

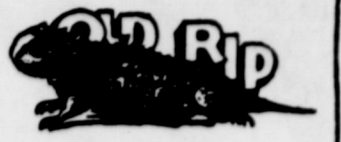

I have done so because, without formality but as clearly as I know how to say it, I want the Navy's pride in you, which it is my privilege to express, to reach into your civil life and to remain with you always.

You have served in the greatest Navy in the world. It crushed two enemy fleets at once, receiving their surrenders only four months apart.

It brought our land-based airpower within bombing range of the enemy, and set our ground armies on the beach heads of final victory.

It performed the multitude of tasks necessary to support these military operations.

No other Navy at any time has done so much. For your part in these achievements you deserve to be proud as long as you live. The Nation which you served at a time of crisis will remember you with gratitude.

The best wishes of the Navy go with you into civilian life. Good luck!

Through the years he has taught many new candidates their degree work in masonry.

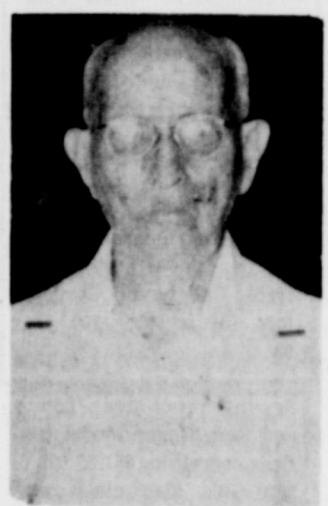
At the age of 94 he is still an active member.

Among the many friends attending the dinner was District Deputy Grand Master W.C. Browning.

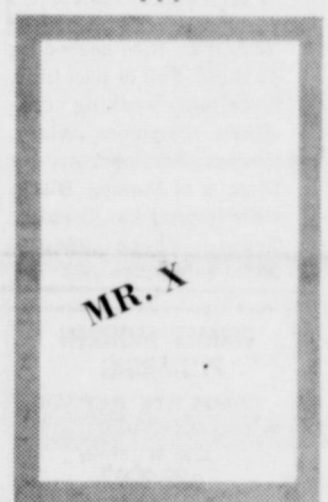
Last week, they trailed Cisco for three quarters, then came back to down the Lobos. Eastland has amassed 192

Little Things That Become Big

"A quarter a month that helps put a crippled child into the Lions Camp" was one of the examples Lion District Governor Loren Maples of Graham used to describe "Little Things that Become Big Things," in his official visit to the Eastland Lions Club at noon Tuesday at Camp Inspiration.

Introduced by Deputy District Governor at Large J.B. (Tip) Arther, Gov. Maples told of the 981,000 Lion members in the 26,000 clubs throughout the world, all "serving humanity."

He touched on the Lion Youth Exchange Program, which he has been active in for years, and explained that students from Australia, New Zealand and South Africa will be arriving early in December. (All students except those from Africa are housed.)

The governor described the Leo Club program in which high school age Lions Clubs are sponsored by senior clubs and encouraged the Eastland club to consider the organization of such a club.

In tell of the Lions CARE program, he told how \$1 from each member in the state

helped build schools and water systems in South America.

"If your club met for no other reason than but to eat, hear a program AND help sponsor the Crippled Children's Camp," he said, "then your time would be well spent." The \$3 each Texas Lion pays in dues to the camp provides not only the summer program for crippled children, but also supports the diabetes program and the adult blind program.

An additional phase of training was added to the Game Management Officers Academy at Texas A&M University in 1965. The extra, but necessary, responsibility expanded the GMO force by 50 men and increased the annual budget by some \$175,000.

AUSTIN - The 302 game management officers of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will be hustling Nov. 18 to keep up with the state's 500,000 opening day turkey and deer hunters.

In addition to the 1,100 game and fish laws in Texas, all GMOs have the responsibility of enforcing water safety laws.

To enforce the law, the Parks and Wildlife Department has added \$1.6 million to its annual law enforcement budget for water safety equipment and operation expenses.

