Park Master Plan Is Reported

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT ANALYSIS

Proposed development and improvements for the park are divided into two categories:

1. Improvement of existing facilities.
2. Development of new facilities.

IMPROVEMENT OF EXISTING FACILITIES

Swimming Pool

The existing swimming pool was constructed over thirty years ago and has been well maintained. However, in order

to meet current standards for public swimming pool operation, the pool should be equipped with a recirculation and filtration system in order to properly treat the water. This system could be installed at the west end of the pool near the existing water main, valves and sanitary sewer. This equipment should be housed in a building for protection of the equipment and supplies, as well as to provide a more pleasant appearance to the park setting. Shaded benches should be provided along the south deck of the pool to provide an area for swimmers to rest out of the

sun. Another lifeguard stand should be provided and should be located on the south deck of the pool to provide more effective surveillance for this large pool. Depth indicators should be painted on the deck and upper interior wall of the pool to inform persons in the pool and on the deck of the depth of the water.

The existing bathhouse is of frame construction and, due to age and normal deterioration, should be replaced with a masonry building. It is recommended that the east portion of the old firemen's hall building be renovated and used as the bathhouse rather than constructing a new building. This would result in a savings in the cost of providing a new bathhouse, as well as continuing the architectural theme of the park. Texas State Health Department manuals for swimming pool design and operation have been included as Appendix Items C and D.

Firemen's Hall

The existing Firemen's Hall building located adjacent to the swimming pool has deteriorated due to age and in its present condition is no longer usable. The rock walls, foundation and floors appear to

be structurally sound, however, and could be easily renovated for use as the swimming pool bathhouse and as a community center. The upper story which connects the two rock buildings could be removed and the buildings roofed separately as single story structures. The community center could serve as a meeting place for civic organizations, scouts, garden clubs, etc. The renovation of Firemen's Hall would thus provide additional recreational facilities for the park which would perpetuate the original architectural design and style of the park. It is recommended that an architectural firm be employed to analyze the feasibility of this type renovation, as well as to

City Officially Asks for Metro Dialing

In Busy Meeting

The Eastland City Commission, in a long session Monday evening, offered Lone Star Gas Co. a six percent rate increase, passed a resolution asking for metro dialing and gave second reading to a new abandoned car law.

Mayor Durel Reid presided with all commissioners present. Visitors were Cliff Wilson, L. Charles Terrell and D.L. May.

Mr. Terrell reported to the commission with photos of street repairs made by Lone Star Gas Co. on Pershing and Halbryan Sts., where the company had made line repairs. Mr. May reported that his company had scheduled the repair of the streets in question with plans to replace the bricks as they had formerly been placed.

Appearing for Lone Star, Mr. May asked for the second reading on an ordinance which would increase the company's rates here by eight percent. The commission gave the right percent proposal a first reading last month, but revised the proposal to a six percent increase after receiving a formal report from the accounting firm engaged to review the Lone Star rate hike.

The Commissioner earlier offered the company six percent, but this was turned down by Lone Star, who first asked for ten, and then dropped their request to eight. Both Cisco and

Ranger have given the company the eight percent second reading, as have other towns in the system.

The Commission voted to ask Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. for metro dialing, which would give toll free dialing for Eastland customers to Ranger and Cisco for a 50 cent rate increase. (The telephone company was also recently given a base rate increase here.)

Action Monday night came on the heels of a report made by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce in a survey of residential telephone customers, regarding the toll-free inter-town dialing.

It was reported that 291 were surveyed with 230 expressing affirmatively for the additional service and costs, and only 61 voting against it. A telephone company official reported Monday that survey results in Ranger and Cisco, where it will also have to be accomplished, were also very favorable. The Eastland commission did ask that the service be initiated within six months rather than 18 as reported necessary by the company.

Members of the commission discussed a multitude of projects now under consideration during the long meeting.

