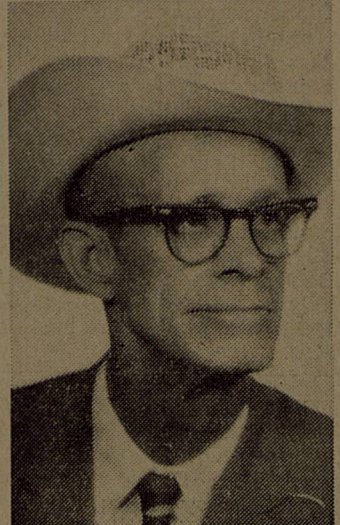

## County Brush Control, Seeding Being Wound Up on Farms, Ranches

Eastland County farmers and ranchers are finishing brush control and range seeding operations this month. Among the ranchers and farmers who have done brush control and range seeding are: Bill Gattis, A. W. Harris, Bill Harrison, Ed Harrison, Don Montgomery, W. B. Wright, J. D. Griffin, Johnny Aaron, Ray Williams G. L. Wooley, James Couch, Sam Powers, and O. C. Stewart.

Proper grazing and maintenance of a feed reserve is of prime importance to any livestock operation. Grazing half and leaving half of the annual production is a good rule to follow. Above 50 percent use weakens the grass plants, stopping root growth for a period. Heavy use, 80 to 90 percent can kill a stand of grass.

A periodic inventory of grazing land, to determine the degree of use during the grazing season, will pay dividends in the fall and winter months and succeeding years. Proper use on the mid-grasses, those 2 to 4 feet tall, will be maintenance of a 6 to 8 inch height with some seed stalks showing. Some plants will be ungrazed and others will be shorter than this height. Proper use on the short grasses would be a maintenance of a 2 to 5 inch height. Naturally a sod type grass could be grazed shorter than a bunch grass.

Technical and cost share assistance was provided through the Upper Leon and Palo Pinto Soil Conservation Districts and the Great Plains Conservation Program. These units represent all portions of the county and varied methods were used. The areas treated will be reseeded until about November 1 to give the grass a chance to become established.

Funeral for Lewis Ray Bryant, 17-year-old Cisco High School senior, was held Friday afternoon at Hamner Funeral Home in Eastland. Mrs. Dora Bryant of Olden, Palbearers were Leon Ingram, Billy Pence, Billy Eudy, Buford Green, Willie Alexander, Mike Joyner, and Jerry Broom, all school classmates.

Young Bryant's death brings to two the number killed as the result of automobile accidents in Eastland County during a brief six-day period — and another man is in critical condition in a Fort Worth hospital as the result of a third vehicle collision. Mr. Arthur Steele Walker, 81-year-old Cisco man, died of injuries received in a three-vehicle crash between Eastland and Cisco last Saturday.

