TEXAS DEPT. of Agriculture Commissioner John C. White issued a progress bulletin on the lesser cornstalk borer infestations in peanut fields in the central Texas area. The DeLeon Research Laboratory has reported a sharp increase in the numbers of lesser cornstalk borers found in the DeLeon area. Highest numbers of corn borers are in dry land fields and in fields which have yet to be irrigated. Some fields checked have been as high as 25 percent. Another area close to Comanche also has high infestations of corn borers. Generally throughout the other areas in Eastland, Erath, and Brown counties, population remain below the critical levels.

New Tubing Mill Nearly Ready to Roll

By Steve Haines Eastland's new F&Y Tubing Mill which is scheduled to open about the second week of August is on schedule, reports Ancil King, co-owner. A.P. Fambro, president of the mill, will use part of the tubing for construction of gates, for which he has a factory in Cisco. Mr. King said that the mill is ready to go except for the electrical wiring and some straightening up.

The plant will manufacture thin wall steel tubing which will be used in the production of gates, playground equipment and automobile exhausts along with many other items.

The plant will employ six to eight men starting off working an eight hour day, then move up to as many as 25 men in 24 hours a day, in three shifts, Mr. King said.

Ralph L. Hankin from Detroit, Michigan, is consultant engineer on the project with Tom Tafferty Inc. from

Brownwood doing the wiring. The mill once turned on in the morning will run continually until time to shut off in the afternoon. This is all because of the new overhead feeding system which has been installed.

The mill is located at the old Texas Electric plant east of Eastland. The building has been completed for about three weeks said Mr. King.

The plant will cold roll the steel and welding will be by high frequency resistor welding King said. The company has a ten acre tract out of the 34 acre industrial park, with the Eastland Industrial Foundation.

The mill proper will measure some ten feet wide, by ten feet high and some 58 feet long, with auxiliary welding, slitting and other equipment.

A burned child is not a pretty sight, and protection for children against some fabric burns is on the way, says the Texas State Department of Health.

A new law has just become effective which eventually will lead to the use of flame resistant material in children's sleepwear and children's outer

clothing through size 14. At this time, children's sleepwear in sizes 0 to 6X must be resistant to flames or have a warning placed on it that it is flammable. At the end of next July this clothing must be flame resistant.

The labeling option in sleepwear gives manufacturers a year in which to begin using

flame resistant fabric, but on July 29, 1973, all children's sleepwear through 6X must meet the standard or not be sold, says the State Health Department.

Compliance date for larger sizes of sleepwear and outer garments will be announced in the future, and manufacturers will again be given 12 months to comply following the announcement. Also covered will be mattresses and protective pads.

Incident after incident in Texas point up the need for flame resistant fabrics. When a person's clothing ignites,

there's more than a good chance that the person will be burned - sometimes horribly, sometimes fatally, but always painfully.

Burns in the United States are killing and crippling more people than polio did in its peak epidemic year in 1954. In 1954, about 50,000 persons contracted polio and 1,500 died of it. In contrast, according to National Safety Council figures, 6,700 persons died in fires and of burn injuries in 1970, and 250,000 suffered disabling injuries.

In clothing, says the State Health Department's Bedding

and Product Safety Division, it is the quick igniting fabric which causes the greatest human losses. These soft fabrics, usually highly flammable, are put into children's clothing as well as nightgowns and robes worn by adults. All too often the frills which decorate these fabrics burn rapidly, adding to the speed of ignition of the garment itself.

Experience has shown the need to protect our children - as well as adults - and the sleepwear standards in the Texas Hazardous Substances Law are a breakthrough in

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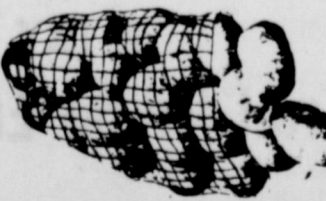

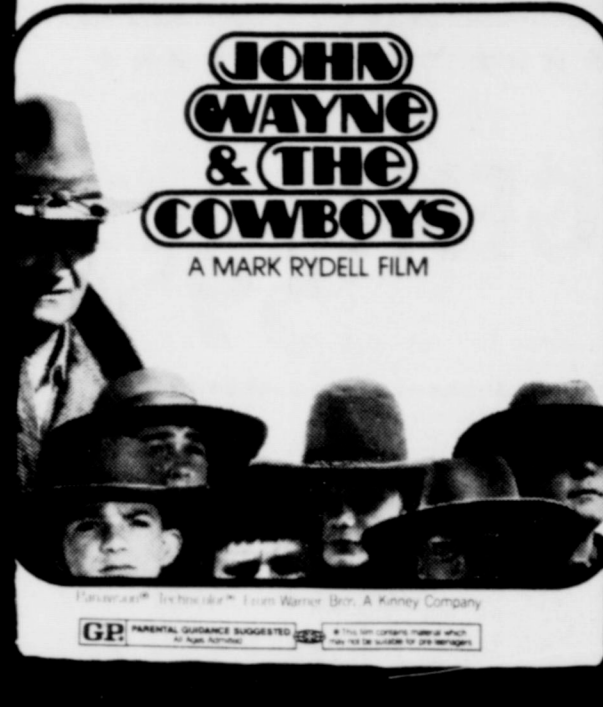

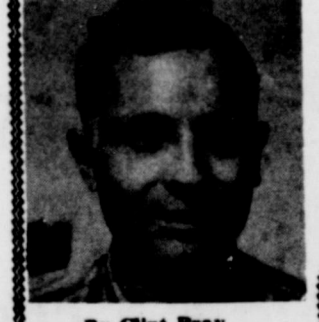

Gordon pot

It sure is hot and dry. Our crops and pastures are beginning to show the effects of the summer drought. Wish we had a little of that cool, wet weather we were experiencing this time last year.