Eastland paid some \$190 to participating in a Texas Municipal League project

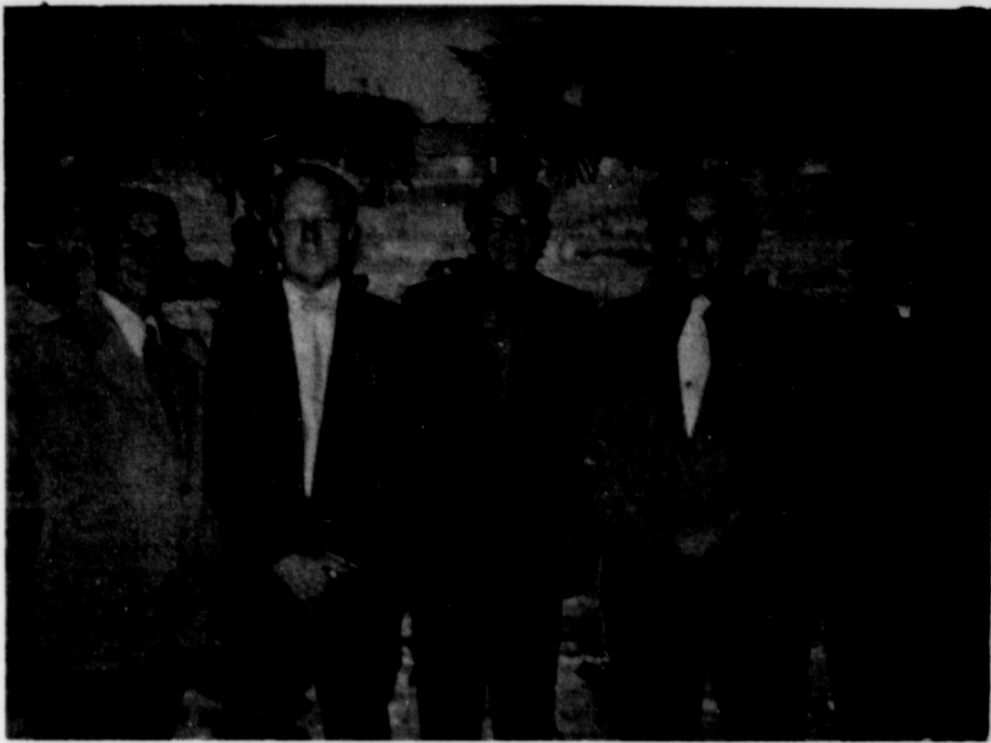

provide plans which would conform to existing State regulations regarding public bathhouses and other public buildings.

Maintenance Building

The existing concession building located between the tennis courts and the bandstand is of rock construction and is currently unused. This building could be renovated for use as the park maintenance building and would provide a place for storage and servicing of mowers, edgers, tools and other park equipment and supplies. A service drive should be added to provide all-weather access to the building by city maintenance personnel.

Restrooms

The small rock restrooms are over thirty years old and due to age and normal deterioration, are no longer satisfactory for public use. However, the masonry portion of the buildings is sound and these facilities could be renovated to provide a usable public facility. Renovation would consist of repairing the roofs, installing new toilets and lavatories, tile walls and floors, new metal doors, and improved interior lighting and ventilation. These improvements could be made for substantially less than the cost of a new restroom building and would conform to the architectural style of the park.

Group Picnic Site

The existing group picnic site consists of four large concrete and stone picnic tables and a large masonry barbecue pit. The barbecue pit has deteriorated to a point where it is no longer usable. It is recommended that this facility be replaced with a new barbecue pit and shelter. This barbecue pit - shelter could be located at the south end of the group picnic tables as depicted on the site development scheme. It should be approximately ten feet in width by fifteen feet in length to provide an adequate area for cooking and preparing foods. The floor should consist of a reinforced concrete slab with the firepit extending through the floor into undisturbed soil. The firepit should be lined with firebrick on the sides and should be open at the bottom for drainage. Suitable roofing would be corrugated asbestos - cement and could be supported by a steel pipe and channel iron framework. Litter receptacles should be provided within 50 feet of the group picnic site.

In addition to the barbecue pit - shelter, it is recommended that an open shelter be constructed east of the existing concrete tables to provide protection from the sun and occasional showers. The proposed shelter is thirty by fifty feet in size and would accommodate approximately fifteen eight foot picnic tables. This would provide seating for 90 to 100 persons in addition to the existing concrete tables. Electrical lighting should be provided in the shelter as well

as two convenience outlets. Water outlets should be provided at each end of this shelter and one at the barbecue pit - shelter.

