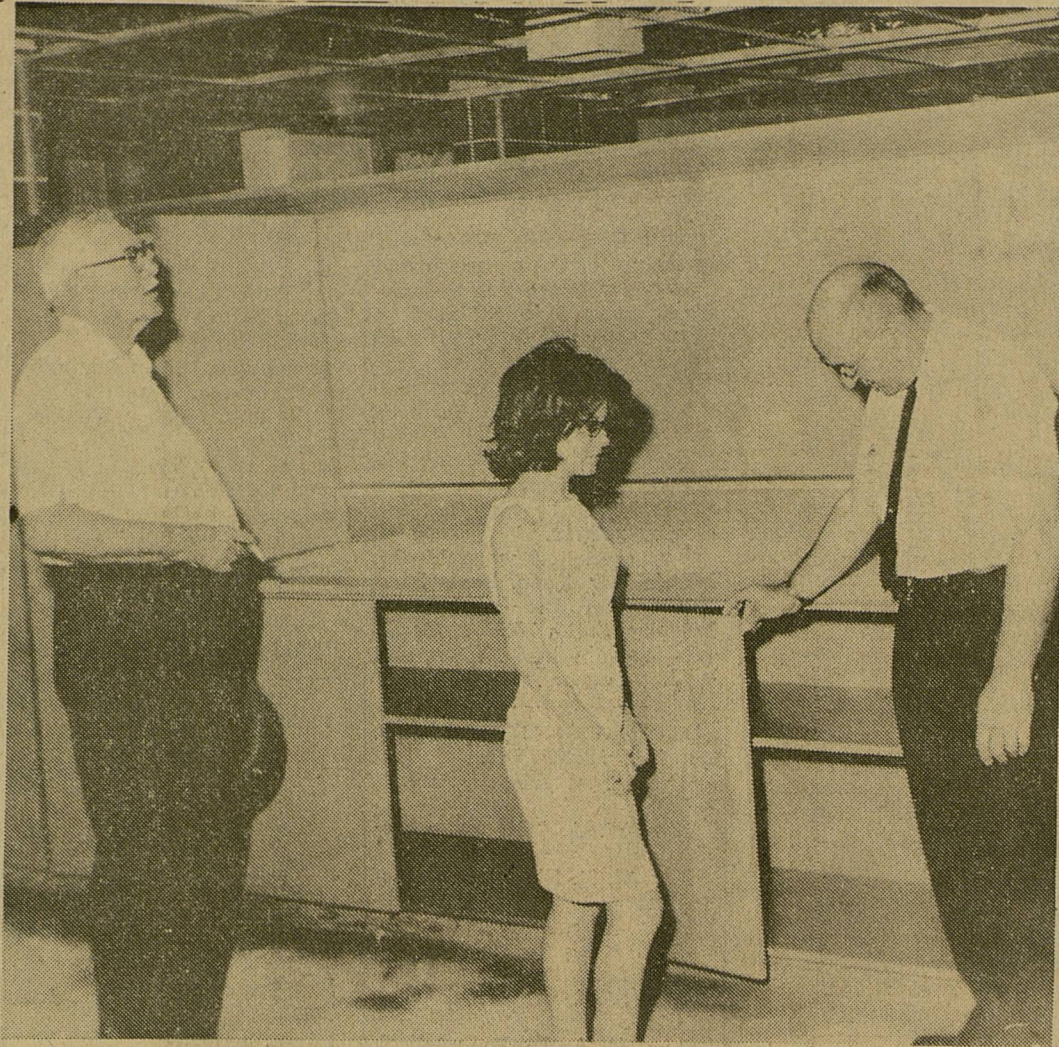
Richard Jones Presented Music Club's Sousa Award

806 Persons Are Examined for Glaucoma in Lions Clubs' Screening

26 Suspect Cases Found

"Certainly one of the most successful, if not the most successful glaucoma screening I have ever worked in," was the observation of Mrs. Pauline Outland, executive director of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, describing the screening held in Eastland Sunday.

