Dr. George M. Smith, Baylor's dean of instruction, announced the names of those students who were selected because of their outstanding academic performance during the 1972 spring semester.

EASTLAND - Janet C. West, junior, 3.61, biology, Mr. and Mrs. D.J. West, Route 2, Eastland High School, 1969.

CISCO - John S. Hammett, sophomore, 4.00 business administration, Mr. and Ms. R.A. Hammett, 901 W. 9th, Cisco High School, 1970.

Kendall R., Krik, freshman, 3.87, business, Mr. and Mrs. Truman P. Kirk, 104 W. 6th, Cisco High School, 1971.

Smith said 267 students were named to the Dean's List and 379 to the Dean's Distinguished List. Of those named to the Dean's Distinguished List, 207

earned a 4.00 or straight - A average.

Baylor utilizes a grading system whereby four points per hour credit are given for each A, three for B's, two for C's and one for D's.

Grade point averages are derived by dividing the total number of points earned by the number of hours taken.

To be eligible for the Dean's List, an undergraduate student must earn a grade point average of 3.60 to 3.79 for at least 15 hours credit during a semester.

The Dean's Distinguished List includes those students who scholastic averages range from 3.80 to 4.00 for at least 15

semester hours. A graduate student must be enrolled for at least 12 hours during a semester to be eligible for the honor.

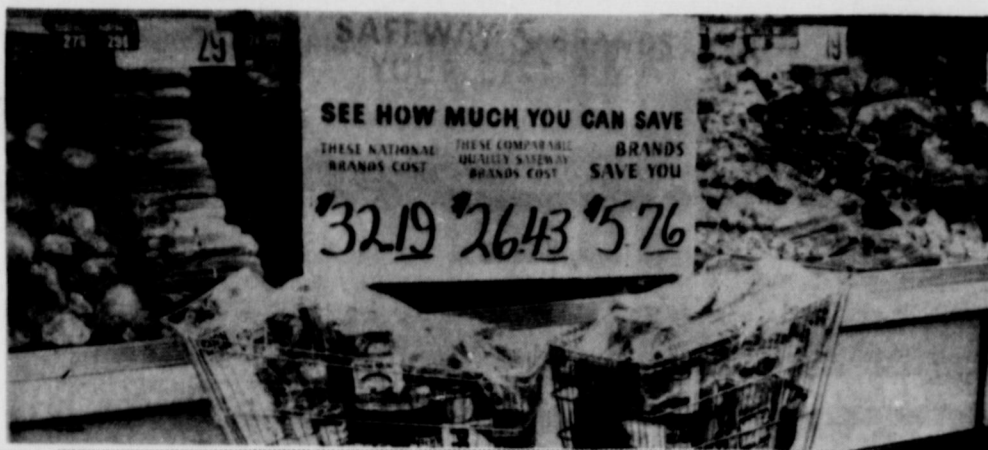

Peace Corps Volunteer Vance McCracken, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McCracken of Cisco, was speaker for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at Camp Inspiration.

Introduced by Program Chairman Jeff Glazner, young McCracken told his unusual experience in helping develop and maintain credit unions among the natives of northern Ghana where he served for nearly two years.

President Clint Bray presided and guests included a group of four Lions from Breckenridge and Mr. and Mrs. McCracken.

Member Dale Bakker announced the plans for the Jaycee Blood Bank Saturday to be held at Eastland Memorial Hospital. Volunteers are welcome.

Young McCracken became one of 4,000 volunteers serving in 50 countries. He had training in Wisconsin and Philadelphia. Credit Unions began in the

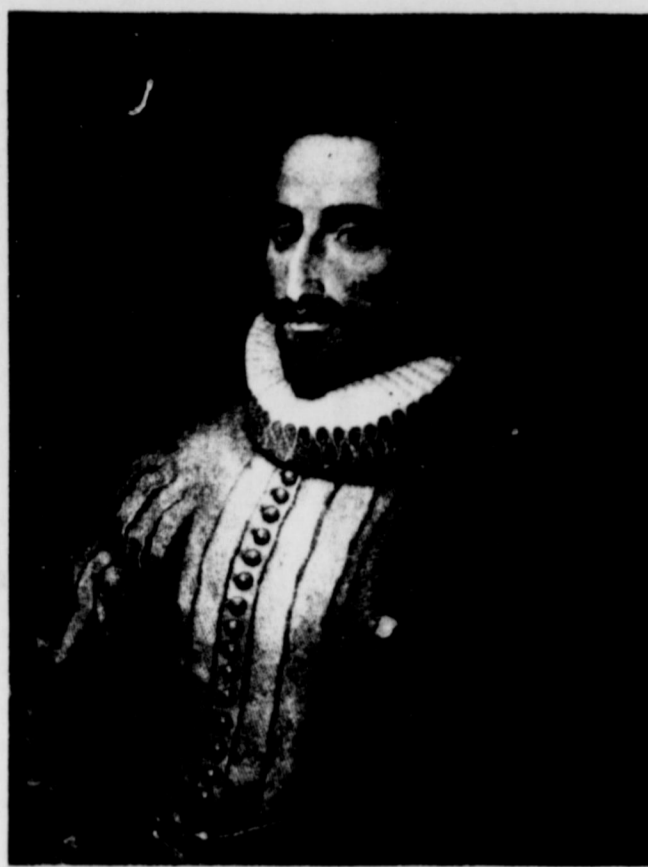
country in 1955 and became a national project there in 1969.

