Omar Burleson as guest speaker. Over 300 tickets have already been sold. Tickets for the event are on sale at \$3.50 each from any lawman in the county. The public is cordially invited to attend the event.

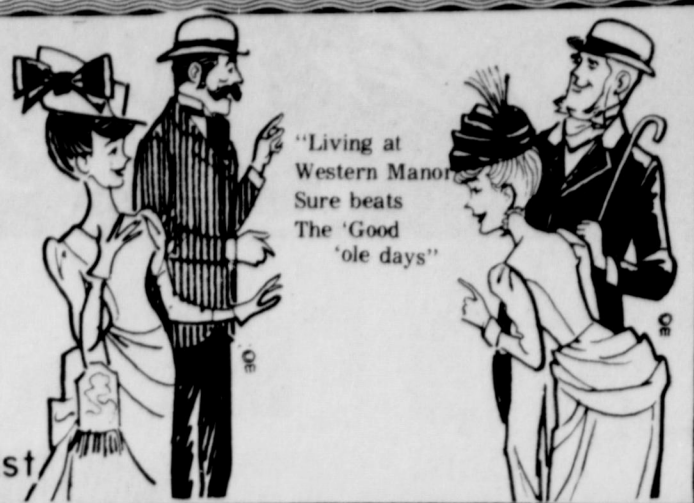

WASHINGTON, April 5 - The minimum national average support level and other major provisions of the 1973 Peanut Program were announced today by J. Phil Campbell, Acting Secretary of Agriculture.

The support level is \$310.50 per ton for 1973-crop peanuts and represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price for April 1973. The support level for 1972-crop peanuts was \$285 per ton.

The 1973 Peanut Program differs from the 1972 program in that (1) there will be no sheller purchase program; (2) peanuts found by Federal-State Inspection Service to have visible Aspergillus Flavus mold will be subject to a \$50 per ton discount; and (3) producers will be required to assume storage, handling and inspection costs on peanuts placed under warehouse storage loans. These three changes were published as Department considerations in the February 14, 1973, issue of the Federal Register at which time members of the peanut industry were asked to present their views.

The Agricultural Act of 1949 provides for peanut support at a level between 75 and 90

percent of parity depending on the percentage which the total supply of peanuts is in relation to the normal supply at the beginning of the marketing year. Today's announcement is in accordance with "forward pricing" provisions of legislation providing for such determination in advance of the planting season.

This national average support level will not be decreased, but will be adjusted upward at the beginning of the marketing year Aug. 1, 1973 if at that time a combination of the parity price and the supply percentage results in a high legal minimum support level.

A later announcement will list the support level of the 1973-crop peanuts by type and area, as well as premiums and discounts for various types of kernels, foreign material and other factors.

Support will be available through loans and purchases. Loans to approved grower associations cooperating in making support available to farmers will mature on demand by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

A producer needs to comply with his 1973-crop peanut acreage allotment to be eligible for support.

Soil Map Of State Now Available

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, a local conservation official said this week.

Lyn Gibson, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service at Eastland, said the beautiful 36-by-45-inch map can be seen in his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Gibson said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map gives color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use.

Insert maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

Published cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service, the map is available in two sheets or printed front and back. Printed front and back, the map costs \$3.00. Printed on two separate sheets, the map costs \$4.00.

For mounting on a wall,

Gibson recommended the two-sheet style. For folding and filing, he said the map printed on both sides might be the best.

The map may be purchased from the Department of Agricultural Communications, Texas A & M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

Other blanks can be obtained from the SCS office at Eastland or from the County Extension Agent's office at Eastland.

If there's a delay in serving the meal after it's cooked, a temperature setting of 150 degrees will keep food warm without cooking it further.

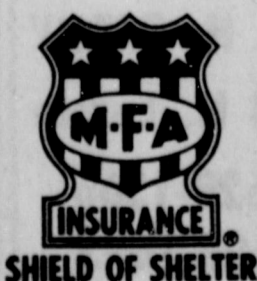
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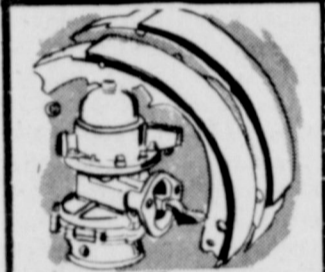

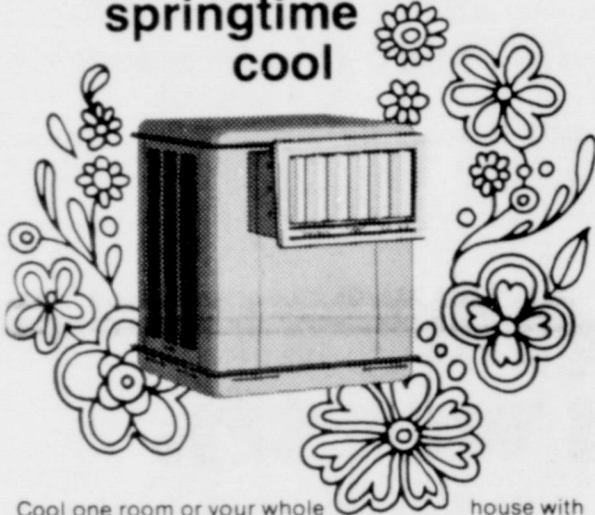

I just received my March 18 copy of the Eastland Telegram.

Mrs. Jack Mace's article concerning the first grave in Eastland County reminds me of other old graves still identifiable when I was living in Eastland. Probably these graves are common knowledge now but for whatever it is worth I will tell you what I know of them and hope it will be of some value in your search for historical data.

A little back ground is necessary perhaps. I was born and raised in Eastland and moved to Idaho in 1947 since then many places. Since leaving Eastland I have returned several times to see the old town because after all these years it is still "my home town". I intend to move back permanently in the not too distant future.

My father, Frank Settles and I used to fish the Leon River quite often. We lived in the Norwood Addition near the Texas Gas Engine and Tool Shop. On our trips to the river we would cross the highway either down the east side of the football field or further east of Hoffman-Paiges depending on

where we wished to fish. When we crossed east of Hoffman-Paiges we traveled straight south for perhaps a mile then turned west southwest to get to the river. After turning towards the river and traveling a short distance we would come upon several graves. Of course over the span of years my memory, never too reliable recalls we were either on the Ed Hargis property or the Old Gene Downton place. I believe though it was the Gene Downton property, anyway there were at least five graves that could be identified. I remember on several occasions my father and I tried to decipher the names and dates but the headboards were too weathered and rotten to make them out. The only thing I am certain of is they were dated in the 1800's I believe in 1878 or 79. The graves were quite a distance from the river and located in a fairly heavy stand of oak trees.

I know of only one other person that would know of these graves. He is J.T. Taylor, I do not know if he is still in the area
