## Mavericks Inched Out BY Haskell, Young 21-20

The football night was hot, the visiting opponent was hot and the Mavericks lost their opening session of the 1972 football season to the Haskell Indians, 21-20. Working in weather equal to that of the two-a-days, the Mavericks fiddled a little, bumbled a lot and fought an uphill battle with the powerful Indians in general, and one tailback Jackie Young in particular in the non-conference tilt. All in all, the Mavericks did

commendable, and undoubtedly found the weak spots that Head Coach Clyde Evatt is obviously already working on. With Sophomore Tommy Morren doing the honors, Eastland kicked off to a Maverick Stadium-packed crowd, and the Indians in their first series, looked lackluster, forced to punt on the fourth play. The Mavericks took the ball on the 47 and with Rex Boney at center an John Jimenez, Maverick football '72 got underway.

Three quick first downs by the Mavs showed the local fans what they've come to expect. On the first shack, Jiminez handed to Tony Thomas for 12 and the first first. Three plays later Thomas has another one on the ten yards. There were two dropped balls and instant recoveries before the next first, when the quarterback kept on a fourth and eight situation and went nine. On the five yard line, Howard King took for one; it was zero on the next buck; and on the

third King went left and plowed over for the first score of the night. Kick for extra point was no good, and it was 6-0. It remained that way through the first quarter as Haskell got two first downs, but failed to get to the yardline. Eastland had the ball and King picked up six in two bucks just before the first stanza ended. Miscue on the fourth saw the dropped Maverick ball recovered by Haskell on the Eastland 22. The visitors

displayed their flash Young when Quarterback Bobby Cobb handed to Young who scooted across virtually untouched, and here too Haskell saw their first big disappointment. The score was nullified by a clipping penalty and the play came back. Undaunted, the Indians put a drive together that held up. Young got a first down on a 15 yard drive; and took two more bucks a push across for the visitors' first six. Kick try for extra point failed and it was a brand new ballgame.

The ensuing kick set up the play of the game for Haskell. Booting to Eastland, Larry Barnes saw the perspiration-soaked pigskin pop out of his hands, to be snatched in mid-air by a young man who proceeded to Indians pay and put six more Haskell points on the board. He then proceeded to run the ball over for two extra points and it stood 14-6.

Eastland amassed three quick first downs and seemed destined again, but once again a dropped ball put the ball into the foe's hands and Haskell was in command at the 36, but a four-down series availed naught and the Mavericks did it again. On the third play Thomas got a first putting it at the 40; Larry Barnes got two; a pass try from Jiminez to Leo Gaeta failed and the Indians had it on the 30. QB Cobb kept for 13 and got a first, then it happened again for Haskell. Young caught a long Cobb pass and zipped the goal line - but a motion penalty nullified it and the ball moved back and first half ended 14-6.

The half-time Coach-talk brought the Mavericks back and it looked mighty bright. Eastland received and Larry Bolles took on the 27 when Thomas next up made a big gainer for a first. A handoff to Bolles got two; Jiminez kept for one; a drop on Bolles lost two; then a pass (nine-yards) to Bolles got the first down. Thomas took and went four yards to the one. Thomas took again and plowed over for six more Eastland big ones. A try for extras failed, and it looked 14-12, but not for long.

Haskell took the kick back to the 38; gained six yards and then Dynamite Young got his hands on it, and zipped 61 yards