Tennis Courts

The existing tennis courts are of asphalt construction and need to be resurfaced in order to provide a usable playing surface. It is recommended that a soil sterilant be used to prevent further damage to the asphalt surface by weed growth. The courts should be recompact and all irregular surfaces either cut down or filled in. A one to two inch leveling course could then be applied and bonded to the existing surface. The court should be seal - coated to keep out moisture and provide a smooth playing surface. A colored asphalt surface may be applied if desired to further improve playing characteristics and improve the appearance of the facility. The lighting should be improved by the addition of several additional overhead lights to provide a minimum of ten footcandles of light at a plane 36 inches above the court surface.

Single Unit Picnic Sites

Four concrete and rock picnic tables and several masonry benches currently exist in the picnic area. The tables are in good condition and should be retained. Several of the masonry park benches are in a deteriorated condition and should be removed. It is suggested that six new picnic sites be incorporated into the picnic area as depicted on the site development scheme. Each picnic site should consist of a picnic table attached to a reinforced concrete pad with an associated cooking grill. Water hydrants should be provided in the area within an approximate distance of fifty feet from each table. One outlet may serve several tables if located within this distance. Drinking fountains with bubblers and hose bibbs may be substituted for water hydrants in the area, if desired. Cooking grills should be located about ten to fifteen feet downwind of prevailing breezes from each table. Two additional cooking grills should be installed near the two existing picnic tables located in the picnic area.

It is recommended that three picnic tables with concrete slabs and shade shelters be installed in the lawn area immediately north of the swimming pool west of the proposed community center. These tables could provide seating for parents of children using the pool, as well as serve the community center activities.

Band Pavilion

The existing band pavilion is in usable condition but has a cracked floor. It is recommended that these cracks be grouted to make a smooth surface and to prevent further water seepage into the sub - structure. Limited use of this facility probably would not justify the expense of installing a new reinforced concrete floor.

Roads and Parking

Roads existing in the park are of asphalt construction and are in good condition. The edges of the pavement are eroded in several places and this is causing the asphalt surface to crumble. It is recommended that the road edges be repaired by installing a steel reinforced concrete strip six inches deep and eighteen inches wide along the edge of the pavement. As an economical measure, compacted base material with an asphalt wearing surface could be substituted. Either method would contain the paving and prevent further erosion of the road surface.

Parking for 54 cars is proposed as indicated on the site development scheme. Improved paved parking areas are located in approximately the same areas as the existing gravel parking lots. Consideration should be given to using six inches of base material and a two course asphalt wearing surface in the construction of the parking areas. Minimum space standards for area individual space parking are 10 feet by 25 feet. All parking areas should be controlled by curb and gutter, or by placing precast bumper blocks around the perimeter of the parking area. The square yards of parking area indicated on the site development scheme are as follows:

DEVELOPMENT OF NEW FACILITIES

Roque Court

Roque is an activity that has few age or physical restrictions and is enjoyed by many persons in the Eastland area. Two roque courts presently exist, but it was recommended that a third court be constructed in order to provide enough playing area for the number of persons desiring to use the facility. A third court would also enable Eastland to host roque tournaments which are held annually in the southwestern portion of the United States. The roque court should be surfaced with hard compacted sandy clay at least four inches deep with underground tile drainage to prevent waterlogging in wet weather. The border should consist of a reinforced concrete curb six inches thick extending at least 12 inches above the court surface. The curb should extend a minimum of six inches into undisturbed soil below the court surface. Wickets should be constructed as permanently installed rods of formed steel 1/2 to 3/4 inches in diameter anchored in concrete. A rake and broom should be available in the area for dressing the surface of the court as necessary.

Horseshoe Courts

A horseshoe court may be provided near the group picnic site, since this activity is enjoyed by all age groups and requires a minimum investment. The area between boxes may be covered with mowed turfgrass, and the boxes made of pressure - treated 2 x 12 boards well anchored in the soil. The boxes should be filled with silica sand and have a steel stake one inch in diameter extending 12 inches above the surface of the sand as the target. An ample safety zone should be provided around the horseshoe court and could be defined as depicted on the site development scheme by the use of beds planted with shrubbery.

