## Jaycee Blood Bank Drive Set for August 12 at Local Hospital

A goal of 50 pints has been set for a blood donation drive to be held in Eastland Saturday, August 12, sponsored by the Eastland Jaycee Club in their continuing public service programs. Chairman Greg Sedillo has announced.

Persons between the ages of 18 and 65 who are in good health are invited to contribute blood on that date. Mr. Sedillo and Coordinator Dale Bakker reports.

Prospective donors are urged to contact either of the two men in advance so that an estimate of the number of donors can be determined. Mr. Sedillo is Produce Manager at JRB Super Market and Mr. Bakker is owner - m manager of Bakker Funeral Home.

Site for the blood drawing will be the Conference Room at Eastland Memorial Hospital where refreshments will be served. Arrangements are being made with the Meek Community Blood Bank of Abilene to handle the technical arrangements.

At least some 65 persons are needed, it is believed to be able to obtain the hoped - for 50 pints, since quite a number of people are disqualified for health reasons, it was reported.

Persons who donate may specify to whom they want their blood credited, either for friends or relatives who have received blood recently, or for future local use. There hasn't been a blood drive in Eastland in a number of years and the Jaycees feel that this project is very important at this time. President Larry Rollins reports.

The Meek Blood Bank is a regular supplier to Eastland Memorial Hospital here. It is

believed that a regular yearly project may be adopted here.

Approximately 65 pints of blood are used at Eastland Memorial a month, it is reported.

### Blood may be kept in the

blood bank for only 21 days. At the end of this time it must be discarded. Because of this, credits for donations must also eventually expire if not used. Credits for blood donations become void after one year

### AROUND THE CORNER

Around the corner - yet miles away - - "Here's a telegram, sir - - - " "Jim died today". And that's what we get and deserve in the end: Around the corner, a vanished friend.

### Editor:

I was born and raised in Eastland and recently a friend of mine passed away there.

When my mother first told me of his death, I sat out in front of my home here in California and easily recalled my boyhood and young adult days in Eastland. And there was this man - always with a smile - a word of encouragement - a compliment when I had done something good - always something meaningful to me as a boy who was either working or trying to be an athlete. I never forgot his impact of friendliness and encouragement. He was just that kind of man.

I was hurt on hearing of his death - hurt almost as much as what I hadn't done as I was in hearing of his death.

I tried to see him the last time I was in Eastland but I missed him. I wanted to tell him now what he had meant to me then. It takes a few years and a few miles to realize what his kind really meant to you.

from the date of donation. The sponsoring organization can usually control the expiration of credits by controlling the number of donations into their fund just as the blood bank attempts to control the number of bloods outstanding by controlling the number of bloods donated to the blood bank at any one time. The sponsoring organization selects a donor chairman and an assistant chairman to act in the absence of the chairman. The chairman will receive from the blood bank a record of all blood donations and all other transactions having to do with his blood fund. He will notify the blood bank in writing or by telephone when he wishes blood credits to be issued to any particular patient giving the patient's name and the name of the hospital where the patient has received blood.

The blood bank will notify him in writing that the credits have been issued and also state the new balance of credits on deposit for the blood fund. The blood bank will issue blood credits only by the order of the chairman or the assistant chairman of the blood fund.

The records of the blood bank allow for a strict accountability for all blood donations and credit releases but we should keep in mind that the single most important function of the blood donor fund is to help the blood bank maintain a safe level of blood in the bank to meet all emergencies.

A patient's life is usually saved because the blood is ready and waiting when he needs it. The blood can be ready and waiting only if someone cares enough to donate it before it is needed.

### Who May Donate

Any person between the ages of 18 and 65 years who is in good health may donate blood.

Some of the common reasons for rejection are as follows: Weight: Males should weigh over 130 lbs. Females should weigh over 115 lbs.

Cold, cough or fever: Must wait at least seven full days after all symptoms have ceased.

Hepatitis (Yellow Jaundice): Permanent rejection for those who have had this or who have had close contact with anyone who had this disease at the same time. (Living in the same household, eating from the same dishes, etc.)

Traveling in Foreign Countries: Vietnam veterans must wait three years

### Saving Bonds

#### Purchases

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$14,278 according to Eastland County Chairman. Sales for the first six months totaled \$132,756 or 44 percent of the 1972 goal of \$300,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$16,451,782 compared to \$15,781,727 during June of 1971, a rise of 4.2 percent, while year-to-date sales totaled \$168,024,525 for 53 percent of the 1972 goal of \$315 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds over the nation during June amounted to a record \$532 million, 9.5 percent above sales during June of last year. Sales for the first six months were \$3,247 million, 16.6 percent above 1971.

