TEXAS CRUDE oil production in 1971 topped one billion barrels for the seventh consecutive year as reserves fell toward the 13 billion barrel mark, according to a study by the Texas Mid - Continent Oil and Gas Assn.

Texas oil wells produced 1,210,818,658 barrels last year, bringing the state's 82 - year production total to 35.3 billion barrels. Reserves dropped 172,000 barrels.

"With producers unable to increase drilling activities, additional oil supplies in Texas hinge on recovering more oil from existing fields," Robert A. Buschman, Association president, commented. Secondary recovery units in Scurry County contributed a major portion of the county's 5.5 million barrel increase in 1971, which jumped the county to No. one in Texas.

Eastland County oil wells have produced 122,827,665 barrels since recorded production began in 1917. The county in 1971 produced 848 barrels a day for a total of 309,600 barrels.

Fourteen Texas counties produced more than 25 million barrels last year. The top three were Scurry, 73 million barrels; Ector, 69 million barrels; and Andrews, 67 million barrels. The top three counties in cumulative production are Gregg, 2.2 billion barrels; Ector, 1.7 billion barrels; and Andrews, 1.5 billion barrels.

## Staff Water Final Planning Underway

Final checking is underway and the last of the easements are being rounded up in preparation for seeking bids to construct the Staff Water Supply System, according to an announcement here.

Approximately 300 customers will be served by the Staff Water Supply Corp.

Persons still holding easements are urged to get them returned as soon as possible. Farmers Home Administration Director E.L. Foster reports. (One easement is being awaited by air mail from Arabia, he said.)

It is hoped that bids may be advertised for soon, with opening to be possibly during the last week of June. Engineers are checking and making final maps and specifications in preparation for the bidders.

The Staff system is in three

segments: some 57 customers in the Kokomo, Bear Creek and Flatwood area will be served on lines off the Carbon main; some 56 are in the La Casa area, north of Ranger; and approximately 180 in the immediate Staff area.

After bids are open, contractor will be given ten days to begin work, and job is expected to take some 180 days, meaning that water could be turned on about Jan. 1. O.M. Boyle, local FHA supervisor reports.

The system includes two storage tanks, (a 50,000 and a 75,000 gallon) and one pump station, to be situated at La Casa.

The Staff system was originated on April 17, 1967, and because of its long time planning, held a high government priority.

Cecil Reeves is president and Alvis Ingram, vice president of

the corporation. Jimmy Little is secretary - treasurer. Directors are Tom Morgan, E.F. Arterburn, Cody McDaniel and Larry Herrington.

The original corporation signers paid \$50 each, and those who signed after April 1, this year, paid \$100 each. Others signing up now will pay \$100 plus installation, which will average some \$85 if they can be added feasible to the system.

The entire system comprises some 81 miles of from eight to two inch lines.

The Staff system will bring to four the number of water corporations in the county. The Morton Valley system has 110 customers; Carbon, 110; and Olden, 131; bringing to 651 the number of families served, or approximately 2,604 individuals benefitting from the water program.

There are presently 88,000

meters in Texas on similar programs in 750 different systems.

The early growing season is resulting in some abundant early crops of fruit and vegetables in the county. A.C. Hardin of Carbon says he weighed 18 white Irish potatoes from his garden and they weighed 18½ pounds - averaged just over a pound each. Others are reporting nice crops of vegetables.

The peach crop is one of the best ever. Peaches are ripening about two weeks earlier, than usual. Chester Marrs of the Chaney Community had about 14 bushels of Sentinel peaches ready to sell last Wednesday. He had more still to be harvested.

Dr. Arlie Powell, Extension Horticulturist was with us

Wednesday. He said the type of peaches Chester had were selling for eight to twelve dollars per bushel on the wholesale market in Dallas. The peaches can be purchased for a much less price. Did you know that 29c per pound is equivalent to \$15.00 per bushel?

The moisture supply has been ideal for the last month for good vegetable and fruit production. It's been just right in most areas for peanut planting too. Some areas of the county need rain now, but the Southwest corner of the county around Pioneer got a good 1½ inch rain Monday, May 29th. We looked at C.E. Barton's pecans in that area last Thursday. At this stage the pecan crop looks like it will be one of the best ever, of

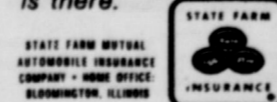

course a lot of things can happen, but the potential is there.

