Ranger Junior College will be playing Cisco Junior College, football rivals from way back. Kickoff time for the big game is set for 8 p.m. Saturday, September 16

The Bowl annually pits Cisco Junior College's Wranglers and the Ranger Junior College's Rangers in the BIG GAME OF THE YEAR. The Ranger Bulldogs bowed to the Cisco Lobos, 19-0, Friday, and the Mavericks were nosed out by the Haskell Indians, 21-20 the same evening.

## Mode O'Day Celebrating 40th Year; 24 Locally

An even 100 years of retail selling is being jointly celebrated during the month of September at the Mode O'Day Store on the West side of the Square in Eastland.

The Eastland store is one of 700 Mode O'Day stores celebrating Mode O'Day's 40th Anniversary, and the local store has history of its own.

The Eastland store is celebrating its 24th year. Mrs. J.U. Johnson opened a store here on the east side of the square, 24 years ago, after being with Mode O'Day in Breckenridge for four years. This makes a grand total of 28 years with Mode O'Day for Mrs. M. Johnson.

Mrs. Johnson was joined by her sister, Minnie Lay in 1960, coming from Wichita Falls and Electra after 16 years with the firm. Miss Lay opened her first store in 1940 at Breckenridge where she worked for four years before going to Wichita Falls and Electra and was there 16 years, making a total of 32 years with Mode O'Day. The Eastland store moved

from the east side of the square to the west side, with a complete new store three years ago.

Miss Lay and Mrs. Johnson extend invitations to their friends and customers to come in and help celebrate the big 40th Mode O'Day Anniversary.

The first Mode O'Day store opened in 1932 in Glendale, Calif., during the depression, and it was a unique idea of developing a chain of franchised dress shops to sell their own manufactured apparel.

In looking back over the history of the firm, Fred Wotring, Senior Vice President observed, "Selling women's apparel direct to the consumer through franchised stores, the savings were passed on to the customers. People were quick to recognize better quality and lower prices."

With its 700 stores today, it's one of the oldest and largest franchised apparel chains in the country. In 1971 over 3.2 million units of dresses, sportswear and lingerie were made and delivered to these shops. The firm today has a

90,000 square-foot office and distribution center in Burbank, Calif., and a similar one in Kansas City. Eight manufacturing plants produce a large percentage of the merchandise sold in the shops.

**SPUTNIK** -- A gentleman of seventeen memorable years died this past week and for the first time in a number of years the CHS band and football teams will have to carry on their Friday evening activities without the aid and company of an old friend.

Townspiece nearly took the old white boxer for granted until two years ago when Sputnik's mug shot appeared in nearly every newspaper in northern Texas and several out-of-state issues. At that time, Sputnik became known to nearly everyone as the dog that took himself to the doctor when he became ill and brought home his own medical prescription tied neatly around his neck by Dr. James Kely.

Many a man can remember the summer days of his childhood when he hated to leave the fishing hole and his dog to return to school in the fall, but Mark Whitehouse will remember mostly his teachers asking him if perhaps he could persuade Sputnik to stay outside until classes were over. However, Sputnik rarely did leave. He went from grade school through junior high and high school with his master Mark and mostly enjoyed marching with Mark and his numerous other human friends in the band on Friday evenings.

Mark left for college in the fall of 1967 and Sputnik, by then growing older in years found more relaxing past times like attending church on Sundays and Wednesday evenings.

Sputnik was a member of the Church of Christ on West Main, however, he later began attending the Presbyterian Church which was only a block from home.

During the week, he seemed to take a successful amount of pride in watching over all the business that was going on in the Hub. After all, he had to keep an eye on the family business for Mark's sake.

It hardly seems like seventeen years ago that Sputnik began his life, and then when you consider his accomplishments, it does seem true. After all, not many people can say that at fifteen years old they were celebrities and retired to easy living.

He was certainly an outstanding character of his time and we're all going to miss seeing him around.--B.H.

finalize plans for construction of the Texas Railway Car Corporation's new \$904,000 facility to be built on a 60 acre tract of land one and one-half miles north of Ranger.

The \$904,000 interim financing was secured from the Abilene National Bank and the National Bank of Commerce of Dallas Tuesday.

Construction for the plant will begin immediately with Abbott Construction Company of Midland erecting the buildings and Seidel, Inc., of

San Angelo, contractor for the dirt work.

Smith Construction Company of Houston has been named contractor for the laying of 10 miles of railway track at the new site.

Texas Railway Car Corporation plans to have 105 male employees with a million dollar payroll by the end of the first year of operation and a total of 315 employees by the end of the third year.

The Ranger Industrial Foundation began working to

secure the railway corporation several months ago. The corporation began operation here February 1 repairing and repainting damaged railway cars with a work force of 25 employees.

Official ground-breaking ceremonies for the new facility will be held in the near future.