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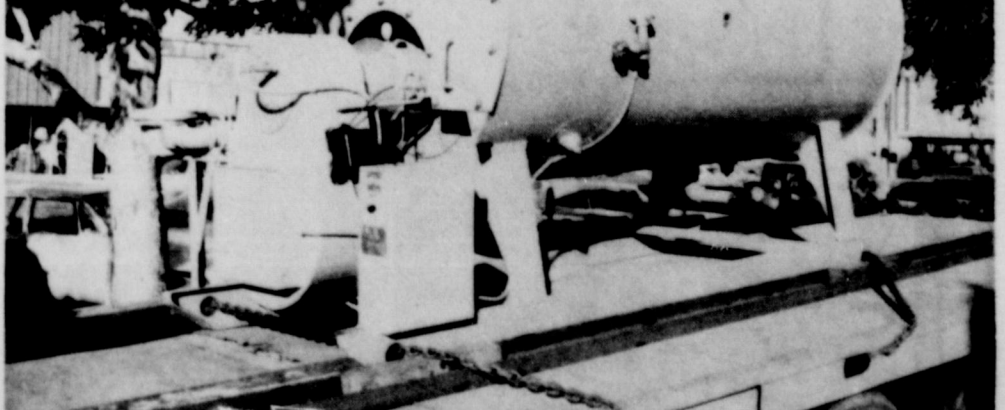

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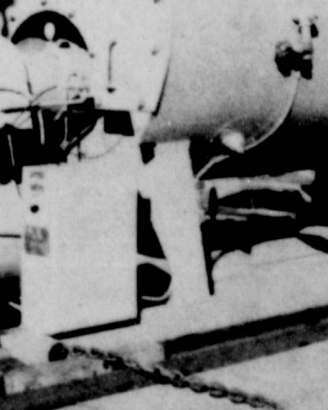

WHITETAIL DEER

What big game animal supplied more food to the Indians than the buffalo? What is the most widely hunted big game animal in the United States today? Yep, it's the whitetail deer.

Season opens Saturday. Whitetail deer size varies with the availability of food and according to the subspecies of the animal. The key deer of the Florida Everglades rarely weigh more than 80 pounds while the largest whitetail on record tipped the scales at 425 pounds. In Texas we have only one kind (species) of whitetail deer. It is found in areas mainly east of the Pecos River.

The deer found west of the Pecos River is the mule deer. This is another species of deer entirely.

There is a large variation in the size of the Texas whitetail deer and this variation is due almost without exception to food availability. More on this later, but the availability of food influences the whitetail in many ways.

Fawns are born in May and June. Twins are normal for well-fed does and triplets are not unusual. If does are poorly fed, however, they may bear only one fawn or may abort before the fawn is born.

Bucks that are on a good level of nutrition can develop antlers that make the average hunter break out with a case of hives. Contrary to some

peoples' thinking, a well yearling deer can be an eight point buck.

By the same token, a 4½ year old buck (which should be the prime trophy) may be a spike if he is poorly nourished. Bucks that are poorly fed may not have an active rut and this can show up in a small fawn crop next year.

This says that body growth and maintenance will take first place over reproduction or antler development.

Deer will grow until about three years of age. If they don't have the groceries available to help them grow to a large body size during this time, they will never develop into a large deer.

This is why a four year old buck should be a prime trophy. He is through with body growth and can "concentrate" on making good antlers.

However, the age structure of a "normal" deer herd, in good condition habitat, with optimum harvest is as follows: Fawns 32 percent; 1 year 31 percent; 2 year 15 percent; 3 year 9 percent; 4 year 4 percent; 5 year 3 percent; 6 year 2 percent; 7 year 1 percent; and 8 year 2 percent. Notice that about 85 percent of the herd is three years old and younger.

This reduction each year is from diseases, natural causes, accidents, and hunting. A deer herd can increase from 25-40 percent per year. At this rate, a herd can rapidly reach the point where it will eat itself out of house and home. Thus, when a herd reaches the "carrying capacity" of a range, the surplus animals must be

removed to prevent damage to the habitat. A harvest of 25 percent of the deer herd can be made without damaging the productive potential of the herd.

It is far better to harvest the surplus animals than to let the herd over populate, destroy their range, and then die of starvation.

If you are curious about the age of the deer you kill, the county agent has a bulletin (L-782) entitled "...To Age A Deer". It gives information how to determine the age of a deer by checking its teeth. Just a note of caution - age is not determined by tooth replacement as in sheep and goats.

Deer have some unique food habits in some ways. Deer have a high protein demand and are very picky eaters because of this. They take the tender fast growing parts of the plants. These are the parts of the plants that have a large amount of protein. On rangeland that has been heavily abused, many if not most of these high protein sources have already been removed. Deer prefer forbs and weeds when available and fall back on browse when little else is available. Grass will only make up about 10 percent of a deer's diet and most of this is taken in the spring when the grass is lush and succulent.

