Application Doesn't Make It Friday

An application for a petition for an election on the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption had not been filed in the County Clerk's office at 5 p.m. Friday.

H.A. Werley, said Thursday that he expected no trouble in getting the required 10 registered voter signatures on an application for a petition for the election.

The area involved includes Eastland, Olden and Morton Valley and extends five miles south and west of Eastland. Werley and his attorney, Saul Pullman of Eastland, visited Smith's office Wednesday afternoon to review the state statutes on calling such an election.

In order for the petitions to

meet legal requirements for authorizing the county commissioners to call the election, they must contain at least 249 signatures of registered voters who voted in the 1968 general election.

After Smith verifies the signatures, commissioners must call the election within not less than 20 nor more than 30 days.

Eastland County has had a long history of on-again, off-again, wet elections - dating back to March 12, 1938, when the county went wet.

The county, with the exception of the city of Ranger, has been dry since Oct. 7, 1939. Elections in 1939, twice in 1940 and again in 1948 to legalize the sale of 4 percent and 14 percent

County Centennial Proposal Given Nod; Work To Begin

A large group of county citizens met Thursday evening at 7:30 in the cafeteria of Carbon High School and approved unanimously a proposal for a celebration honoring the 100th anniversary of Eastland County. The centennial will be held in the spring of 1973 with the time and place to be decided by an executive committee which will meet Oct. 2, 3, and 4.

Mike Collins of Eastland, was selected as temporary chairman and Bobbie Sansom of Rising Star was selected as secretary of the centennial spectacular.

The Centennial celebration will be staged by every citizen of the county with the assistance of the Rogers Company of Fostoria, Ohio.

Events for the centennial will be planned, in which the people can be actual participants rather than mere spectators, to paid attractions. It was suggested that every civic group of Eastland County be invited to help plan and organize a series of events in which they, themselves, will participate.

As a means of stimulating retail business, special projects will be developed to create great mass visitation to retail stores throughout the entire county.

Since the purpose of the Celebration is based on an historical event, as the chief entertainment feature and as the principal means of financing the entire program, a dramatic historical spectacle will be presented each night of the celebration's climactic history to dramatize the history of Eastland County.

Planning is underway for a Centennial Celebration and Chairman Mike Collins has announced that his first committee meeting will be held Monday evening.

Ted and Dorthy Stewart, and their four children, a missionary family to Sao Paulo, Brazil, will visit in Eastland Sunday, August 27, at the Plummer and Daugherty Streets Church of Christ. The 6 p.m. hour will feature Bro. Stewart in a report of his work in Brazil after which he will show colored slides.

Stewart's visit to Eastland will report on his work as Evangelist in Sao Paulo, a city of eight million, and on his work as Director of a Preacher Training School which began three years ago. The Stewart family have lived in Brazil for the past eleven years and are in the United States on furlough this summer while making reports and visiting families and churches. They will return to Brazil in September, 1972.

The Stewart family are not strangers to this area. Both Ted and Dorthy are graduates of Abilene Christian College. During student days there Bro.

Ted was minister of the Gordon Church of Christ and Mrs. Stewart is the former Dorthy McAfee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.T. McAfee of Gordon and niece of Mrs. Arda Tibbs and Mrs. Ruth Campbell of Eastland. The Stewarts have four children, ages 13, 11, 7 and 6. Following ministries at Rosen Heights Church of Christ in Fort Worth and Central Church of Christ in Amarillo, the Stewarts became missionaries in Brazil in 1961.

Park Master Plan Is Reported

EASTLAND CITY PARK TABULAR SUMMARY OF PROJECT ELEMENTS AND COST ESTIMATES JULY 1972

allowances are for planning purposes only. Experience has indicated that a monetary savings can be realized in park development work by employing a combination of city force account labor and contract construction work. In addition, volunteer labor from local service organizations may be employed as a possible means to further reduce construction costs.

The Texas State Building Commission has estimated construction costs to increase approximately 12 percent per year in the future and this indicated increase should be considered in addition to the following basic cost allowance.

Over 700 members of the home demonstration clubs throughout Texas are expected to attend the annual Texas Home Demonstration Association state meeting on September 13 and 14 in the Astroworld Hotel in Houston. Eastland County delegates are Mrs. Bernard Campbell, Pleasant Hill H.D. Club; Mrs. Zelma Lusk, Flatwood H.D. Club; Mrs. Sue Taylor, Lake Cisco H.D. Club; and alternates are Mrs. H.E. Hartsell, Morton Valley H.D. Club; and Mrs. Ava Rodgers, Kokomo H.D. Club.