The coordinatin and cooperation of the many volunteers and the marvelous acceptance by the public were remarkable, Mrs. Outland said, echoing what Eastland Lion President Marcus O'Dell labeled the perfect public service.

Dr. Bob Alexander, chairman for the screening, reported at the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday that a total of 806 persons were examined, and that of that number 26 were referred to specialist for further tests. "This does not mean," he said, "that 26 persons had glaucoma. It means only that our test revealed that these people had excess pressure on their eye balls and need further attention."

It will be perhaps 60 days before final reports on the screening are complete, Dr. Alexander said. The Society for the Prevention of Blindness carefully follows up the referrals to see how many are actually treated, and makes final reports.

"Certainly the public screening made people in our area conscious of the dangers of

glaucoma and aware of the need for frequent examinations," Mr. O'Dell said. He further expressed the clubs' appreciation for the many volunteers who assisted. Dr. Jim Wittington, now of Fort Worth, Continued on page eight

'Revised' Water Rates Okayed Summer Months

30c a 1,000, Four Towns' Water Rates Are Compared

Once again, the official word in Eastland — "Turn that lawn sprinkler on and let it go."

The City Commission has adopted another summer water rate for local citizens during June, July and August. It isn't as extensive as the one tried last year, but it is an incentive to residents to keep lawns and shrubs green and growing.

The new rate calls for a billing of 30 cents a thousand gallons for all water delivered over 10,000 gallons for June, July and August. There are no other changes, and amounts less than 10,000 will have no reduction. Last year the rate was 25 cents a thousand over 10,000, but the Commissioners agreed that five cents more a thousand would not penalize the city's revenue as it did last year, and at the same time, the new rate which is ten cents below the regular cost would be appreciated by Eastland residents.

Although anticipated, the water rate wasn't brought up until near the end of the Monday night meeting when newly-elected Commissioner James Reid asked that it be considered because, he said, many people had talked to him about it and want another special rate this year.

There was quite a bit of discussion on the matter, particularly whether or not the reduction in water revenue would penalize other city needs. Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. said, "I'm certainly for a special rate, but not if it prevents the city from taking care of its other regular services."

Dr. Treadwell gave Reid's motion its second after the prolonged discussion and the vote was four to one for the reduction — which amounts to a 25 per cent saving on city water. Commissioner Dale Trout voted against the rate, stating: "I was certainly for it last year, but after the city lost about \$3,000 on the low rate the first year, I'm not sure we can afford it this year. I know of other expenses which the city will have soon and we want to be able to meet these obligations as they come up. A list of anticipated expenses, some of the present and some in the foreseeable future, was presented showing that the city would probably have to repair an air compressor for some \$1,000; purchase a backhoe for about \$5,000; and other such expenses.

Mayor Frank Deaton presided and stated that he planned to bring the summer water rate up if the other commissioners didn't.

Reid pointed out that last year was a "wet year" and by not dropping the rate more than ten cents this year, perhaps the city will "break even" — if the citizens will take advantage of the opportunity to use water at a lower rate.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other "water" business the commission agreed to commence billing the school for water used to water the football and track fields. Price will be 15 cents a thousand which is considered to be about cost. (Water costs the city seven cents a thousand, plus its delivery expense). About a million gallons a summer is used, it was reported, and at cost, this wouldn't be but about \$150. The decision to bill the school was unanimous.

HIGH STONES OKAYED

Following a pre-meeting visit to the Cemetery accompanied by Ben Hamner, the commission agreed to open the south end of the east section for "tall" head stones. Presently the new section operates on a "ground level" basis, and many people complain about not being able to erect larger stones, it was reported.

Mr. Hamner conducted the tour to request that the commission re-plot the new section in order to leave driveways between the burial places. In the north part of the new section (where low-stones will continue to be required), the lots there will be two rows of graves and alternate 12-foot drives to facilitate conducting funeral services in inclement weather, without having to cross pre-

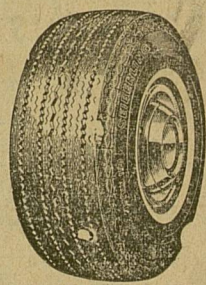
No requests from the physicians had been made, Mr. Deaton said, but the situation warrants consideration. Commissioners approved the matter, on a motion by Curtis Koen.

