## Chamber Membership Now 113; Banquet Is Planned

Chamber of Commerce membership has increased almost 50 per cent, board of directors learned Thursday at their regular monthly meeting.

Membership Chairman Jim Parks reported that the drive which is presently nearing an end, has increased the membership from 73 to 113.

Newest members are Beskow Jewelry, Flower Ship and Eastland Transfer and Storage, he said. Workers will make final call-backs during this week in order to "wrap up" this drive, he said, but membership recruiting will continue to be a part of the chamber's program.

Mr. Parks expressed thanks to the active participation by committee members in the successful drive.

A chamber banquet is being planned, Don Viereger, chairman of the special events committee, reported. "We'll try to have some definite announcement within the next 45 days," he said.

The directors voted to encourage the observance of the same official holidays as last year. These are New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas Day.

In other business, the directors agreed to set their regular meeting date for the last Thursday in each month and heard an industrial report from Industrial Committee Chairman Frank Sayre.

President James Smith presided and about 14 directors were present.

## Absentee Voting Ends Tuesday As Election Fever Gains Steam

Tuesday is the deadline for absentee balloting for the May 2 Democratic Primary.

Deputies in the County Clerk's office report that voting by absentee has picked up considerably during its last days.

At 7 p. m. Friday, there had been 74 absentee votes cast, County Clerk Johnson Smith reported.

They emphasize that they cannot put a ballot in the mail or hand one across the county after 5 p. m. Tuesday. However persons who request and get ballots through the mail before that time, have until 1 p. m. election day to get them returned.

Friday morning at 9 a. m., a total of 64 persons had voted absentee—either "across the counter" in the clerks' office or had requested and been sent ballots through the mail. Generally some 6,000 persons vote in primaries of this nature, and "yardsticks" such as absentee voting and others, indicate that this May's total vote will be about average.

Heated county races as well as important state races are expected to attract voters to the polls. Two county races—the sheriffs and commissioner, Precinct One—each have five candidates running.

## Deposits Near \$5 Million At Eastland National Bank

Deposits at Eastland National Bank are approaching the magic five-million dollar mark, with \$4,954,033.17 reported at the end of the first quarter of this year.

The present report shows an increase of over \$100,000 over the Dec. 31, 1963 report, and the first-quarter report is traditionally the lowest of the year, and the December, the highest.

The local bank was approaching the four-million mark a year ago at the time of the first quarter report. At that call, the bank showed \$3,994,498.86 on deposit.

Loans and discounts are down from three months ago. The present report shows \$2,

055,905.45, and on the December report, the bank reported \$2,116,269.02. The current loans are up, however over a year ago when \$1,742,235.29 was recorded.

In its 30th year, the bank has repeatedly shown increases in deposits, with each quar-

terly report setting new records.

The call for statements of condition Tuesday, which was a banking holiday, was for the close of business as of April 15, which would partially account for the increased totals, it is reported.

## 'Mello-Drama' Set By Seniors Friday Night

The Senior Class of Eastland High School proudly presents "Deadwood Dick", a routin', tootin' melodrama of the Gay '90s in three acts. The play, written by Tom Taggart, is to be held Friday, May 1 at the high school auditorium.

No definite time has been established for the play—it is vaguely of the period of 1875-1900. It is the dramatization of a bloodthirsty dime novel just like those Grandpa used to sneak out in the barn to read because he knew, if his Pa caught him reading such "lurid trash," it meant a quick trip to the woods head and a good whacking.

In 1876 a little-known writer, Edward L. Wheeler, started turning out dime novels about a Robin Hood of the Black Hills whom he named Deadwood Dick. Overnight Dick became so popular that the series continued for 15 years and Wheeler gave up only when he had written 64.

Taking the most exciting situations, the more colorful characters, and the most amusing dialogue from these novels, Tom Taggart has fashioned a Gay '90s melodrama that has all the elements that make these blood-and-thunder melodramas of Grandpa's day so hilarious; long-lost daughter, stolen gold mines, kidnapped heroines, and hairbreadth escapes. The main action of the play all takes place in Calamity Jane's Man-Trap Saloon in Deadwood Gulch, Dakota Territory.

Lily and Rose Blossom, played by Connie Turner and Treania Warren, are the typical heroines of old-fashioned melodrama—beautiful and innocent. Ned Harris and Mike Jones, played by Jimmy Wright, are a pair of handsome, stalwart heroes.

Calamity Jane, Sharon Day, is the type of Gay '90s woman personified by Mae West. Bill Garner, playing Blackman Redburn, is the villain—black haired, mustachioed and hearted. Pong Ping, Janie Harris, is a slim, squeaking Chinaman. Judge Nix, played by Gary Graham, does his best to be a dignified old lawyer but his lack of education crosses him up.