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C. - GIVEN TIME THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT will attempt to make perfect all the imperfections of man and machine.

THUS IT WAS A YEAR AND A HALF AGO that the Congress passed the Occupational Safety and Health Act. The law went into effect on April 28, 1971. Employers and employees have been struggling to comply with the law and its regulations since that time. It may be another year or two before any appraisal can be given to the law's effectiveness.

IN THE MEANTIME, THERE ARE MANY complaints about the requirements and some think it is too sweeping and detailed in its regulations to be workable. In many instances it is something like the little boy who had to write a book report on a 400-page volume dealing with penguins. His report was summed up in one sentence: "This book told me more about penguins than I really want to know." Experience suggests that there is more "law" in the Safety Act than is needed.

LIKE A GREAT MANY

OTHER pieces of legislation, the law is passed on sobering statistics picturing conditions in need of correction. Figures presented showed some 14,500 persons died and more than two million suffering disabling injuries in industrial accidents in the year 1970. An estimated 250 million man-days of work were lost. The conclusion is that many employers have been negligent and many workers have been careless.

GRANTED ALL THIS, THERE IS growing evidence that industrial safety requirements are developing into a lawyer's dream and an engineer's nightmare.

FIGURES NOW SHOW THAT OF THE 22,000 inspections made by safety inspectors of the Labor Department, penalties have been recommended in 40 percent of the cases, adding up to about \$1.5 million in fines. Some have been in the nature of rather trivial charges. All sorts of reports come in, such as an electric extension cord not secured in a certain way, a hardhat not precisely the approved weight, a toilet seat not exactly so many inches off the floor, and an appropriate receptacle not provided for cups at the water container.

UNDER THE LAW THE BURDEN of maintaining safe conditions is entirely the responsibility of management and if an inspector finds a worker bareheaded when he should have on a hardhat, the employer is socked with a penalty.

SMALL EMPLOYERS ARE PROTESTING that the heavy burden of recordkeeping is impossible for them but statistics to a government agency are like cud for a cow. Of course, the Labor Department is charged with the enforcement of the law passed by Congress and can be too much to blame but on the other hand it seems that unless fault is found the inspector may not be doing a good job.

ACCIDENTS COST MONEY but so does safety. Any of us who might be an operator of a large piece of machinery, such as an earth mover, would like to have a roll-over bar for greatest protection. Something like 70,000 machines of this type are produced annually and under the law each must be equipped with a new roll-over bar at an estimated cost of \$2,000 each. This represents \$140,000,000 increased cost, which somehow must be paid for.

LIKE CLEAN AIR, CLEAN WATER, pure food and non-flammable nighties, there is no question that greatest precautions should be provided and sanitary conditions be maintained in industrial plants. Industry and science have come a long way in improving conditions where people work but usually there is room for further improvement. Except in surgical operating rooms, it is doubtful that all noise, all dust and all hazards can be immediately eliminated in all manufacturing and building trades. If reasonableness can be applied in the initial stages, success in keeping costs down and cooperation up could be better achieved.

AMENDMENTS HAVE ALREADY BEEN offered to the 1970 Act to try to eliminate some of the more impractical aspects. Just recently an amendment to the Labor Department's appropriation bill provided that businesses covered by the law who employ 25 or fewer people be exempt. This was adopted in the House of Representatives and, if approved by the Senate and signed by the President, it would give relief to smaller businesses which are finding the present law to be exceedingly burdensome.

COLLEGE STATION - It's just good insurance to vaccinate all horses, mules and donkeys against the dreaded sleeping sickness, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE), even though the animals were vaccinated last year when the disease reached epidemic proportions in Texas. and safest way to protect horses and other equine against VEE, even though the vaccine should provide immunity for more than a year," emphasizes Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Revaccination is not compulsory but is an extra precaution." Armstrong notes that the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas Animal Health Commission are also encouraging all equine owners to revaccinate as an added safety measure.

Other reasons for the revaccination effort are that (1) Texas is a high risk area and the only state where VEE has occurred, and (2) confirmed cases of VEE have already occurred in Mexico this year and the disease appears to be moving northward. As far as the vaccination of foals and pregnant mares is concerned, Armstrong points out that there has been some change, according to recent hearings at an International Conference on VEE in Kansas City, Missouri.

