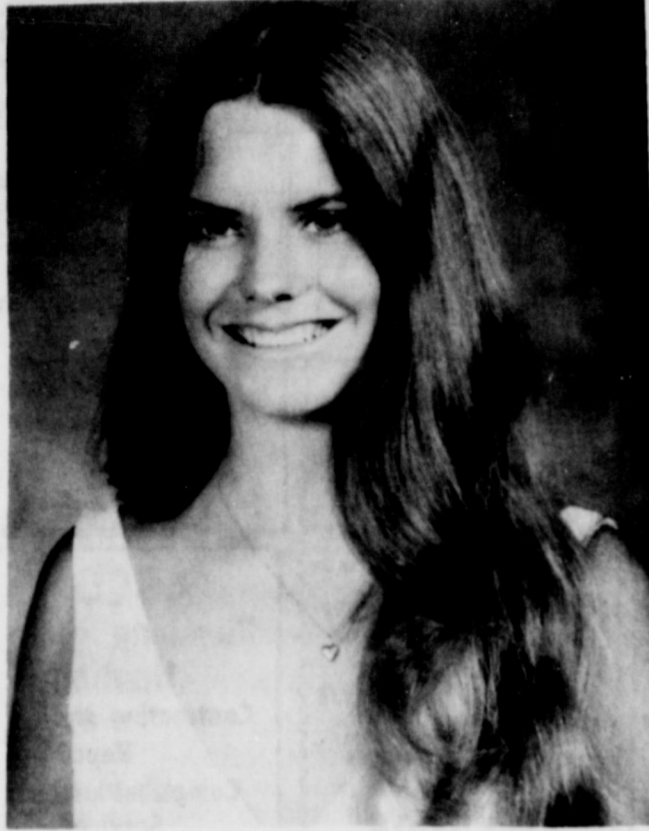

## R.B. Hall Joins Travel Agency

R.B. Hall Jr., assistant vice president for development at Hardin - Simmons University for the past 18 months, has resigned effective September 1, according to Dr. Clyde Childers, vice president for development.

Hall plans to remain in Abilene and establish Christian Travel Inc. He announced that the travel agency will be "a ministry promoting Christian travel." He plans to assist churches, various religious groups and denominations with mission tours, in pastoral exchanges in foreign lands and lay Bible teachers' study tours.

"In addition I plan to seek out men and women interested in directing Christian tours through Christian Travel Inc. and plan initially to conduct tours to Europe, Bible lands and Central and South America." Hall, who describes the proposed travel agency as "a business with a Christian flavor," will operate the agency from his residence at 208 Merchant.

Hall served as pastor of the First Baptist Church at Littlefield immediately before coming to Hardin Simmons. He has been pastor of churches in both Oklahoma and was director of public relations and student recruitment for Wayland Baptist College Plainview for three years. He is a graduate of H - SU and Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth. He has been a leader in church affairs on the state level.

In 1966 Hall and his wife participated in a pulpit ex-

change with the pastor of Kingston Baptist Church near London, England, at which time they toured several European countries. In July 1968 they made a tour of Europe and Holy Land sponsored by Wayland Baptist College with Hall serving as tour director. He directed a tour to the Baptist World Congress and World Exposition in Japan during the summer of 1970.

Mrs. Hall, the former Helen Taylor, Eastland, Tex., is a graduate of Baylor University. Prior to their marriage she was with Pan - American Air Ways. They have four children, Roger, Kimmy, Deborah and Brent.

Commenting on Hall's resignation, Childers said, "Dr. Skiles joins me in expressing high appreciation to Mr. Hall for his work at H - SU." Childers said a replacement has not been found for Hall.

## Texas Electric To Build Glen Rose Nuclear Plant

Texas Electric Service Company announced today that studies underway for more than a year have resulted in a decision to proceed with construction of a nuclear - fueled generating station at a site about four miles north of Glen Rose in Somervell County.

The Station will be owned jointly with Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Power & Light Company.

Construction of the station, which is subject to the approval of the Atomic Energy Commission and Texas regulatory agencies, will start in 1975. A 1,150,000 kilowatt unit is planned for operation in 1980 and a second unit of the same size is planned for 1982.

The generating station is part of a long range program to meet projected power needs for the future in the area served by the three companies. The use of electricity has been more than doubling every ten years and the trend is expected to continue for the foreseeable future.

