Valley View Open House Postponed Until Oct. 29

Formal open house and dedication of the Valley View Lodge on S. Ostrom St.,

originally scheduled and announced for Sunday, Oct. 22, from 2 to 5, has been postponed

until Sunday, Oct. 29, according to Administrator Mrs. Shirley Frost.

Completion of the modern 102-bed nursing center was on schedule and due to be officially opened as announced this weekend, but the rain which began Wednesday evening curtailed final completion, causing the postponement of the official opening.

"Certainly we are thankful for the rain, but we do apologize for any inconvenience that might result from the postponement," Mrs. Frost said in making the announcement.

The modern home will feature the latest facilities for providing care and service for resident patients, and is a sister unit to the successful Eastland Manor Center on West Commerce St. in Eastland, administered by Eugene Frost.

On the staff at Valley View will be Mrs. Lavelle Hallmark.

LVN, who will be in charge of nursing care.

"Of necessity because of building commitments here and elsewhere, our scheduling on the opening in Eastland was close," said Construction Superintendent Billy Joe Browning, "but the unexpected rain at the end of the week just forced us to have to make a postponement."

Mavericks Lose, 19 - 0

There's a decided tendency to write only about the defensive first half of the fateful Eastland - Coleman clash of Friday night, which resulted in a major win for Coleman, 19 - 0, in the opening round of the District 9 - AA conference play.

But, as with other games, there was a second half too.

County results were mixed. Cisco bested Hamilton, 38 - 0; Ranger lost to Santa Anna, 32 - 0; Gorman beat Evant, 22 - 6; and Rising Star played Saturday night.

In the other 9 - AA battle, Clyde beat Comanche, 18 - 0. Maverick defensive stars shined brightly against the Bluecats and fumbles pretty well spelled the game.

With the first half battle in the game between the Eastland Mavericks and Coleman Bluecats ending in a 0 - 0 score there was some running action on the field. But before we go into the running of the first half let's not rule out the one big factor that played a large part in the game: the weather. The weather at Bluecat Stadium was none to be desired. A heavy fog and light cold mist was over the stadium all night. It seemed that the only two players who were having much of a night was Marris for Coleman and Larry Boles for Eastland, who amazed the fans with his long 4th down punts, which averaged 40 yards each.

The first half's running action stayed mostly in the middle of the field with rushing and passing yardage staying very much the same.

As the second half opened it was Eastland's turn to receive the ball.

Coleman Marris kicked the ball down to the Eastland's 2 yard line, and there it was 1st and 10. And after two more first downs the ball had been carried to 43 of Coleman, where they took possession of the ball, and then Coleman moved their ball to their first score of the game with some fabulous running and passing plays.

They moved the ball down to the Eastland 19 and from the 25 yard line Marris attempted the field goal, which was good, putting the score 3 - 0, Coleman.

As for the rest of the 3rd quarter there were no fancy runs and two major upset fumbles which could have made a big difference in the game. One by Coleman at their 40 with Eastland recovering, and then one by Eastland's John Jimenez at Coleman's 43.

As the 4th quarter opened Coleman received a first down on their 30 yard line. From there they moved the ball for two more first downs and to the 12 yard line of Eastland.

From the 12, number 32 for Coleman jumped in for the score. With the extra point good the score read 10 - 0, Coleman.

With Coleman kicking to Eastland's end zone the referees brought the ball back to the 20 and from there it was first and 10. On the first play Howard King broke loose and ran for 15 yards for another first down at the 50 yard line. But after three more plays Eastland was forced to punt. It was 1st and 10 at the Coleman 33, and after three plays for

Coleman they had run the ball down to the 29 yard line of Coleman, a gain of four yards. On 4th and 6 Coleman kicked to the Eastland 23. From there Eastland ran into a brick wall gaining only two yards. Boles kicked to 50 yard line where it was 1st and 10 for Coleman. Coleman then moved the ball for one more 1st down. Before bringing the ball down to the 46 of Eastland. The punt was to the four yard line of Eastland and there it was 1st and 10 for the Mavericks. After three plays Eastland was forced to kick. Boles booted the ball back to the Eastland 42 and from there it was run back to the 35 of Eastland by Coleman. 1st and 10 at the 35 of Eastland the quarterback gave to no. 32 who scrambled down to the 10 yard line of Eastland. On the 2nd down and nine, 12 passed to 19

(Nunez) and he ran in for the touchdown.