His duties included helping educate the people to what credit unions are, helping operate successful projects and helping existing unions. Problems included a little trouble with embezzlers and complications with Ju-Ju magic of many of the tribesmen.

"Imagine, if you can, the problems that are inherent with a young white man trying to explain the advantages of polling money for a common cause. The first thing is, they don't trust each other, and you can guess that we did have our problems selling credit unions. And too, there was the language problem, among other things," he explained.

The area where he served is also a great peanut-raising economy, in a near desert atmosphere, while the south of the country is lush tropical jungle.

Vance is an accomplished musician, and asked after the meeting how his music had fared during his Peace Corps Service, he answered, "It suffered." He plans to go to New York to work on his masters degree.

running gun battle, the bandits needed another car.

At the edge of Cisco they stopped an oncoming family car driven by Woodrow Harris, 14, of Rising Star. Harris, his parents and grandmother were ordered out of the car at gunpoint. Harris complied. But he thoughtfully locked the ignition and took the keys with him (and today carries an engraved watch presented to him by the bank's grateful insurance company).

Under fire from the posse, the bandits shifted hostages, money, and the dying Davis to the Harris car. After the discovery that they did not have the keys, they shifted back to the Harris car. The fatally injured bandit was left behind in the Harris car. In the excitement, so was the money (not a large loss; banker Jewell Poe had stuffed the sack mostly with non negotiables). A few miles farther on, the bandits abandoned car and hostages, and fled on foot.

This was the opening chapter in what newspapers at the time termed the state's largest manhunt.

Greene's account brings the full fantastic story to life. He presents in cliff-hanging dramatic from events throughout the lengthy manhunt and aftermath to the final chapter, almost two years later, when Marshall Ratliff, the Santa Claus bandit, was taken from his jail cell by a mob in Eastland and lynched. Davis died in a Fort Worth hospital, and Helms in the electric chair at Huntsville. Hill was paroled from his 99 year term in 1943, received permission to change his name, and moved to a different part of

the state.

If there is a flaw in Greene's book, it is that the vividness of minor characters sometimes overshadows the principals. (For instance, who could forget Woodrow Harris' 80-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Sarah E. Graves, who not only refused to get out of the car at gunpoint, but also turned her head and refused even to honor the bandit with her attention.)

Yet this vividness has a purpose. Ultimately, the book becomes a study of a time and place—the West Texas of a few decades ago. Undoubtedly more than one reader will recognize qualities of life that have all but passed from the scene, and lament their passing.

