392 Signatures Needed If Application Comes

An application for a petition asking for an election to legalize the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off - premises consumption had not come into the County Clerk's office at press time.

H.A. Werley, 68, said in the Abilene Reporter - News Tuesday morning that he has obtained 13 signatures for his application. (Ten are required to secure the petitions.)

The number of qualified signatures required to call such an election appears to be 392, which is 25 percent of the total number of voters who voted in 1968. That year there were 1,569

votes cast in the governor's race (99 for Smith in Eastland and 123 for Smith in Olden; 444 for Paul Eggers in Eastland and 69 for Eggers in Olden.)

TO BE PUBLISHED
A group of Eastland men have met and authorized this newspaper to announce that the list of signers will be published, if and when it is returned.

There appears to be some dispute over boundary of the area for which the election is being sought. Mr. Werley, through his Abilene Reporter - News statements, has listed the area as the city limits of Eastland "and five miles south and five miles west."

Authorities hold that the law provides three choices for boundaries: Justice of the Peace Precincts, County Commissioner Precincts or City Limits of city or town.

New home building sites for now and in the future are being opened on Eastland's west side. Construction of streets, water and sewer facilities is now

underway in the newest subdivision, Crestwood, a 30 - acre location west of Hillcrest. The new location offers spacious building sites for new homes.

Developers report that the addition will be restricted to residences only and certain building specifications and standards will be required.

Initially only the first 18 lots will be served in the first phase of the development but the entire addition will eventually be developed. Persons may select locations for building now or in the future it was pointed out.

H&W Construction Co. has secured sites and will begin construction in the near future, it is reported.

Water should be flowing in the Staff Water Systems by April 1, 1973, if all goes well, reports E.L. Foster, Farmers Home Administration Director, said in Eastland Wednesday.

Bids for construction on the project will be opened Tuesday, Sept. 19, at 2:30 p.m. at the County Commissioners Courtroom at the Courthouse, Mr. Foster said.

The project will involve some 85 miles of pipeline and is estimated to serve upwards of 300 customers. It extends from near Caddo to the Don Estes Ranch near Desdemona and across the highway west of Carbon.

\$250 Billion Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON -- The American Bankers Association has announced its support of a proposed \$250 billion ceiling on federal spending.

Allen P. Stults, president of the ABA, said legislation to impose the ceiling on fiscal 1973 expenditures was endorsed this week by the association's board of directors.

Mr. Stults said the 23-member board unanimously adopted a resolution expressing concern about "the resumption of inflationary pressures and their potentially adverse impact upon the American people and the U.S. economy."

"The discipline of a rigid expenditure ceiling would alleviate the immediate danger of generating an excessively expansionary deficit," the resolution continued.

As a second step, said Stults, the bankers proposed a four-

point program to develop permanent measures to control spending:

-- Adoption of multi-year budget projections for total spending and specific programs. This will permit lawmakers to assess the ultimate costs of programs.

-- Assign definite termination dates to new spending programs, and to existing programs of questionable value.

-- Create a joint Congressional Committee to evaluate the federal budget as a whole.

-- Subject trust fund programs to budgetary review, expenditure control, and accountability procedures applied to other tax-supported programs.

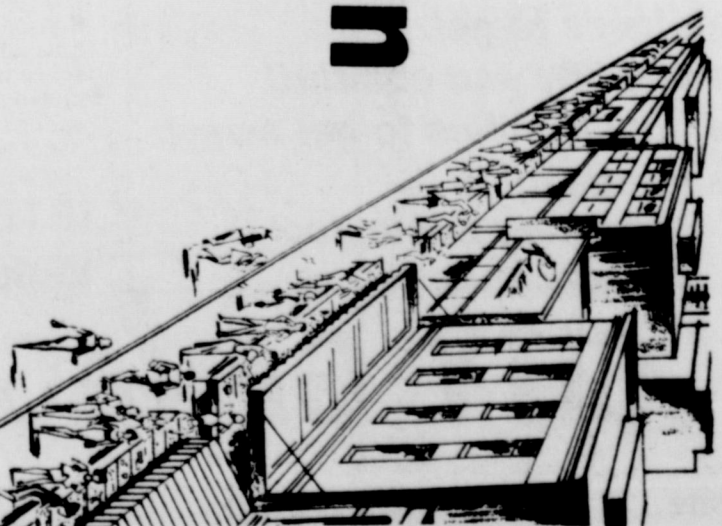

Mrs. Thomas 'sentenced' to 16 more years of ice hockey

It may be 16 years before Jeanie Thomas can retire from the world of junior hockey.

Come 1988 her youngest son, now only 2 years old, will pass the 18-year age limit for junior hockey and for the first time in almost 20 years, Mrs. Thomas won't be a hockey mother.