At the conference it was resolved that foals of immune dams in high risk areas should be vaccinated when three months of age and again when weaned at about six months of age. Unvaccinated pregnant mares in high risk areas should be vaccinated regardless of stage of pregnancy.

In addition to VEE, the veterinarian stresses the need to vaccinate animals against the Eastern and Western strains of equine encephalomyelitis. Once animals are vaccinated for these two strains, a booster shot should be given every year. Armstrong advises that all vaccinations should be given by a veterinarian. He also encourages horse owners to move their animals as little as

possible to reduce the risk of spreading VEE.

The disease will remain a threat until late this fall when cooler weather suppresses mosquito populations. The mosquito is the main carrier to the disease.

The tradition of holding the Homecoming at the Community Tabernacle will be broken this year. The "Homecoming" will, for the first time, be held in the air conditioned High School Gymnasium.

is not only welcome, but invited by the Homecoming Committee and the community as a whole. The program will start at 10 a.m. and continue throughout the day.

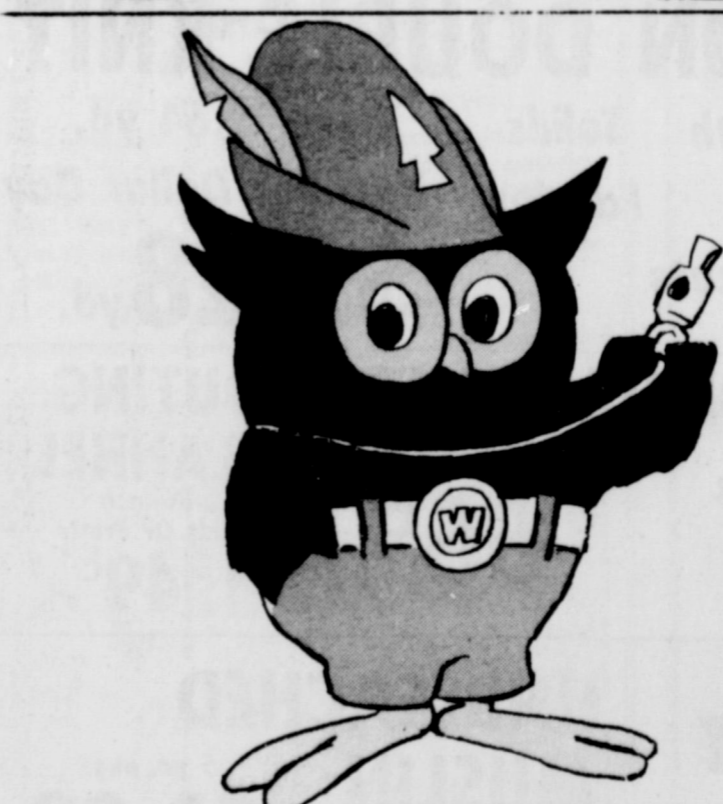

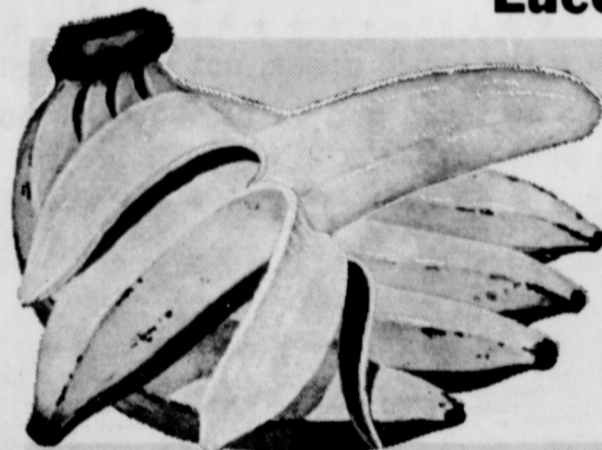

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pecan Growers Association, Drawer CC, College Station, Texas, 77840, proposes a referendum election on October 23, 1972, under provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature and House Bill 525, 62nd Legislature on the proposition whether or not pecan producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 50 cents per 100 pounds to be collected at

the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 12 man pecan producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pecans.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Drawer CC, College Station, Texas 77840, before midnight on the date of election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced pecans for commercial purposes in the amounts of 300 pounds or more total over the last three years is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed

pecan producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications

must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot may obtain one at his local County Agent's office
