



Roosevelt Says He Does Not Mean Convoys, But Does Not Divulge His New Aid Plans

WASHINGTON, April 25.— President Roosevelt said today that the United States is taking action to counter attack Axis forces which may be in Greenland and indicated an extension of the naval patrol system might be employed to get war supplies

to Great Britain. The President did not reveal what action would be taken in Greenland, where the new defense pact gave this country the right to set up new bases. He was em-phatic in defending the right of the country to extend the neutrality patrol wherever necessary to defend the safety and security of the Western hemis-

The patrol, he said, could be extended to the seven seas if necessary and denied that he inended to set up a convoy system.

Last night the frank statements of Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox and Secretary of State Cordell Hull that "this is our fight" appeared to confirm indications that the United States soon would extend naval activities in the Atlantic to insure deivery of war supplies to Great

A Stab of Light Into the Dim Future

A mere million dollars is nothing in the vortex of billions whirling about in Washington today. Yet the million dollars spent by the Temporary National Economic Committee during the past three years in getting together 20,-000 pages of testimony from more than 500 industrial leaders may turn out to be the most productive million of

The committee set itself a crushing task—nothing less than to find out the answers to the questions everyone has been asking for 10 years: Why want amid plenty? What's wrong with our economic system?

Now, in 37 volumes, the report is made. It should be the greatest mine of information that exists on our econ-

Everybody is concerned about what will happen after the war emergency is over. Will it mean another depression worse than the last one? It is cretainly possible unless the greatest possible foresight is used, beginning now. The recommendations of the TNEC are aimed, apparently, at this post-war period rather than at the period of the defense effort, which is no time to rock boats.

First, the committee is sold on free enterprise. It feels that the only way in which America will eventually be gotten back at peacetime work is by reopening the opportunities for new enterprise. Those avenues are now increasingly blocked on one hand by the increasing size of a few vast corporations, and by increasing government

Thus the committee suggests: subjecting national corporations to national charter and control; loosening the grip of patent rights; abolition of basing-point systems for calculating prices; repeal of the Miller-Tydings type of price-maintenance laws; government restriction of new mergers; legal and tax policies which will foster and protect new enterprises.

That is a bare hint of the line of thought that has come to the majority of the TNEC after hearing all this testimony. The crux of the matter is here: as long as American business continues to gravitate into larger and fewer units, an equal centralization and expansion of government is inevitable. As free enterprise is restricted, free government is endangered; political freedom is impossible without economic freedom.

When the present emergency is passed, it is clear that the United States is going to have to do some fast stepping. Every bit of light that can be thrown now on the best direction of those steps is a guarantee of future safety and progress.







defense expenditures as much as one billion dollars and that it raise \$3,600,000,000 in new revenue by imposing drastic surtaxes on the middle and lower middle class incomes and a general increase in all other taxes.

By Hamlin Caterpillars On Fruit Trees Are Killed by Spray

> County Agent Elmo V. Cook offers the following information on controlling caterpillars that are eating the leaves of fruit trees:

Leaf-eating caterpillars can be controlled on any plant by spraying the leaves of the plant with a mixture of arsenate of lead and water. The usual mixture is one pound of arsenate of lead and fifty gallons of water. When the water evaporates from the leaves the poison is left on them and any insect eating the leaves will get a killing dose of poison before it does much damage.

It is safe to spray arsenate of ripe fruit for several weeks but apricots should not be sprayed now unless extreme care is taken in washing the fruits before eating them. It is safe to spray peaches, plums, apples, pecans and shade trees. Leafy vegetables such as lettuce, collards, cabbage and mustard should not be sprayed with arsenate of lead.