Planning for new generating stations and other installations which will be required must be done well in advance to assure an adequate supply of electric energy.

In making the announcement, Texas Electric president Burl B. Hulsey, Jr., stated that "studies underway at the location have shown it to be an excellent site for a generating station and a reservoir. About 5,000 acres will be included in the site, of which 3,200 acres will be used for the lake, which is needed to provide cooling water for the station operation. The lake will be formed by construction of a dam on Squaw Creek and additional water necessary to assure an adequate level can be obtained through an existing agreement with the Brazos River Authority.

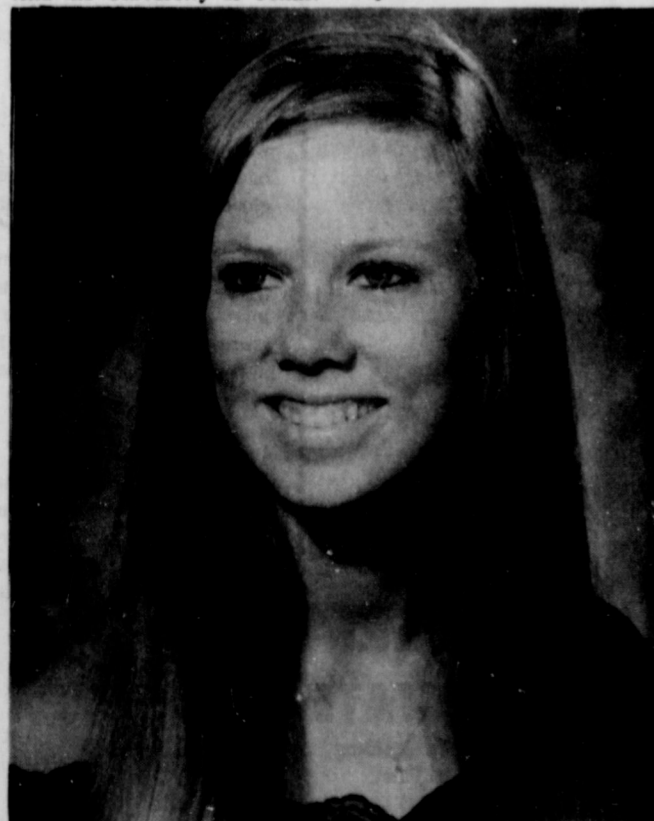
It is expected that much of the reservoir will be made available

An Eastland man, Norman Ray Woodall, State Agent for Mid - Continent Automobile Association, has received three of his company's highest awards since June of this year.

Woodall, who has been with the nationwide insurance company since May, was recently awarded two plaques at the company's statewide convention held in Brownwood. One of the awards was for writing \$500.00 worth of business in the third week of June, with the other award being received for writing an additional \$1,000 worth of new business before July 15.

In addition to the handsomely engraved plaques, Woodall received a gold wrist watch.

Woodall said his next "goal" he is reaching for is a company sponsored free trip to Mexico City. To obtain this, Woodall said he will have to write \$1,500 worth of new business during any three weeks, during the next six months.

## THE PEANUTS MUST GO THROUGH

# Goober 'Express' Gets the Job Done

IT MAY BE among the slowest things riding the Texas rails these days, but speed isn't important when you're only going 26 miles.

They call it "The Goober (or Peanut) Line" because of its importance to peanut farmers and the peanut industry deep in the heart of Texas.

Reliability is what counts with the Texas Central Railroad Company (the official name), something peanut growers didn't have when the track belonged to the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad (Katy).

Those who had a big stake in rail service between Dublin and Gorman, an area about 90 miles southwest of Fort Worth, fought the Katy's abandonment plans for several years, then decided to go into the railroading business as a last resort.

The Katy was successful in abandoning a 220-mile segment from Bellmead (near Waco) to Rotan in West Texas. Now, the Texas Central is operating two stretches along that route, 26 miles between Dublin and Gorman, and a 45-mile section from Rotan to Stamford, north of Abilene.

Since it operates fewer than 100 miles, Texas Central qualifies as a short-line railroad, which

reduces the number of Interstate Commerce Commission regulations pertaining to it.

