Many hurdles have been topped in the long-range planning for expansion and modernization of Eastland Memorial Hospital, but apparently there are to be others to come.

"We're closer, of course", Administrator Mrs. Helga Tiner said Friday afternoon, "but there's still a lot of work to be done."

Commenting on announcements this week regarding tentative approval for government grants, Mrs. Tiner explained that the entire process is complicated and is requiring "mountains of paper work" in complying with requirements.

The grants do come as more or less a "wind-fall" for Eastland Memorial at this time, but the hospital board and staff have been working on expansion and modernization plans for over four years, and the enormous amount of detail work that has already been done is believed to be instrumental in advancing the local hospital's chance for help.

Board President Charles Freyschlag, the board, the hospital staff and medical staff have worked diligently providing information and projections in compliance with the various agencies responsible for handling the grants and loans.

Architects are Killebrew, Rucker and Associates of Wichita Falls, and E.C. Johnston, C.P.A., of Eastland are constantly providing data to the agencies.

Provisions call for 43 new beds and modernization of 41 existing beds, and ancillary departments (surgery, kitchen, etc.) including all phases except the actual hospital bed. Stipulations are that modernization must be funded, one-half from grant and one-half from loans. All new work must be from the loans.

A further designation requires that government money can only pay 90 percent of the total of eligible work, leaving ten percent to be paid by the hospital for eligible projects and 100 percent of the ineligible work. (All development is not eligible under the programs.)

The recent tentative approval of a \$515,000 federal grant brings to \$1,840,000 the total outside aid the hospital might expect to get. Actual allocation of the funds won't be made until revised application for the money is made through the Hill-Burton program, the federal program under which health facilities may begin new construction or remodel existing facilities.

Hill-Burton loans totaling \$1,625,000 were tentatively approved for the hospital in March, and a grant of \$160,000 came in May.

The hospital is running at capacity and reported 72 patients Wednesday, 75 Thursday and 71 Friday.

To cope with the overcrowding, Eastland Memorial converted all private rooms to semi-private rooms to accommodate admissions in excess of hospital capacity.

To apply for federal assistance, according to Mrs. Tiner, the hospital had to submit a detailed report of its operations, with specifications for expansion and modernization of the current building. One new wing will be added to the structure to house the new beds.

Remodeling of ancillary departments includes such items as expansion and updating of surgical suites, modernization of dietary and administrative offices and fire proofing the ceilings. The self-study showed Eastland

Memorial to be below state standards of construction in these respects. According to Mrs. Tiner, the number of patients a day was too high for the amount of space available in the hospital.

Hospital personnel runs shorthanded, Mrs. Tiner said, as it does in most hospitals in the nation. Five doctors staff the hospital.

When final approval of the funds goes through, Mrs. Tiner said, the hospital administration will review the

needs of the hospital to determine specifically where and how much of the funds will be spent.

Mrs. Tiner said she hoped construction could begin before the year's end.

Since application forms for

the federal Hill-Burton program have changed since the hospital first applied, Mrs. Tiner has been compiling the additional information as to budget, census, operating costs and the like which the new form requires.

Screwworm Cases Reported In County

Two cases of screwworms were found in Eastland County last week reported County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. He said there were the first confirmed cases of screwworms in Eastland County in six or seven years.

One case was found near Gorman and the other near Rising Star. The confirmed cases are being treated by releasing sterile flies. These sterile flies mate with native screwworm flies causing the flies' eggs to be infertile. "Hot-spot" treatments consists of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case. Fly releases are also being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile in a major portion of Eastland County.

Weather condition were favorable for heavy screwworm buildups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the South-west, explains the agent. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive

screwworm invasion. According to Gordon, more than 5,000 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring and summer, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak - 200 million a week - treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest. Gordon urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) to follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall.

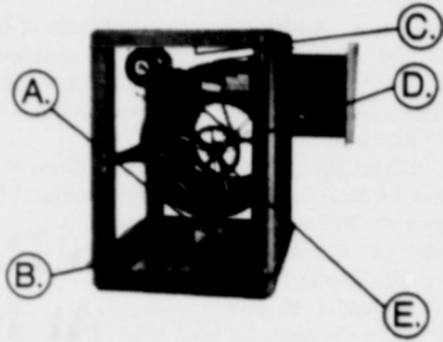

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'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disengagement.

When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

Gordon pot

The rains last week were badly needed in Eastland County. Peanut growers say they were just right. Peanut planting had reached a standstill because of inadequate moisture in the planting zone. Now the moisture is there and peanut planting has continued at a rapid rate.

We have had several calls recently from home gardeners who report their tomatoes have rotten spots on one end. This is a disease called blossom-end rot. The symptoms are dark, sunken, leathery spots that appear on blossom-end of green fruits. The spots vary in size, sometimes affecting half the fruit. This is a physiological

disease caused by fluctuating moisture supply and lack of available calcium.

Some methods of control is to add adequate limestone to calcium deficient soils. Use adapted varieties. Adding calcium chloride to the spray or the use of calcium nitrate as a sidedressing may be beneficial. Maintain uniform soil moisture supply. Calcium Chloride and Calcium nitrate may be difficult to find locally.

Add Eastland County to the list of counties that have had screwworm cases confirmed. We received a one page list of counties that sent in worms which were identified as screwworms last Thursday.

Eastland County was one of 90 counties on the list. We have received no other information concerning the location of this case.

All cattlemen should put off all operations such as dehorning, castrating and branding until this fall when cold weather arrives. A wound is an open invitation for a screwworm fly to lay her eggs. Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program report that almost 90 percent of all confirmed screwworm cases are from man-made wounds and the navels of young calves.

Do you have trouble growing magnolias? Everett Janne, Extension Landscape Horticulturist, tells us why we have problems with magnolias.

First, magnolias are not well adapted to areas of low humidity and alkaline soils. They are native to the acid soil regions of the United States including East Texas.

Any attempt to grow them in our area demands excellent soil

preparation prior to planting. Incorporate at least one part of sphagnum peat moss for every two parts of soil in the backfill. In tight soils some type of drainage system should be installed to provide a means for excess moisture to move out of the area.

The incorporation of three to five pounds of sulfur per 100 square feet should be in-

corporated in the upper foot of soil at the planting site. Annual applications of one to three pounds of sulfur per 100 square feet of area can be used to maintain a more desirable pH in soils of this area.

It will do little good to apply iron compounds such as iron chelates or iron sulfate to the soil without lowering the pH with sulfur. Foliar applications of the iron compounds is more

productive than soil applications. Use one ounce of iron sulfate (copperas) per two gallons of water adding about one tablespoon of household detergent. Wet the foliage

thoroughly with the spray applying in late afternoon so it has an opportunity to be absorbed by the leaves before the hot sun strikes the foliage