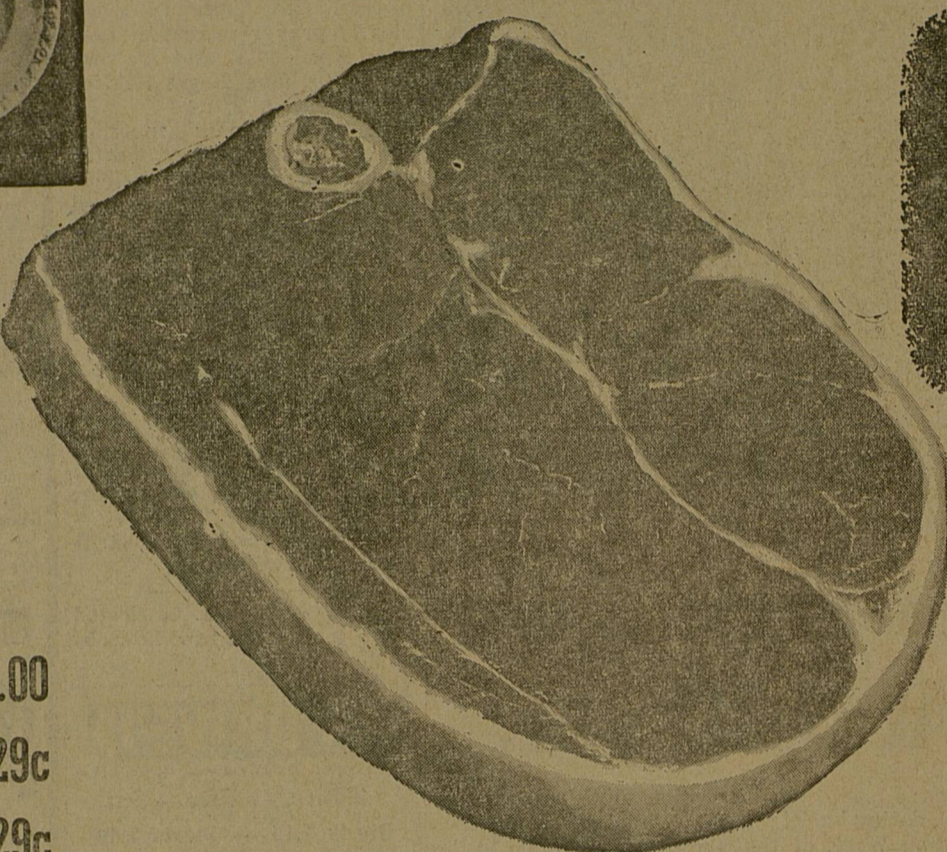

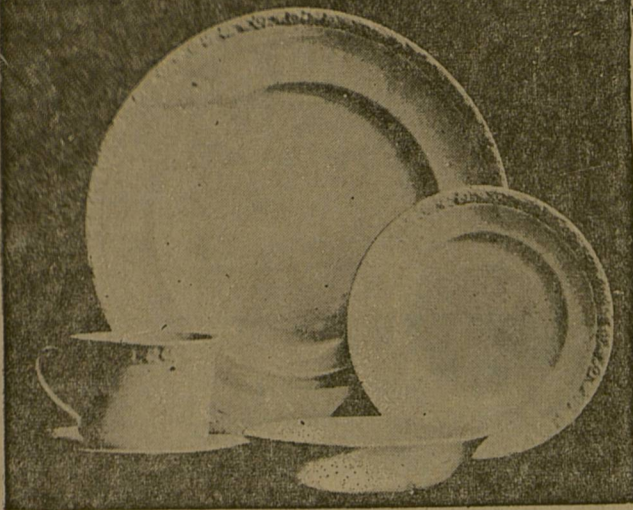

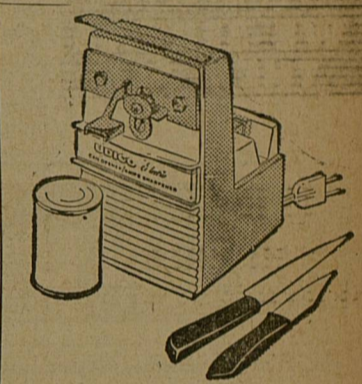

## Public Welcome To Music Club's Concert Sunday At 3:30 p.m.

Eastland Music Study Club is observing National Music Week, May 3-10, with another concert, open to the public and presenting Kenneth Alford, chairman of the fine arts division at Ranger Junior College. Mr. Alford, pianist, will be presented in the Woman's Club at 3:30 p. m. Sunday, May 3.

In making plans for the concert, Mrs. Donald Kinnaird, vice-president of the club said it is the objective of the club to develop more extensive understanding and appreciation of the great art of music, and to encourage more participation in music. She said, "We need to demonstrate the pleasure and value of music and to vitalize music for the harmony it creates."

This year National Music Week is a tribute to Charles M. Tremaine, the founder, who died on March 28, 1963. In 1924 he instituted the first National synchronized observance of National Music Week, with the desire to (1) advance the art as a cultural contribution to the education of the individual and the community, and (2) spread the enjoyment of music more widely among the general public. According to his own statement, there were several kindred activities before the first-known National Music Week was inaugurated, such as:

Music Festivals, dating back many years; Nation Week of Song, 1915; the first city observance was in Boise, Idaho, in May 1919. Others were in Pennsylvania, New York, Navasota, Texas, in the spring of 1920.

The immediate past Mayor of Eastland, Don Pierson, has issued a proclamation in favor of National Music Week, which

was published. Mrs. Kinnaird emphasizes that the concert is open to the public and those attending are invited to attend the reception, immediately following the program, to meet the guest artist and his wife.

Mrs. Don Russell, program chairman who made arrangements for Mr. Alford's appearance in Eastland, will introduce the artist.

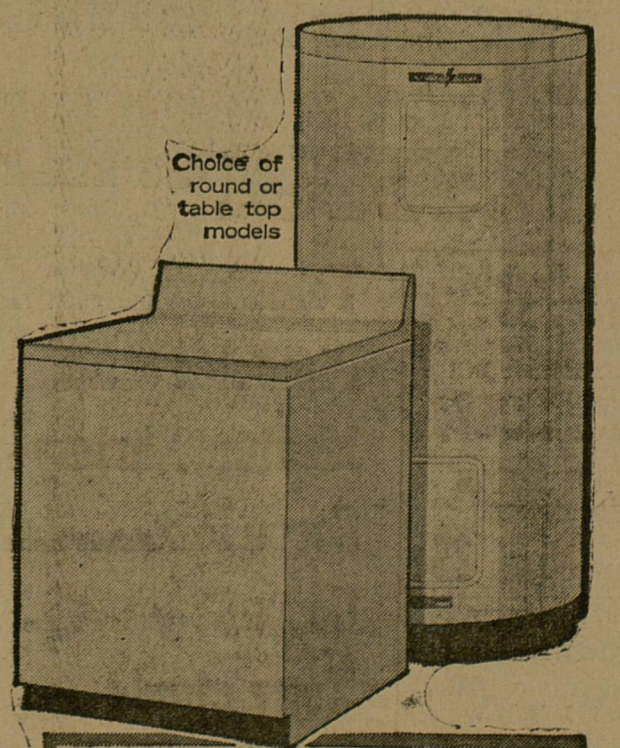