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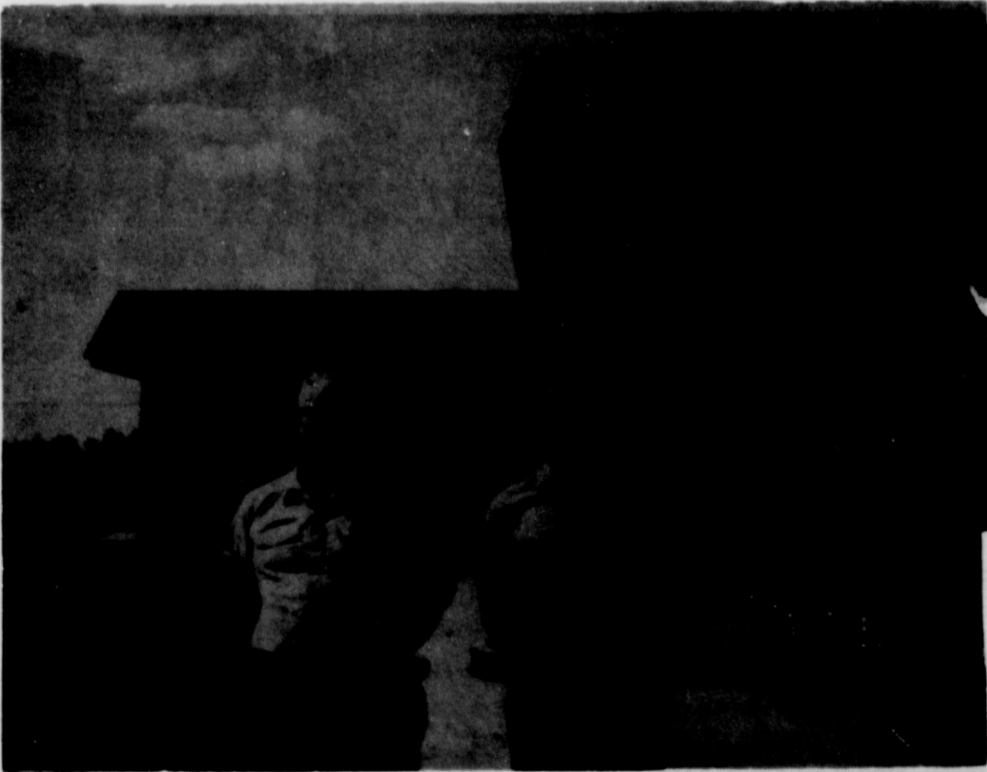

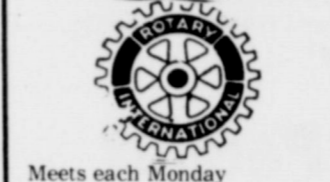

**Gordon pot**

A record breaking year? This could be the year that agricultural income in Eastland County reaches an all time high. Crops are in very good condition in most parts of the

county. If the rains fall right in September the peanuts yields should be high. The early peanuts are now going to market, but the majority of the crop will be harvested in October and November.

Grain sorghum and forage crops look equally good. We should have high excellent grain yields this year. A good crop of hay is being harvested in most parts of the county.

A top crop of pecans is also expected. Growers are now trying to control the destructive pecan weevil. If they are successful we will have one of our best pecan crops.

Livestock prices have been favorable and good grazing conditions have existed in most parts of the county.

Unfortunately, not everyone has had the advantage of rain this summer. Some areas of the county have experienced one of the worst summer droughts in years.

Let me add that a record breaking income from agricultural products does not necessarily mean that farmers and ranchers are making more profits. Production costs have risen at a higher rate than prices farmers and ranchers receive. XXX

Some vegetable and fruit crops have done well this year also. We had a very large peach crop and several have reported good truck crop yields this summer.

Oscar Schaefer of the Cook community said he had a real good melon crop. He even furnished us proof of the good quality of his crop.

Mrs. James Johnson of Lake Leon told us about her fall garden. She planted beans, squash, and black eye peas on July 27th. The garden is making excellent growth and the squash are already in production.

According to Dr. David B. Miller, Extension on Poultry Marketing Specialist, some consumers are being taken-in by the sale of "Organic Eggs". The "Organic Eggs" are twice as expensive and no more nutritious than regular eggs.

"If a hen has a sufficient quantity of nutrients she will form an egg and all eggs will have the same quantity and quality of nutrients," says Miller. "Of course, this will vary with the size of the egg."

Actually, all eggs are organic so it doesn't make sense to pay

a higher price for those labeled "organic". In addition, regular eggs move faster in the store and should be fresher than the specialized organic eggs.

Texas Egg Law requires that eggs be graded, have a clean, sound shell and be kept at a temperature under 60 degrees. There is no evidence to support the idea that organic eggs are more nutritious.

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# LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE ABATEMENT AND REMOVAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES OR PARTS THEREOF, AS PUBLIC NUISANCES, FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF THE PREMISES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC HEARING; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, DESIGNATING EMPLOYEES ENTITLED TO ADMINISTER ORDINANCE; DESIGNATING VEHICLES TO WHICH ORDINANCE SHALL NOT APPLY; AND PROVIDING THAT VEHICLES SHALL NOT BE RECONSTRUCTED.

