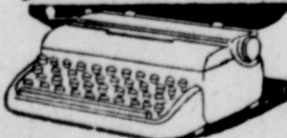

### They'll Ask for 'Seconds' of Spring's Menu Treats

WITH spring in the air, our appetites perk up. So let's try two special recipes. The first recipe is a real quickie that tastes as though it had been cooking for hours. Prepared this way, corned beef has a wonderful flavor.

#### Barbecue Corned Beef Medley (4 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, 1/2 cup chopped onions, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1 cup tomato sauce (8 ounces), 1/2 cup catsup, 1 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons kitchen bouquet, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 cups cooked corned beef, julienne style (1/2 pound), 1 1/2 cups corn cut off cob or one 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, drained; 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 2 tablespoons water.  
Heat fat in 2-quart saucepan. Cook onion over moderate heat until soft but not brown. Add celery, tomato sauce, pepper, sugar, vinegar, kitchen bouquet and Worcestershire sauce. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add corned beef and corn and cook until thoroughly heated. Serve over toasted picnic buns or split, hot biscuits.

#### Dark Chocolate-Frosted Cake

Three squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 package instant fluffy frosting mix, two 9-inch devil's food layers, baked and cooled, made of instant mix.  
Melt chocolate over hot water. Remove from heat and COOL TO ROOM TEMPERATURE. Prepare frosting mix according to package directions, using 1/2 teaspoon vanilla (optional). Then, with a spoon, carefully fold in the COOLED chocolate. Spread generously between layers and cover top and sides of cake. Cover cake to keep frosting soft and glossy.

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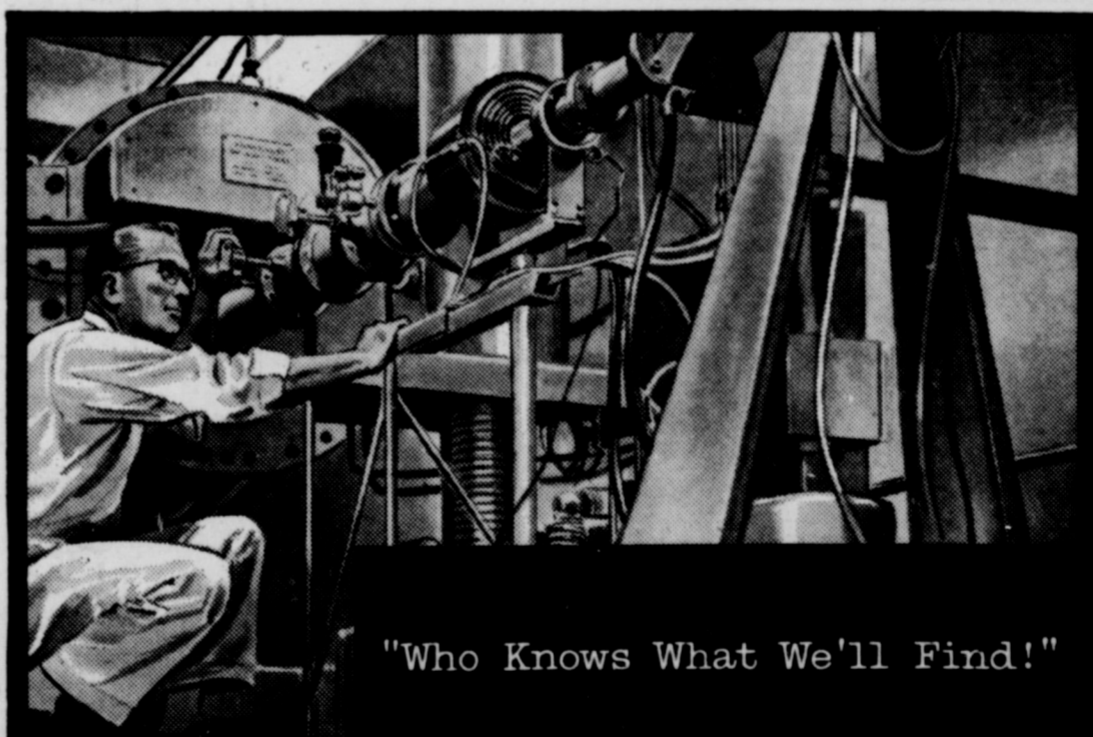
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### Speech Students Give Program At Las Leales Club Guest Tea

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### Bowman Biscuit Company Will Mark Birthday

One of the West's early pioneering industries, Supreme Bakers, the Bowman Biscuit Company, celebrate their fiftieth birthday on April 6. The rise of this western baking industry from fifteen original employees to the present figure of more than a thousand people . . . and from the original production of five principal types of crackers to the more than 130 varieties of cookies and crackers produced today, is credited to the integrity and foresight of its founder and today's president.

Clinton A. Bowman, father of J. C. Bowman who now heads the operation, founded the baking firm in April 1906, and named it "The Merchants Biscuit Company." Strangely enough, this was also the month of the great San Francisco earthquake and fire, and this tragic event resulted in the new baking firm's first two big orders of cookies and crackers to be delivered to the hungry and homeless victims on the coast.

Another milestone in the history of this western industry was dated 1913, when the young company met with almost complete disaster. This was the date of the Cherry Creek Flood which inundated the rich industrial area of Denver in 1913. Had it not been for the financial support of good friends, "Merchants Biscuit Company" would have dropped out of business entirely.

In 1912, the brand name of Supreme Bakers and the now-famous Four-Leaf-Clover trademark were adopted to identify the firm's cookies and crackers. In 1927, the Merchants Biscuit Company became affiliated with the United Biscuit Company of America, an association in which companies retain their independence in managerial and production policies, yet share with each other their several hundred years of combined experience, to provide invaluable knowledge to the baking industry.

Following C. A. Bowman's death in 1945, J. C. Bowman, his son, was elected to presidency of the firm. A veteran of 25 years' service under his father's leader-

ship, his guidance is seen in the substantial growth of the company in recent years. The familiar name "Merchants Biscuit Company" was replaced by the "Bowman Biscuit Company" in 1950, in honor of C. A. Bowman and his contribution to the cookie and cracker industry.

From its original three-story plant at 842 Walnut, the Bowman Biscuit Company has developed and expanded, until today, it claims an entire city block. Production activities, once confined to a limited local area, have expanded to take in an eight-state territory in the Rocky Mountain West.
