### Eastland

The 1972 - 73 School Year for Eastland School Students will begin on Monday, September 21st. The official beginning for the faculty was August 11th. They have completed six days of work on the new school year already, having been in the In-Service Training Program at Cisco Junior College with other Area Schools last week for three days, and on duty three additional days at Eastland.

Registration for Grades 1 - 8 was completed August 11th and Tentative enrollments indicate approximately the same number of students will be enrolled this year as last year.

The first day of school will be a full day of operation with the high school and Junior High classes beginning at 8:00 a.m. and the tardy bell ringing at the Elementary School at 8:15. All buses will be running the same routes as last year and all cafeterias will be open on the first day. Price of lunches will remain the same as last year, with elementary students paying 40c and Junior High and Senior High Students paying 45c per meal.

The School District has contracted with the West Texas Rehabilitation Center of Abilene for Speech Therapy services for a number of elementary and Junior High School Students for the second year in a row. Arrangements have also been made with Cisco Junior College to offer vocational courses in the areas of office Occupations, Welding, Auto Mechanics, and Data Processing for Junior and Senior Students at Eastland High School. Thirty five students have registered for the Vocational Courses for the 1972 - 73 school year. The courses are taught at the high school level and high school students are given high school credit for courses completed.

### Carbon

The Carbon Schools will begin on Monday, Aug. 21, 1972 at 8 a.m.

All new students will report to the Principal's office on the second floor, and the rest of the students will report to their homeroom.

At 8:30 there will be a general assembly in the auditorium. After the assembly, pupils will report back to their homeroom for the issuing of books and other necessary first day matters. School patrons are cordially invited to attend school the first day.

Busses will run as usual the first day and will be on the same schedule as last year unless you are contacted prior to the first day. Busses will run at 2:30 on the first day of school, but after that they will leave the school at 3:30.

A noon meal will be prepared in the school cafeteria the first day. Price of the lunches will be 35c for grades 1 - 6; 40c for grades 7 - 12; 50c for faculty and other adults. Lunch tickets will be issued the first day on a charge basis so it will not be necessary for the student to bring money the first day. Lunch tickets will cost \$3.50 for grades 1 - 6; \$4.00 for grades 7 - 12; \$5.00 for teachers. Lunch tickets can be paid for in the principal's office.

## Kindergarten Enroll Oct. 9

The Green Kindergarten, 903 W. Plummer will open for its 18th year with enrollment Monday, October 9 from 4 to 6 p.m. Preference will be given to children going to public school in 1972.

Kindergarten will be open the months of October thru March. They will meet Mon., Tues., and Wed. anytime after nine and must be picked up before 12.

## Jammie's Open House

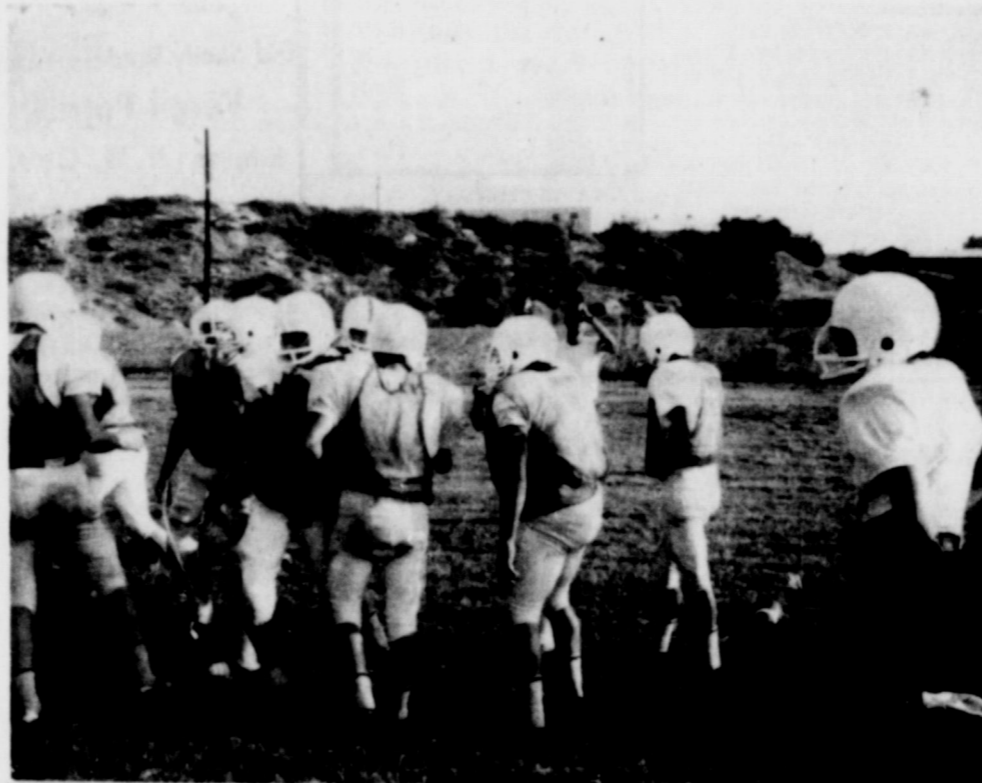
Cisco's newest motel and first on IH - 20 will officially open its doors this Sunday with an Open House Sunday from 3 to 3 p.m.