WHEREAS, the State of Texas has in House Bill 1181 declared certain junked vehicles to be a public nuisance, and

WHEREAS, the City of Eastland, Texas, in accordance with the provisions set out in Section 10 of such Bill desires to enact an ordinance establishing procedures for the abatement and removal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, as public nuisances, from private property or public property;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. Notice. That notice stating the nature of the public nuisance shall be given by certified or registered mail with a 5 day return requested to the owner or the occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists. That such notice shall also state that such public nuisance must be removed and abated within 10 days of receipt of such notice and that any request for a public hearing thereon must be made before the expiration of such 10 day period. That if the

notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days from the date of such return.

Section 2. Public Hearing. That when a public hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located within 10 days after the service of notice to abate said nuisance a public hearing shall be held before the City Commission or any other board, commission or official of the City, as designated by the City Commission prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance. That any order created requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle, and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.

Section 3. Notice to Texas Highway Department. That notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within 5 days after the date of removal of the vehicle or part thereof identifying the vehicle or part thereof in order that said Department can cancel the certificate of title to such vehicle.

Section 4. Employees Entitled to Administer Ordinance. That this ordinance may be administered by any regularly salaried, full time employees of the City of Eastland, except that the removal of the vehicle or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person.

Section 5. Nonapplicability of Ordinance. That this ordinance shall not apply to (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property or (2) a vehicle or part thereof which is stored or

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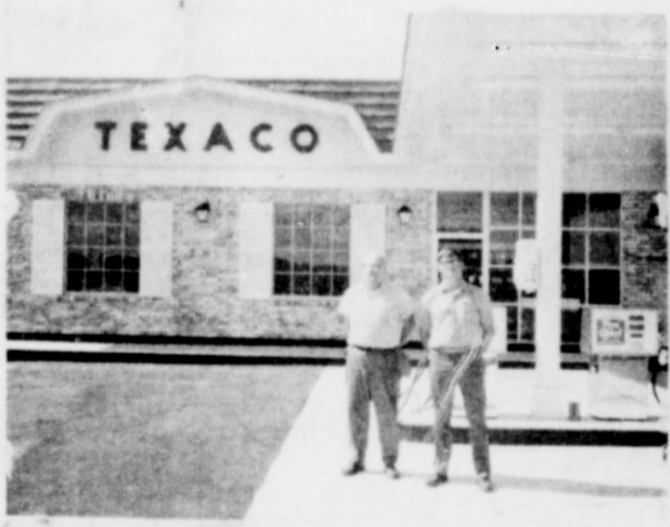

## Why Dr. Outler Is Interested in Toads

"I MUST SEE the toad," said the President of the United States. So back in 1928, Old Rip, an Eastland, Texas, horned toad was fetched to the White House for President Calvin Coolidge's inspection. Old Rip was very much alive when he made his trip to Washington. And the horned toad was famous because he was supposed to have lived for 31 years while sealed up air-tight in the Eastland County Courthouse cornerstone.

Now in 1972 Dr. Albert C. Outler told me: "I need some material on that toad." He meant Old Rip. Why would Dr. Outler of SMU, one of the nation's most distinguished theologians, be interested in the renowned lizard?

The answer to this question is concerned with the fact that Dr. Outler is now engaged in sweat-neck research on the sermons of John Wesley (1703-1791), the founder-father of Methodism. Albert Outler is the editor and one of an army of scholars compiling a 25- to 30-volume edition of John Wesley's works. He has taken off a year from his chores as professor of historical theology at SMU to complete a 4-volume compilation of Wesley's sermons with notes on the sermons from Outler's research.

### Frog in an Oak

Dr. Outler's interest in toads such as Old Rip began from the reading of a Wesley sermon called on "On Living Without God" in which the Methodist church founder mentions a "late incident, the truth of which cannot be reasonably doubted, there having been so large a number of witnesses. An ancient oak being cut down and split through the midst, out of the very heart of the tree crept a large toad and walked away with all the speed he could. Now, how long may we imagine had this creature continued there? It is not unlikely it might have remained in its nest above 100 years. It is not improbable it was nearly if not altogether coeval with the oak; having been in some way or other enclosed therein at the time that it was planted. It had lived that strange kind of life at least a century."

WHILE RESEARCHING in England, Dr. Outler somehow traced to the source of John Wesley's story about the toad in the oak tree to a little known yet 8-volume work of Oliver Goldsmith called "An History of the Earth and Animated Nature" published in 1774.