This boosted the score to 16 - 0 Coleman, after the extra point kick was no good.

On the kick from Coleman, the ball went into the end zone and the ball was carried back to the 20 of Eastland. On 1st and 10 John Jimenez fumbled the ball on the snap, and Coleman recovered.

It was now 1st and 10 for Coleman at Eastland's 20 yard line. After two pass attempts no. 30 Marris attempted a field goal from about the 25.

The kick was good and that wound up the ball game, with the score Coleman, 19 - Eastland 0.

Key defenders were Tony Thomas, Howard King, Larry Boles, Allan Jolly, Steve Lopez, Mark Parsons, and Gary Barnes.

Manager Neville's private office, the front area and the service area all boast built-in paneling in the offices is antique birch and carpeting adds to the overall beauty of the facility. "We were especially

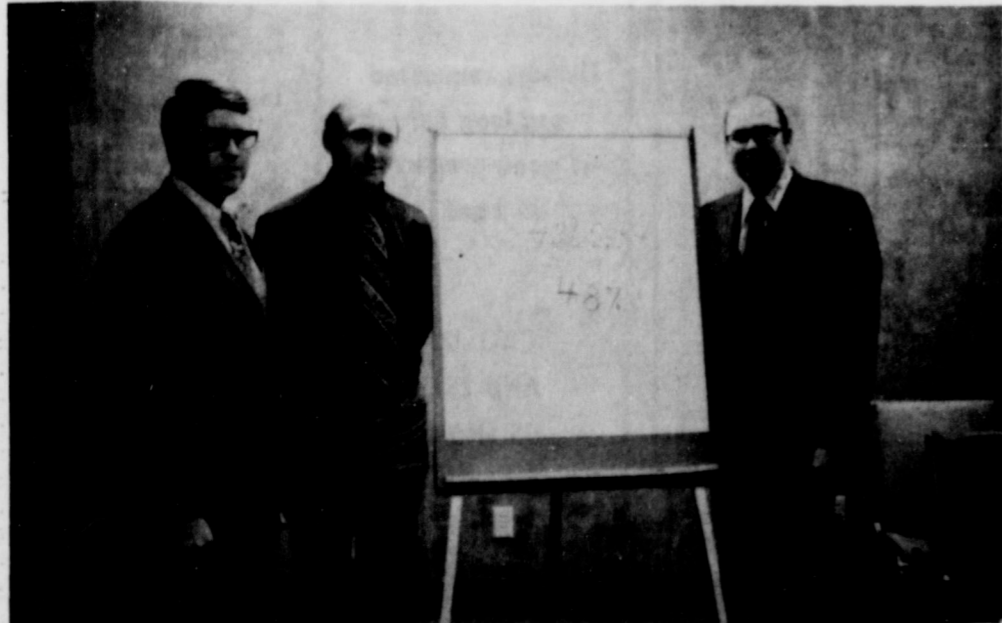
happy to be able to utilize an existing building, and with a remodeling, make it what we believe is an outstanding addition to our town." The handling of the front of the building is especially beautiful.

**Insurance Rates
Study Continues**

Defeat of the competitive insurance plan in the legislature does not mean hope is lost for a reduction in home owner rates in West Texas, State Rep. Joe Hanna said today.

Rep. Hanna, co-chairman of a special interim committee studying the basic rate structure for extended coverage in home owner policies, said that committee will continue to meet and review such insurance rates. This committee was formed

before the special session was called by Governor Preston Smith to study insurance reform Hanna said, and had already collected statistics and information valuable to the study.

