Audrey Braden of Rankin was crowned Texas Pecan Queen for 1972 and 73. There were twelve girls representing major pecan producing areas of Texas in the contest.

Eastland County Pecan Queens have been state runner up contestants for three of the last five years, Joan Kelly of Eastland was first runner up in 1968 when the contest was last held in Brownwood. Lynne Phippen of Cisco was first runner up last year when the contest was held in Austin.

Evelyn is 17 years old and a 1972 graduate of Eastland High School. She will attend Cisco Junior College this fall.

The Pecan Queen Pageant followed the annual banquet of the Texas Pecan Growers Association. It was a part of the 51st Annual Texas Pecan Growers Conference and State Pecan Show, July 17 - 19.

Farm Bureau Week Proclaimed By County Judge Scott Bailey

County Judge Scott Bailey proclaimed July 25 - 31, 1972 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Eastland County, at the request of Sam Kimmell, Eastland County Farm Bureau president. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

In his proclamation, Judge Bailey said "experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective

equipment can counter many hazards and keep accidents and injuries to a minimum.

Emphasizing the importance of protective equipment, Farm Bureau President Kimmell said "the agricultural worker may have need for more types of personal protective equipment than the average construction worker."

Farming is an occupation that involves a number of diversified jobs ranging from construction to machinery

repair, and the types of protective equipment a farm worker might need runs from such commonly used items as work gloves to considerably more complex respiratory equipment.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm and ranch residents in Texas averaged over 250 per year during the decade of the sixties.

Reviewing the 1971 Texas Accidental Deaths in Rural Areas Report - which shows a total of 203 deaths. President Kimmell pointed out that the breakdown is as follows: fire, explosion and burns - 35; drownings - 29; firearms - 28; machinery - 26; tractors - 22; animals - 17; electric current - 9; suffocation and asphyxiation - 9; poisoning - 4; hanging - 1; and lightning - 1.

"If this 'Unwelcome Harvest' of accidental deaths in rural Texas is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year," Kimmell concluded.

Eastland FFA'ers Attend State Convention

Delegates to the 44th Annual Convention of the Future Farmers of America in Texas elected East Texas Frederick McClure their 1972 - 73 president.

McClure, from San Augustine, is 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.D. McClure and represented Area IX. After serving one year in the presidency he plans to attend Texas A&M University. Funnell up in the presidential contest was Kelley Martin from Corsicana.

Also named to represent the 53,000 members of FFA in Texas as Sweetheart was Phyllis Anne Rouse from Area III. She is 17 and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P.M. Rouse from Weimar, Texas.

Other final session highlights included naming the Public Speaking Contest winner, Bobby Tucker from Mineola. Tucker will represent Texas in a three state regional contest later this summer.

Bruce Gibson from Godley is 18 and will serve as the National Officer Candidate from Texas during the National FFA Convention this fall in Kansas City.

Top degree winners named for the state are Lynn Upham, Olen, Lone Star armorer; Larry Culp, Happy, Star American Farmer; Robert Jones, Cotulla, Star Chapter Farmer; and Jerome Christian, Jacksboro, Star Greehand.

The 1973 Convention will be held in July in Fort Worth.

Attending the convention from Eastland were Jim Brown and Gary Mathis, delegates; David Walker, Terry Mahaney and Larry Courtney, members; and Don Griffin, agriculture instructor.

Bess Thurman recently returned from a two weeks trip to Hawaii.

She and Sybil Rutherford of Gordon and Odessa toured four of the islands, Kauai, Oahu, Maui, and Hawaii. They report a wonderful time.



Saul Pullman Reports On National Convention

Saul Pullman expressed real appreciation to the Eastland County delegates who supported his nomination and election as a delegate to the National Democratic Convention which met in Miami Beach, Florida the week of July 10. Since this was his first national convention, he found the entire experience very worthwhile and a quickie education in practical politics. On the whole the proceedings were more orderly than the Chicago convention in 1968, but every delegate felt free to speak on any question that came up on the floor.