The lesser corn stalk borers are building up in large numbers in peanut fields. We expect this trend to continue until moisture is received unless peanut fields are treated.

Growers are urged to check fields closely because small newly hatched worms can be found. Infestations vary considerably from field to field. Individual field inspection

should be made before the decision to treat or not to treat is made.

Some growers are asking for serious troubles by distributing parathion through the irrigation system. This method of insecticide application is not recommended by anyone. This practice is especially dangerous to those who have to move the irrigation pipe after the application is made. It could be fatal to some child, or adult who should decide to get a drink from the sprinkler. After parathion once goes through the pipe the pipe becomes contaminated and is just as dangerous as an empty

pesticide container. Parathion penetrates the skin and goes into the blood system. A small amount of parathion in the blood may not affect a person. But, I am told that the parathion builds up with continued exposure until it reaches the point where it does affect the boy, but then it may be too late.

Welcome to two new agriculturists to Eastland County. Lynn Gibson and Charlie Henderson began work here last month. Gibson replaces E.E. McAlister in the Soil Conservation Service and Henderson replaces O.M. Boyle as supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration. We look forward to working with these men while serving the people of Eastland County.

Some people ask us the difference between the work of the Extension Service, the ASCS, the SCS and the FHA. Each agency has different and

distinct responsibilities, but we all work together to reach a common goal - to improve agriculture and rural life in Eastland County.

Screwworms continue to be a pest in Eastland County. Three to four cases are reported weekly. Screwworms are being reported from all areas of Texas as well as two-thirds of the state of Oklahoma.

The National Screwworm Production facility at Mission, Texas has been at maximum production since the first of May this year. The average sterile fly release since that time has been nearly 200 million per week.

In order to release sufficient numbers of sterile flies in some areas of the southwest which are considered critical to the success of the screwworm eradication program, there are other areas where screwworms now exist that will not receive sterile fly releases.

Ranger 3rd Baseman Sees Daylight

ARLINGTON - For a spell in late June and July Texas Rangers third baseman Dave Nelson got this notion all of his goals for 1972 might be wishful thinking as he struggled through one of the toughest slumps in his nine year professional baseball career.

The 28-year old native of Fort Sill, Oklahoma, was clipping the ball at a 295 mark and had been the American

League's top base stealer all season as play moved toward the hot summer months.

By the All-Star Game break Nelson was wondering what went wrong. He had a stretch of 59 at bats with only seven hits that plummeted his batting average to .232. He wasn't getting on base and as a consequence his stolen base total was stagnant.

The first areas of the southwest where sterile fly releases have been discontinued are the northern two-thirds of Oklahoma, and all of the Texas panhandle and extreme northwest Texas. As additional sterile flies are needed in the critical areas, sterile fly releases will be discontinued over other areas to the north where cold weather will eventually kill out screwworms this winter.

"I knew I wasn't a .230 hitter. I didn't feel I was pressing at the plate, but I wasn't making contact," Nelson explained. "I was mentally disturbed and that, in turn, soured my fielding. Balls I normally play with ease were zipping by me for base hits and I was hurting both myself and the club. I kept saying to myself, 'hang in there, things will get better.'"

Things did get better for Nelson, who never fell from grace in Manager Ted Williams' estimation during

that long slump.

On the July end six game swing into Anaheim and Oakland for three games each with the Angels and West Division leading A's Nelson suddenly caught fire.

In the series opener in Anaheim, Nelson was 0 for 4 with two strikeouts. He was called out on strikes his first time up in the second game, then singled three times in his next four times at bat and after getting on base in the third inning, stole his 29th base of the season.

"I felt that was the turning point, those three hits. I was making contact again and I felt loose," said Nelson afterward.

However, he was handcuffed by Rudy May on the third day of the series and hit only one ball out of the infield in four trips.

Undaunted, he really came alive in the doubleheader that

opened the Oakland series. He walked his first time up and promptly stole second, then scored the first run of the 2-1 win. In the ninth he doubled in the winning run and then stole third for his 31st theft of the year. In the second game he blistered A's pitching for three more singles in five trips and stole two more bases, and had a hand in all four runs of the 4-1 sweep of the bill.

"I'm relieved the slump is over because I'm dedicated to winning the stolen base crown. It will be tough getting my batting mark up to the .275 I had hoped for, but I'm on the move now," Nelson said as he eyed the final two months of the drive.