When food supplies get short, some landowners think they can pull the deer through by feeding corn. Deer like corn and it can be used to draw deer into an area for harvest, but it does not contain the protein and energy required by growing deer. It does meet the protein requirements of adult deer

Find English Care Different, Instructive

The English system of health care is much different from the American, and some aspects of it are even primitive by our standards. Mrs. J.R. Newton, administrator of the Twilite Acre Nursing Home, said recently. She and her husband have just returned from a week spent in London where they attended a seminar on care of the aging. But it seems to work very well, she said.

She pointed in particular to the use of midwives for the delivery of babies. Most of the births take place in the home and the midwife is a specially trained member of the nursing profession. But even she does not rate at the top of the nursing echelon.

Newtons, who own the Rising Star nursing home among others, spent October 6 to October 12 in London where they gave particular attention to the English system of care for the elderly. The seminar was sponsored by the American Nursing Home Association. They plan to go to Rome, Italy, next spring on a similar tour.

Medical services and health care in England are fully socialized, although there is private care for a small element of the population who desire and can afford it.

"You need to understand," said Mrs. Newton, "that there are two very well defined classes of population in England - the very poor and the very rich. There is very little of the middle class,

however. Range cubes work well as a supplement but can get expensive.

us. It does seem unfair, however, to tax English people to take care of Americans or other foreigners who do not pay any of the tax for support of the program."

"The 'day care center' system apparently provides very good care for the elderly," Mrs. Newton said. By receiving attention at the health care center, to which they are publicly transported, during the day and living with their families at night

strictly speaking. All of them, however - and even foreigners who come ill while in England - are entitled to and receive medical treatment and hospitalization and other health services free of charge, under a program supported by a tax on earnings."

Except for a few private institutions, there are no nursing homes such as we have in the United States, she said. The English equivalent is a 'day care center' to which the elderly receiving care are taken by night, returning to their homes at night. If they need medical or nursing attention at the home it is provided by a doctor, known as a 'general practitioner' and by a special corps of nurses. The general practitioner is one of the two classes of doctors who provide medical care for the population. If he recommends that a resident go to a day care center, then the treatment of the patient is supervised by a specialist while there. Both are simply doctors such as we know them in the United States, who can also devote some of their day to the care of private patients who pay them on a fee basis.

There seems to be a sufficient number of these doctors and their service is good. House calls are a regular feature of the English system, Mrs. Newton said. In the cases of obstetrics, if there is need of a physician, he takes over from the midwife at the home or, the case is taken to the hospital.

"If any of us had become ill while in England, we could have received hospital services and medical or surgical treatment without any cost to

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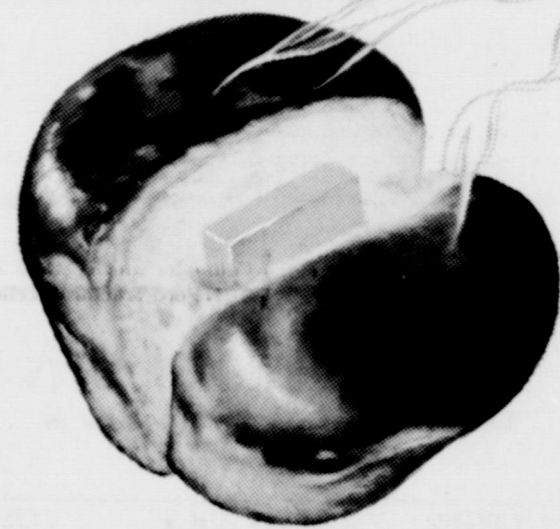


