

ONE NATION UNDER GOD

Young people in our own country and in other lands as well, often ask me: "Who are we, and where are we going?" I suppose they do this because they know I have spent my life

roaming the globe, coming in contact with people of all types, nearly everywhere. Therefore, maybe, maybe in Tibet or somewhere I had found the answer to this age old question. Alas, I have to disappoint them. But sometimes I tell them I am sure a partial answer can be had if we look back and check on how, historically, we got to be the way we are - as a nation. To do this above all we must understand our own religious background, and the same for any other nation.

During more than six decades my travels have taken me to nearly every country on the planet. Everywhere religion plays a predominant role in the lives of all human beings. Our own religious backgrounds has and still does mean so much in American history that the United States Supreme Court has called attention to its importance in the field of education. In its rulings on religion and education our highest tribunal has specifically encouraged public schools to reach about religion, all religions.

The role of religions in history, art, literature, language, music, and other subjects, is emphasized by our Supreme Court. However, there has been a shortage of material available for use in schools. To fill this void one of the most distinguished authors and pulpit personalities of our time has written a booklet. His aim in it is to try

and help all of us reach a better understanding not only of our American religious heritage but of the right - and need - for young people to begin learning about this in the classroom.

The title of the booklet is ONE NATION UNDER GOD. The author is Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, who in my global travels I have found is as well known in most other countries as he is here in America. Sitting next to me on a trans-Atlantic plane on one occasion was a six foot four Scot enroute to Australia. His objective was to buy up a large part of the Merino wool in the lands "down under", and ship it back to the woolen mills in Scotland. He told me how on his way across America his number one wish was to meet the legendary Dr. Peale.

This new booklet features the basic facts about the religious life of America right from the days of Columbus, who attributed his discoveries to "Divine Guidance", to the astronauts who read from the Bible as they made their historic first voyage around the moon.

Wanting to be sure his presentation was objective, Dr. Peale produced the booklet with the cooperation of others. That is, he obtained editorial advice from men and women of various religious traditions -

Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish. The story he tells us is strictly non-sectarian. It emphasizes the part our religious heritage has contributed in the building and strengthening of this great country.

As a contribution to the cause of religious liberty, Dr. Peale has arranged for the booklet to be distributed at no cost to schools, from coast to coast. This is done by the non-sectarian, non-profit FOUNDATION FOR CHRISTIAN LIVING in Pawling, New York, which regularly makes his sermons and booklets and the writings of others available to hundreds of thousands of readers around the world.

Copies of ONE NATION UNDER GOD are available for the schools in your community. (Principals should write to Box X - 5, Foundation for Christian Living, Pawling, N.Y. 12564). What Dr. Peale has written, has helped me to a better understanding of my fellow countrymen. I feel sure it will

be useful to your students, in fact to all who read it. As I mentioned at the outset, wherever I have gone, to visit the Eskimo in the Arctic, to unexplored areas of wild New Guinea, and even to highly civilized lands, it has been obvious to me that you can understand people only if you are familiar with their religious background.

Note: The name of Lowell Thomas has become a household word during the 42 years in which he has been the dean of radio commentators, also as father of Cinerama, noted world travel, and author of a shelf of books of exploration, adventure and adventure - biography.

