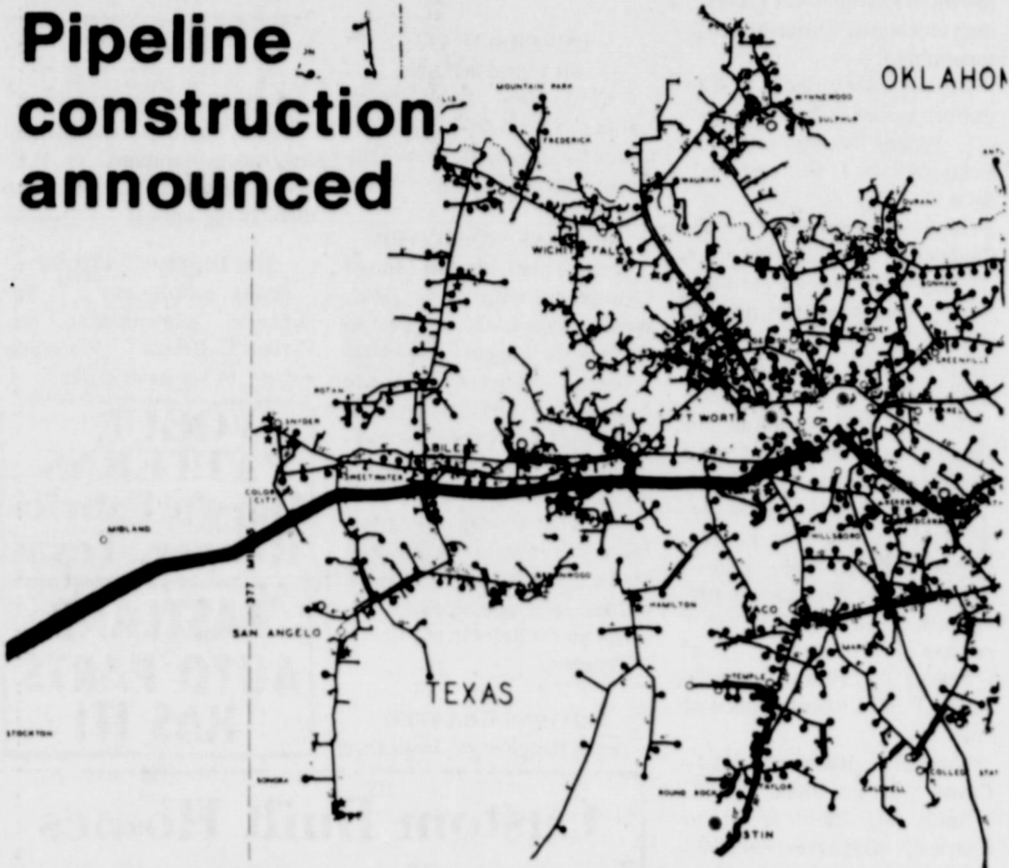

## Pipeline construction announced



The 36-inch \$70 million pipeline will run from West Texas and connect into the Lone Star transmission system south of Dallas.

## Through Eastland County

Lone Star Gas Company has announced plans to lay a large diameter gas transmission pipeline to the Delaware Basin in West Texas. According to an announcement by President W. C. McCord, the line will be about 400 miles long, connecting the Delaware Basin with the center of the company's transmission and distribution systems in Texas.

The pipeline will tie into the Pecos Growers Gas Company's Coyoanosa Gasoline Plant in West Texas and will connect into Lone Star's transmission system south of Dallas. Lone Star will use four contract spreads of about 100 miles for construction of the pipeline. Construction of the pipeline will be supervised by Norman Stone, engineering department superintendent, Transmission Division.

## \$171,000 Library-Civic Center Proposed To City Commission

### No Action on Lone Star Hike

The Eastland City Commission in a three-hour session Monday evening declined action on Lone Star Gas Co.'s request for a 10 percent rate hike; heard recommendations on construction and finance for a \$171,000 civic center - library; and handled routine business.

The City has joined a group of other cities engaging an accounting firm to do a study on the proposed gas hike and is awaiting word from the firm before taking action. Lone Star declined an offered six percent increase by the city.

City Manager Lewis Tiner was asked to write Lone Star complimenting the presentation made by Local Manager D.L. May in the manner in which he presented his company's case. The City Father's reluctance to grant the increase hinges on the fact that the company was given a 20.5 increase in 1969.

Mayor Durel Reid briefly outlined his committee's civic center - library work since its inception last February when the then Mayor James Reid named him to head a group to consider the feasibility of a new center.

In regular meetings since that time with representatives from each of the service - civic - club organizations, Mayor Reid explained that it had been decided that professional guidance was needed to coordinate the efforts and to propose what is needed here.

GET A CHECK-UP!

An architectural firm, Huelppelshouser Associates of Fort Worth, was engaged for a preliminary study. Fee to be \$1,500 and R.L. Darrow of the firm made a report Monday

afternoon to the overall committee and to the commission Monday evening.