OF COURSE, Mrs. Thomas can't be sure her three sons will all play hockey up to the age limit, but current circumstances would seem to point in that direction.

Son Scott, now 10, has attended the Fort Worth Amateur Hockey Assn. clinic for three years; Bill, 6, is attending the clinic for the first time this year, and Mike, 2, is already playing backyard hockey although he hasn't made it to the ice variety yet.

"In fact," laughs the wife of Lawrence Thomas, of 8916 Kincaid, "the first words Mike said were 'play hockey'."

"My husband and I are resigned to the fact that we have a future in amateur hockey for many years to come."

THE FAMILY'S involvement with hockey began several years ago when they were given tickets to a Fort Worth Wings game.

"It was love at first sight for all of us," recalls Mrs. Thomas, who also has two daughters, Mitzi, 15, and Mary, 12.

Following that first encounter with hockey, Mrs. Thomas soon found her sons playing hockey on the driveway. "First they started using brooms for sticks and then they advanced to wearing roller skates for the non-hockey," she adds.

Then the family heard about the hockey clinic and son Scott could hardly wait to get on the ice.

In a poem Mrs. Thomas has written about hockey, entitled "The Name of the Game is Hockey," she describes that first visit to the clinic as seen through the eyes of a mother.

"Up in the morning, out on the ice, dreaming of making a score!

The Fort Worth Press, Monday, August 21, 1972

Some guy named Horn yelling at him, like YOU never did before!! What are they doing to my little boy? Do they have to be so rough? Surely two days at this horrible pace, and he'll have had enough!

Suddenly, the worry starts to fade and is replaced by a sort of pride.

Instead of 'Will he kill himself?' It's 'will he be off-side?'

"It's crazy," she laughs, "how those little boys decide they want to play ice hockey, when they've never even had on a pair of ice skates. It simply never occurs to them that they can't play just because they can't skate."

So the boys learn to skate and then they're ready to try playing in the amateur hockey league, an experience Mrs. Thomas also describes in her poem.

"The schedule comes! You read it through and feel a little shaken. First game . . . Sunday . . . SIX A.M. . . . Surely they're mistaken!!

But six a.m. Sunday morning, you're shivering in the bleachers, Thinking surely hockey fans are the world's weirdest creatures.

There they go onto the ice! But the referee has to wait . . . Cause there's YOUR kid, still in the chair yelling, 'Someone tighten my skate!'

A smile comes over the hockey mother's face as she recalls last season and her skate tightening experiences.

"I'd come to the coliseum to bring Scott, but I'd end up staying around tightening the skates for dozens of youngsters. Finally the coach ran me off saying that 'these boys are going to have to learn to do it themselves.'"

SO THIS season Mrs. Thomas is acting as beginner co-ordinator at the hockey clinic and will resign herself to the role of a spectator come hockey season.

And that's not so bad considering Mrs. Thomas says she "can't think of anything I'd rather do than sit in the coliseum and watch these youngsters playing hockey."

All Agree: Centennial Needed But Methods Differ

Everyone appears to be accord that Eastland County's 100th Anniversary should be properly celebrated next year, but there apparently are differences of opinion as to the best methods.

A preliminary agreement has been made with the Rogers Co., a professional celebration staging company, to handle the Eastland County event, but in a steering committee meeting Monday evening, several questioned the advisability of paying an out-of-county firm to help with the event.

The company's initial proposal calls for a total budget of some \$20,000 and their fee would be approximately \$9,000.

Their proposed budget shows that the event would net maybe \$1,500 if there were 100 percent accomplishment.

Chairman Mike Collins, who accepted the post on a one month basis to see if a celebration could be held using the company, presided at the meeting held at First Federal Savings and Loan Association Meeting Room in Ranger. Representatives were present from each town in the county.

Some hold that a locally produced celebration would be just as effective, and cost a lot less money.

Another steering committee meeting will be held Monday Sept. 11 in Gorman, and a Rogers Co. representative is to be here for an Oct. 2 meeting to be held in Cisco.

During the two hour information session Monday evening, various opinions were expressed regarding the advisability of hiring as opposed to a locally produced show.

The matter is still open for discussion and persons wishing to express themselves on this matter, may do so to this newspaper or to Mr. Collins.

PARK INTRODUCTION

At the request of the City of Eastland, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, through its Small Community Planning Assistance Service, offers the following information relative to the proposed development, for park and recreational purposes, of a portion of land owned by the City of Eastland.

This planning proposal consists of a written development analysis, a site development scheme, and typical facility plans. It is intended to provide the basic

park and recreation planning tools necessary to begin implementation of the proposed city park and recreational site development project. The material presented is not intended to supplement or replace the final design, construction drawing, and specification phase of the planning process. All facility locations depicted on the development scheme should be reverified during the final construction design phase, for construction and site limitation factors that could preclude

placement in the area designated.