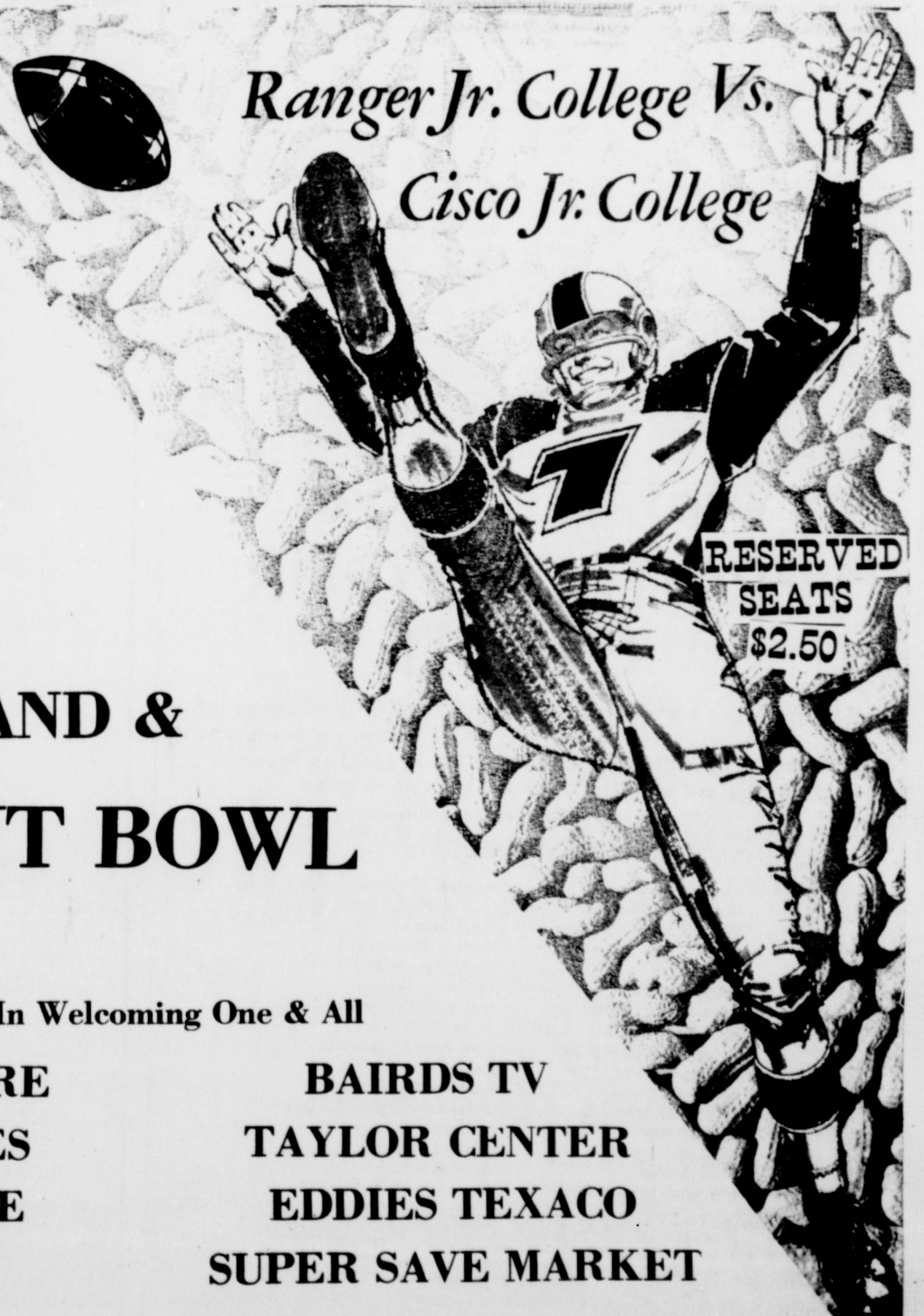
