# Construction Underway On New 120-Bed Eastland Manor Home

## Health-Care Services Continue Expansion

### Completion Due In 90 Days

Further expansion of Eastland's medical and health care facilities was evidenced Wednesday with the beginning of construction of a new Eastland Manor Nursing Home.

The new facility will be a virtual duplicate, but larger copy of the existing Eastland Manor. Administrator Eugene Frost announces. To be built on a site Administrator Eugene Frost announces.

To be built on a site immediately due east of the Eastland Elementary School, and South of W. Sadosa St., the modern home will probably face west, so that residents may enjoy the activities of the students on the playground.

The new home will offer facilities for 120 residents. Applications are being accepted by Mr. Frost now for employment and residents, he said.

The present Eastland Manor is operating a capacity 102 residents. It is located between West Main and West Commerce in the 1400 block.

Clearing of the new site

began Wednesday and opening is planned in 90 days, Mr. Frost said.

"The expanding need for top

nursing home facilities here prompts us to add another unit here," Mr. Frost said.

"We will offer 24-hour

nursing care and provide services for all types of patient care," he said.

Eastland Manor opened January 17, 1971, and has enjoyed a warm reception continually.

The new home will be built and furnished by BJB&R Construction Co. of Abilene and will be operated by Eastland

Manor Inc., a corporation made up of Mr. Frost, R. W. McDonnell of Abilene and Billie Joe Browning of Greenville.

Mrs. Frost is Associate Administrator.

The new home will open with 25 employees and will go up to 60 or 70 at full occupancy, Mr. Frost said.

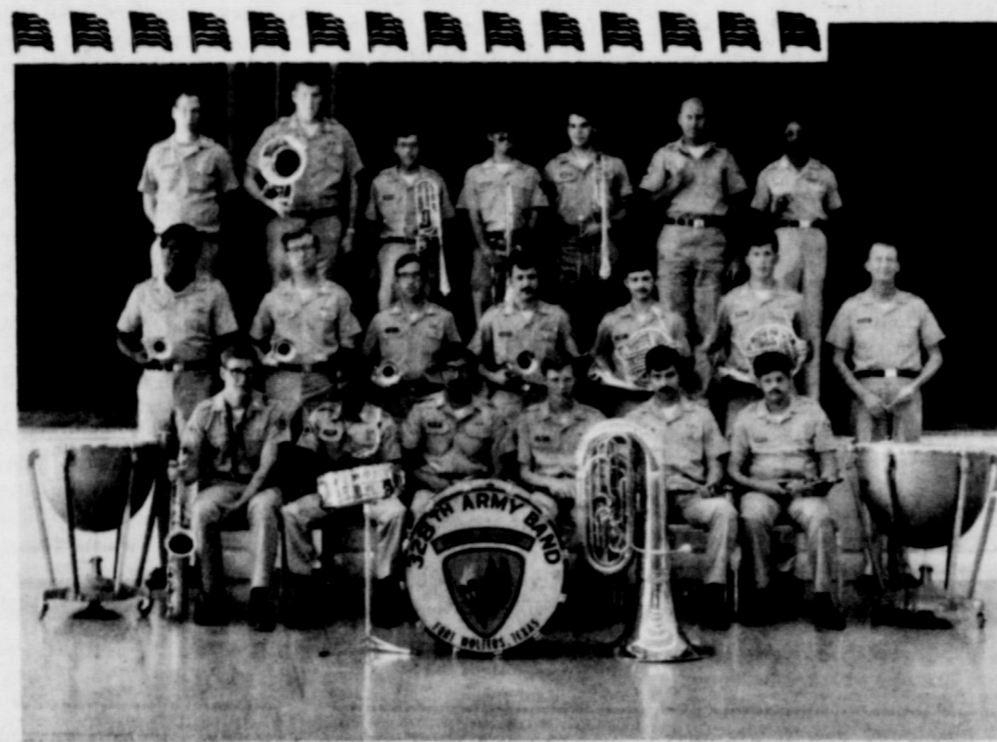
At the Eastland Manor

Homes, residents enjoy home-like atmosphere with beautiful furnishings and recreational facilities. The buildings are completely fire retardant and fire protected by automatic fire warning devices.