"At least two members of the Insurance Commission have indicated to me that relief is overdue for the north-northwest section of the State, which includes this area," Hanna said. "We will continue to press for fairer and more equitable rating system in Texas. It is not right that this area must pay as much as 3 1/2 times as neighboring counties,

Pecan Field Day To Be Held

Pecan harvesting and pecan spraying machinery will be demonstrated at David Hooper's pecan orchard at Scranton, Monday afternoon, Oct. 23rd. This will be a part of a fall pecan field day in Eastland County.

The field day will also include a tour of a native river bottom orchard that has been improved.

The field day is planned and sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. Dan Childress, president of the organization, says the field day will begin at 10:00 a.m. Monday at J.P. McCracken's native pecan orchard, formerly known as the Kent Work Orchard. The group will meet 2½ miles south of Cisco on Highway 183 and about one half mile south of the Leon River Bridge. Tony White is working the McCracken orchard and has made improvements that will be interesting to see, reports Childress.

After lunch the field day will continue at Scranton in Hooper's orchard which is managed by Dale Carlile. The pecan machinery will be demonstrated during the afternoon at the Scranton orchards.

Childress said several manufacturers have said they would have their latest equipment for demonstrations. Childress said pecan growers will have an opportunity to see the equipment work in actual orchard conditions.

County Agent, De Gordon, said several Extension Service and Experiment Station Specialists will attend the field day to discuss pecan problems with growers. These will include Dr. Jerral Johnson, Plant Pathologist; Dr. Clifford Hoelscher, Entomologist; and Dr. J.W. Worthington, Horticulturist.

A milocrop that has been described as better than usual is being harvested and stored in barns now. We've had several calls from producers who want to know how to protect this farm - stored grain from insects.

Proper attention prior to and at storage time helps greatly in preventing loss to insects. When storing grain, take adequate steps to provide the least favorable conditions for insect development. Store clean, sound, grain with a moisture content of 12 percent or less. Grain containing more moisture attracts insects, promotes mold growth and may induce heating.

Store grain only in bins that have been cleaned thoroughly. Remove old grain, trash and other debris that furnish living quarters for insects. Cover cracks with builders molding or other suitable material to prevent grain from collecting.

After the bin has been cleaned thoroughly, spray inside surface with malathion or Methoxychlor at the rate of two gallons of 2½ percent spray per 1,000 square feet. To obtain a 2½ percent mixture add 1.6 pints of 57 percent Malathion liquid in five gallons of water. If Methoxychlor is used add two pounds of 50 percent wettable powder to five gallons of water.

For more information on the control of insects in farm - stored grain, obtain publication L - 217 from the County Extension Agent's office.

Colder weather can't come soon enough for most Eastland County livestock producers. A change to cold weather would be a big help in slowing screwworm outbreaks.

But until a hard freeze comes - and it may be a long way off - checking animals and treating all wounds is still as important as ever.

Approved screwworm remedies are available as dusts, smears and aerosols.

Coumaphos and Ronnel Water sprays are also effective in protecting wounds against screwworms invasion and in killing worms in infested wounds.

The importance of checking animals regularly cannot be over emphasized. Each and every type of wound should be treated because one drop of blood will attract a screwworm fly. All punctures such as those made by ear tags or biting insects, such as ticks should be treated.

Since horn flies, ticks and lice are attacking livestock use coumaphos (Co - Ral) or ronnel. (Korlan) spray when treating animals for these pests since either will also provide protection against screwworms.

As long as screwworm flies remain active, livestock producers must keep their guard up. This is no time to relax and wait for cold weather.

The latest estimate of the Texas Pecan crop is 65 million pounds. A crop of this size would be 171 percent greater than the 24 million pounds produced in 1971. If the final outturn is at the forecast level, this would be the second largest crop on record. In 1968 Texas