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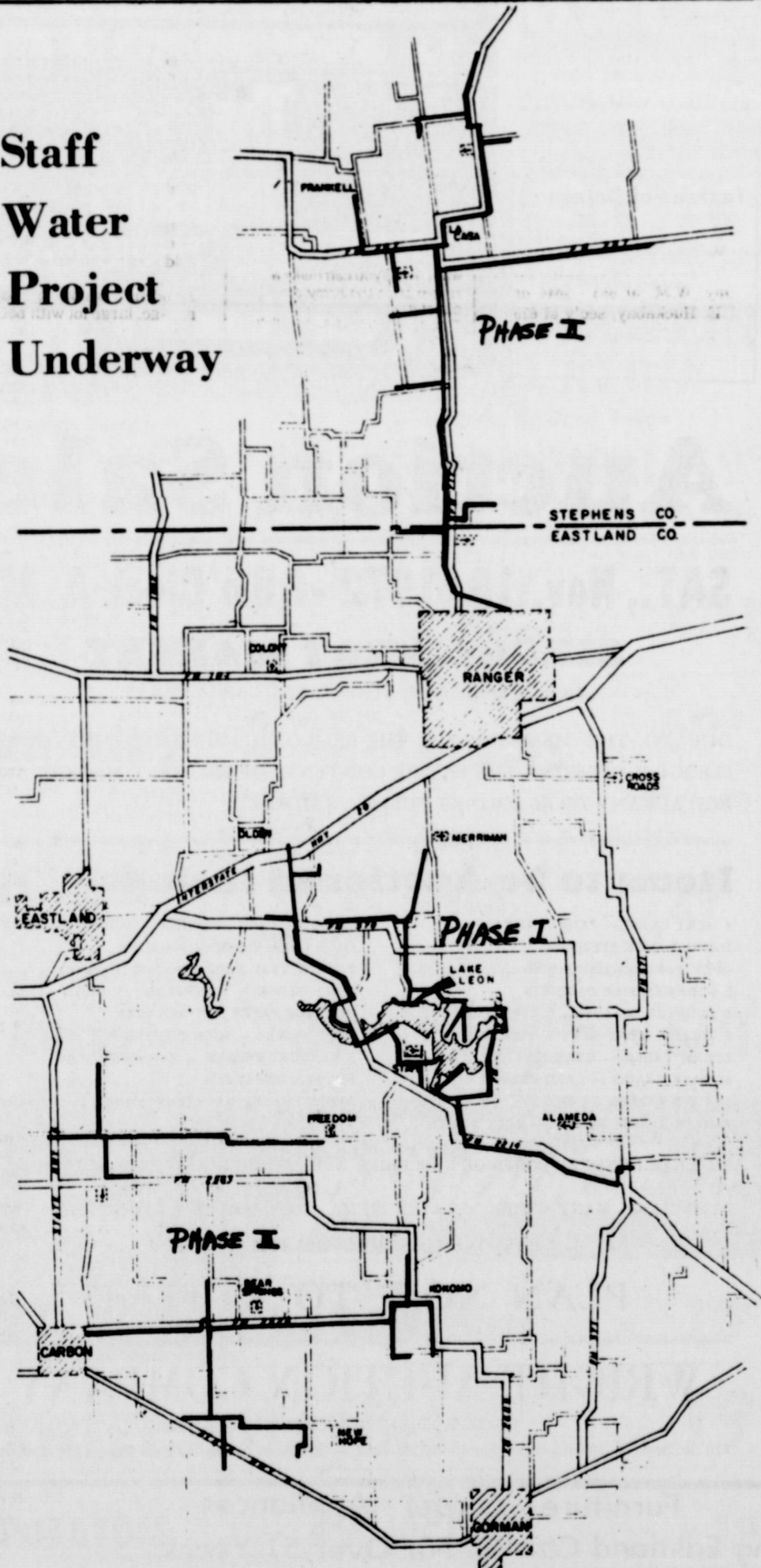
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Staff Water Project Underway

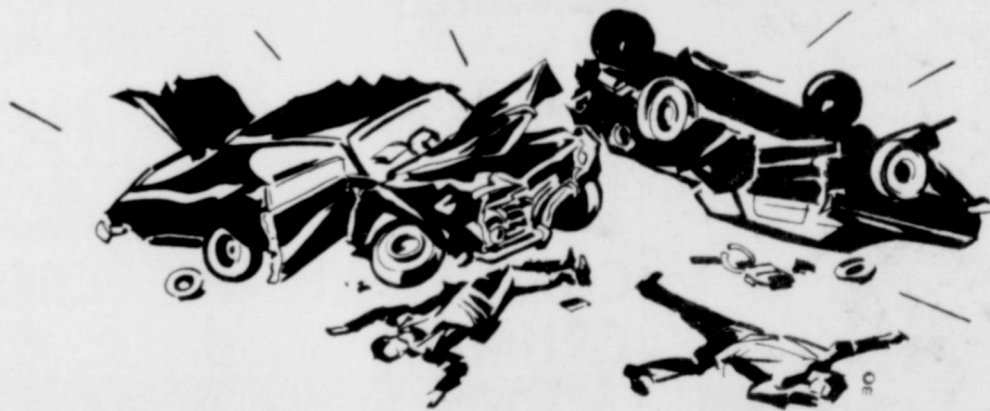

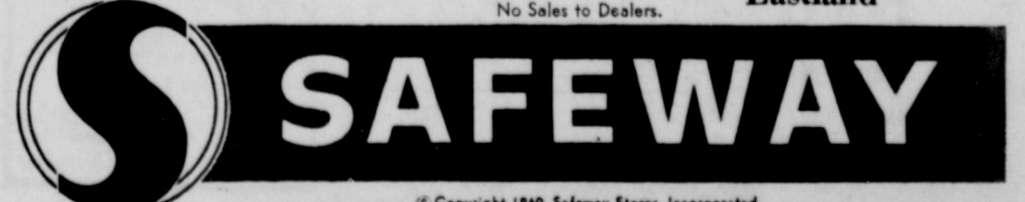

He and his family with others moved to Clay County Ark. about the year of 1865. He lived there until 1869. He then started out to find a new home in Texas. He came to Comanche County. He was here for only a short time, but lost his wife while here and she is buried somewhere in that county.

