W&S new year come to 136,660, down from \$147,430.20 this year; likewise expenditures are to be down to \$110,685, from \$117,981.37, for the \$25,974.46 projected balance.

In the general fund, another drop is seen in revenue at \$179,841, down from \$200,436.44, with expenditures at 189,620.81, down from \$201, 685.98 this year, for a \$9,779.81 deficit.

specialist's daily work is not seen by the public he serves. The lines distributing the water and collecting the wastewater are hidden underground and the treatment plants are often in remote locations. As long as they function, everyone is satisfied, but the silent service to keep them functioning too often is taken for granted.

The huge and growing investment in water and wastewater facilities requires expert operation and maintenance. In fact, each operator in Texas is entrusted with about \$64,000 worth of public facilities as compared to an industrial worker who is entrusted with only \$10,000 worth of equip-



The Rev. J. Edward Cunningham, executive secretary of the Southern Region, explained the Atlanta base was selected to meet the increasing demands for Scriptures in the area from Virginia to Texas, which has a population of 56 million people. The 13 states formerly constituted part of the Eastern and Central Regions, which have offices in New York and Chicago, respectively. The Society also maintains a Western and Pacific Regional office in Los Angeles.

"This is not a bookstore operation, but an office from which we initiate Scripture distribution programs," Mr. Cunningham said. One regional distribution secretary and clerical help are assisting him. Citing the fine opportunities in the Southern Region to distribute the Scriptures widely, he asserted the area "has more coastline" along the Atlantic Ocean and Gulf of Mexico, "than any other region.

It also has the Great Smokies National Park in North Carolina and Tennessee, "the busiest national park in the United States," and "Disney World and the whole vacation complex" in Florida where visitors and vacationers continually swell the native population. Migrant workers, blacks. American Indians, Spanish - speaking persons and a number of ethnic groups also merit special attention, he said. Mr. and Mrs. Henri Mueller were born in Posen, Poland, about 1850. At the age of 15, Mr. Mueller had to take four years of compulsory military training in the German Army.... While in training, his mother died.

This so embittered him that. on his release, he decided to come to America, working his way over on a boat. When he landed in New York City in 1869, he secured a job as a dock worker. He worked for twelve or thirteen years, carefully saving his money, until he had enough to buy a farm in West

Texas. In 1881 Mr. Mueller came to the little community of Yellow Mound (so named from the little mound of yellow - colored clay located on what was then known as the Holland place) just northwest of Eastland, Texas


He liked this farm, which had a log house occupied by the Holland family, and decided to buy it.

Mr. Mueller sent money to his sweetheart Klair in Germany to pay her passage to America. In 1884 he met her in New York, where they were married.

By train and stage they reached Eastland and spent their first night in West (2) Texas in the old Planter Hotel which was then operated by 'Ma'' Steele. This hotel, a large two - story wooden building, was located on Main off the northwest corner of the square

Mr. and Mrs. Mueller soon built a new house on the east side of their stock pond across from the old log cabin. Their only child, Fritz