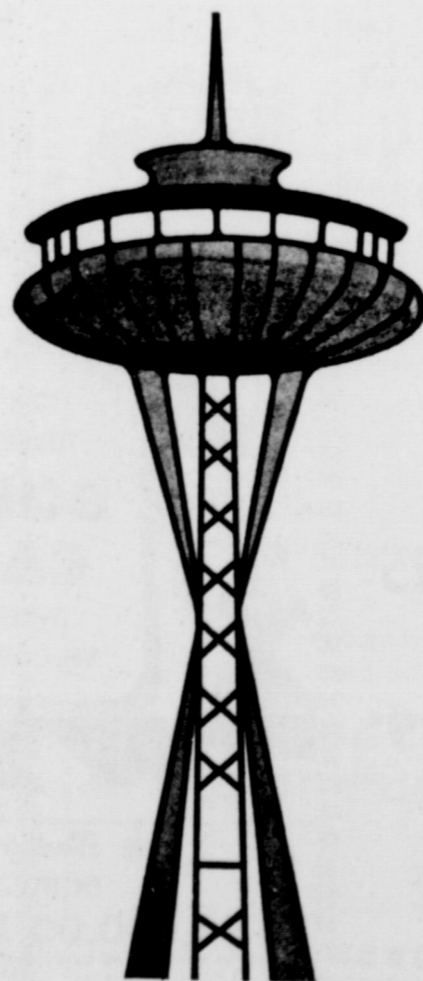

The committee is composed of DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent; David Martin, ASCS director; Lynn Gibson, SCS conservationist; and Charlie Henderson, FHA supervisor.

The Texas Highway Commission has approved a \$800,000 safety and betterment program on highways and farm to market roads in District 23 headquartered in Brownwood, according to District Engineer E.M. Pritchard.

The work in the Brownwood District is part of a \$40.0 million statewide safety and betterment program.

In Eastland County the MK&T Railroad overpass in Cisco on US 80 is scheduled for removal since the railroad has been abandoned.

State Highway 71 in McCulloch County from US 87 southeast 17.9 miles, is listed for widening and the surfacing of shoulders.

Two small bridges south of Goldthwaite on US 183 in Mills County are also planned to be widened under this program.

Pritchard said the farm to market road improvements includes the widening of the south approach to the Santa Fe Railroad underpass on Austin Avenue in Brownwood, and the widening of Hords Creek and Live Oak Creek Bridges on FM 53 west of Coleman.

State highway safety and betterment projects include the widening of Central Avenue, US 377, in the City of Comanche from State Highway 36 in the west edge of Comanche, east 2.8 miles.

Pritchard said the overpass removal project in Cisco is estimated to cost \$110,000 and will include the construction of a 72 ft. curbed roadway.

This project has had high priority with City of Cisco officials ever since the abandonment of the railroad. However, the project was deferred until the completion of IH 20 around Cisco in order to avoid detouring the large number of vehicles using US 80 before completion of the Interstate bypass.

Planning will be begun immediately by Eastland County Resident Engineer R.P. Haun, Jr.

The Abandoned Graveyard

This cemetery is located in Eastland County about nine miles southwest of Eastland City on the Leon River.

I do not know when the first person was buried here but the first time I saw the cemetery was in December, 1897, and it looked to be very old then.

The cemetery was well kept from 1898 until 1922, the year that I left Eastland County and came to Abilene. During these years, 1898 to 1922, a good many people lived in the country (but not now) and they would meet on the 30th of May every year and clean every grave. The work was all done before noon and then the women and children put flowers on all graves. All this was done by noon and then the dinner was spread on the ground (no tables) under the large shade trees. After eating all joined in singing and prayer services. But when oil was discovered at Ranger the people discontinued burying here. The people were afraid some might drill near the cemetery and when the Merriman Cemetery was drilled it sure did stop many from using country cemetery. In those days the most of the farmers became very optimistic thinking it would not be long until he would have an oil well.

Now the Pleasant Valley Cemetery is in a deplorable condition. Only a few of the graves are being cared for and I am afraid when this generation is gone none of them will be cared for. Some of the graves have not been cared for in years. Many of the monuments have the inscription on them "Gone But Not Forgotten". Some of the monuments are leaning.

