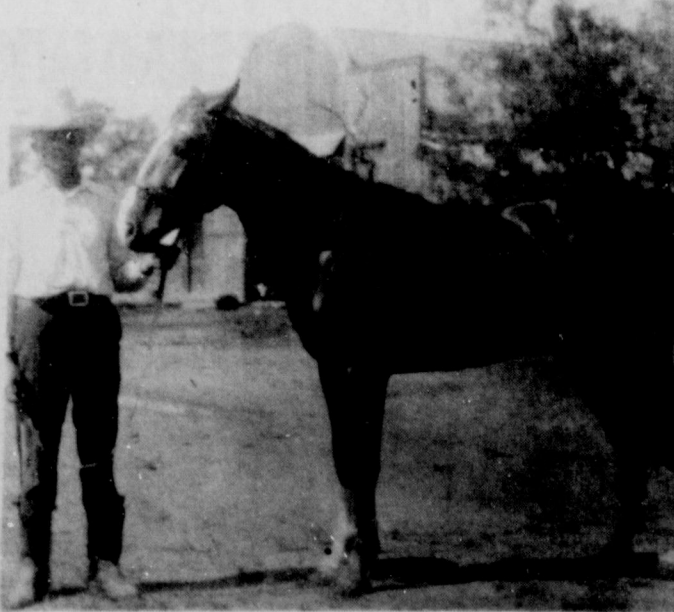

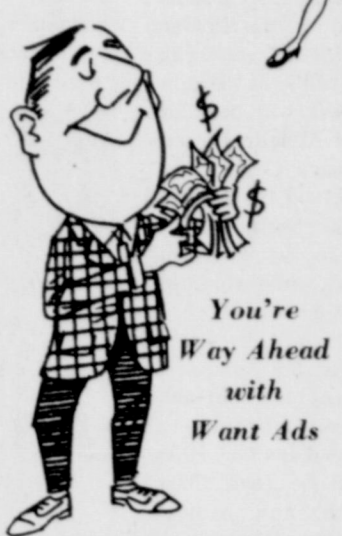

Cisco Jr Music Festival To Be Held At April 5, 6, 7

The Cisco Jr. High Band under the direction of Mr. Lynn Low and the Cisco Jr. High Choir under the direction of Mrs. Connie Rattan will be among 78 junior high musical organizations including approximately 4000 young musicians participating in the thirteenth annual Cisco Junior Music Festival to be held on the campus of Cisco Junior College Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, April 5, 6, and 7.

The festival is a contest strictly for elementary and junior high bands, orchestras, and choral groups. It includes events in concert, sight-reading, solos, ensembles, and twirling. Organizations winning first division, or "superior" ratings in concert and sight-reading receive trophies, and individuals and small ensemble winners receive award medals.

The Cisco Junior High Choir will be in concert at 11:15 Thursday and the Junior High Band will participate in the festival at 8:20 Saturday.

Fifteen adjudicators, or judges, will evaluate the performances of the organizations, solos, ensembles, and twirlers. The judges will come to Cisco from as far away as Richardson to the east, Lubbock to the north, and Kermit to the west. 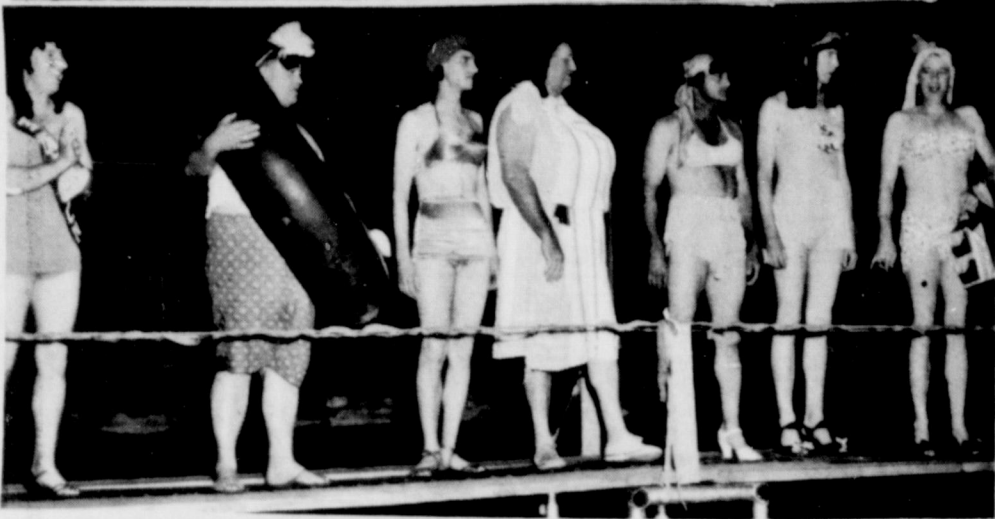

GWINN, Mich. - Captain Glen P. Doss recently participated in weapons firing training with his Aerospace Defense Command (ADC) unit at Tyndall AFB, Fla.

Captain Doss is a pilot with the 87th Fighter Interceptor Squadron at K. I. Sawyer AFB, Mich. The unit is equipped with F-106 Delta Dart all-weather interceptor aircraft.

All ADC interceptor pilots are required to complete training annually to evaluate their skills against a radio controlled target drone that effectively simulates an "invader" aircraft. The elusive targets fly more than 600 miles per hour at an altitude of 60,000 feet.

Ground crews are evaluated on their weapons loading ability and speed in preparing aircraft for launch during the training period.

Captain Doss, a 1959 graduate of Schriener Institute, Kerrville, Tex., received his B.B.A. degree in 1964 from the University of Texas. He has served eight months in Vietnam.

Of course, there is a special calling to the special ministries such as the pastoral ministry. Pastors should be prepared to teach the word of God. Perhaps more is expected and demanded of them, but in another sense every Christian should be able to teach the Word of God.

A disciple is a learner. A Christian is a witness. To witness for God means, we must be acquainted with Him and His teachings.

When the Word of God speaks through His servants, it will have the ring of authority.

The next consideration is we must rightly divide or handle it. Be acquainted with the whole teaching of the Scriptures.

Fragmentary views and partial emphasis distorts the truth. If we take a portion of truth and try to make a whole truth we actually make it an untruth.

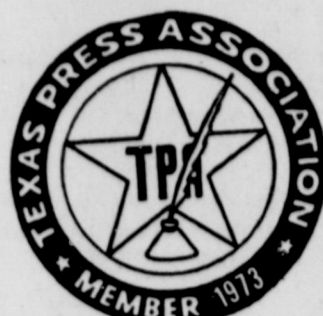