Shuffleboard Courts

Shuffleboard courts should be provided near the group picnic site to provide active - type recreational pursuits for the teenage and adult park visitors. This is an activity which is popular in all recreation areas, since it may be enjoyed by the older as well as the younger persons. The courts should consist of reinforced concrete slabs on well drained and prepared sand pads. Benches with shade screens may be installed for spectator - participants. The surface should be waxed periodically to afford an optimum playing surface. If extended daily use is desired, area lighting for the shuffleboard court should be provided and should provide a minimum of 10 footcandles of light to the court surface.

Children's Playcourt

The children's playcourt is intended to provide facilities for more active forms of recreation. The children's playcourt depicted on the site development scheme is divided into two distinct age categories. Children ages 2 - 6 are segregated from children 7 and older to provide play space of interest to the indicated age

groups, as well as lessen physical conflicts between the two age groups. Play facilities may be commercially fabricated and installed within the area, allowing adequate safety zones between each piece of play equipment and the adjoining concrete curb. Parent seating areas should be provided adjacent to the play area.

Landscaping

Landscape improvements to Eastland City Park should include renovation of turfgrass, removal of dead trees, pruning of existing trees and shrubs, and planting of additional plant material.

The turfgrass is primarily bermuda but is thin and includes several varieties of weeds and weed grasses. It is recommended that the lawn area be aereated or lightly tilled and seeded with hilled common bermuda grass seed at the rate of 2 to 3 pounds per 1,000 square feet. A balanced fertilizer should be applied at the rate of 5 lbs. nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. A balanced fertilizer should be applied at the rate of 5 lbs. nitrogen per 1,000 sq. feet and watered in. The areas should be watered frequently until the new grass is mowed the second time or until runners begin to form and thereafter when the soil surface is dry 1 to 1 1/2 inches deep.

Several dead trees exist near the Firemen's Hall and should be removed and the wood burned to destroy borer larvae. Many of the existing trees have low - growing limbs which interfere with mowing and recreation. These limbs should be removed as well as any limbs which are touching buildings, electrical wires, etc. Care should be exercised in pruning to make flush cuts and not to leave stubs which may die back and cause heartwood decay. Fresh cuts should be treated with an asphaltic sealer as an additional decay preventive measure. It is suggested that waxleaf

ligustrum, Elaeagnus, and nandina be planted as indicated in the existing bed along the rock wall centrally located in the park.

A shrub bed is depicted on the site development scheme located between the horseshoe court and the children's playcourt. This planting would serve as a deterrent to children running into the horseshoe court area and possibly being injured, as well as a visual backdrop for the horseshoe court participants. The shrubs used in this planting should be resistant to foot traffic. Shrubs suggested would include chinese holly, pyracantha, or photinia. This bed could be bordered with plantings of petunias, dwarf marigolds, etc. for seasonal color.

The area immediately surrounding the base of the water towers should be fenced to make the towers inaccessible to the public and to discourage future vandalism to these structures. This fenced area could be made attractive to the park setting by the use of shrubbery as indicated on the site development scheme. Tall, dense evergreen shrubs would best serve this purpose with seasonal color provided by the use of petunias, dwarf marigolds, chrysanthemums, etc. in the front portion of the beds. The dominating appearance of these water towers could be greatly reduced by painting them with aluminum paint which, when weathered, would tend to blend in with the sky. Additional information pertaining to tree maintenance and diseases has been included in the appendix.

Utility Systems

Water for the proposed recreational facilities may be obtained by connection to the existing water distribution system in the park. Distribution to the additional picnic sites and other additional facilities should be made through a distribution

system sized to accommodate projected needs during the construction design phase.