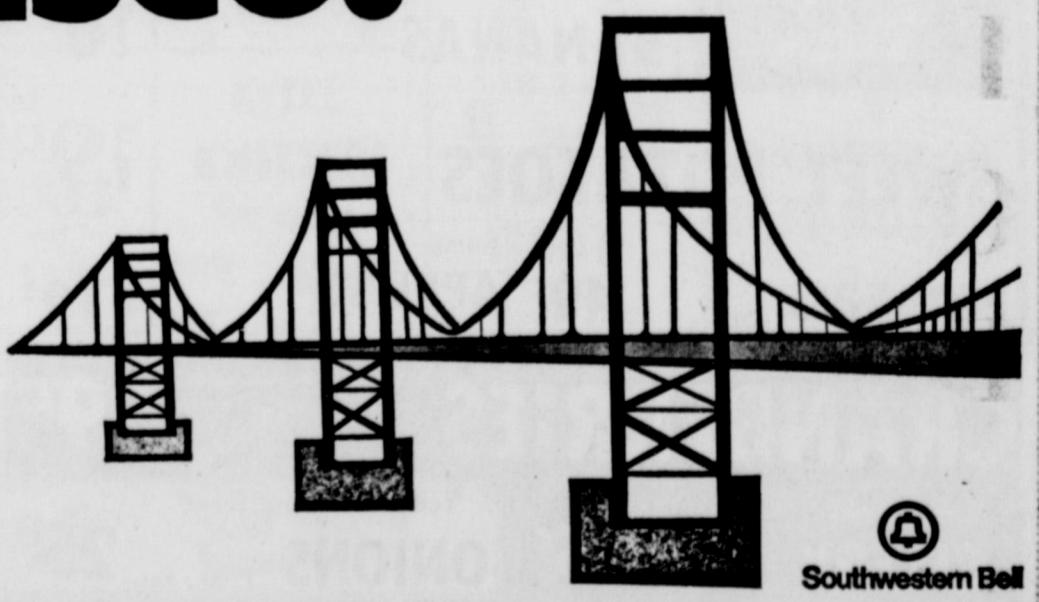

Gordon pot

A lot of excitement is being created by the exotic breeds of cattle. These are breeds from European Countries that are being used in cross-breeding programs in this country.

Because of modern technology it is possible to breed cows in the United States with bulls in Europe. This is done with the use of frozen semen and artificial insemination. Some of the European bulls have also been imported to the states.

These breeds are noted for fast growth rates and large mature weights when compared to the British breeds common to this area. There seems to be some disadvantages as well as advantages with these large cattle.

The heifer calf is from a Hereford cow. The calf is about one month old now and shows the characteristics of its Simmental father. It has a long, straight body and appears to be a fast growing calf.

Hodge is looking forward to having more Simmental calves in the near future from Angus and Hereford cows. He is a trained technician for Artificial Insemination and is equipped to provide this service for other cattlemen.

The deer hunters have been anxiously looking for this time of year and by now many have already made their first kill.

We have two publications that may be of interest to hunters and their families. One leaflet is titled "Field Dressing a Deer". It gives one method of field dressing and skinning a deer. Any method resulting in a clean, well bled carcass is satisfactory. Unpleasant experiences with venison usually

result from lack of care before the meat reaches the kitchen. The other publication is titled "Wild Game Care Cooking". This publication describes the time-tested methods of handling game in the field until it is tastefully served on your table. It not only tells how to cook venison, but also how to cook other large game, small game, and game birds. The publications are available in the County Extension offices in the courthouse.

Eastland County farmers and ranchers will be receiving a crop and livestock questionnaire in late November or December. The information requested on these questionnaires is needed to make an official estimate of the inventory and production of crops and livestock within Texas, as well as in this county. These questionnaires are mailed by the Statistical Reporting Service in Austin. The information is valuable to the producers in furnishing a basis for planning future production and marketing practices.

Eastland County Pecan Show Set For Dec. 1st & 2nd

The Twentieth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show has been set for December 1st and 2nd in the Eastland County Courthouse. The announcement was made today by Dan Childress, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The show will be sponsored by the association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Marcus O'Dell, President of the Chamber of Commerce, says the Pecan Show will include about 200 entries of top quality pecan exhibits, a pecan bake show and pecan centerpiece show. He said the show will give recognition to one of the county's most important crops. The pecans, baked goods and centerpieces will be displayed in the first floor lobby of the courthouse on December 1st and 2nd.