The cost at Eastland Manor homes under the State Medicaid program is the same as for all nursing homes, he

said.

Private rooms have private baths, dining rooms, recreational rooms, chapel, beauty-barber shops, isolation rooms, examination rooms, organ cable TV in color, therapy, game tables, fire control doors, pianos and recreational programs are provided.

the Ft. Worth-Dallas area is the 328th Army Band at the U. S. Army Primary Helicopter Center and School. Based at Fort Wolters near Mineral Wells, the band is the Army's musical representative in the populous North Texas area.

Besides their principle duty of participating in numerous formal ceremonies and entertainment connected with helicopter pilot training, the band has played in scores of communities in the area for such events as rodeo parades, community festivals, patriotic events, and programs for government agencies.

An important facet of the band's activity is its series of performances in area high schools. The purpose of the school concerts is to promote appreciation of live musical performance, to entertain, and to improve the Army's image in the eyes of the younger generation. The band plays a fast moving program of symphonic and show music interspersed with individual and group soloists. At least 20 of the musicians of the Fort Wolters band are former members of some of the area's fine college and high school

bands. Several bandmen have degrees in music and are qualified school band directors.

The bandmaster, Chief Warrant Officer Herbert J. Bilhartz, is from San Antonio, and is a graduate of the music department of the University of Texas at Austin.

The band will then present a musical presentation of three numbers.

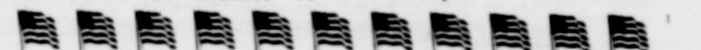

We observe June 14th as flag day, as it is the official birthday of the flag of the United States of America, which is its correct full name.

On June 14, 1777, Congress passed the following: Resolved that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white on a blue field - representing a new Constellation. This made Old Glory our official flag.

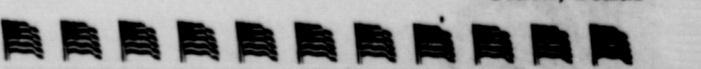

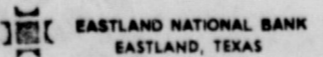

## Briscoe, Sanders, Creighton Triumph In Second Primary

The county voting almost exactly mirrored the state results and three local races were decided Saturday, with

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the fourth local contest made Tuesday on the flip of a coin.

Of county-wide interest is the election of L.T. Owen as new County Commissioner from Rising Star Precinct. He defeated Curt Smith, 426 - 383.

In Cisco, Former Police Chief S.E. Parkinson polled 693 votes to defeat B.W. Carr, who got 462 votes, for Constable of that precinct.

In Rising Star, Arley Bibby got 425 votes to win over W.H. Kornegay's 378 for constable in that precinct.

The county went for Barefoot Sanders over Ralph Yarborough, giving Sanders 2,490 and Yarborough 1,871.

It turned out to be Briscoe's county too, with 3,053 votes for him and only 1,340 for Farenthold for state governor.

Hobby got 2,538 to win over Connally's 1,839 for Lt. Governor.

Calvert got 2,284 and Wilson 1,994 for state comptroller.

Sen. Tom Creighton polled 2,869 votes in the county to Tom Holmes' 1,422 to help re-elect Creighton to the State Senate.

County Republicans voted in three boxes - Eastland, Cisco and Rising Star - and gave Grover 23 votes and Fay, 3 for the GOP gubernatorial nomination.

The county strength in the first primary was 5,470 to the run off turnout was considered very heavy. And returns came in record - swift with the courthouse counting crew finished by 8 p.m.

The fourth local contest was an unusual party situation. The race for Precinct 2 Democratic chairman in Eastland County, which ended in a tie between

Jim Everett won the coin toss to be nominated as Olden Democratic Precinct Chairman at the 2 p.m. meeting in the County Courtroom where results were canvassed.