Lynda Marrs plays Molly Loveless, the Sheriff's wife, a handsome, motherly woman in her 40's.

Jimmy Moylan plays the typical Wild West sheriff, Joe, the assistant "villain"—bartender and toady to Blackman—is played by Joe Harris. Jeane Morren as La-Paloma is the adventuress—a slim, slinking vampire with a Spanish accent.

Folyd Robertson as Ivory Irving plays a mean piano. Teetotal Tessie, played by La-Juan Dorsey, is a battle-axe of a woman, with a voice like a foghorn. Miners and tuffs are portrayed by Jimmy Yancey, Mike Daniels, Jerry Jackson, Verell Bolean, Joe Cooper, and Tommy Freeman. Barmaids are Sherry Decker, Guylynn Quinn, and Janice Watson.

The club urges that citizens give special attention to: Beautification — check on the need for painting and repairing houses, fences, etc.; planting seed and plants, pruning shrubbery and trees, and removing dead wood. Vacant lots should be cleared of rubbish and weeds. Safety — Give attention to pruning trees and shrubs that create dangerous blind corners. Remove fire hazards. Remove dangerous objects which might injure children; especially remove discarded refrigeration and deep freezers that have doors which lock. Health — Destroy weeds such as ragweed and Johnson grass. Clear out breeding places of flies and mosquitoes.

ally is that of the county-district attorney office, which has two candidates. Political rallies have brightened just about every Saturday in April, with appearances being made by candidates in the various county towns.

Unconfirmed reports of write-in campaigns for certain offices also add spark to the forthcoming polling.

Eastland voters will be voting in "booths" for the first time, come May 2. The Eastland Jaycees are providing "private" voting devices, on which citizens will mark their ballots.

A special "election section" will appear in this newspaper Thursday with a complete rundown on candidates, sample ballots, sites for voting and other pertinent information relative to the important election.

In order to vote absentee in person, a person living within the county must make his appearance in the clerk's office by 5 p. m. Tuesday, ask for a ballot and sign an application stating that he plans to be out

of the county on May 2.

In order to vote absentee by mail, a person living in the county, must first secure a certificate from their physician, stating that the person by reason of illness or physical disability, will be unable to appear at the polling place on May 2, and then the clerk's office can send the person a ballot by mail. These ballots may be sent out until 5 p. m. Tuesday.

Qualification for voting absentee by persons living outside the county, are that an application be filed stating that they are already outside the county and for that reason will not be at the polling place on May 2. The clerk can continue to mail ballots until 5 p. m. Tuesday.

Those persons voting by mail have until 1 p. m. Saturday, May 2, on which to get their ballots back into the county clerk's office by mail in order to be counted.

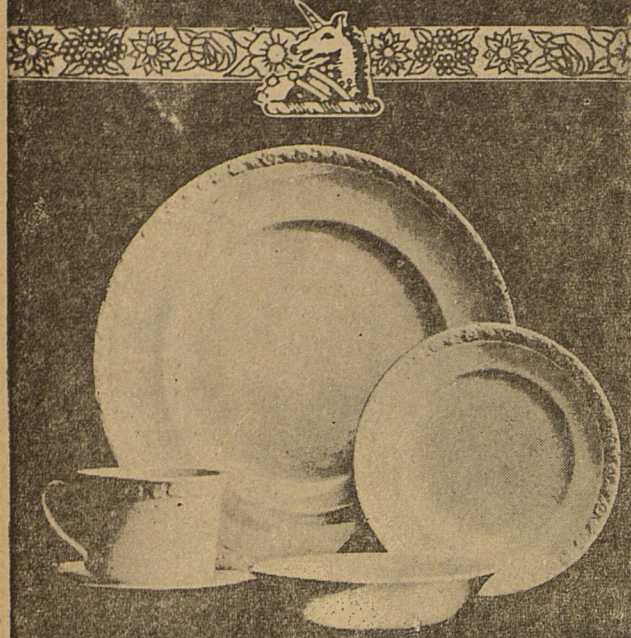

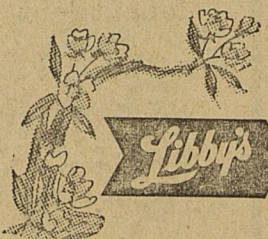

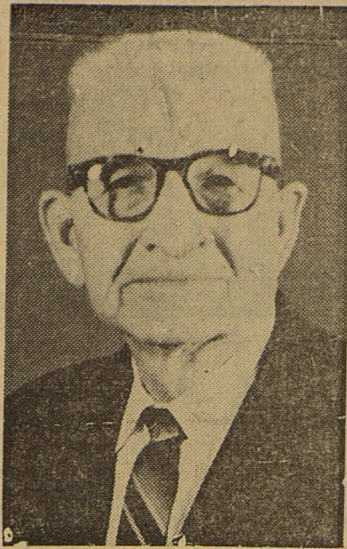

When buying fresh mushrooms at the market, choose those that are clean and white to creamy white in color.