A total of 43 nuts of any variety constitutes an entry in the pecan show. The pecans entered must have been grown in 1972 and be entered by the person who produced the pecans. Everyone who owns at least one pecan tree is invited to enter an exhibit.

Pecans are judged on the basis of size, percent kernel, quality of kernel and attractiveness of the pecan. Natives, variety seedlings and improved varieties may be entered in the show. A grower may bring one entry of each variety and as many different entries of natives as he chooses. All entries become the property of the Pecan Growers Association. Entries winning first, second and third will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Ribbons will be given to exhibitors who have first, second and third place entries. Trophies will be given to the exhibitor of the Champion

Shelling Pecans, Champion Native Pecans and Champion In - Shell Pecans.

Pecan entries may be left at the County Agent's office in Eastland or with the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger or Cisco. Members of the pecan growers organization will also collect entries to bring to the show.

County Agent De Gordon said the idea of pecan shows began in Eastland County in 1952. The late J.M. Cooper, County Agent, and local grower staged the first pecan show in the state. Other counties adopted the idea. This year there will be 34 county pecan shows, three regional pecan shows and one state pecan show in Texas.

Gordon said the county pecan show has proven to be an excellent educational tool in building interest in the use of high quality pecan varieties that are adapted to this area. These shows have served to promote the use of pecans in delectable food products.

The Texas Proprietary School Act was enacted by the 62nd session of the Legislature in 1971. The bill was aimed at the regulation of privately owned, profit making business, vocational, technical, and home study schools which do business in Texas. Standards are provided for the assurance of adequate facilities, equipment, curriculums, and instructors.

The Texas Education Agency, Division of Proprietary Schools is responsible for the administration of the Act. This Division sees itself as a consultative staff whose function is to work with proprietary schools in upgrading the quality of instruction. The thrust of the Act is to assure that job oriented education in private schools produces results and also to assure that the advertising of such schools is both factual and truthful.

Schools are required to post bonds to help insure that the school is financially responsible and to help defray closing costs if for some reason a school must close its doors. This gives protection to students who are enrolled in the school at the time of closing and who should receive tuition refunds. Schools must give a detailed picture of their operations to the Texas Education Agency and must meet certain standards to be certified to do business in the State.

School representatives or salesmen must also post a bond and register with the Texas Education Agency. They are prohibited from giving out

misleading information about their school, its courses, or job opportunities upon graduation. Salesmen are not permitted to solicit students for a school unless they have a representative permit issued by the Texas Education Agency.

There are some things, however, that you should do to help insure that a private business or vocational school that you are planning to enter is legitimate. Ask to see the salesman's permit. If you're doubtful about the school and you're still in high school, check with your counselor. The staff at the Texas Education Agency can also be called on for information. Never sign up for a course in haste. Inspect the school yourself if it is located where you live, and talk to some of the students. Read carefully any papers before signing. Enrollment "applications" are usually contracts which call for the payment of tuition. Even if you never enter, you may be obligated to pay a "registration fee" if you signed a contract.

But if you have a complain about a school in spite of these precautions, check your contract and review school policies to be sure your complaint is legitimate. Then check with the school director or counselor to see if your problem can be resolved. If you get no help, contact the Division of Proprietary Schools and Veterans Education, Texas Education Agency, 201 East 11th Street, Austin, Texas 78711. They play an important role in this area of consumer protection in Texas.

Motoring Public Asked To Join Pick-up Campaign

AUSTIN - The Texas Highway Department is taking the lead among State agencies in asking the motoring public to join the "Pitch In" anti-litter campaign.

The campaign has been sponsored by industry leaders throughout the nation in efforts to pare the wasteful cost of litter pickup along the highways and elsewhere.

The Highway Department has been placing litter barrel decals on receptacles posted along the 70-thousand-mile State highway system to encourage motorists to "Pitch In". There are approximately five thousand litter barrels in roadside parks, safety rest areas and highway turnouts.

In addition, the Department is affixing "Pitch In" bumper stickers to Departmental autos, trucks, station wagons and pickups.