The meeting is open to the public and will be a valuable experience to all those interested in improving home and community life.

Outstanding speakers will be discussing various aspects of home economics in Texas during the two day meeting. Dr. L.S. Pope, of Texas A&M University, will discuss the problem of food costs and the consumer. Dr. Mina Lamb of Texas Tech University Food and Nutrition Department, will present an "Eulogy of Nutrition."

Home Demonstration ladies will also participate in special workshops concerning citizenship, family life, 4-H work, health, cultural arts, recreation, and safety.

Election and installation of state officers will conclude the meeting.

Home Demonstration clubs, numbering 1,315 in Texas with more than 21,000 members, are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University. The Extension Service sponsors local clubs throughout Texas...which focus on the needs of homemakers in their counties...as part of a statewide educational effort to bring the latest information on homemaking to all families of Texas. There are seven H.D. Clubs in Eastland county, and homemakers wishing to join are always invited and welcomed.

Mrs. Carolyn Beebe will be joining the Eastland County Extension Service staff during the month of September. Mrs. Beebe will be working as an Apprentice Extension Agent during September in order to receive some updated training and information. Several years

ago, Mrs. Beebe worked as Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent in Taylor County.

On October 1, 1972, Mrs. Beebe will become Brown County Home Demonstration Agent.

Mrs. Beebe is the former Carolyn Gilbert and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Gilbert of Gorman.

Delicious pears are in abundance, and you might like to try this excellent recipe for preserving some of them...

PEAR BUTTER

2 quarts pear pulp (about 20 medium ripe pears)

4 cups sugar

1 teaspoon grated orange rind

1/2 cup orange juice

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

To prepare pulp...quarter and core pears. Cook until soft adding only enough water to prevent sticking. Press through a sieve or food mill. Measure pulp. Add remaining ingredients, cook until thick, about 15 minutes. As mixture thickens, stir frequently to prevent sticking. Pour hot into hot sterilized jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Adjust caps. Process pints and quarts 10 minutes in boiling water bath.

Coastal Getting Free Lunch Program Explained

Hot lunches are available at each of the three Eastland Schools every day that school is in operation. These lunches may be purchased by students at the following rate during the 1972 - 73 school year.

Elementary Students - - 40
 Jr. High and Senior High - - 45

Some families may find it difficult to pay for lunches needed by children in their family. If you find it difficult to

financially afford lunches for your children, you are invited to complete an application for free lunches if you think you qualify according to the attached guidelines.

If your family income is greater than that allowed according to the attached

chart, you still may qualify if you have had illness in the family and have had extra medical bills, or other unusual bills that have caused a financial hardship.

Your child will be treated the same as other children

L.D. Belyeu, 5 mi. northeast of Gorman, said he had applied 200 pounds per acre of 33 - 0 - 0 on one 40 acres block about Aug. 5. He plans on a hay crop and another growth to graze after frost. "The quality of grass is poor after frost that isn't fall fertilized, but if fertilized the cows will take it until winter rains rot it. I like to always leave a good growth for winter grazing," Belyeu remarked.

He said that he got more growth on his coastal and better gains on his livestock when he uses 33 - 0 - 0.

"I've tried 10 - 20 - 10 at the rate of 300 pounds per acre but didn't get the growth I expected," said Belyeu.

Since the cost of application has increased he applies his spring fertilizer in a liquid form with 24D to kill weeds but waits until the bermuda is growing; usually after April 15. Otherwise he prefers the pellet form.