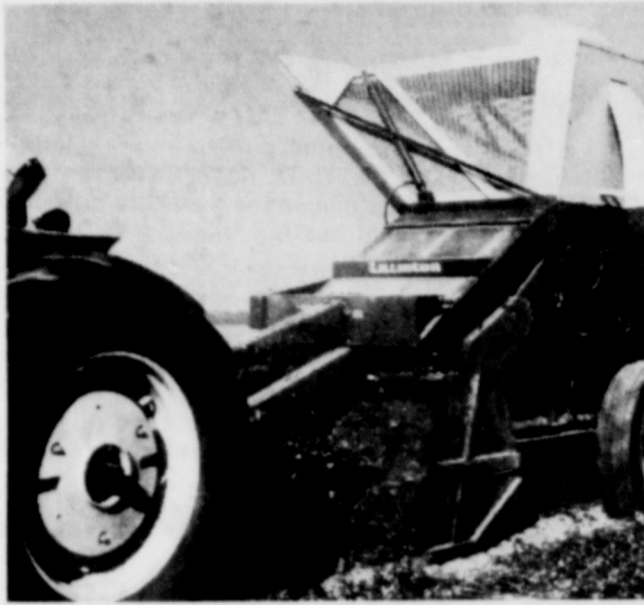

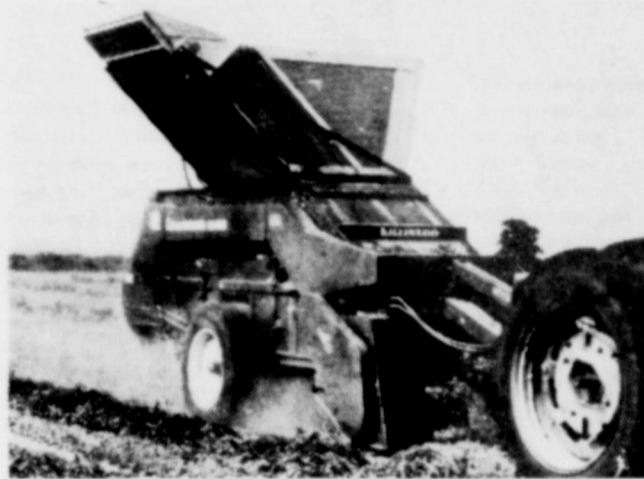

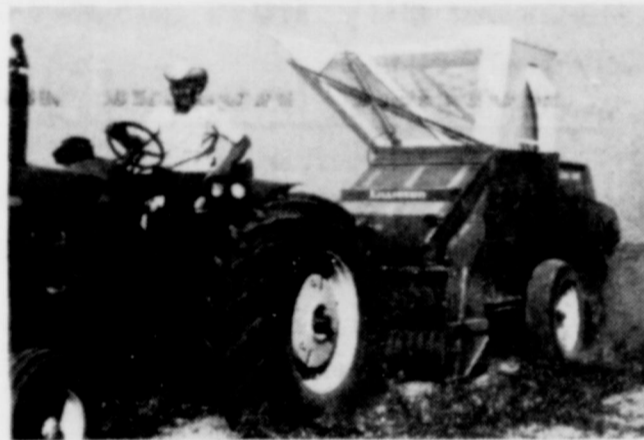

**As It Looks From Here**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - - THERE'S AN OLD SAYING (if it isn't an old saying, we'll start one) that "give me the power to select a Congress and you can have the presidency."

ACTUALLY, THIS HAS BEEN repeated many times over the years by those with political wisdom and

knowledge of the governing processes. Even a few members of Congress - - enough to provide a needed responsible majority - - can, at any given time, change the trend of things.

AFTER ALL, IT IS THE CONGRESS which passes the laws and holds the purse

strings. The President and his appointees administer the laws and spend the money. True enough he has the power of veto over actions of the Congress but the veto can also be overridden. IT IS, OF COURSE, A MATTER of the electorate's judgment as to the makeup of the Congress and we differ in our opinions as to what constitutes proper qualifications for the office. Primarily it is assumed that the Congressman's stand on issues is determining. Quite naturally, we differ on basic philosophies of government, which direct the course of our Nation. We can all agree that any Member of Congress should be able to read and write but beyond that, differences of opinion set in as to other qualifying attributes.

Descriptive words such as "intelligence, dedication and integrity" and so forth, have meaning but are sometimes difficult to define. Like the zeal of Saul, it depends on the direction these attributes may take. A dedication of purpose can be anywhere around the 360 degrees of the compass. The fact remains that there are obvious truths which, at this time and place in our history, need to be critically observed. It seems that number one should be the re-establishment of complete integrity of our dollar's value. Many other issues are related to this rather simple proposition - - inflation, the erosion of people's savings, investments, pensions or whatever. It relates to the crime rate, which absorbs the issue of law and order. It relates to our national defense and our standing with other nations of the world. GIVEN A CONGRESS WHICH IS DEEPLY conscious

and thoroughly dedicated to preserving a government which can serve the need of its people and at the same time preserve its integrity, then the Presidency is not the most vital office. It is, of course, the highest office and has tremendous authority in making appointments to the Cabinet and the various posts under it. The President has the veto power and the authority to withhold funds appropriated by Congress. But, it remains the duty and responsibility of the Congress to enact laws and appropriate money for their administration and execution. THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES cannot veto what is known as "line items" as the Governor of our State is permitted to do. He either

vetoed all of an appropriation measure or none. He cannot lift out certain items to which he objects. On the other hand, he can order the impoundment of funds appropriated for a specific purpose. This is an old controversy and one unresolved. In truth it will never be resolved but only complained about as has been the case throughout the years. The real answer is for the Congress not to appropriate money to the President for things not needed or in excess of that which is absolutely necessary. This is the real rub and accounts for the conclusion in the minds of many that of the two it is more important to elect a highly responsible Congress than to elect a President of the United States.