Prime mover behind the Texas Central takeover was Melvin Shell, owner of the Gorman Peanut Company and president of the railroad. The job of running the Goober Line, however, has been turned over to his 28-year-old son, Terry Shell, who is executive vice-president and a University of Texas law graduate.

The 7-member Texas Central board includes Ross Wilson, general manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association (SWPGA), a cooperative headquartered in Gorman. It is a member of Farmland Industries. The co-op has 10,200 members, most of them in Texas and Oklahoma.

Wilson, secretary of the Texas Central board (meetings are held at the co-op), says continuation of rail service was essential to the growers.

"Without rail service," Wilson said, "farmers could end up losing their peanut allotments. The railroad is the lifeblood of the commercial shelling mills. Plants would have to move where rail service was available."

Trucks were not a practical alternative, the elder Shell pointed out. "Shipping peanuts by truck costs about \$8 a ton," he said. "The rail rate is \$2.50. Trucking just can't compete with milling in-transit rates and there aren't enough trucks at peak periods. One plant ships from 60,000 to 70,000 tons a year."

In the Katy's last days on the Gorman-Dublin link, it was making just two runs a week. Now there are five and extra runs are made when required. The 26-mile segment was acquired in 1967 and the Rotan-Stamford link in 1970. About 85% of the Gorman-Dublin business is peanuts. Most traffic moved on the Rotan-Stamford track consists of wallboard and cotton.

The longer link was acquired to spread out overhead, Terry Shell said. Business and revenue are seasonal, but expenses, other than per

diem costs, are fixed. The railroad employs 30 and has four diesel engines. It now uses boxcars of other lines. The 19,000-horsepower diesels were purchased from the Houston Belt Terminal Railroad at costs ranging from \$9,000 to \$11,000 apiece.

At its next meeting the Texas Central board was to consider selling the diesels and leasing others from the Fort Worth Denver Railroad.

Factors favoring Texas Central operations over the Katy's largely have to do with labor savings. The Peanut Line's employees are nonunion and the company eliminated station agents at Dublin, DeLeon and Gorman.

Essential to its successful operation, Terry Shell added, is a "fine working relationship" with the Santa Fe at Dublin. "Without this cooperation," he said, "we couldn't survive."

The Texas Central got going when \$70,000 was raised to purchase the 25.76 miles of track and the rights of way in the towns of Dublin, DeLeon and Gorman, along with two diesels and some freight cars.

Actually, the Texas Central goes back to the late 1800's. It was bought by the Katy in 1910. The Texas Central name was retained. When Shell's corporation bought the trackage from the Katy, it actually bought the capital stock and title of the old Texas Central Railroad.

Texas Central Enterprises, a

company formed to hold the stock of the railroad, has built a 40,000 square-foot refrigerated warehouse along the line. The temperature is maintained in the middle 30s. "Cold storage is essential to peanut processors," Melvin Shell said. Twenty-eight million pounds of peanuts moved through the warehouse in the last year. The electricity bill is about \$12,000 a year.

Industry valued at nearly \$3 million has developed along the Dublin-Gorman link since it was purchased from the Katy. Businesses situated along it include a peanut drying co-op at Dublin, implement dealers, peanut shelling plant, a peanut oil mill, grain elevators, feed mills and a pallet factory. A brick factory is considering a 5-mile spur to its plants. With the spur, it believes it could double production.

Terry Shell conceded the Goober Line is not noted for speed. The beds are in questionable condition, since the Katy had invested little in their upkeep in those years leading to abandonment. The rails are light, only 66 to 85 pounds a yard compared to 136-pound track being laid on main lines these days.

This necessitates slow speeds on the Goober Line, around 15 or 20 miles an hour.

But that isn't what matters. The important thing is that rail service has been saved. You may be talking only peanuts, but in this part of the country, that's the name of the game.

**Cornstalk Borer Report Issued**  
AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner John C. White today issued a progress bulletin on the infestations of the lesser cornstalk borer in the peanut

fields in Central Texas. Commissioner White reported that almost all peanut fields now have some infestation of the lesser cornstalk borer. About a fourth of the fields surveyed have damaging infestations of this insect. A few fields have infestation reaching

fifty percent or more. Hot dry weather is ideal for the build up of the lesser cornstalk borer population; however leaf feeding insects have not generally reached the problem stage probably due to the hot dry weather.