### L.T. Owen County Comm., Prec. 3



L.T. Owen was elected County Commissioner, Precinct 3 in the run off election Saturday, June 3 with a vote of 422 over his opponent Curt Smith with 380 votes.

Mr. Owen, age 42, moved to Rising Star in 1943. He was born and raised in the Okra and Longbranch communities. He has been in the trucking business here for several years.

L.T. is married to the former Josie Hogan and they have three sons, Johnny, 20; Robert, 14; and Bill, 9½ years old. They are members of the Church of Christ.

He will assume the duties of County Commissioner Thursday, June 8.

incumbent Dr. Dick Hodges and Jim Everett in Saturday's runoff elections, was decided by a coin toss at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the county commissioners office, according to county chairman A.E. Crawley.

Crawley said the county executive committee canvassed the runoff vote and "cast lots" to determine the winner between Dr. Hodges

and Everett, each of whom received 66 votes Saturday.

According to County Clerk Johnson Smith, neither man was on the May 6 primary election ballot. The two received a majority in a three way write-in campaign, he explained, placing their names in the runoff.

Smith pointed out that Article 13.26 of the election code, which governs the runoff tie vote situation, says that the winner shall be selected by casting lots, but does not specify the method to be used.

### Peanut Pageant June 15

The date for the fourth annual Eastland County Peanut Princess Pageant has been set for June 15, 1972. Sponsored by the Woman's Study Club of Gorman, the pageant will be staged in the Gorman High School Auditorium at 8:00 p.m.

Informational letters, rules and entry blanks have been mailed to clubs and other non-profit organizations throughout Eastland County. Entries, together with the \$10 entry fee, must be returned to the Woman's Study Club by June 1st.

Awards this year will again be \$200 cash award to first place winner, the honor of being Eastland County Peanut Princess, and the opportunity to compete in the Texas Peanut Queen Contest to be staged in Eastland on August 5. Second place will receive a cash award of \$100. Third place will receive a cash award of \$50. These cash awards are courtesy of Eastland County merchants.

Miss Kay Hoffmann of Eastland was selected Eastland County Princess in June, 1971, at the pageant in Gorman and then the talented young lady was selected Texas Peanut Queen in the State Contest. ### \$88,620 Okayed For NYCProject

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of \$88,620 in neighborhood youth corporation fund to Eastland County School at Eastland for summer work opportunities for 210 enrollees from low income families during the summer. The summer job program will start soon after the school term ends and will run for 9 weeks at 20 hrs. a week for each youth.

The summer job and community service activities will pay \$1.60 hr. for 234 hrs.

The goal of the summer program is to provide earnings, work experience and supportive services to poor family youth to stay in school, and potential drop outs to encourage them to return to school next fall.

## Voc-Ag Program Is Year-Round

The Vocational Agriculture program of Eastland High School is a twelve month program and many phases of the work and activities of the 53 members of the Future Farmers of America will continue during the summer months. Directing the work and activities is Don Griffin Vocational Agriculture Teacher and FFA Advisor.

Supervising students with their crop and livestock projects and making plans and securing livestock for prospective students is a very important part of Vocational Agriculture Education's summer program.

Other summer activities include collecting and filing teacher material, developing teaching plans, developing department and FFA budget, securing new tools and shop equipment, rearranging classrooms and making necessary local and state reports. Also, work with adult and young farmers of the community will continue, placing emphasis on conducting disease and insect control practices. New and improved farming and livestock practices will be instituted. Meetings and plans of the local Advisory Council on Vocational Agriculture Education will also be conducted.

The Eastland Chapter of the Future Farmers of America will conduct monthly summer meetings and will take part in the State FFA Convention on July 12 - 14, 1972, in Dallas, Texas. Activities and accomplishments of the Chapter will be released to the news media. The Vocational Agriculture Teachers Conference, sponsored by the Texas Education Agency, will be held in Fort Worth, Texas, August 1 - 4, 1972.

