





W i nn i n g the Democratic nomination in Eastland Coun-ty is virtually equal to election and L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, first deputy in the sheriff's depart-ment, will most l i k e l y be sworn in as county sheriff on Jan. 1st., after Saturday's

run-off primary. Sublett downed veteran for-mer county Sheriff J. B. Will-iams in all but two precincts. Sublett got 2.467 and Williams 1,412. Williams carried only home-town boxes of Gorman and Desdemona.

A new county commissioner will be sworn in on Jan. 1st too, after Danny W o o d s of Olden beat Earl Blackwell of Ranger. Woods got 1,317 and Blackwell, 710, in the three boxes and absentee vote that make up Precinct One.


A total of 3,863 voters went to the polls Saturday — com-pared to 5,805 in the May first primary.

Incumbent Joe Pool carried Eastland County with 2,815 to his run-off opponent's 988 for Congress-man-at-large.

County vote counting was completed by 8:30 p.m. Satur-day with all boxes complete. Sublett will be filling the job now held by Lee Horn, who did not seek re-election. Woods will be replacing Tip Arther, who also didn't seek re-election.