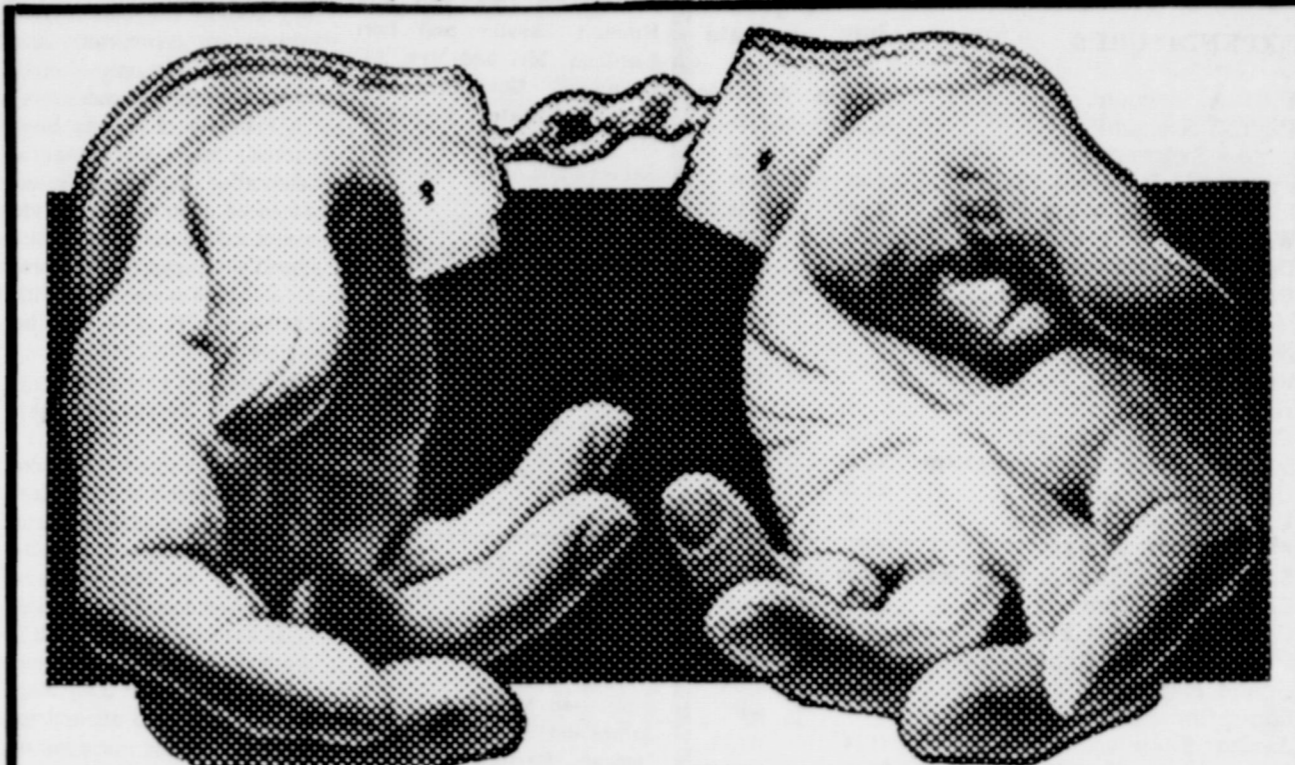
Belyeu started sprigging coastal bermuda in 1967 under the Great Plains Conservation Program. He now has over 300 acres of coastal on which he is carrying out a good management program.

DESIGNATING EMPLOYEES ENTITLED TO ADMINISTER ORDINANCE; DESIGNATING VEHICLES TO WHICH ORDINANCE SHALL NOT APPLY; AND PROVIDING THAT VEHICLES SHALL NOT BE RECONSTRUCTED.

WHEREAS, the State of Texas has in House Bill 1181 declared certain junked vehicles to be a public nuisance, and

WHEREAS, the City of Eastland, Texas, in accordance with the provisions set out in Section 10 of such Bill desires to enact an ordinance establishing

procedures for the abatement and removal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, as public nuisances, from private property or public property;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. Notice. That notice stating the nature of the public nuisance shall be given by certified or registered mail with a 5 day return requested to the owner or the occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists. That such notice shall also state that such public nuisance must be removed and abated within 10 days of receipt of such notice and that any request for a public hearing thereon must be made before the expiration of such 10 day period. That if the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days from the date of such return.

Section 2. Public Hearing. That when a public hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located within 10 days after the service of notice to abate said nuisance a public hearing shall be held before the City Commission or any other board, commission or official of the City, as designated by the City Commission prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance. That any order created requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle, and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.

Section 3. Notice to Texas Highway Department. That notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within 5 days after the date of

removal of the vehicle or part thereof identifying the vehicle or part thereof in order that said Department can cancel the certificate of title to such vehicle.

Section 4. Employees Entitled to Administer Ordinance. That this ordinance may be administered by any regularly salaried, full time employees of the City of Eastland, except that the removal of the vehicle or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person.

Section 5. Nonapplicability of Ordinance. That this ordinance shall not apply to (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property or (2) a vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or a junkyard.