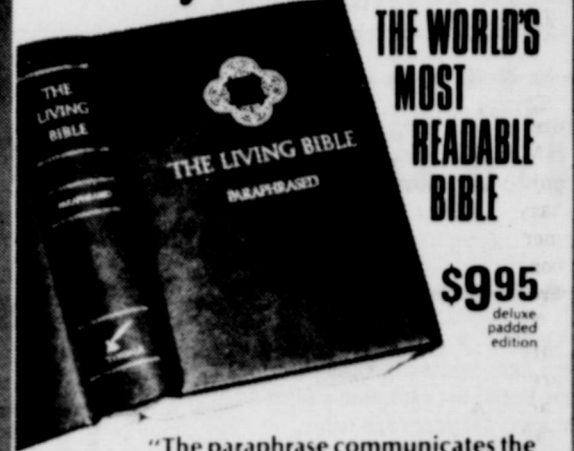

**'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun**

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disabement.

When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.

Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.

Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

**Gordon pot**

The early growing season is resulting in some abundant early crops of fruit and vegetables in the county. A.C. Hardin of Carbon says he weighed 18 white Irish potatoes from his garden and they weighed 18 1/2 pounds - averaged just over a pound each. Others are reporting nice crops of vegetables.

The peach crop is one of the best ever. Peaches are ripening about two weeks earlier, than usual. Chester Marrs of the

Chaney Community had about 14 bushels of Sentinel peaches ready to sell last Wednesday. He had more still to be harvested.

Dr. Arlie Powell, Extension Horticulturist was with us Wednesday. He said the type of peaches Chester had were selling for eight to twelve dollars per bushel on the wholesale market in Dallas. The peaches can be purchased for a much less price. Did you know that 29c per pound is equivalent to \$15.00 per bushel?

The moisture supply has been ideal for the last month for good vegetable and fruit production. It's been just right in most areas for peanut planting too. Some areas of the county need

rain now, but the Southwest corner of the county around Pioneer got a good 1 1/2 inch rain Monday, May 29th. We looked at C.E. Barton's pecans in that area last Thursday. At this stage the pecan crop looks like it will be one of the best ever, of course a lot of things can happen, but the potential is there.

A campaign announced by Secretary of Agriculture Butz urges all owners of horses, mules and other equines to have them vaccinated for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE). The campaign includes: (1) all states, (2) all equines not vaccinated last year, (3) all foals vaccinated last year before six months of age should now be revaccinated as yearlings, (4) any other equines whose vaccination status is doubtful, revaccination is not dangerous, (5) commercial vaccines will be available through the veterinarian.

Horses previously vaccinated with the government vaccine may be safely revaccinated with the commercially available product, which must be administered by a qualified veterinarian. Vaccination of foals under two weeks of age and pregnant mares is not recommended unless they are in imminent risk of VEE infection. Since commercial vaccine is now available, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will not furnish vaccine or pay inoculation fees except for possible emergency conditions.

Horse owners should report all sick animals, especially those showing symptoms of fever, loss of appetite, depression, stupor, weakness, staggering, blindness and undetermined death. More than 60 percent of the horses infected with VEE die. There is no cross protection between VEE vaccination and the vaccines for the Eastern and Western forms of encephalomyelitis.

**Range Tour Will Be Held June 22 In Albany**

A grazing system which has resulted in increased grass production, more efficient harvest, and increased livestock production will be demonstrated on a range tour to be held near Albany on June 22, 1972, at 10:00 a.m. according to Lendon Parker, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Albany.

The tour, which will be sponsored by the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, the Lower Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service, will take place at the Lucky Ranch, six miles south of Albany on Highway 380. The Lucky Ranch is owned by H.R. Stasney.

"More than fifty people have traveled from across the State," Parker said, "to see this High Intensity - Low Frequency Grazing System which, along with a range improvement program, has nearly doubled the stocking rate in three years time on this ranch."