Commissioner White urged all peanut growers to check these fields at least on a weekly basis. Many fields with low population of the corn borers two weeks ago now have infestations far exceeding the levels where it would pay to apply control measures. Commissioner White concluded by saying, "Use only approved chemicals and use according to the label on the container."

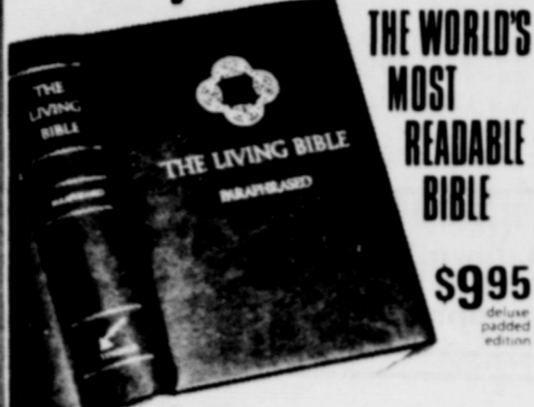
### I REMEMBER Dick O'Brien

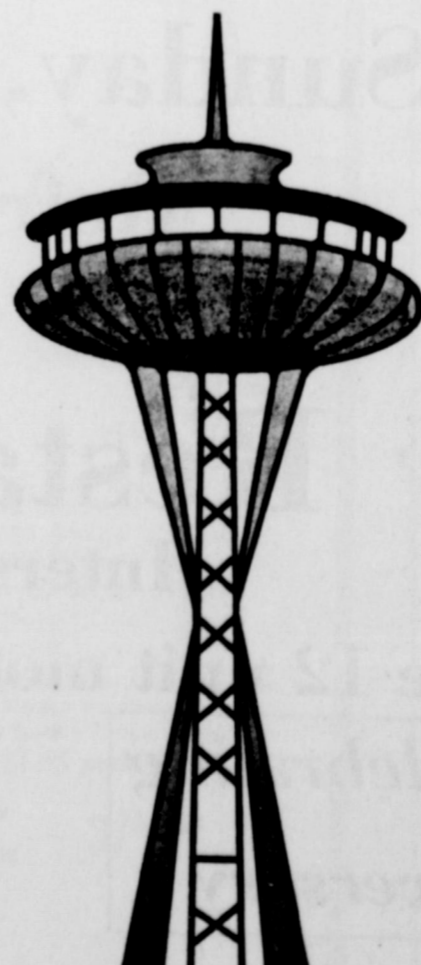

A totally unique new program is being offered in peanut production at Ranger Junior College beginning with the upcoming Fall semester. This program was planned because peanuts play such a vital role in the economy of the local area. Fifty percent of the peanuts grown in Texas are grown within a sixty mile radius of Ranger. As far as we know, no other college in the United States offers a curriculum designed specifically for peanut production. The entire curriculum has been approved by the Texas Education Agency.

Growers, shellers, and the A&M Experiment Station are supporting the program because of its need to students seriously considering peanut farming as a vocation. Before the program could be initiated, it had to be endorsed by the Southwest Peanut Industry with an advisory board formed to help plan the courses. The board consists of Ross Wilson, S.W.P.G.A.; Victor Scott, S.W.P.S.A.; Tom Birdsong, III, S.W.P.S.A.; D. B. Warren, S.W.P.G.A.; J. O. Jackson, Jr., TPPB; Shelby Newman, Texas A&M Experiment Station; and Wayne Eaves, TPPB.

The two year program is designed to lead to an associate in applied science degree. The college has adequate facilities and equipment to meet the program needs. The program will be headed by Mr. Weldon Wilson who holds a M.S. Degree from Texas A&M University. Mr. Wilson has had extensive training in peanut research working with the A&M Agriculture Experiment Station.

This brings the year's total to only 9.02 inches, 8.97 inches short of the total through the same time last year, which was 17.99 inches. Heaviest rain for the month fell July 4 when .93 inches was recorded. Another .56 inches fell July 18.

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proposition whether or not pecan producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 50 cents per 100 pounds to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 12 man pecan producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pecans.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Drawer CC, College Station, Texas 77840, before midnight on the date of election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced pecans for commercial purposes in the amounts of 300 pounds or more total over the last three years is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed pecan producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot may obtain one at his local County Agent's office

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