Section 6. Vehicle Not To Be Reconstructed. That after a vehicle has been removed it shall not be reconstructed or made operable.

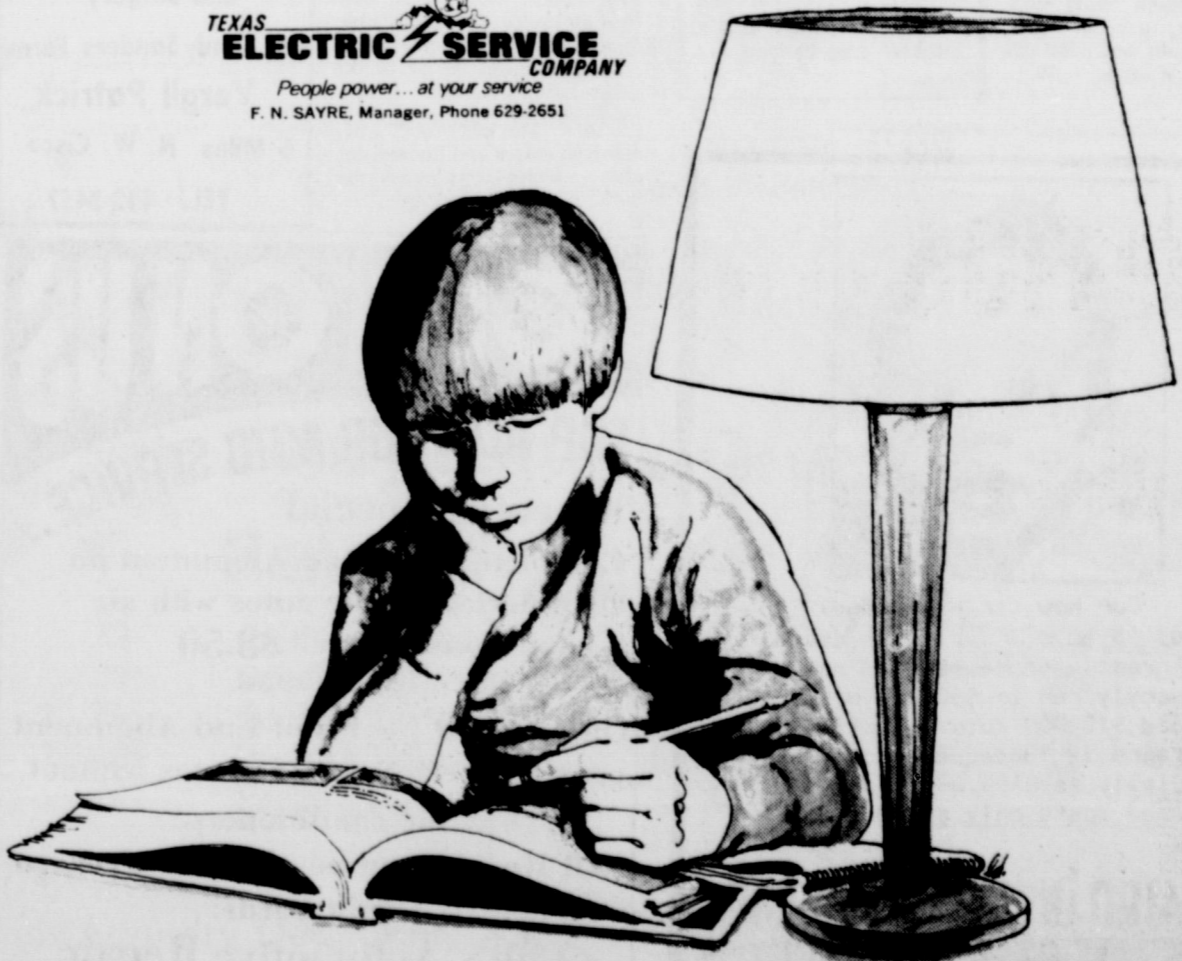

Farm Exodus Declining?