High Intensity - Low Frequency systems on the Lucky Ranch and others at Throckmorton, San Angelo, Water Valley, Sonora, and Barnhart that have been in for two or more years have drawn statewide attention because they are showing such benefits

**Federal Trade Commission**

Some two years ago congressional hearings helped spotlight abuses in connection with sweepstakes prizes offered but never awarded in mail offerings.

Last year the Federal Trade Commission secured agreements from some of the large promoters in which the companies agreed to award all offered prizes. Several other companies voluntarily adopted the same policy. Still my office continues to receive complaints

concerning fake puzzle contests. Some of these complaints center around contests which are "free" but some involve contests in which it costs to participate. A typical example of the latter type is the puzzle in which a contestant is asked to identify word and picture clues such as "The opposite of white is....." "Five plus three equals....." and "The moon comes out at....."

Using the first letter of each of the above words the entrant would then have to spell out and select the correct first name of a famous American whose picture would be shown. There might be clues given such as "He helped write the Declaration of Independence" - "He flew a kite in a storm with a key tied to the tail and discovered electricity." You would have to fill in the first name.... with the last name of Franklin being given. Possible choices for names as shown in an accompanying list might be - Ben - Ted - Ike - Pat - and Max. It would be very difficult for even a fifth grade child to fail to solve a puzzle as simple as this one.

After the entrant sends in his solution, he is informed that he is officially tied for first place in the contest. All persons who have sent in the correct solutions are notified that there will be a series of tie - breakers which they must solve to be eligible for a prize but if the contestant wants to qualify for an even larger prize, they are asked to enclose \$2 to \$5 for each tie - breaker.

The scheme is that while the initial puzzle and most of the early tie - breakers are ridiculously easy, as you get to the end of the tie - breakers, the puzzles become so difficult that even an extraordinary person would have only a faint chance of coming up with the correct solution.

**AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - AT THE END OF LAST WEEK'S release, reference was made to "affirmative orders" issued by a court. Essentially this is an injunction against an individual who is found to be pursuing a course of conduct which is legally wrong and is harmful to another. Courts possess the power in appropriate cases to grant relief by issuing an order prohibiting such actions in the future. "Affirmative orders", however, may go one step further. Not only is future conduct proscribed, but the court requires affirmative action designed to undo the wrong previously committed.

THIS IS WELL AND GOOD. But, when the wrongdoer is a government agency, the requirement that it take a specific course of action, transfers decision - making from the legislative to the judicial branch.

AS AN EXAMPLE, THIS TECHNIQUE has been employed extensively in school desegregation cases. Schools are not only being ordered to stop acts and policies which tend to discriminate against racial minorities but also are being affirmatively directed with regard to a wide range of future school policies such as the location of district boundaries, the sites of specific schools, the racial composition of teachers and students within each school, the busing of students by racial quotas to a particular school, the propriety of text books and materials, testing methods etc.

THE CONGRESS HAS ENACTED numerous laws against discrimination by reason of race, creed, sex and previous origin. It has also declared that public funds shall not be used to bus students simply to achieve racial balance in schools. The Supreme Court has either ignored the acts of Congress or held them unconstitutional,

presumably because the majority of the Justices thought the law should be otherwise.

REGARDLESS OF WHETHER IT SHOULD or should not, it is not the prerogative of the courts to decide how tax money should be channeled.

SPACE DOES NOT PERMIT A FULL discussion of the separation of powers of all three branches of the Federal Government - the Executive, Legislative and Judicial. Since almost the beginning there has been controversy and argument on what the separation should be and the extent of overlapping authority. For instance there is now the issue of the President withholding certain funds appropriated by the Congress for specific purposes. The Congress provides the funds - the Executive spends. No more money can be spent that is appropriated but the President and Presidents in the past contend that all funds provided need not be spent.

IN RECENT DAYS, AMENDMENTS TO BILLS in the House of Representatives proposed that funds be withheld from Executive Agencies whose representative refuses to testify before Congressional Committees under executive immunity.