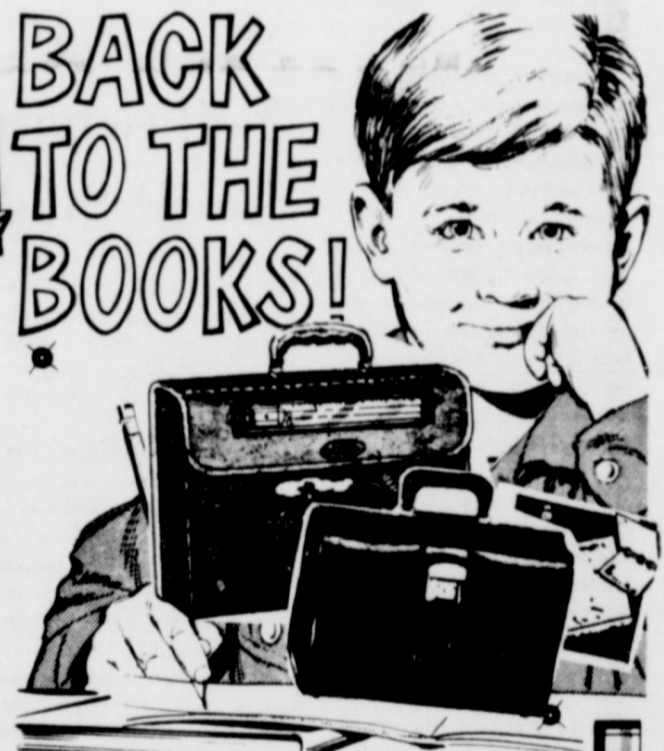
Electrical service is available throughout the park. Extension to the various user facilities, i.e. the size and numbers of wires needed to supply this service, would be determined during the construction design phase. If practical, all service extensions should be made underground so as to provide a more pleasing appearance to the park.

Sewage disposal for the park

facilities should be made by using collection lines to a main line for injection into the city's sewage line located within the park.

Natural gas may be supplied by connection to the existing gas supply line located within the park.

During the construction design phase, coordination should be made with the Texas State Department of Health, to assure conformance with State health regulations for sewage disposal systems and swimming pools.

Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health
 The sound of school bells this fall means a lot of things - the end of summer, completion of school immunizations, a little bit more relaxation for the state's mothers AND uneasiness in sending first graders off to school for the first time.

If that youngster is riding a bicycle to and from school, there are precautions you can take to help ease that fear of an accident, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Just as good health rules, such as immunizations, can ease the fear of disease, bicycle safety rules can release the anxieties of the daily to and from school routine, says the State Health Department.

A quarter - million children are entering first grade this year, and total school enrollment is expected to reach 2.8 million. This boils down to a lot of congestion during the morning and afternoon school rush.

If your child is planning to bike to school, planning in advance will lessen the possibility of injury.

Riders may reduce the chances of having an accident by:

1. Selecting the right size bike - one that is neither too big nor too little - and having it properly adjusted;
2. Keeping the bike in good mechanical condition;
3. Having the required safety equipment;
4. Obeying traffic rules and regulations; and
5. Following safe riding practices.

In Texas last year, there were 275 accidents reported to the Department of Public Safety which involved a bicycle or motor scooter colliding with a motor vehicle. There's no telling how many accidents involved only a bicycle and some other object such as a curb, a tree, or another bicycle.

Parents do have a strong responsibility in seeing that their children know and observe safety rules and that the bicycles they buy do fit the child. A properly - adjusted bike will allow the rider's toes to touch the ground when he is sitting on the seat. His knees shouldn't hit the handle bars when pedaling or turning.

There's another important thing a parent can do - travel the bicycle route with the

child, pointing out trouble areas and observing to see that the child obeys traffic regulations and uses hand signals.

In checking the mechanical parts of the bicycle, brakes should get thorough test. Check the chain for damaged links and a snug fit, and replace missing spokes and tighten loose ones.

Tires should have proper pressure and a good tread. Handle grips should fit snugly, and pedals shouldn't be worn. Oil the pedal bearings and spindles for proper movement. City regulations may vary, but bicycles ridden at night should have headlights and tail lights or reflectors. A horn or bell is a good safety bet.

On of the major risks bicyclists take is failing to follow the same rules as motor vehicles. Riders must stop for all stop signs and obey all traffic lights and signals.

Far too often you see bicyclists riding on the wrong side of the street facing traffic. Like automobiles, the bicycle should keep to the right. If walking a bicycle, you should walk facing traffic as if you are a pedestrian.

A bike rider should travel as directed on one - way streets and avoid weaving in and out of traffic. And when you're at a corner, don't crowd into the space between a car in the right lane and the curb. If that car turns right, you may get caught in a traffic pinch.

Your bell or horn can be used to warn those who may not see you. Be alert for pedestrians and give them the right - of - way.

How about intersections? Bicyclists are small and a lot harder to see than a car - especially in early - morning and evening - so slow down at intersections. It may be wise to get off and walk across busy streets. If entering the street from a driveway or alley, stop to see if the way is clear.