As I was walking over the cemetery I decided if something was not done and done soon that it would be a "Lost Cemetery". I decided on

a plan of getting up a permanent fund, put it in a savings and just use the interest and the interest only to keep up the cemetery and by the help of some which are very much interested we have made up a fund of \$515.00 and have it in the Eastland bank. It is drawing 5 1/2 percent interest. We are going to do our best to get a permanent fund of \$1500.00 but we are going to need help. This is why I am writing this article. So many of the people have moved and we have no way to get in contact with them. I am hoping many will see this and send in a donation. If you have loved ones buried here or know

of anyone that does please send a donation as it is for a good cause. If anyone that reads this and feels like donating it certainly will be appreciated.

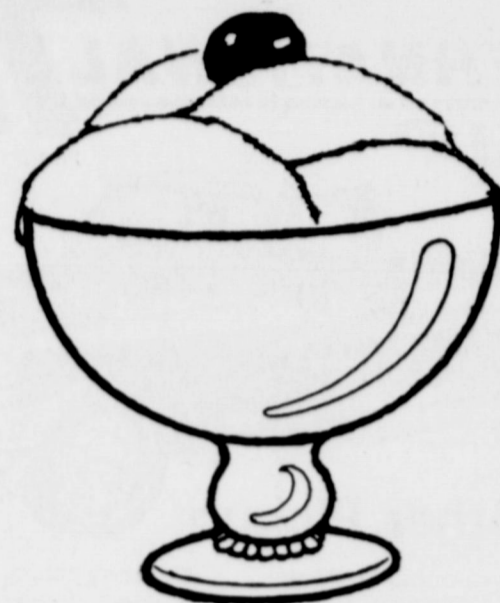

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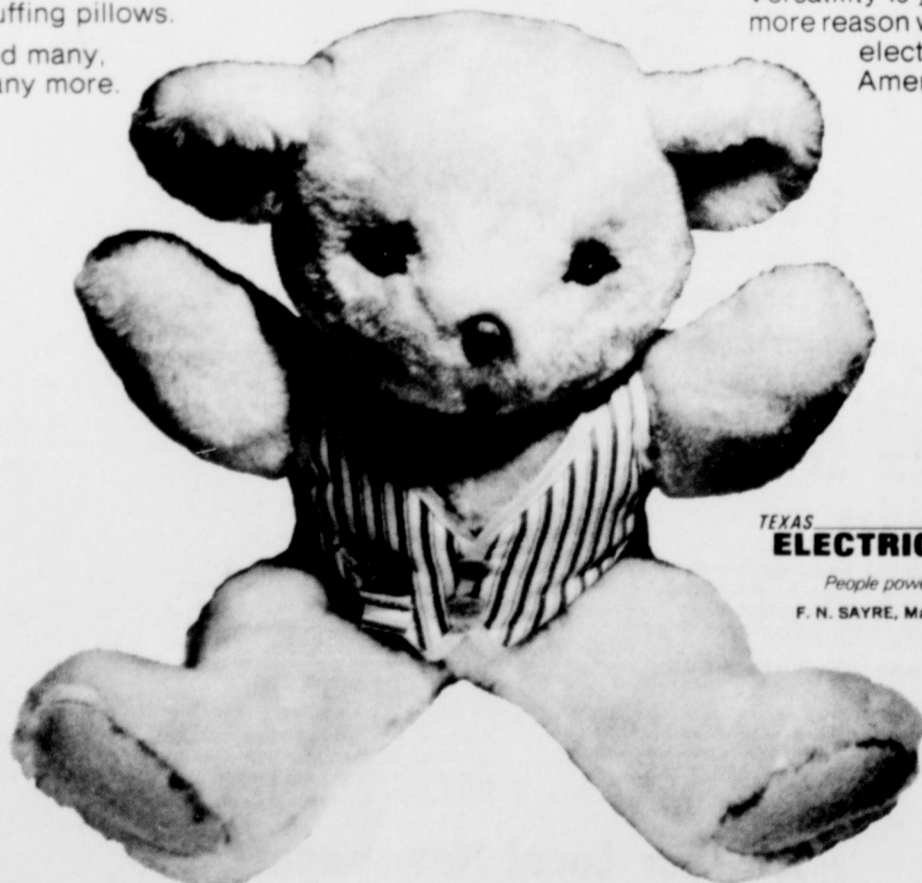
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