AFTER ALL, EVERY PART OF GOVERNMENT certainly should be dedicated to work for the good of the Nation, and they do, but our system is based on the "checks and balances" previously mentioned. Each branch must be tempered by restraint and discretion, the foundation upon which national respect for Governmental authority largely depends.

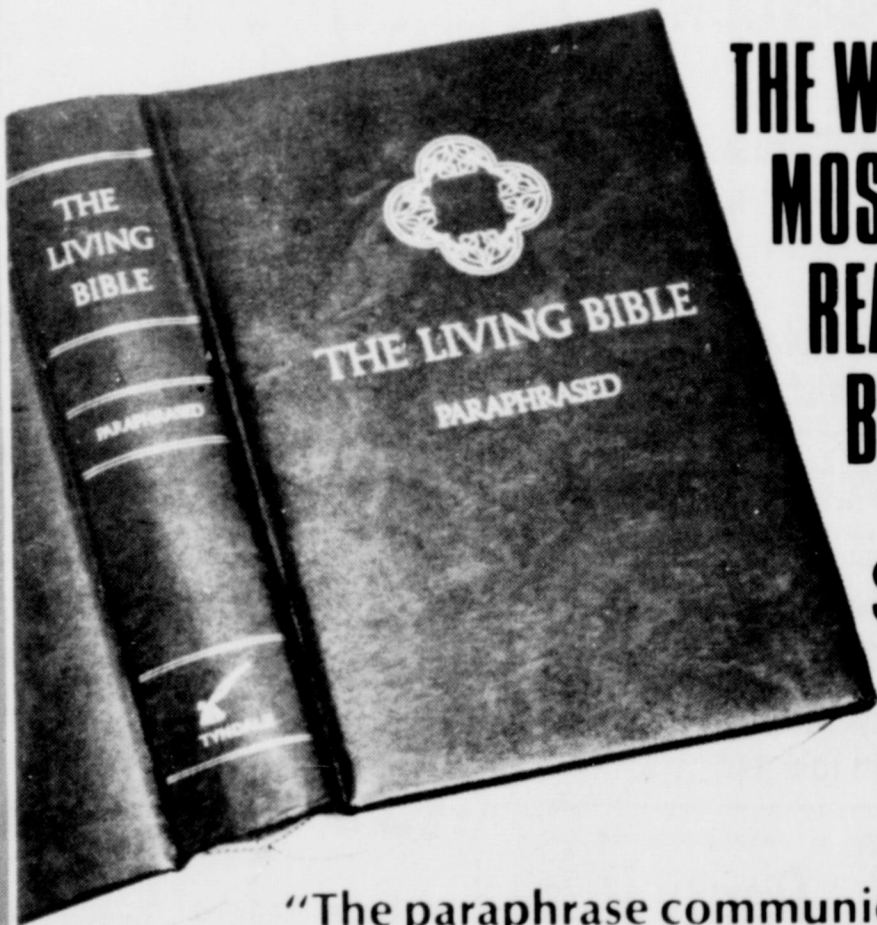

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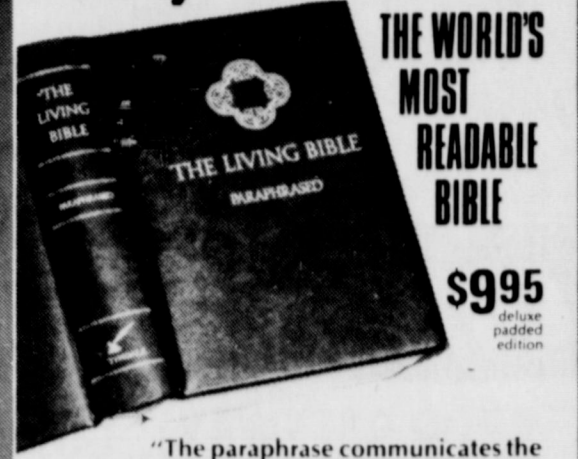