He had to wade through a lot of Goldsmith before he found this in Volume 7: "What shall we say to its (a toad) living for centuries lodged in the bottom of a rock or cased within the body of an oak tree without the smallest access for nourishment or air, and yet taken out alive and perfect . . . We have the highest authorities bearing witness their truth, and yet the whole analogy of nature seems to arraign them of falsehood. Bacon asserts that toads are found in this manner; Dr. Plot asserts the same . . ."

### Long a Legend

THERE HAS long been a legend in the Southwest that horned toads can live for 100 years or more without food, water, or air. This belief caused a child named Will Wood to place his pet horned toad inside the cornerstone of the Eastland County Courthouse on July 28, 1897. This was witnessed by county dignitaries and the toad was sealed in the cornerstone.

Will Wood was still living in Eastland when the cornerstone was opened on Feb. 18, 1928 at a time when the old courthouse was being torn down. Several days before the cornerstone was opened stories had appeared in newspapers all over the country about Mr. Wood putting the toad in there 31 years before. So there were about 1,500 witnesses gathered for the opening of the cornerstone, with 2 Eastland preachers and County Judge Ed S. Pritchard charged with the duties of watching every move from the time the wall was pulled off until the workmen's picks broke through into the cornerstone. The Rev. F. E. Singleton pointed a finger into the cavity when the cornerstone was broken open and said: "There's the horned frog!" Eugene Day, an Eastland oilman, reached in and brought out the living lizard by the tail.

After that Old Rip became one of the most famous creatures on earth. First Will Wood took his pet to the White House for Coolidge to see. In St. Louis, 40,000 people turned out to see the ancient toad. Old Rip died on January 19, 1929, probably from the rigors of a theatrical tour. His body was embalmed and is now on display in the Eastland County courthouse.

THE WITNESSES get angry if you suggest there was some sleight of hand when the cornerstone was opened. I've spoken with many of those 1,500 witnesses. They're all convinced the toad taken from the stone in 1928 was the same one placed there in 1887.