The order of business began with the state caucus meetings at three o'clock afternoon. The Texas delegates met in the Marco Polo Hotel about twelve miles from the convention center, and during the general briefing credentials were distributed to the delegates for the upcoming night session and decisions were made concerning the propositions that would be voted on at that time. Then the different factions of the Texas delegation would meet in different rooms to decide their particular strategy. Governor - nominee Dolph Brisco led the uncommitted delegates. Frances Farenthold led the delegation for McGovern, and Preston Smith was to have led the group for Humphrey. The Humphrey group soon identified with the Brisco - led group since Smith was not at the convention and Humphrey released his followers early in the proceedings. The Texans for Wallace group was a very loud minority who held their position long after it was evident that they would not be able to control the needed votes to get their nominee elected on

the floor. Saul Pullman was a Frances Farenthold supporter and favored her for the vice - presidential position. Pierre Salinger stayed with the Texas McGovern delegation and used his influence to line up support for the party favorite. The convention proper was called to order each evening about 7:30 p.m. and the sessions lasted until the wee hours of the next morning. Sack time was from 3 a.m. (at the earliest) until noon when things had to start moving to get to the daily state caucus by 3 o'clock.

Most of the delegates were of the opinion that the party platform was not the place to air positions concerning social reforms such as a guaranteed annual income, recognition and representation of gay organizations, regulation of marijuana, and therefore these measures were voted down and rejected as planks in the 1972 Democratic platform. The part of the platform that had to do with bringing the boys home from Vietnam within three months after inauguration sounded good to the delegates and the young people held McGovern to this position. Mr. Pullman found the youth at the convention well informed and fully aware of what they wanted and very capable of using political means of getting it. They dressed un-conventionally for the most part, but were clean, courteous, and very interested. In discussions with groups of them Mr. Pullman was favorably impressed and came away with the distinct impression that the young vote would determine the outcome of the election. Those who were there were far from apathetic.

Concerning security: All parcels were searched and sealed, and all delegates were

identified and marked by a hand stamp as they entered the convention hall. This being done they had free access to and from the hall and "hall" movement within the hall. There were no extra precautions taken when Wallace made his platform appearance, and none were needed.

The big job between now and November is to unify the party from the grass roots up. Mr. Pullman thinks that Democrats will carry Texas at the local and state levels, but he foresees that Texas will go for Nixon and Tower on the national ticket. Texas is very conservative politically and cannot quite stomach McGovern and all his apparently radical positions at this time. However, personally Mr. Pullman says he will support the Democratic ticket all the way, and that by 1976 the state and the nation will be carried by the Democratic

party again.

The city of Miami Beach was very eager to please the delegates and provided free packets of information on all areas of southern Florida as well as Miami Beach itself. A cultural courtesy was the free convention performance of Puccini's opera, Madame Butterfly. Food at the convention site was high cost and hard to get. Hot dogs were 35c, cold pre - wrapped sandwiches were \$1.25 - \$1.75, and small cokes were 25c. However, the local Flying Donkey Club provided a free assortment of soft drinks for all the delegates and alternates, and the Kentucky colonel provided the delegates with a free chicken dinner one night. The delegates appreciated every gesture of courtesy.

Mr. Pullman expects to attend the state convention September 19 in Houston and is

willing to get more involved in political affairs in the state in the years ahead.

Winners Named

Results of the 1971 Texas Pecan Show were announced at the 51st Annual Texas Pecan Growers Conference in Brownwood July 17 - 19.

County Agent De Gordon reports that local growers won several ribbons at the state show. Mrs. C.E. Smith of Rising Star won first with her entry of Choctaw pecans, first with McCulleys, third with an entry of known hybrids, second with an entry of Caddos, third with an entry of known hybrid shelling pecans, and second with an entry of Ranger pecans.

Chester Marrs, of Ranger won a first place ribbon on an entry of Caddos, second on Texas Prolifics, and third on Rangers.

Mrs. Sanders Enthusiastic Campaigner

Mrs. Barefoot Sanders, wife of Democratic nominee for the United States Senate, was in Eastland Wednesday pushing her husband's statewide campaign. An enthusiastic handshaker, Mrs. Sanders passed out brochures and the Sanders campaign treat - barefoot shaped cookies baked by the candidate's mother.

"Texans want a Senator who will listen, a man who cares and a man who will take his job seriously enough to be present when important laws are voted on in the Senate," Mrs. Sanders said. "Our Republican Senator John Tower has one of the worst attendance records in the Senate."

As Mrs. Sanders has traveled over Texas she has found that voters are interested in a candidate's family - it gives

them a view of what kind of man they are voting for. "Barefoot is an honest, easy - to - approach man. He is serious about wanting to serve Texas in a Texas way - working fulltime at the job and being a spokesman for the Texas point of view in Washington," Mrs. Sanders asserted.

Barefoot Sanders, former White House aide and U.S. Attorney is the Democratic nominee for the U.S. Senate after a decisive win over Ralph Yarborough in the June runoff, polling over one million votes.