The caps of the mushrooms should be closed or partially opened, not fully opened. The gills (the fluted formation between the cap and stem) should be light in color, not

brown or black. One pound of fresh mushrooms, cooked and drained, is equivalent to three 4-ounce cans of drained mushrooms. When buying flower seeds, look for new varieties listed as F1 hybrids. These are among your best buys. Seeds from these hybrids cost more than

Did you know that vegetables cooked one day then reheated and served the next lose some of their nutrients? Vitamin C losses are particularly noticeable. The vegetables will have only three-fourths as much Vitamin C after 1 day in the refrigerator as when freshly cooked.

After 2 days, the vitamin C content drops to two-thirds and after 3 days it's down to a third or half of its original value.

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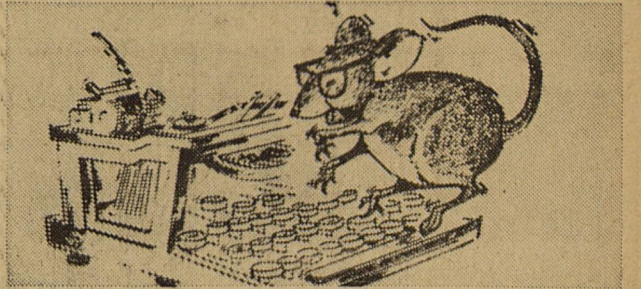

He is a member of the Eastland County Medical Society, Texas and American Medical Association, the American Academy of General Practitioners and the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons.

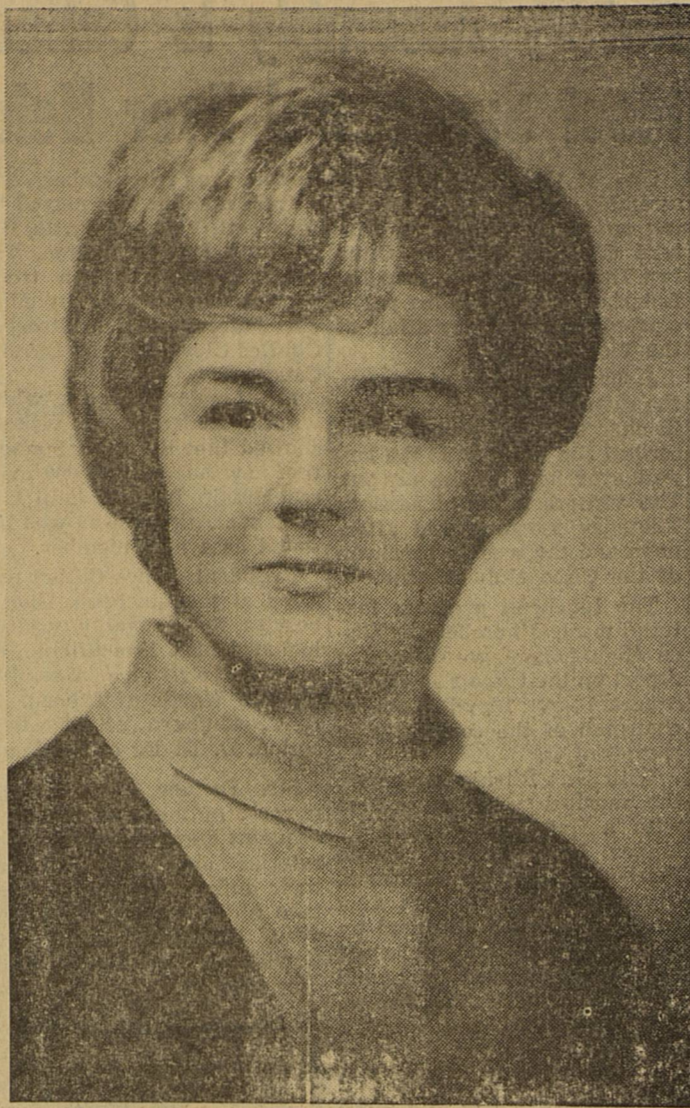

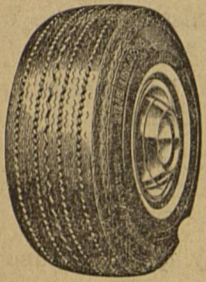
will favor securing more farm to market roads in our precinct if elected. I will see that all roads will be maintained in this precinct and everyone will be treated fairly and impartially.
