Tid Bits Eastland, Carbon School Bells BY HVO Ring Monday in New Term

Eastland

The 1972 - 73 School Year for Eastland School Students will begin on Monday, September 21st. The official beginning for the faculty was August 11th. They have completed six days of work on the new school year already, having been in the In Service Training Program at Cisco Junior College with other Area Schools last week for three days, and on duty three additional days at Eastland.

Registration for Grades 1 - 8 was completed August 11th and Tentative enrollments indicate approximately the same number of students will be enrolled this year as last year.

The first day of school will be a full day of operation with the high school and Junior High classes beginning at 8:00 a.m. and the tardy bell ringing at the Elementary School at 8:15. All buses will be running the same routes as last year and all cafeterieas will be open on the first day. Price of lunches will remain the same as last year, with elementary students paying 40c and Junior High and Senior High Students paying 45c per meal.

The School District has contracted with the West Texas Rehabilitation Center of Abilene for Speech Therapy services for a number of elementary and Junior High School Students for the second year in a row. Arrangements have also been made with Cisco Junior College to offer vocational courses in the areas of office Occupations, Welding, Auto Mechanics, and Data Processing for Junior and Senior Students at Eastland High School. Thirty five students have registered for the Vocational Courses for the 1972 - 73 school year. The courses are taught at the high school level and high school students are given high school credit for courses completed.

The Carbon Schools will begin on Monday, Aug. 21, 1972 at 8 a.m.

All new students will report to the Principal's office on the second floor, and the rest of the students will report to their homeroom.

At 8:30 there will be a general assembly in the auditorium. After the assembly, pupils will report back to their homeroom for the issuing of books and other necessary first day matters. School patrons are cordially invited to attend school the first day.

Busses will run as usual the first day and will be on the same schedule as last year unless you are contacted prior to the first day. Busses will run at 2:30 on the first day of school, but after that they will leave the school at 3:30.

A noon meal will be prepared in the school cafeteria the first day. Price of the lunches will be 35c for grades 1 - 6; 40c for grades 7 - 12; 50c for faculty and other adults. Lunch tickets will be issued the first day on a charge basis so it will not be necessary for the student to bring money the first day. Lunch tickets will cost \$3.50 for grades 1 - 6; \$4.00 for grades 7 12; \$5.00 for teachers. Lunch tickets can be paid for in the principal's office.





Checks of trees in this area

adult weevil emergence has increased during the past few days. Growers and homeowners are urged to check their trees for infestations of this large weevil. Several producers are using traps to capture pecan weevils as they emerge from the soil. This gives us a better indication regarding proper timing of insecticide treatments. You can also "Bump" lower limbs to jar weevils from the tree to check on the presence of an infestation. This can be accomplished by spreading a plastic sheet under a low limb and jarring the limb to dislodge the weevils. Spray applications of Carbaryl Sevin) should be applied if three or more weevils can be

found per tree.

The insecticide, Sevin, at a rate of three pounds of 80 percent WP per 100 gallons of water is recommended for chemical control. Spray applications may need to be repeated within eight to ten days depending on length of adult emergence. Total spray coverage of the tree is important obtaining satisfactory control

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by add ing a Section 2 to read as fol-

Section 2. (a) When legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent re-solution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.
"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convened as a convene vention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other offi-cers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of

the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals.
This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section
33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its mem-bers and for the employment a staff for the convention and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. "(e) The convention, by reof at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may sub-mit revisions of the existing constitution which may con tain alternative articles or tions. Each resolution shall specify the date of the elec-tion, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as pro

vided for elections under Section 1 of this article. "(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopt ed on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."
Sec. 2. The foregoing consti

tutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for vot-ing for or against the proposi-tion: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the con-vening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitu tional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of sub-mitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR-35) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to reed as follows:

"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by gen-eral laws, exempt from taxa-tion public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious socie-ty, and which yields no reve-nue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associa-tions of persons for school pur-poses and the necessary furni-ture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National orga-nization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such in-stitutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the proper-ty mentioned in this Section shall be null and void.

The spouse and chil-dren of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was en
