City to Pursue Grant Help For Center-Library, Other Projects

To Visit HUD Immediately

The City of Eastland will pursue a plan to secure federal funds to assist in the construction of a \$171,000 civic center-library as the result of a Commission meeting Friday afternoon.

Attending the called meeting were Marion Porter, Resource Conservation and Development Project Director for the Soil Conservation Service of Stephenville; Joe Smith, fiscal advisor with the First Southwest Corp. of Abilene; and Dale King, field representative for Cong. Omar Bureson.

Mayor Durel Reid presented with all commissioners present and Commissioner H.V. O'Brien introduced Mr. Porter who explained briefly the programs that might be available for such a project.

"There are 1,048 different government programs," he said, "and surely one or more of these will fit Eastland's needs."

Mayor Reid asked specifically about the requirements that might be included regarding the employment of a professional librarian and certain other minimum standards, understood to be part of the government programs.

It was agreed that these and various other questions would just have to be cleared with the agency or agencies involved.

First suggested is a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program called Community Facilities which would provide a two-thirds grant for qualifying projects. Mr. Porter reasoned that the civic center probably certainly would be eligible, but that the library part might not, and that these details would have to be worked out with HUD's assistance.

It was voted that the city would pursue this and appointments are to be set up with HUD officials within the next week for the Commissioners to sit down and explain the various plans the city is considering.

Several additional programs were discussed with the possibility of the city attempting to accomplish many of the needed services which

are being considered now. These would include sewer line extensions, possibly paving projects, and others which are deemed important.

The city is already involved in a project which will see the construction of a new sewer treatment plant. Government approval is awaited and this will be funded by \$92,000 in revenue bonds, already voted, with the remainder of the cost being paid through government grants.

Carbon-Gorman Borer Report Good

Texas Agricultural Commissioner John C. White announced today that the lesser cornstalk borer is beginning to appear in the peanut fields in central Texas.

A survey of approximately 500 acres in the Eastland - Comanche - Erath counties showed that some fields have corn borer populations up to seven percent at this time in the DeLeon - Desdemona area. Similar infestations occurred in the Lamkin - Gustine area. No infested fields have been found in the survey in the Carbon - Gorman area.

The first moths were caught in the Departmental light traps on March 13, 1972. Then, contrary to normal patterns, the corn borer moths did not reappear for approximately one month during the cool wet season which occurred in March and April. Since then, buildup in the fields has been slow, much behind the buildups which occurred in 1971 for the same period. However, recent hot days and nights and the dry weather have created favorable conditions for the rapid reproduction of the lesser cornstalk borer in peanut fields. The Departmental light trapping program now shows that corn borer moth activity

has markedly increased during the past two weeks.

Commissioner White urges all farmers to be on the lookout for this insect and to start

control measures when damaging infestations are reached. Commissioner White also urged that all farmers bear the responsibility for

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Rep. Hanna Asks Review Insurance

A resolution to create a committee to review the whole system of extended coverage insurance in Texas was introduced by State Rep. Joe Hanna in the House of Representatives in Austin Saturday.

Rep. Renal Rosson of Snyder joined Hanna in introducing the resolution which Hanna says he hopes will bring about a more equitable system of extended coverage insurance. At present the state is zoned into only three zones, which puts Eastland County in the Inland Northwest zone, a position that causes an Eastland County resident to pay \$465 for a three year extended coverage policy on a \$20,000 home as opposed to the same person in Palo Pinto County paying \$130 for the same coverage.

The resolution which must be considered and voted on by the House will create a special committee to make a statistical study of extended coverage insurance, compiling facts and statistics relating to the existing weather zones and areas used for extended coverage purposes.

The committee will study the widely divergent costs of premiums on extended coverage policies, the number of extended coverage policies issued in each applicable weather zone and area, losses incurred due to natural disaster in each applicable weather zone and area, the amounts paid out under extended coverage, policies in each applicable weather zone and area, and the probabilities of such natural disasters occurring in the various parts of the state.

"This committee will give us a state-wide study based on statistics and facts rather than arbitrary lines," Hanna said. Extended coverage has gone up 100 percent in the last two years. Eastland County officials have joined with seven other counties in past months to object to the status of their area, which makes them pay twice the rates charged those in the Seacoast zone, and nearly three times as much as the counties just east and south, called the Inland - Central zone. Officials of the seven counties have met with the Insurance Commission, and have received little hopes of rate adjustments up to now.

Hanna's resolution will give the problem state-wide attention, and will hopefully bring relief to a situation which county officials have called grossly unfair.

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

'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

-- Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

-- If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

-- Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

-- Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

-- Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

-- Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disablement.

-- When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

-- Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

-- Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

-- Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

-- Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

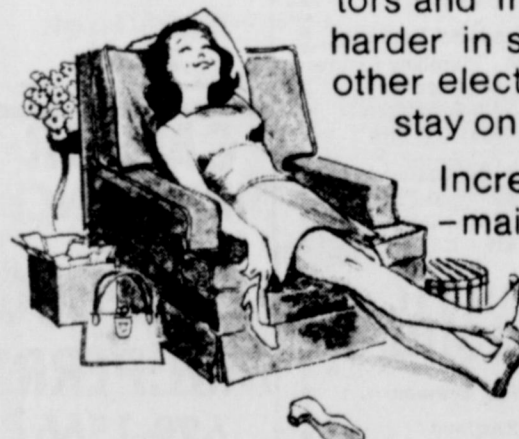

I Remember ...

As we drove over the paved

miles of highway in Eastland county recently, I wondered if very many people remember when we had "road overseers," appointed to lead a "gang" to keep the roads repaired? Each able-bodied man in the county was supposed to do five days of road work each year or pay the equivalent of having it done. Before the brick road from Eastland to Cisco was constructed, there was not a mile of paved roads in the county. To keep roads as smooth as possible it was necessary to "drag" them regularly. Modern kids wouldn't recognize a "road drag" if they saw one, yet they were common "Georgia stocks" fifty years ago. And, someone will ask, what is a Georgia stock? We shall get to that in a later column.

Back to county roads: in the sandy belt it was necessary to "clay" the road. A deep pit going down into the clay under soil would be dug and the clay spread on the "Big road" now called highway. This clay topping was smoothed down with a roller and made a reasonable surface for wagons and buggies. There were no automobiles. I know it is difficult for young people to realize the changes that have come in the last half century.