Hitching rides on automobiles or other moving vehicles is strictly forbidden. And, more than one rider on a bike also is an invitation to an accident.

Many accidents occur when riders ignore common sense safety rules. Studies have shown that many accidents occur to the "show off" and the "speed demon" who darts in and out of traffic.

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

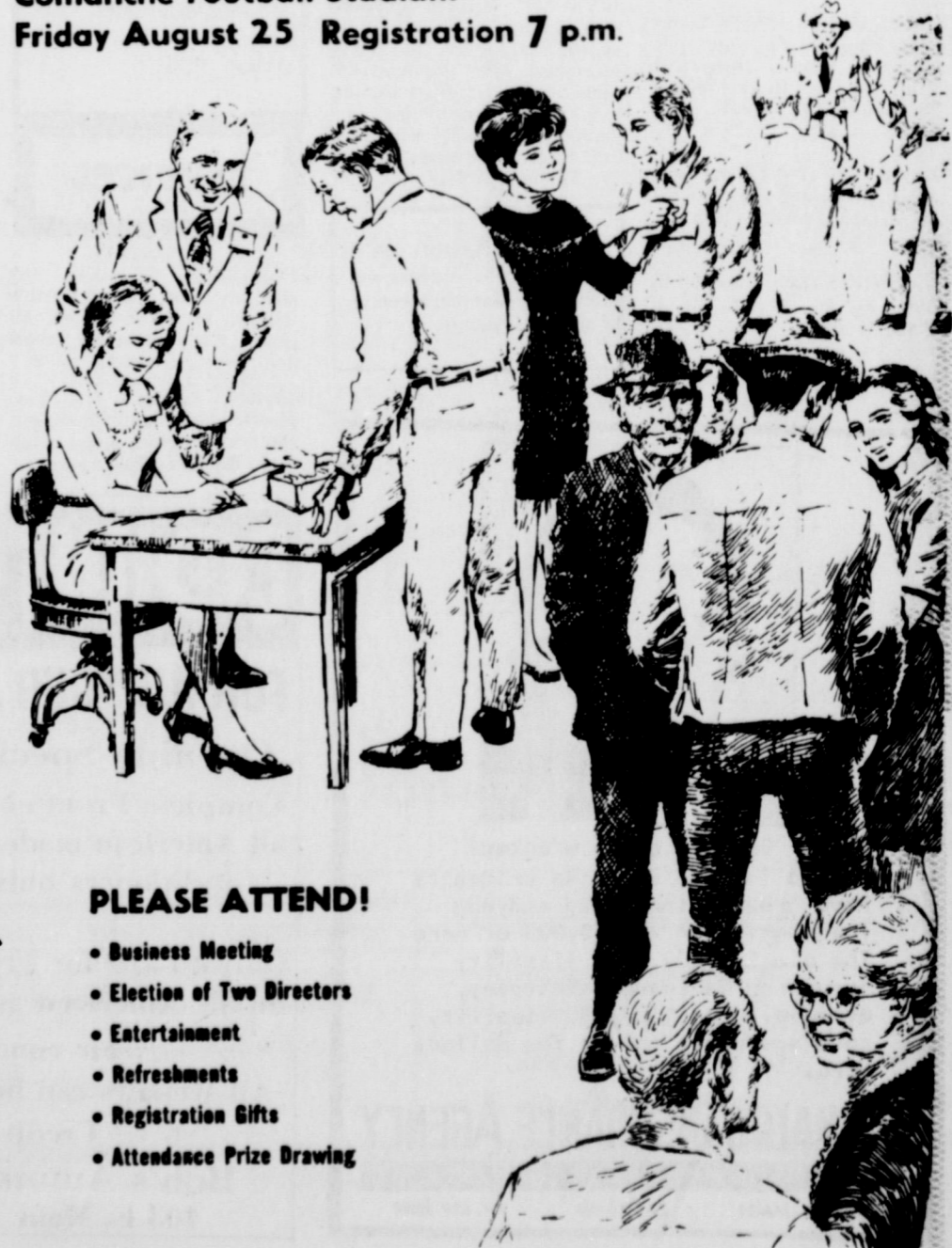