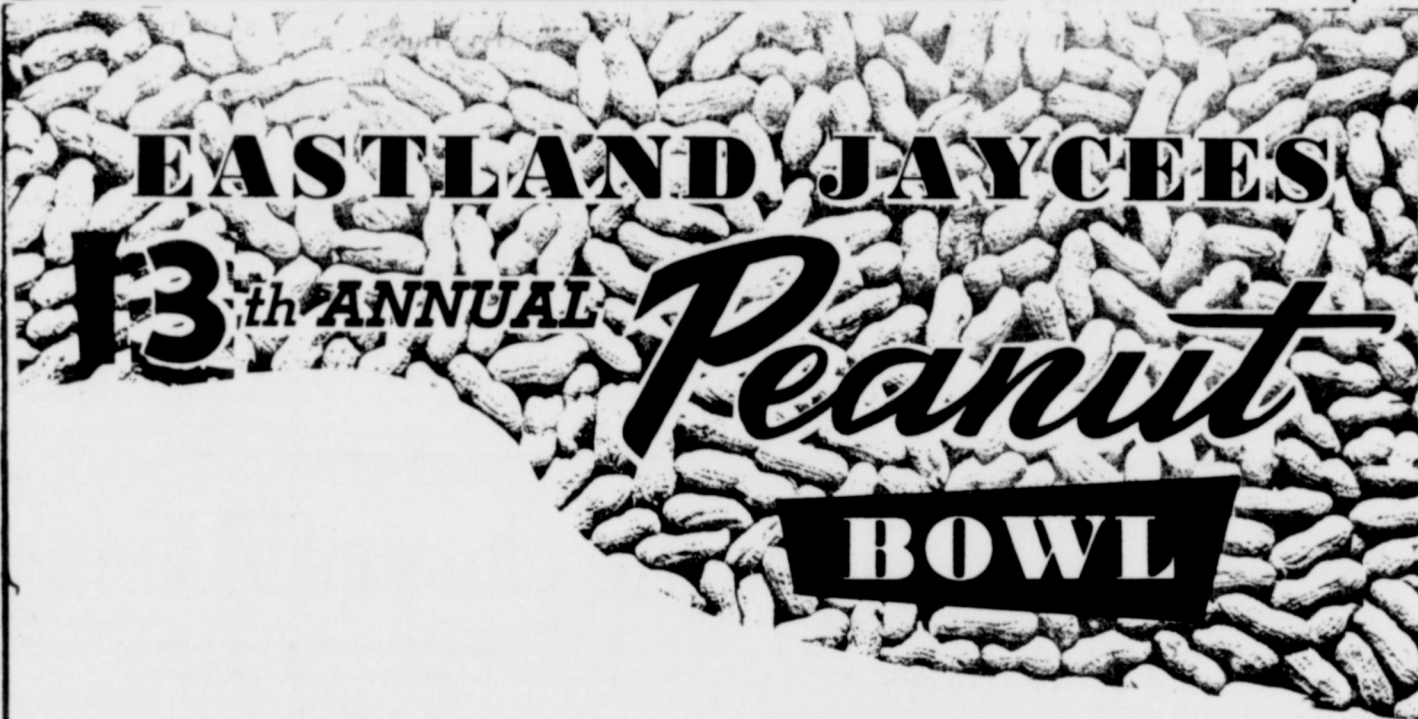