The typical building, area, and component plans presented are intended to define only basic space and style requirements and should not be considered the final solution as to design or function.

CITY CHARACTERISTICS

Named in honor of Captain William Mosby Eastland, Texas Revolutionary hero, Eastland, Texas, began in 1875 as a small community near the center of Eastland County. Jacamiah S. Daugherty, Charles U. Connelley and several other settlers constructed a rock courthouse and declared the community to be the county seat. Population of Eastland was reported to be 3,178 in the 1970 United States Federal Census Report. During the construction of the fourth courthouse in 1897, a cornerstone containing a live Texas horned frog (horned lizard) and other items was laid

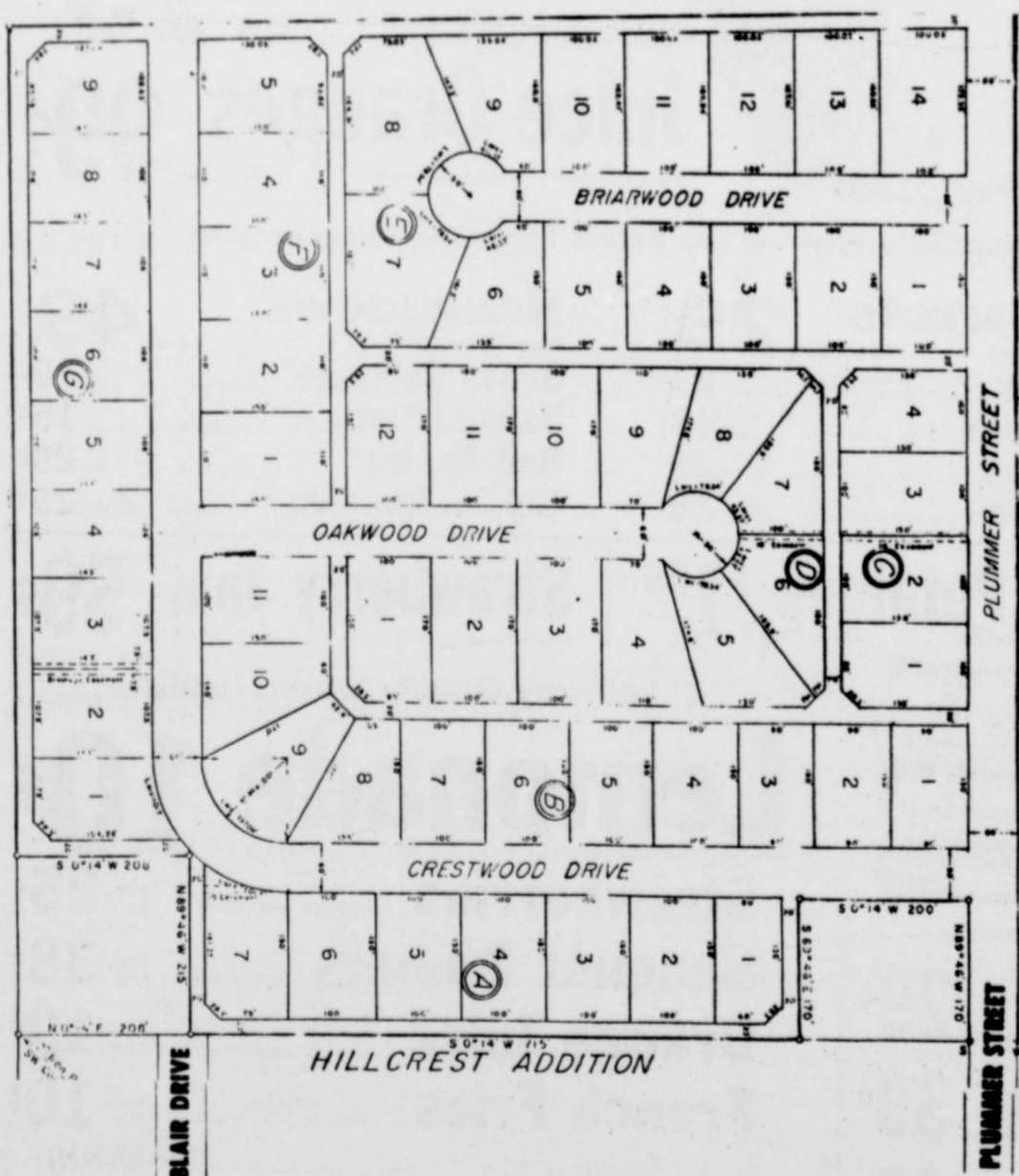
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