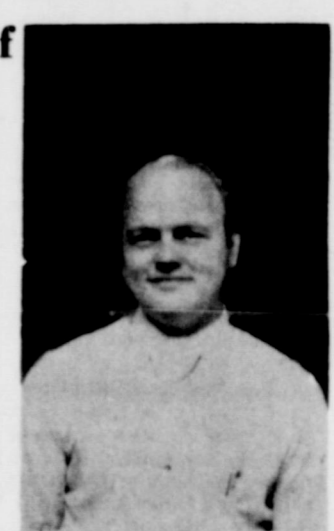
His training includes the Red Cross Standard Course of Instruction in First Aid, which will be utilized in ambulance service with the Arrington Home.

While parts of Eastland other parts are still very dry. County have had good rains Most of the peanut growing

areas have had some good rains and the crops are in excellent condition.

There are some spots, mainly in the northern part of Eastland County that have not had any rain since July 4th.

This has been a year of contrasts in rainfall in Eastland County. One farmer reported nine inches of rain in the last six weeks at Punkin Center just six miles south of Eastland. James Dabney, Eastland's official weather observer reports only 9.93 inches of rainfall since January 1st.

Rising Star has had 18.6 inches of rain since January 1st, according to John Lee, official weather observer there.

Have you noticed the excellent prospects we have for a bumper crop of pecans? Pecan production potentials are the best we have had in recent years.

Pecans in Eastland County are still about two months from harvest and are now subject to attack by many insect pests. One of the most damaging insect pest in this area is the

pecan weevil. This weevil has the potential to completely destroy all developing nuts on a tree or most of the crop from a large grove. Our crop last year was small and some producers did not harvest any edible pecans because of weevil damage.

Adult pecan weevils are about 1/2 inch long, dark gray in color and have a large beak for

feeding and puncturing the developing pecans. This feeding puncture results in the pecan dropping from the tree prematurely and being destroyed. When pecans reach the dough stage, the female weevil begins to deposit eggs into the interior of the nut. Eggs hatch in about three to four days and the young larvae feeds on the contents of the nut.

Once the larvae is mature, a small hole of about 1/8 inch is cut in the shell of the pecan and the larvae or "red head" drops to the ground to complete its two year development.

Checks of trees in this area indicate adult weevil emergence has increased during the past few days. Growers and homeowners are urged to check their trees for infestations of this large weevil. Several producers are using traps to capture pecan weevils as they emerge from the soil. This gives us a better indication regarding proper timing of insecticide treatments. You can also "Bump" lower limbs to jar weevils from the tree to check on the presence of an infestation. This can be accomplished by spreading a plastic sheet under a low limb and jarring the limb to dislodge the weevils. Spray applications of Carbaryl (Sevin) should be applied if three or more weevils can be

found per tree.

The insecticide, Sevin, at a rate of three pounds of 80 percent WP per 100 gallons of water is recommended for chemical control. Spray applications may need to be repeated within eight to ten days depending on length of adult emergence. Total spray coverage of the tree is important in obtaining satisfactory control.





Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for religious purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void."

"(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis."

Proposed **PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows: "Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the corpus of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis."

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

Proposed **PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission. "(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. "(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature. "(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. "(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. "(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. "(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

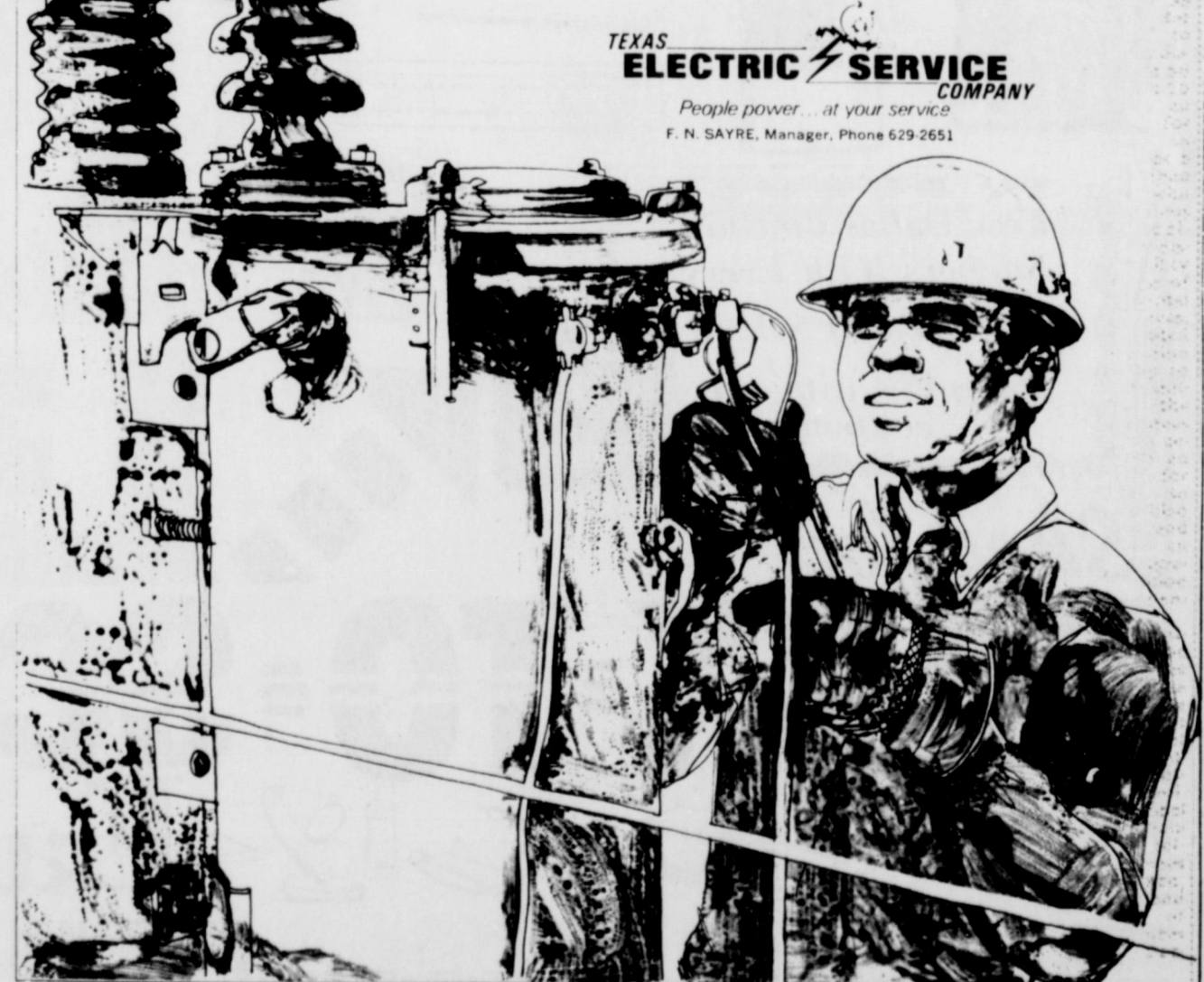
