Eastland Countians are in store for good "product" this summer in the way of entertainment, and are probably due an exhibit of a special presentation called "From Footlights to Film."

That's the word announced at the three-day convention of Interstate-Texas Consolidated Theaters in Dallas this past weekend.

To the theatermen, good "product" means good motion pictures — and according to those announced for showing at the Majestic Theater this summer, the "goodies" include new Walt Disney epics as well as high scorers in the Academy Awards sweepstakes, although Big Winner "Tom Jones" likely won't make it to this county. (After seeing it in Dallas, we wonder how it got so many wins. It's funny, but there are better pictures, in our opinion).

The special exhibit is a series of ten 4x6-foot panels of pictures on the general theme from Vaudeville to film. These were on display during the convention when the assembled amusement editors and writers from Texas cities served by Interstate-Texas Consolidated were saluted by the theatermen.

The pictures in the exhibit are from the Hoblitzelle Theater Arts Library at the University of Texas and trace the development of entertainment from the earliest days of vaudeville through the silent film era and the talkies to the present day spectacles presented in wide-screen from 70mm negatives.

The library was established in 1954 by the Hoblitzelle Foundation, of which Karl Hoblitzelle is president as well as chief executive of Interstate-Texas Consolidated. Contained are American and English theatrical Memorabilia rich in photographs, books, music, manuscripts, letters, design drawings, models and the like dating back as far as 1750.

Frank Deaton to Head Commission

Frank Deaton, owner-manager of Eastland Auto Parts, was the unanimous choice for chairman as the Eastland City Commission swore in two new members and organized at the regular monthly meeting Monday evening.

During the brief meeting, the commission also discussed public housing in Eastland and parking problems and posed for an official picture.

James Reid and Curtis Koen were sworn in as new commissioners.

Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. placed Mr. Deaton's name in nomination; Dale Troutt seconded the motion; and Reid moved that nominations cease.

Troutt then nominated Koen as chairman pro tem, and he too got a unanimous vote. Mr. Troutt will continue as secretary-treasurer.

Federal Housing Authority low-rent housing proposals for Eastland were met with less than enthusiasm from commissioners, with members expressing doubts as to the city's need for such housing at this time. Mr. Deaton said he had talked with seven persons Monday concerning the housing and all had expressed no interest in such a project.

Commissioners took under advisement the need for increasing the cost for parking permits in the city. This is being eyed because of repeated abuses of the 30-minute permits which the city issues presently for \$12 a year.

When volunteer 1964 Cancer Crusade workers call on Eastland residents Thursday evening, they will be advising of the seven cancer danger signals as well as collecting funds for crusade service and education. Mrs. Austin Flint of Cisco told the Eastland Rotary Club Monday.

Mrs. Flint was assisted by Mrs. Ann Justice of Eastland. A film, "The Million Club" was also shown to the club.

The seven danger signals, she pointed out, are: 1. Unusual bleeding or discharge. 2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere. 3. A sore that does not heal. 4. Change in bowel or bladder habits. 5. Hoarseness or cough. 6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing. and 7. Change in a wart or mole.

5-Minute Car Wash Opens Here

The new 5-Minute Self-Service Car Wash is open in Eastland. Located at 102 N. Daugherty St., the service offers modern, convenient facilities for persons who like to wash their own autos.

Owner-Operator Bob Perkins, in announcing the opening, also pointed out that the service is economical. For 25 cents, a customer gets five minutes use of the washing equipment which utilizes heat (110 degrees), mechanical action (500 psi pressure) and chemical action (special automotive detergent) to get dirt off cars.

Also available is a special high-powered vacuum cleaner for use at ten cents per five minutes, to clean the interior of autos. The facilities are completely coin operated, and all necessary supplies and equipment is available.

The car wash is located "Just around the corner, west of the post office." Mr. Perkins said, "just off West Main St., convenient to get into and out of."

Highlights are convenience (open day and night), quick (from 5 to 10 minutes), and costs, (as little as 25 cents).

The local installation features two-washing bays, and a special drying area. Additional black-top paving is to be installed later, Perkins said.

BROWSING with BEV.....

For her tenth birthday, the young lady of the house announced she wanted a blue angel food cake. It was her birthday, so she got it. But when the cake was served at the party, few people ate it. The reason: A blue cake isn't very appetizing.

