\$250 Billion Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON - - The American Bankers Association has announced its support of a proposed \$250 billion ceiling on federal spending.

Allen P. Stults, president of the ABA, said legislation to impose the ceiling on fiscal 1973 expenditures was endorsed this week by the association's board of directors

Mr. Stults said the 23 member board unanimously adopted a resolution expressing concern about "the resumption of inflationary pressures and their potentially adverse impact upon the American people and the U.S. economy.

"The discipline of a rigid expenditure ceiling would alleviate the immediate danger of generating an excessively expansionary deficit," the resolution continued.

As a second step, said Stults, the bankers proposed a four

- Adoption of multi - year budget projections for total spending and programs. This will permit lawmakers to assess the ultimate costs of programs.

- - Assign definite termination dates to new spending programs, and to existing programs of questionable

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C. --REMEMBER THAT PART of a little limerick which goes something like this: "It's either too cold or it's either too hot; we are always wanting what is not." It was meant to suggest that some people constantly complain and are never happy with anything.

IN THIS POLITICAL YEAR the weather might be about the most noncontroversial subject. ON THE OTHER HAND there is always a good chance of finding argument, even

about the weather.

JOKINGLY SOME PEOPLE will say "Send us a rain from Washington." Actually it is fortunate for the Country that the weather is a product of natural forces or sublime direction rather than the work of a committee of Congress. If the Congress should engage in arguments over whether we should have dry weather, wet weather, partly cloudy or clear, some Member would opt for something else and maybe unintentionally bring a tornado or a hurricane in some part of the Country other than that which he represents. There would be the difference in those parts of the Country favoring crops and that part favoring grazing or forestry, or that part which irrigates or nonirrigates. Then there would always be the danger of a filibuster in the Senate resulting in no weather at all. There would always be the politician getting out a press release claiming credit for rain which had fallen on the just and unjust alike. Doubtless the umbrella people would take a hand in lobbying for certain kinds of weather as well as other producers of products suxh as galoshes for wet snow.

PERTS about all most of us know about the weather is that actually Mark Twain was not the originator of "Everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it." Some of us through the years have attributed this line to Mark Twain but now it seems to have been observed by Charles Warner who wrote in the Hartford, Connecticut Courant

MOST WEATHER EX-PERTS seem to have a sense of humor about their predictions although some no doubt take their prognostications most seriously. This is not to disparage these specialists and their instruments but old farmers, mountaineers and sailors have been pretty dependable for a long time. Only trouble is they are pretty hard to find these days. They study the sky for a moment or two, check the direction of the wind with a saliva - moistened finger, and make some pretty accurate predictions.

SKEPTICISM DEVELOPED within some of us during World War II when the predictions of military weather experts were seldom correct. Of course, this might be applied to about any other kind of prediction - - it's just more noticeable about the

'CAP'N" BILL, WHO HAS a fishing boat down on the Gulf, is a dependable weatherman, using a squinted eye, a wet forefinger or an aching joint as his only instruments. We asked him about the weather for the day and he said he was going fishing if he could get his dad burned engine started: that it had been raining a lot and everything was water - logged, including him.

HE WAS ASKED WHY THE weather all over the world had gone so berserk in the last several months. There have been floods in the New Braunfels area. Virginia, South Dakota and Hurricane Agnes flooding Virginia, District of Columbia, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland. (The flood at Snyder had not yet occurred.) Then there were floods in Japan, the Philippines, and it seems about every other place except the Sahara. Cap'n Bill responded that the weather was not the only thing that's crazy. He says the whole dang world is and that it all started in 1957 when the Russians punctured the invisible sack around the earth with Sputnik. He says it's no wonder we have floods, tornadoes, landslides, earthquakes, hippies, zippies, crime, dope and all the other loony carrin's - on.

AS FOR WHETHER THE WEATHER will ever stop misbehaving, Cap'n Bill said, "Can't tell. Mother Nature don't like being fooled and sheain't one to forget anytime

soon. A NEW RADAR WEATHER STATION at the Minicipal Midland - Odessa Airport was dedicated last week. As soon as funds can be secured a major Weather Bureau station will be installed at Clark Field in Stephenville

WITH DUE RESPECT FOR Cap'n Bill's proclivities, weather service for West Texas should be greatly improved with these new installations.

