Many a man can remember the summer days of his childhood when he hated to leave the fishing hole and his dog to return to school in the fall, but Mark Whitehouse will remember mostly his teachers asking him if perhaps he could persuade Sputnik to stay outside until classes were over. However, Sputnik rarely did leave. He went from grade school through junior high and high school with his master Mark and mostly enjoyed marching with Mark and his numerous other human friends in the band on Friday evenings.

Mark left for college in the fall of 1967 and Sputnik, by then growing older in years found more relaxing past times like attending church on Sundays and Wednesday evenings.

Sputnik was a member of the Church of Christ on West Main, however, he later began attending the Presbyterian Church which was only a block from home.

During the week, he seemed to take a successful amount of pride in watching over all the business that was going on in The Hub. After all, he had to keep an eye on the family business for Mark's sake.

It hardly seems like seventeen years ago that Sputnik began his life, and then when you consider his accomplishments, it does seem true. After all, not many people can say that at fifteen years old they were celebrities and retired to easy living.

He was certainly an outstanding character of his time and we're all going to miss seeing him around, -- B.H.