Food not only has to taste good, it has to look good. Blues, blacks, and purples are usually not too tempting food colors. For example, orange juice served in a blue glass has much less appeal than in a clear glass. Black is associated with burnt flavors.

Unusual colors arouse suspicion. Green bread suggests mold; red chicken loaf is alarming. So go easy on artificial food coloring. And when you do use it, keep within a reasonable color range. Also avoid serving foods of clashing colors. Purple-red beets, red cabbage, pickled radishes, and orange-red tomatoes and pimentos are not attractive together.

Neither are mono-colored foods. A menu of mashed potatoes, creamed onions, fried liver, celery, white bread, and rice pudding lacks character. It needs perking up — with buttered peas substituted for the onions, pickled beets instead of celery, and some brown-crust rolls in place of the white bread. A spoonful of red jelly will enliven the rice pudding.

You can also bring color to a meal with gay dishes, flowers, and table linen. Just see that the colors are compatible.

mance of duties and conduct in office is a matter of public record, we feel that we are dedicated and qualified to render the type service which our citizens deserve and have a right to expect.

"I am not a politician. I am a law enforcement officer. My background includes three and a half years' experience as a constable, four months as a deputy under the late and esteemed John Hart, and 10 years as your sheriff. During my three years' service in the U.S. Navy during World War II I was engaged in military police and law enforcement activity. I also spent 18 months as a security officer in the employ of Humble Oil & Refining Co.

28, 1945 as a First Lieutenant. He entered A&M College of Texas in 1945 and graduated with a bachelor of science Degree in Agricultural Administration January, 1947. He was employed with Quaker Oat Company-Feed Division.

In 1949 he entered Texas Technological College and was awarded a Masters of Science Degree in Agricultural Economics in May, 1950. He taught Economics in Texas Technological College in 1950-1951.

He was called to active duty in 1951 during the Korean campaign and was stationed at Reese Air Force Base, Texas; Sculthorpe Air Force Base, England; SMU-ROTC, Dallas; Pope Air Force Base, North Carolina, and Shaw Air Force Base, South Carolina. His last assignment was on the Inspection Staff of Hq. Ninth Air Force at Shaw Air Force Base, S. C.

He was a veteran of 15 years of active duty with the Army Air Corps and U.S. Army Air Force.

He is survived by his wife and two sons of Sumter, S.C.; his mother, Mrs. Willa Brock of Eastland; and two brothers, Howard M. Brock of Lake Jackson, Texas; and C. G. Brock of Arlington.

Air Force officers were trying to determine why the two C119 Flying Boxcars crashed. A spokesman at Clinton Air Force Base said it appeared the two planes "may have collided while on their approach to the airfield."

Others on the plane were crew members attached to the 907th Troop Carrier Group, 302nd Troop Carrier Wing at Clinton. Nine were Air Force Reservists, while one man was in the Air Force, assigned to the 9th Air Force and based at Shaw AFB in South Carolina.

Each plane carried a five man crew with 4 paratroopers in one C119 and five in the other.





10,972 Vehicles Registered To Date In Eastland County

Vehicle registration is big business in Eastland County today — a far cry from what it was when the first Texas Traffic Law, which included provisions for registration, was enacted nearly 60 years ago.

The county tax office, and its appointed sub-stations, are beehives of activity during "tag time" each year.

This year a total of 10,972 sets of tags have been issued through the office, County Assessor-Collector J. C. Allison has reported. And the process accounts for a lot of revenue for the county and the state.

Eastland County has collect-

ed \$136,710.13 for its share and will send \$86,762.08 to Austin as the state's share. That amounts to \$223,472.21 in revenue from vehicle registration from this one of 254 counties.

Sales so far are only \$34,679.40 below that for all of 1963, indicating that a lot of tags will be sold throughout the year.

Last year there were 7,239 sets of tags sold for the year, with the county's share of the revenue amounting to \$153,567.37 and the state's, \$104,584.24. The state gets half of all monies taken in after \$50,000, a tax deputy said.

By types, vehicles registered

this year: Passenger cars, 7,514; commercial, 1,916; farm vehicles, 1,218; farm truck-tractor, 2; trailers, 489; motor cycles, 20; and farm trailers, 10. The revenue reported for the year also includes one-trip permits, duplicates, transfers and additional fees.