YOM KIPPUR DAY OF ATONEMENT

> September 18, 1972 Hebrew Date: Tishri 10, 5733

In Jerusalem, Jews gather at the "Wailing Wall" (The only remnant of an ancient temple in that city) on Yom Kippur, the final day of the Ten Days of Penitence. Here at the site of religious pilgrimages down through the centuries, worshippers observe Yom Kippur. This scripture from The Living Bible is the authority for observance of Yom Kippur

"This is a permanent law: You must do no work on the tenth day of the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar), but must spend the day in self-examination and humility This applies whether you are born in the land or are a foreigner living among the people of Israel; for this is the day commemorating the atonement, cleansing you in the Lord's eyes from all of your sins. It is a Sabbath of solemn rest for you, and you shall spend the day in quiet humility, this is a permanent law. This ceremony, in later generations shall be performed by the anninted High Priest, consecrated in place of his ancesto Aaron; he shall be the one to put on the holy linen garments, and make atonemen for the holy sanctuary, the Tabernacle, the altar, the priests, and the people. This shall be an everlasting law for you, to make atonement for the people of Israel once each year, because of their sins (Leviticus 16:29-34)

"Nine days after the Festival of Trumpets, all people are to come together before the Lord, saddened by their sin; and they shall offer sacrifices by fire to the Lord. Don to any work that day, for it is a special day for making atonement before the Lord your God. Anyone who does not spend the day in repentance and sorrow for sin shall be excommunicated from his people. And I will put to death anyone who does any kind of work that day. This is a law of Israel from generation to generation. For this is a Sabbat of solemn rest, and in it you shall humble your souls and be filled with remorse, the time for atonement begins on the previous evening and goes on until the next evening (Leviticus 23:26-32)

OF COURSE, Mrs. Thomas can't be sure her three sons will all play hockey up to the age limit, but current circumstances would seem to point in that direction.

Son Scott, now 10, has attended the Fort Worth Amateur Hockey Assn. clinic for three years; Bill, 6, is attending the clinic for the first time this year, and Mike, 2, is already playing backyard hockey although he hasn't made it to the ice variety yet.

"In fact," laughs the wife of Lawrence Thomas, of 8916 Kincaid, "the first words

Mike said were 'play hockey'. "My husband and I are resigned to the

fact that we have a future in amateur hockey for many years to come."

THE FAMILY'S involvement with hockey began several years ago when they were given tickets to a Fort Worth Wings game.

"It was love at first sight for all of us," recalls Mrs. Thomas, who also has two daughters, Mitzi, 15, and Mary, 12.

Following that first encounter with hockey, Mrs. Thomas soon found her sons playing hockey on the driveway. "First they started using brooms for sticks and then they advanced to wearing roller skates for the nonice hockey," she adds.

"Up in the morning, out on the ice, dreaming of making a score!

Some guy named Horn yelling at him, like YOU never did before! !! What are they doing to my little boy? Do they have to be so rough?

Surely two days at this horrible pace, and he'll have had enough!. Suddenly, the worry starts to fade and is

replaced by a sort of pride.
Instead of 'Will he kill himself?' It's 'will he be off-side?""

"It's crazy," she laughs, "how those little boys decide they want to play ice hockey, when they've never even had on a pair of ice skates. It simply never occurs to them that they can't play just because they can't

So the boys learn to skate and then they're ready to try playing in the amateur hockey league, an experience Mrs. Thomas also describes in her poem.

"The schedule comes! You read it through

and feel a little shaken. First game . . . Sunday . . . SIX A.M. . . . Surely they're mistaken!!!

But six a.m. Sunday morning, you're shivering in the bleachers, Thinking surely hockey fans are the world's

weirdest creatures. There they go onto the Ice! But the referee has to wait . Cause there's YOUR kid, still in the chair

yelling, 'Someone tighten my skate!' "
A smile comes over the hockey mother's face as she recalls last season and her skate tightening experiences.

"I'd come to the coliseum to bring Scott, but I'd end up staying around tightening the skates for dozens of youngsters. Finally the coach ran me off saying that 'these boys are going to have to learn to do it them-

SO THIS season Mrs. Thomas is acting as beginner co-ordinator at the hockey clinic and will resign herself to the role of a spectator come hockey season.

And that's not so bad considering Mrs. Thomas says she "can't think of anything I'd rather do than sit in the coliseum and watch these youngsters playing hockey."

All Agree: Centennial Needed But Methods Differ

accord that Eastland County's 100th Anniversary should be properly celebrated next year, but there apparently are differences of opinion as to the best methods.

A preliminary agreement has been made with the Rogers Co., a professional celebration staging company, to handle the Eastland County event, but in a steering committee meeting Monday evening, several questioned the advisability of paying an out - of - county firm

to help with the event. The company's initial proposal calls for a total budget of some \$20,000 and their fee would be approximately \$9,000. Their proposed budget shows

that the event would net maybe \$1,500 if there were 100 percent

Chairman Mike Collins, who celebration could be held using the company, presided at the meeting held at First Federal Savings and Loan Association Meeting Room in Ranger. Representatives were present from each town in the county.

Some hold that a locally produced celebration would be just as effective, and cost a lot less money.