"Campaigning is a two - way conversation," Mrs. Sanders said. "Because of our travel, Barefoot has a better insight into the needs of Texas and what concerns the voters. We have found that Texans are

looking for new and independent leadership - leadership which will be attentive to Texans and which will listen to the problems of Texans."

Jan and Barefoot have four children - all involved in the campaign effort. The two oldest daughters, Janet, 19 and Martha, 18 have traveled extensively over the state.

Gordon pot

Eastland County swine producers may be missing a real opportunity if they have not checked into the Mid - Tex Feeder Pig Association. The purpose of the association is to provide area swine producers with a dependable market for the feeder pigs produced in this area.

The pig sales began on April 15th and has been held monthly since then at the show barn in Hamilton. The last sale was held July 15th. A total of 816 pigs were sold and averaged

selling for \$22.32 each. In May 756 pigs were sold for an average of \$24.97 each. During the June sale 1064 pigs sold for an average of \$22.63.

In order to market feeder pigs through this sale, a person must be a bonafide producer of feeder pigs and a member of the Mid - Tex Feeder Pig Association, Inc. The membership fee is only \$5.00 - er year. Producers must consign their pigs to the sale at least seven days before the sale and pay a consignment fee of \$1.00 per head.

Only healthy pigs may be

sold. They are sorted by weight and grade. Pigs are sorted into four grade groups. Pigs classified in the higher grades bring more money. The pigs must weigh between 30 and 90 pounds in order to be classified. Unclassified pigs are sold, but bring less money. Pigs consigned to the sale must have been farrowed and raised on the farm of the consignee and male pigs must be castrated and healed.

If you are interested in selling feeder pigs at these prices contact us at the County Agent's office.

"Trickle Irrigation in the Pecan Orchard" was the main topic of the 51st Annual Texas Pecan Growers Conference held in Brownwood, July 17 - 19.

Trickle or drip irrigation is a unique method of slow water delivery.

A lot of people are getting interested in this new method. Water placement and application are controlled and limited to only the vicinity of plant roots. With this procedure less water is required for irrigation.

The drip technique is to apply

small amounts of water frequently, perhaps daily, to replace that withdrawn by evaporation and plant transpiration. A more uniformly high soil moisture content can be maintained. Plants not subjected to extreme soil wetting and drying are normally healthier and can be more productive.

Several manufacturers and distributors of trickle irrigation equipment had displays and demonstrations at the conference. Most systems involved plastic pipes that either lay on the soil surface or

is buried under ground. They also involved little water outlets called emitters. Every manufacturer has a different type of emitter, each claiming to be the best.

I think we will be hearing and reading a lot more about trickle or crop irrigation in the future. It will never work on peanuts, but will on fruit and nut crops and we may see them used in lawns and gardens.

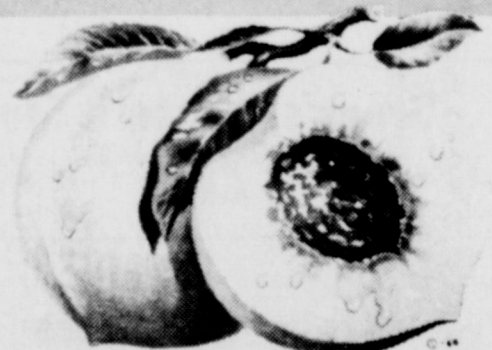

Proclamation

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby declare the week of July 25 - 31, 1972 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the unparalleled technological advances in agriculture have given the farmers and ranchers of our county the ability to produce an abundance of food and fiber, adding to their economic well-being and comforts of life; and

WHEREAS, unfortunately, however, the implements of modern technology have also increased the risk of agricultural accidents or mishaps on public roads, in homes, or in recreational activities; and

WHEREAS, our great State of Texas, through farm and ranch accidents continues to reap "An Unwelcome Harvest" of over 200 farm deaths and thousands of painful disabling injuries each year; and

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed National Farm Safety Week and the Governor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4-H Clubs, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme, "PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT - Your Defense Against Injury!";

WHEREAS, experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective equipment such as safety glasses or goggles, hard hats and bump caps, ear muffs and plugs for lengthy exposure to excessive noise, filter and cartridge respirators for work in heavy dust and chemicals, protective clothing and safety shoes with metal toe caps and puncture resistant soles can counter many hazards and keep accidents and injuries to a minimum;

THEREFORE, I urge all citizens to recognize this special period, and especially urge farm families of Eastland County to become more safety conscious, not only during this FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year.