All in all, it makes a good source of revenue for the state and county. A state agency this week announced that the cost of producing each set of 1964 plates was six cents. They are made at the Huntsville Penitentiary.

Quite a contrast indeed from the original registration law.

According to Department of Public Safety Highway Patrol Sgt. Roger Sosebee, the first Texas Traffic law was enacted by the legislature April 15, 1907, and provided that no vehicle be permitted to exceed 18 miles per hour on the open highway (8 M.P.H. in towns and villages) and that each be registered with the county clerk and assessed a fee of 50 cents each.



McLendon Plans Much Travel In Drive For Votes

Gordon McLendon concentrated his fire on the pending civil rights bill in the waning days of his campaign for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

He followed a schedule designed to reach, through personal contact and communications media, the greatest possible number of voters before the May 2 primary. His itinerary calls for thousands of miles of travel into all sections of the State by plane and helicopter.

"My opposition to the bill being debated in the Senate actually is a crusade for civil rights," he declared. "I'm not in favor of denying any of our citizens the rights granted them by the Constitution, but I am against the passage of

this bill because certain sections of it threaten the civil rights of all citizens. Those provisions would deny everyone, regardless of race or national origin, the right of trial by jury and deprive us all of control over our property — including our very homes.

"Some of the people who are demanding the passage of this bill, without changing a word or a punctuation mark, evidently are misled. But I am convinced that the leaders who are mapping the strategy of this high-power campaign know exactly what they are doing. They see in this bill, with its disregard of fundamental civil liberties, another instrument of power over the lives of the American people."

McLendon emphasized that the only way of registering majority opinion on the principles involved in the campaign is to vote in the Democratic primary.

Connally Slates TV Telecast For Progress Review

Governor John Connally will review steps of progress for Texas under his administration in a special half-hour night of this week. The program will be carried on more than 22 stations in all parts

of Texas. Tentative time in most areas is 8:30 p.m. on CBS stations.

It is the first major appearance by the Governor of his re-election campaign. He has made a few non-political appearances over Texas, but mostly concentrated on ending to duties of the governorship at Austin.

In the half-hour program, to originate from the State Capitol, Governor Connally is expected to stress several high-

lights of his administration on which he has placed emphasis since taking office. Foremost is likely to be the field of education, which has been a frequent theme of his statements. At the governor's recommendation, the 58th Legislature authorized creation of the Committee on Education Beyond The High School, which currently is evaluating the state's educational resources and laying out a blueprint for the future.

The Governor also is expected to dwell on increased industry for Texas and point out that 317 new plants were built in the state last year — second only to New York. He also likely will point out that the state's new Texas Health Plan provides low cost medical care for aged as a result of legislation passed last year. More than 50,000 elderly Texans enrolled in the plan the first thirty days.

Yarborough Asks Re-Election On Basis Of Record

"I seek re-election to the United States Senate on a record of accomplishment," Senator Ralph Yarborough said this week.





INCOME TAX REDUCTION

The income tax reduction bill that became effective in April of 1964 had the vote and support of OMAR BURLESON who has long felt that tax relief for the public was one of the most important issues before Congress.

CUBAN EMBARGO

During the Cuban affair OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill for a complete embargo on trade with that country. He voted against the sale of wheat to Russia, recognizing that it would encourage our allies to sell to Cuba which they have done in fact.

CIVIL RIGHTS

Because the present form of the Civil Rights bill contains provisions to limit the freedoms of all Americans, he voted against it. He is for the constitutional guarantees for all Americans regardless of status.

LIMITED OIL IMPORTS

In 1949 OMAR BURLESON introduced the first bill to limit oil imports, and then voted for the bill that gave the President of the United States power to limit or abolish oil imports.

REDUCE COMMITTEE BUDGETS

As chairman of the House Administration Committee, OMAR BURLESON has consistently reduced the spending of congressional committees. He reduced Adam Clayton Powell's committee spending budget by 50%.

FOREIGN AID

OMAR BURLESON has voted against foreign aid since the late 1940s. The recent reaction in Congress as to drastically reducing foreign aid and discussion about abolishing it proves him correct.