When You Go Dancing

Whenever business was good at a suburban night club, the management would "stretch" their space by putting extra tables and chairs on the edge of the dance floor. One night, a dancing couple stumbled over a stray chair.

The woman suffered painful injuries, and later sued the club for damages. She pointed out that the chair had been shoved several feet into the dancing area.

"If it was," countered the management, "some other customer must have done the shoving. We are not legally liable for what our customers do."

But the court granted the woman's claim. The court said that by placing chairs directly onto the dance floor, the management had set the stage for trouble.



When you go dancing in a public place, you are entitled to conditions of reasonable safety. The dance floor, the lighting, and the furnishings should all be maintained in such a way as to minimize the chance of accidents.

Nevertheless, merely by choosing this form of recreation, you are accepting those dangers that are "natural" to it. For example: Another woman, injured while dancing, claimed she lost her footing because the floor was slick. But the court found no reason to blame the management for this. As one judge put it:

"Dance floors are intended to be slippery."

Furthermore, your own behavior might amount to negligence. That was the court's ruling in a case in which the claimant had ventured onto a ballroom floor in a state of advanced intoxication.

And in another case, the court declared it was negligence for a woman to try a particularly tricky step while wearing heels three-and-a-half inches high.

"The situation," said the judge, "parallels that of the risk taken by a participant in a sport."

Good money management considers the past, present, and future. Look at the past to see where your money goes as well as where it comes from. Keep an extra close check on spending for a month or more to determine your spending patterns.

Then figure how much money is coming in. Your spendable

income basically is your pay check. If you have cash income from other sources, such as dividends, interest, or rent, be sure to include it.

Look at the present to check family needs and wants for which you can spend current income. First, list the things you need - your fixed expenses. This includes food, shelter (house payments, repairs, furniture, appliances, utilities), clothing (new, repairs), taxes, transportation (bus fare, auto payments and repairs, gas, oil), insurance, health (doctor and dentist, drugs, eye glasses), and savings (including emergencies).

Second, list the things you want - flexible expenses. These include education (books, tuition, newspapers, magazines), recreation (sports, movies, records, pets, vacations), gifts, personal grooming, contributions and dues, etc.

Third, add up these items to see if they fit the family's total expected income. If you're like most people starting a budget, you've probably overspent. You'll have to alter your plan. Remember your important needs - food, a place to live, and clothing. Can these costs be cut? What about other expenses? What could be left out or put off until later?

Make your plan, but keep it simple. If it's easy to use, you'll be more likely to stick to it. Then try your plan for a month or two. Perhaps you've overestimated spendings in some areas and underestimated in others. Try to leave a "cushion" of a few dollars.

Look to the future and adjust to change. Spending and

Employment And Payrolls For Each Of Texas' 254 Counties Reported

Employment in the private sector of the Texas economy totaled 2,992,413 in March 1971, an increase of 7,877 from March 1970, and payrolls amounted to \$4.7 billion, up \$210.8 million, according to a report issued today by the Bureau of the Census, Social and Economic Statistics Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Harris County had the largest employment, 645,996, an increase of 15,769, and payroll, \$1.2 billion, up \$79.7 million from a year earlier.

The report, County Business Patterns, 1971, Texas, is the latest in a series of annual reports providing first quarter economic statistics for States and counties. It presents data by detailed industry classification on mid-March employment, first quarter taxable payroll, and the number and employment size of reporting units for those private, non-farm business firms reporting to the Social Security Administration under the Federal Insurance Con-

tributions Act (F.I.C.A.). A special mail survey is conducted to obtain industry and county detail not reported to the Social Security Administration.

About three-fourths of all employees in the United States are covered in the reports for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam, and the U.S. Summary.

Not included are employees of Federal, State, and local governments, self-employed persons, farm workers and those employed in domestic and certain transportation services.

The detailed reports are useful to business and governments in administration and planning, analyzing market potential, setting sales quotas and budgets, and measuring the effectiveness of sales and advertising programs.

Copies of the Texas report are available for \$2.00 from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, or from Department of Commerce field offices in major cities.

Information by county and by industry also will be available at cost on punchcards and computer tapes from the Economic Statistics and Surveys Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:
"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.
(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.
(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.
(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.
(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publishing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.
(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.
(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

Construction of gates is in full swing at Eastland's new gate plant on East Main St. Production is good at the new gate and panel plant said co-owner Bert Herridge.
Mr. Herridge said the plant is turning out 250 - 300 gates and panels per week. There are seven people now employed at the company, with an increase in production planned in the near future.
The plant is operating on an eight hour day basis but when the increase in production goes into effect the plant will probably go into a 16 hour day, Mr. Herridge said.
The plant turns out high grade gates used on farms and ranches and other uses. The panels can be used as portable fences and many other uses also.
The gates are put together by welding with an electric welder. After they are put together they are painted in a paint vat. There is so much of a demand for these gates and panels that there is usually someone waiting for the paint to dry to pick up their gates, Mr. Herridge said.

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:
"Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."
Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows:
"Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the cor-