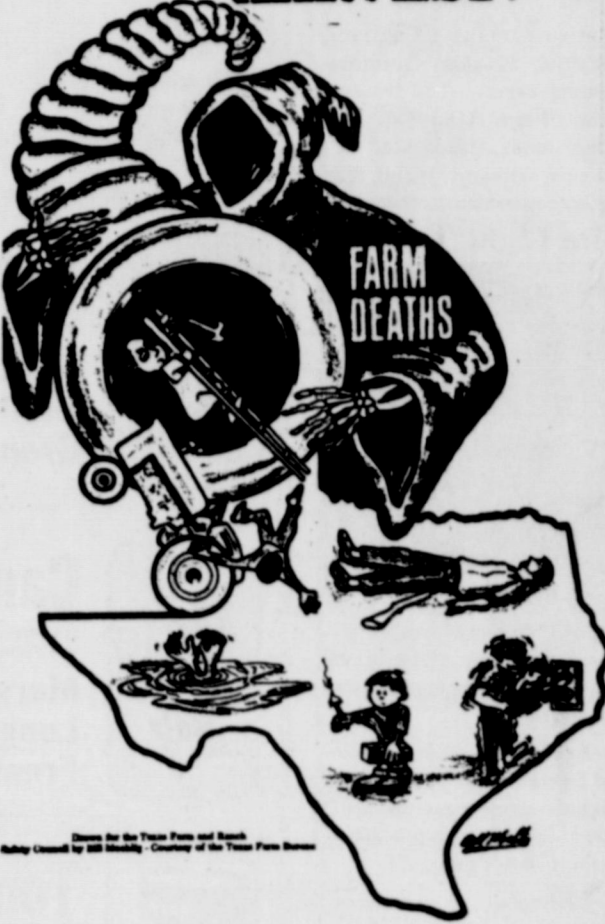

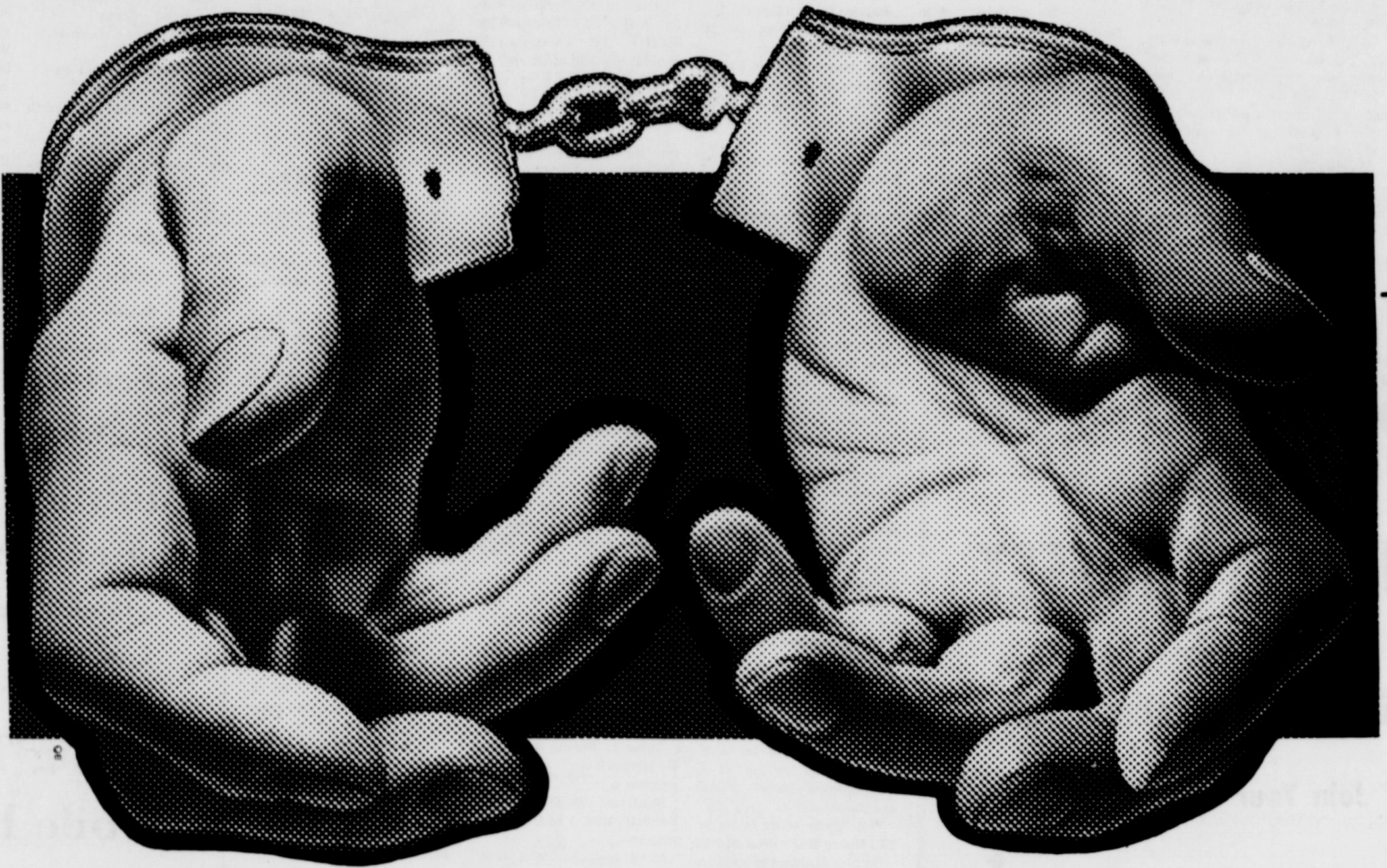

Now It's Too Late!

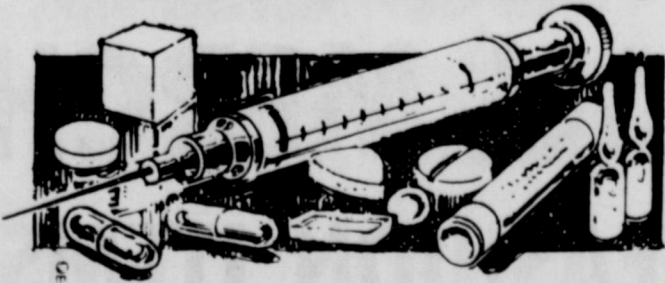