The Department also plans to distribute the bumper stickers to other State agencies for their vehicles. The green and white vinyl bumper stickers were made available by the U.S. Brewers Association, Texas Division, which is one of the sponsors of the anti-litter program.

The task of pickup after highway litterbugs falls to maintenance forces of the Department, a task which costs the taxpayers of Texas more than \$3.3 million a year.

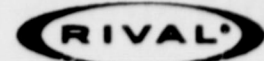

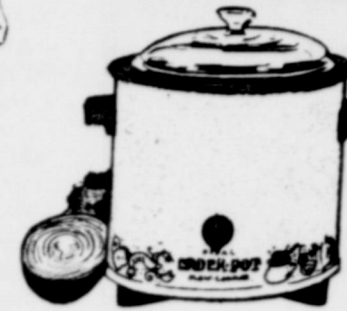

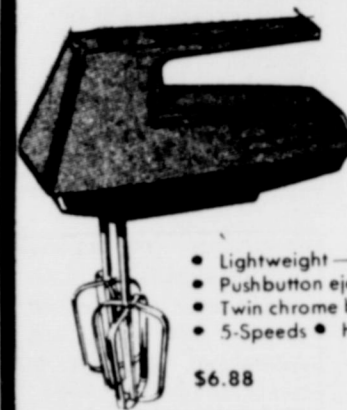

Leeray -- A Mushroom Town Then A Ghost Town

Mrs. T.E. Castleberry
In the fall of 1919, R.I. Lee and Walter Ray, both of Cisco, chose in George Thorp's pasture a pretty spot west of U.S. Highway 183 on the Eastland - Stephens County line, and platted a town site with the county line right down the middle of Main Street.

was a drawing for a brand new Ford car.
An Eastland man was Master of Ceremonies. As well as I remember he was Jim Steele. I remember him saying "If it were as pretty underfoot as it is overhead, there would be thousands here to buy instead of hundreds.
The gentleman said many nice things about West Texas. He asked "How many of you

live in West Texas? Most of the hands went up.
How many of you are proud to live in West Texas? The hands went up even higher into the air.
Mr. Steele continued his praise of West Texas. He added "Out in West Texas where men raised white faced cattle and red faced babies!"
After a pause he resumed unfolding a rosy future for West Texas and especially for LeeRay. And why not! It really looked like prosperity would last forever!

Soon the leaders got down to the business of selling lots. Quite a few were sold at fancy prices.
Then there were speeches about the drawing to see who would get the lucky number for the new Ford car to be given away.

A man walked up to a pretty little girl and said, "Come draw a number from this basket."
The holder of the winning ticket was a youth who looked to be 17 or 18 years of age.

His name was Lee Stamford from near Carbon.
Someone said to the youth, "Why don't you reward the little girl for drawing your name?"

The boy reached his hand into his pocket of his blue jeans and gave her a dime. Everybody laughed. They did not know he was supporting a widowed mother!

In a short time quite a few nice buildings went up.
The Eastland - Stephens County line ran right down the middle of Main Street.

Eastland County men built on the south side of the street a nice brick bank building. Stephens County men built one on the north side of the street.

There were other nice brick buildings. A grocery store, post office and school building.

LeeRay was a busy little place just waiting for the Cisco - North Eastern Railroad to come through.

The Cisco railroad, the Ranger, Jake Harron, and "Eastland, Wichita Falls and Gulf" were racing to see which could arrive in Breckenridge first.

John Ringling the Circus King bought the Eastland, W.F. & G. and then was called the "Ringling Railroad".

When the Cisco North Eastern train reached Lee Ray, there was an all day celebration. Everybody was there! It was a big affair.

The Cisco Railroad was owned and sponsored by R.I. Lee and Walter Ray.

In July, 1920, the Jake Hammon arrived at the five mile run at Breckenridge just a few days before the Cisco