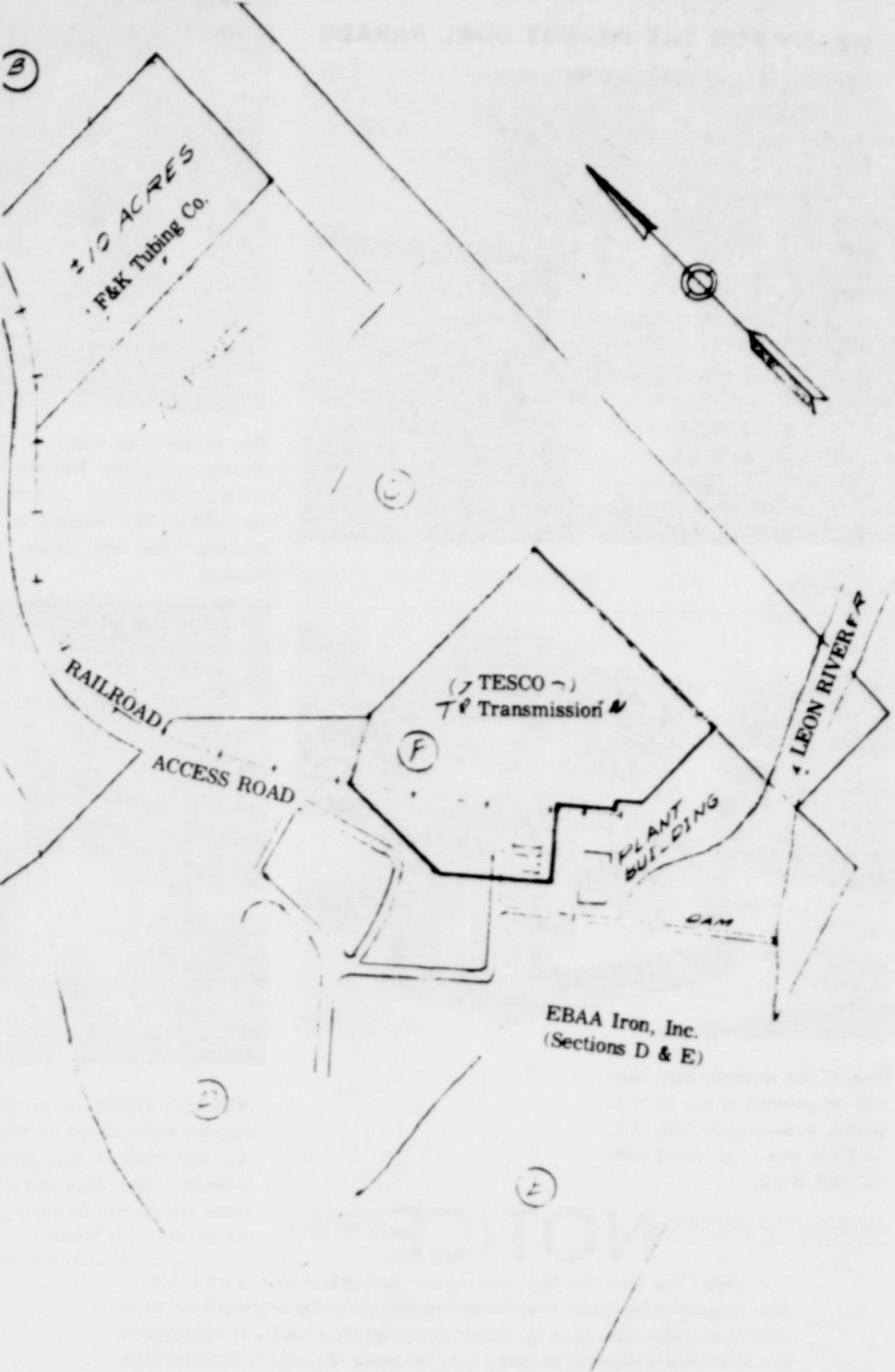

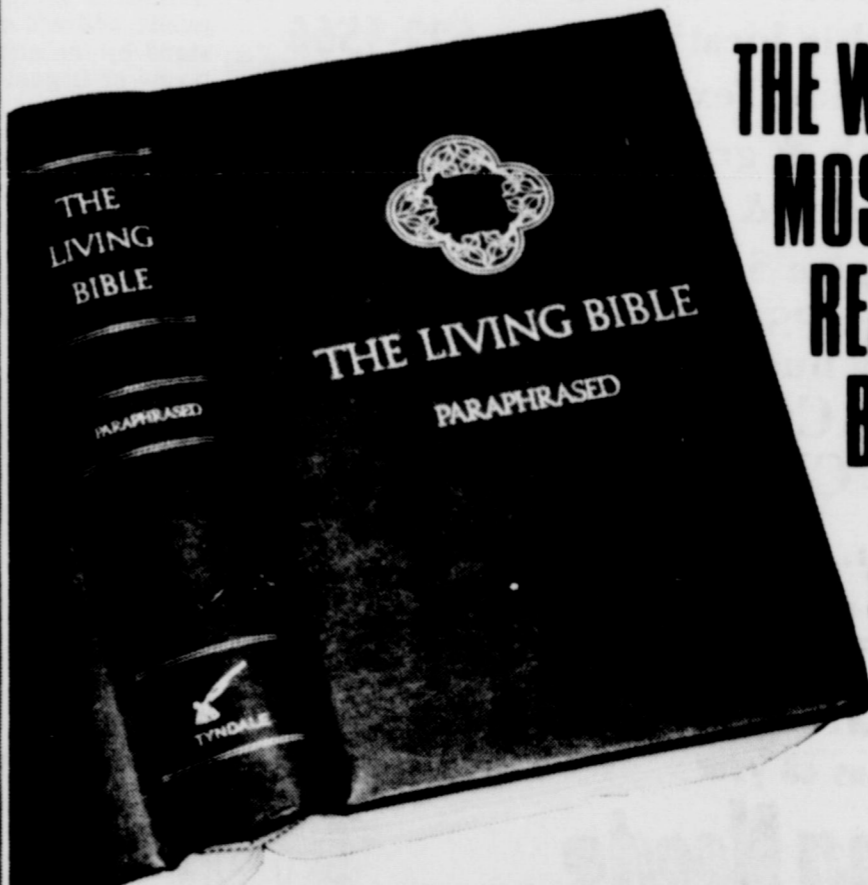

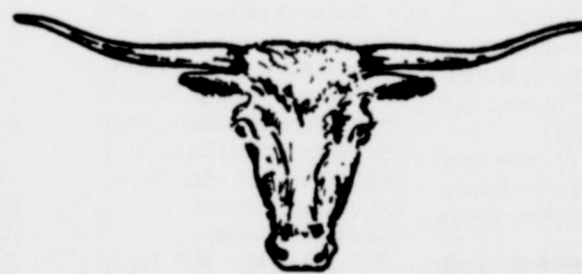