WASHINGTON, -- The move from farm to city may be coming to a halt, a new era of economic and social growth for rural America may already be launched.
 These are two conclusions to be drawn from various reports on the progress of rural America, from the arid stretches of the Southwest to the green fields of the Southeast. They also are indications that the much talked about goals of rural development are beginning to emerge as realized accomplishments for an increasing number of communities.
 Some signs of the recharged energies within rural areas are:
 -- More jobs: During the 1960's nonfarm jobs increased by 39 percent in metropolitan areas. This growth rate has been high in completely rural counties as well as in those with cities of up to 50,000 population.
 -- Farm exodus ending: The farm population has dropped to fewer than 9 1/2 million persons. With so few people remaining on the Nation's farms, little further decline in the population is possible. As the farm-to-city migration dwindles to a negligible level, continued gains in nonagricultural jobs will have a more visible impact on the overall economy and population of rural areas.
 -- Greater Federal commitment to rural areas: The government is stepping up its investment in rural America manifold. For example, funds earmarked for housing in rural areas amount to \$2.2 billion this year, four times the 1969 level; sewer and water programs are allocated \$342 million this year, nearly twice the 1969 level. Total funds devoted to rural development efforts by the Department of Agriculture will amount to \$3.5 billion this year -- four times the level in 1961 and twice as much as in 1969.
 More important than the statistics or the governmental expenditures, however, is the determined individual in community after rural community who resolves to solve the problem on his own, who takes action to set his own neighborhood on the road to progress.
 In Tulsa, Texas, for example, local leaders set out to combat decaying businesses, blighted housing. As a result of their efforts, the community has 386 new low cost homes and jobs and incomes are up because of the construction work. In North Carolina, citizens mounted a driver education campaign as a small but vital part of their Statewide effort to connect

Lone Star Job Through County Let in Part

A contract has been let for an undisclosed amount for the first three spreads of Lone Star Gas Company's 400 mile pipeline which will stretch from the Delaware Basin in West Texas to the company's transmission and distribution system in Dallas, through Eastland County.
 Out of 12 bids submitted, the successful bidder was Booth Services Inc. in Houston. Construction will begin September 1 on the three westernmost spreads which comprise more than 180 miles of 36 inch pipe. Two construction crews will do the work under the supervision of M.E. "Panama" Shifflet, chairman of the board of Booth Services and a long time pipeline builder.
 Bid invitations on the fourth and fifth spreads will be mailed soon with replies expected by mid-September. Invitations on the sixth and final spread will be mailed in September.

Eastland County stockmen are troubled with an increased number of screwworms this month. This has been the worst summer for screwworms in ten years.

Sixteen livestock owners sent worms to the Mission lab in

July that were identified as screwworms. There have been 22 cases identified thus far in August from Eastland County. Several others called to report cases, but did not mail samples to the lab.

The eradication program

officials are still releasing billions of sterile screwworm flies, which stop natural reproduction by mating with fertile native flies. We encourage all livestock owners to continue collecting and sending samples to the lab at Mission, Texas. The number of samples sent in determine the number of sterile flies released in this county. We will likely continue to have infestations of this insect until winter. It is hoped that the cold winter temperatures plus the release of sterile flies will get the outbreak under control this winter.

Do you need trees for wind-

break on your farm or ranch? If so, now is the time to order seedling trees from the Texas Forest Service. About 15 different species are available. This list includes several kinds of pines, sweetgum, sycamore, asp. elm, catalpa and others. The cost of the seedlings is \$3.00 per 100 trees.

We have applications for your use. They must be ordered between September 1 and February 12. Two landowners from Eastland County ordered 100 trees each in 1971.

Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas

Agricultural Extension Service, warns horseowners to keep their animals off of sorghum - sudan pastures due to a disease called "sorghum cystitis". Freshly cut sorghum

- sudan hay will also bring on the condition.

Armstrong points out that all horses may be affected but that the condition appears to be more serious in younger animals. A number of cases have been reported recently in Texas.

The first signs usually are incoordination of the rear legs. In about half the horses ob-

served this was followed by involuntary discharge or urine. The urine drip may be continuous and may become intense if the horse moves suddenly. The condition may also cause mares to abort.

Sorghum cystitis occurs most frequently during times of medium to high rainfall, usually from June to November. It occurs mainly when horses feed on fast fresh growth of sorghum - sudan hybrids, sorghum grazer and Johnson grass. Uncured or improperly cured hay from these grasses also causes the

illness. However, horses eating well - cured hay from these three forages have not been affected. Also, no cases have been reported after the first frost.

There is no cure for the condition once the horse has it. Several treatments have been used with little success according to Dr. Armstrong. However, when affected animals are removed from the pasture and fed a balanced ration, they usually improve somewhat.