He then came to Eastland County and purchased land along the Leon River in the Pleasant Valley Community.

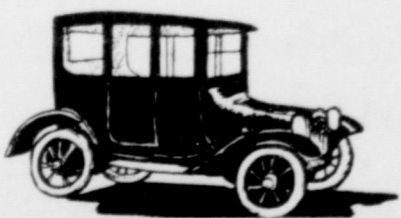

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THE WONDERFUL WORLD of BOOKS

A book that is shut is but a block. - Ancient Proverb.

SENATE PRAYERS & SPIRES OF THE SPIRIT, by Frederick Harris. 175 pages. \$4.95. The Bethany Press., St. Louis, Mo.

This slim volume due to be released Thanksgiving Day is a treasure of thought, filled with Senate prayers and columns taken from writings in the Washington Evening Star. Dr. Harris was pastor of the Foundry Methodist Church in Washington, D.C., for 40 years, and served as chaplain of the United States Senate for a quarter of a century.

His friend, the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower, said at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge in 1967: "No man wearing the cloth of the clergy has more influentially illuminated the purposes and the aspirations of

our country than my good friend Dr. Harris."

The book contains copies of 40 prayers given in the Senate by Dr. Harris, and a good half-hundred two-page or so "devotional" writings, each a spark to ignite thinking. Titles run the list: "On Omitting Flowers" (he's against this request); "Banquet of Consequences" or how about "The Beliefs of Unbelief".

This quote from "The Prophecy of the Palms": "Long ago the world was through with Pilate. But the world is not through with Jesus; it is through without him!" Highly recommended reading.

BOLLINGER CEMETERY In EASTLAND COUNTY

Bollinger Cemetery is a small family cemetery located southwest of Staff. The cemetery can be reached from F.M. Road 2214 by turning south on a dirt road approximately one mile southwest of Lake Leon bridge. The dirt road (about one mile in length) dead ends at a gravel road. The cemetery is located about one mile west on the gravel road on the north side of the road.

About 1875 Noah Monroe Bollinger moved his family from Bollinger County, Missouri, to Eastland County seeking a climate beneficial to the health of his wife, Hoover Bollinger. A son Daniel Benjamin and a daughter Emma came with their parents. Daniel Benjamin returned to Missouri. In 1877 he married Sarah Elizabeth Clubb, and later returned with

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Emergency Benefits

Texas farmers and ranchers who have suffered crop, livestock, or property losses from a natural disaster since June 30, 1971, may be eligible for benefits from Public Law 92-385, J. Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration - Texas, announced today.

Provisions of this law, signed by President Nixon on August 16, 1972, are now fully operative, Futch said.

Benefits are divided into two time frames: In the northeast corner of the cemetery sandstone rocks seem to indicate that a grave is there. However, the older children of Daniel Benjamin Bollinger did not believe a grave is there.

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1. Farmers and ranchers who received loans from Farmers Home Administration as the result of losses due to a natural disaster that occurred between June 30 and December 31, 1971, may be eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000 of the principal of the loan. Interest on the remaining loan would be three percent.

2. Those who received loans as the result of losses from natural disaster that occurred after December 31, 1971, are also eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000. Interest on the outstanding balance would be charged at one percent.

Futch emphasized that it is not necessary for those who are entitled to benefits to contact the local FHA office. These are blanket provisions applicable to all who have received loans, and each will be contacted and told of the action he should take.

Futch also advises that any farmer or rancher who receives an Emergency loan for farmers Home Administration between now and June 30, 1973,

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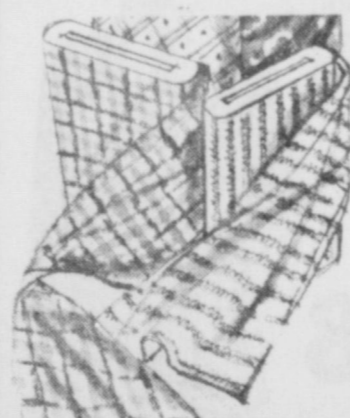


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