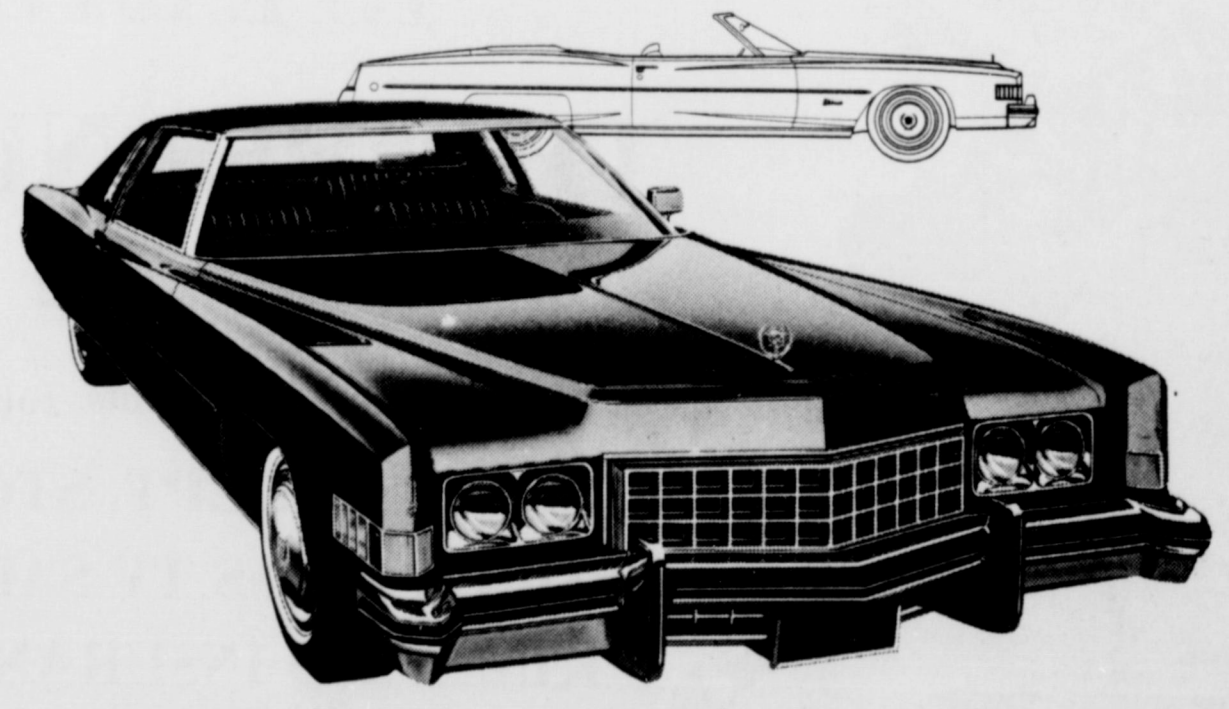

Nueces River Authority has filed as sponsor of the Choke Canyon project on the Frio River west of Three Rivers. TWC said the Federal Bureau of Reclamation, which would build the reservoir, did not consider water rights already granted when it made studies of the sites.

A one-year real estate loan providing for an interim payment on or before six months from date of a specified

sum, plus accrued interest with unpaid principal balance due and payable on or before one year after date meets requirements of 70 per cent loans.

TEXAS SIXTH - Texas is sixth among destinations of vacationing American families, according to a national survey cited by Texas Tourist Development Agency.

Texas also ranks fifth in visitor spending, as well as sixth in family visits last year, according to the study commissioned by Better Homes and Gardens magazine.

With 2.8 million family vacation visits credited to the state last year, Texas was exceeded by California, 5.6 million; Florida, 5.5 million; New York, four million; Pennsylvania, 3.5 million and Tennessee, three million.

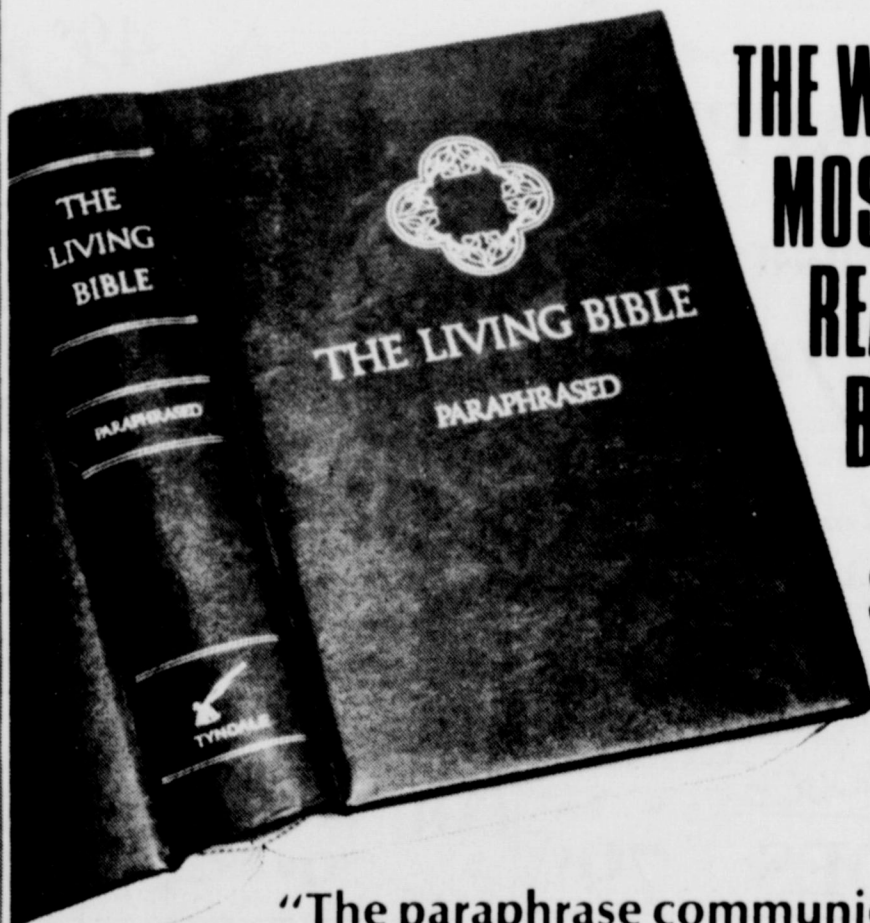

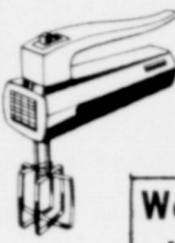

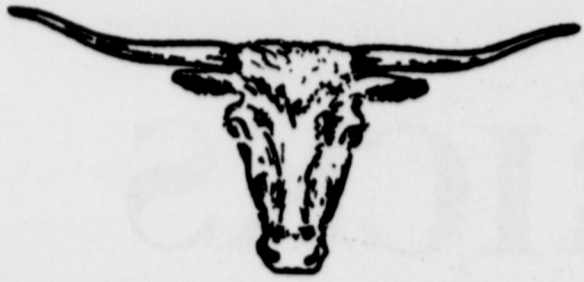