Proposed is a 6,193 square foot community center and combination, 2,118 square foot library, plus additional circulation area of 831 feet for a

total of 9,142 square feet. The library area would provide immediate stack area for 15,000 volumes, expandable up to some 22,000.

The firm reported that ideal site would be a 180 by 260 foot tract immediately west of the

old gymnasium which the school board voted Monday night to sell to the city for \$1. Overall cost for the furnished, air conditioned building would be \$171,000 Darrow explained.

Also present was Noel Johnson, independent securities broker, who explained that his firm would handle the plans for financing for a fee of \$3,000, and that initially there would be no need for a tax increase assuming the city could defer funds now going to capital improvements (roughly \$1,000 a month for the sanitary landfill tractor through September of next year) to retirement of its debt, until such time as the assessed valuation is raised. The city is presently collecting the maximum tax, but valuations are only approximately one-fourth of actual value. (The 1971 assessed valuation was \$2,802,000.) Mr. Johnson said that no state or federal funds are available for this type project.

It was agreed that the committee will be asked to meet with the commission to discuss the plans further before action is taken.

In other action, the commission set date for the equalization board for Thursday, July 13, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Agreed to buy the buildings of the Tri-City Ready Mix plant in the southeast part of town.

Agreed to explore getting the city's water supply approved by the State Health Dept. in order to facilitate the hospital's application for expansion and modernization.

## National Living Centers Leases Hickman Homes

### 30-Bed Expansion Due at Eastland

#### Construction To Begin Soon

National Living Centers, Inc. (NLC), has negotiated two lease agreements which extend the company's operations in its primary fields of nursing centers and child day care centers.

Through an agreement with Thomas E. Hickman, National Living Centers has added five nursing homes to its growing system of nursing and convalescent centers now totaling 33 facilities with more than 3,100 beds. The 15-year agreement, effective June 1, 1972, carries an option to renew for an additional 10 years.

The five facilities located in the Texas towns of Goldthwaithe, Eastland, Cisco, Brownwood and Bangs, contain 359 beds, and 30 additional beds are under construction in the Cisco facility. The addition of the initial 359 beds represents a 13 percent increase in the number of beds operated by National Living Centers, Inc., one of the ten largest operators of nursing centers and child day care centers in the nation.

The second lease agreement announced today by National

Living Centers extends its operations in the child day care field. Also effective June 1, 1972, is a five year agreement to lease The Colonnades Day School, located at 5801 Dashwood in Houston. This agreement is renewable upon option for two additional five year periods.

The day care center is licensed to care for 70 children and will be operated by the company's wholly-owned subsidiary, Playcare Centers of America, Inc. The child care subsidiary now operates five centers and has two currently under construction.

J. Livingston Kosberg, president of NLC, noted that "The successful second issuance of common stock in our company which netted \$1,874,000 in proceeds to the company and a substantial increase of 40 percent in revenues for the third quarter of this fiscal year as compared to the same period a year ago form the basis for a new expansion thrust of which the two agreements announced today are the beginning."

### 'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden dismemberment.

When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

### Court Cases Decreased In 1971

AUSTIN - The number of cases filed in district court in Eastland County during 1971 was 7 per cent less than the number filed during 1970, according to statistics released by the Texas Civil Judicial Council.

Cases filed during the last calendar year totaled 343, including 105 criminal and 238 civil.

Judge Earl Conner, Jr., of the 91st District Court has jurisdiction in Eastland County.

The local district court disposed of 297 cases during 1971, 46 per cent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1970. At the end of the year, 354 cases were pending on the docket.

Statewide, the 245 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced a 7 per cent increase in filings - 278,338 cases from 260,171 in 1970. One-fourth of these were criminal cases.

These state courts disposed of 51 per cent of the total cases filed in 1971 or carried over from 1970. The defendant entered a guilty plea in 47 per cent of the criminal cases disposed of. In the cases disposed of by a jury verdict, 78 per cent of the defendants were found guilty and 22 per cent acquitted.

Of the 272, 2341 cases pending throughout the state at the end of 1971, 16 per cent had been on the docket 12 to 24 months and 24.5 per cent had been pending over two years.

### 'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disablement.

When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

# City Joins Group To Study Gas Hike Proposal

The City of Eastland has joined a group engaging an accounting firm to study proposed gas rate increases and has paid a fee of \$193.50 for the joint study.

The following is an explanation of the details of the program:

Dear Mayor and Councilmen:

Recently, you indicated an interest in joining together with other cities served by the Lone Star Gas Company for the purpose of determining an equitable schedule of gas rates for your city through the process of retaining a rate consultant qualified to analyze and make recommendations concerning the application which you now have for a gas rate increase.

The Texas Municipal League, working with several City Managers within the Lone Star Gas Company service area, has made arrangements by which a well known firm in Dallas can be retained to prepare analyses of the various customer city rate adjustment applications. The firm is Shimek, Roming, Jacobs & Finklea of Dallas, which has agreed to perform the following services for the interested customer cities:

1. Examine each individual application and prior application.
2. Make a preliminary analysis of each application to determine whether the various elements of the application are sufficiently supported.
3. Identify those elements of the application which may need justification in addition to that submitted.