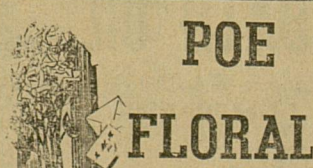

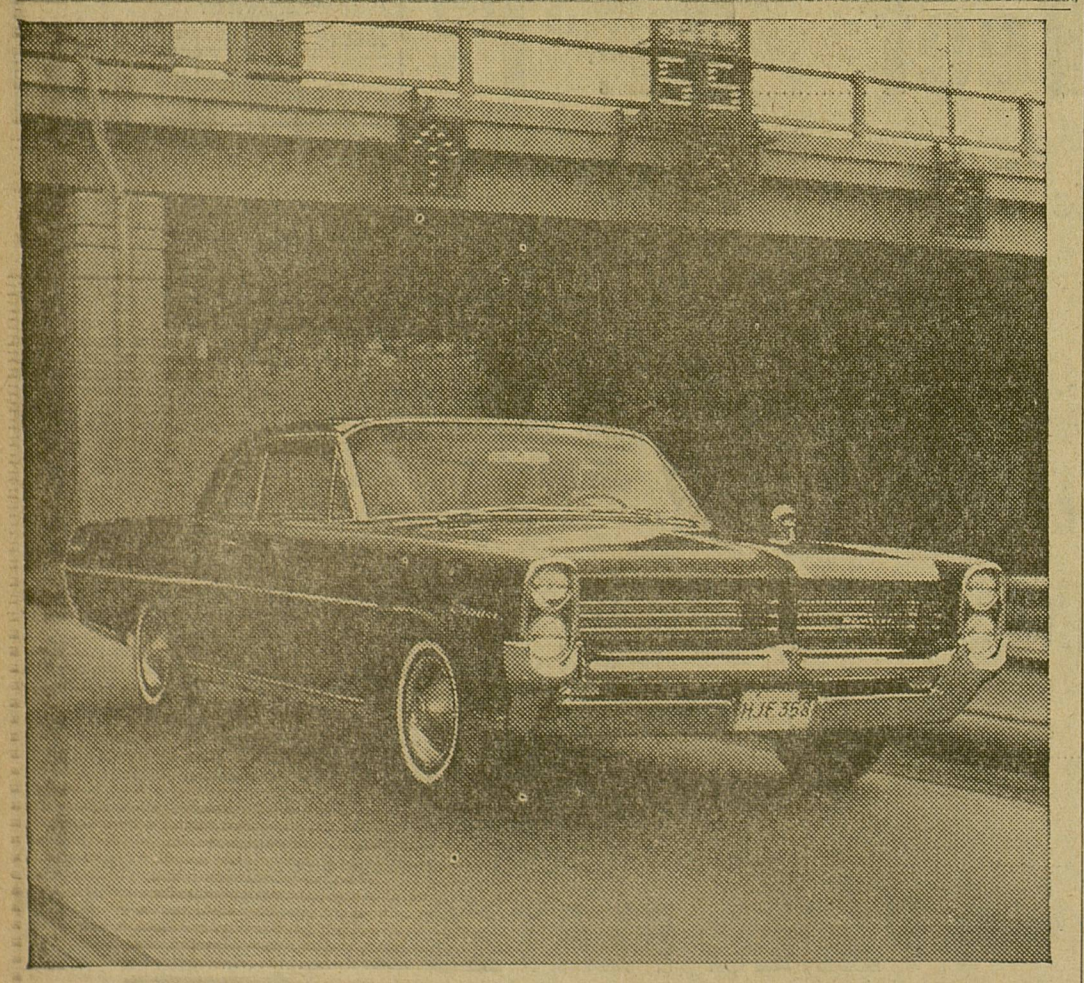