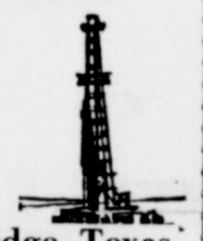

Mrs. Cathcart is a graduate of Silsbee High School, at-

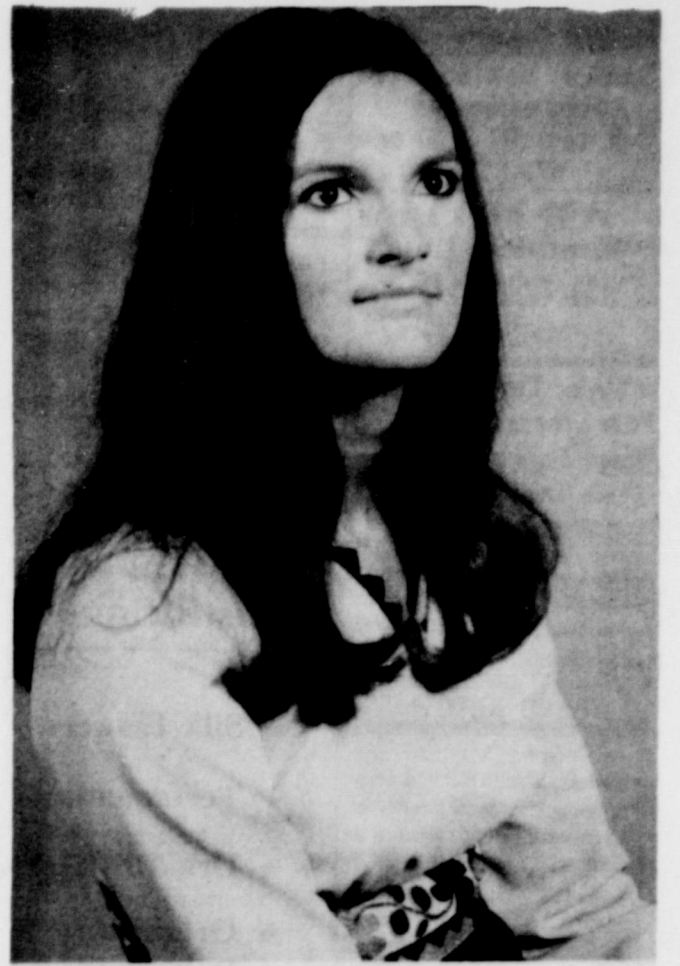