A campaign announced by Secretary of Agriculture Butz urges all owners of horses, mules and other equines to have them vaccinated for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE). The campaign includes: (1) all states, (2) all equines not vaccinated last year, (3) all foals vaccinated last year before six months of age should now be revaccinated as yearlings, (4) any other equines whose vaccination status is doubtful, revaccination is not dangerous, (5) commercial vaccines will be available through the veterinarian.

Horses previously vaccinated with the government vaccine may be safely revaccinated with the commercially available product, which must be administered by a qualified veterinarian. Vaccination of foals under two weeks of age and pregnant mares is not recommended unless they are in imminent risk of VEE infection. Since commercial vaccine is now available, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will not furnish vaccine or pay inoculation fees except for possible emergency conditions.

Horse owners should report all sick animals, especially those showing symptoms of fever, loss of appetite, depression, stupor, weakness, staggering, blindness and undetermined death. More than

60 percent of the horses infected with VEE die. There is no cross protection between VEE vaccination and the vaccines for the Eastern and Western forms of encephalomyelitis.

Summer time is a busy time for the homemakers who are canning and freezing fruit and vegetables! This year there has been a bumper crop of apricots. Recently visited at the Dave Fambrough home in Eastland and such a lovely home orchard! The trees were loaded

with apricots, peaches, and plums.

For different jam recipes you might like to try **Pineapple and Apricot Jam**. The recipe is:  
2 1/2 lbs. fresh apricots (7 cups sliced)  
5 cups sugar  
3 cups crushed pineapple.

Wash and slice apricots, mix with sugar and pineapple (fruit juice). Cook until desired consistency (about 25 minutes). Pour into sterilized jars and seal while hot.

**'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun**

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

- Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.
- If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.
- Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.
- Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.
- Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.
- Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disabement.
- When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.
- Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.
- Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.
- Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.
- Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

**West Texan Says Climate Different In South America**

BARRANQUILLA, Colombia - A West Texan living in a city in the Caribbean coastal country of South America will probably notice first the rain. It falls once or twice daily in good volume during the late spring and summer months. And the temperature is something like that at Corpus Christi in July - warm and humid.

After a week, we are pretty well situated for a two months' stay. We have a two bedroom apartment in a modern stone building with two room air conditioners and all of the necessities. We have learned where to tune in the Voice of America on the SW Radio for the news of the USA each night. The dozen or so local radio stations and the one television station all use the Spanish language.

Taxis are pretty reasonable and we get around in them. There are lots of old US cars and a good many small cars here. The local government charges a duty of 200 to 300 percent of the cost of cars and this makes them pretty expensive.

Meals are more reasonable at restaurants here than in the USA. Haven't seen any menus with hamburgers on them yet. Their super markets are adequate but not very super when you compare them with those at home. Hospitals and medical facilities seem adequate.

The airplane is the chief means of transportation in

South America. The roads are pretty good to the coastal towns of 50 miles or so but beyond that you run into dirt and gravel roads, we're told.

You can now drive on improved or paved roads all through Mexico and Central America to Panama. But from there through Colombia, it's a different story. They have so much forest and swampy country to cross that a survey party recently took four months to go through the proposed road route. And they figure it would take years to build a highway. It would take about three days to drive over the roads the 500 miles or so to Bogota, capital of Colombia. Bogota is 8,500 feet high and cool the year around. They use neither heat nor air conditioning in their homes. Here, they use no heat - only air conditioning. There is never a frost here. Things grow the year around. And you wouldn't believe the flowers you see here.

There are some interesting customs here. For example, when a prominent person dies they print up posters about three by four feet and post them on street side signboards to announce the funeral plans.

We have plans to visit a Masonic Lodge meeting this week and a Lions Club luncheon next week. There is an American school here that teaches all of the grades. Teachers are paid \$300 a month and we're told that it is increasingly difficult to obtain teachers from the USA.

The trip here was real interesting. We drove to Dallas and flew Braniff to Miami, Fla. Left Dallas at 10:30 a.m. and arrived at Miami about 2 p.m. EST. And at 4:30 p.m., we flew by Avianca Air Line (founded in 1919 as the first in South America) to Bogota, arriving in the rain around 8 p.m.

Both Braniff and Avianca airlines served a meal, and the meal of each was chicken. Flew over the middle of Cuba at 35,000 ft. and couldn't see it for clouds.

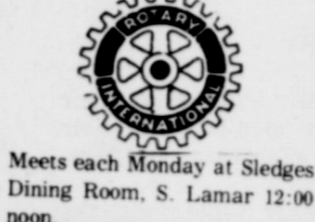

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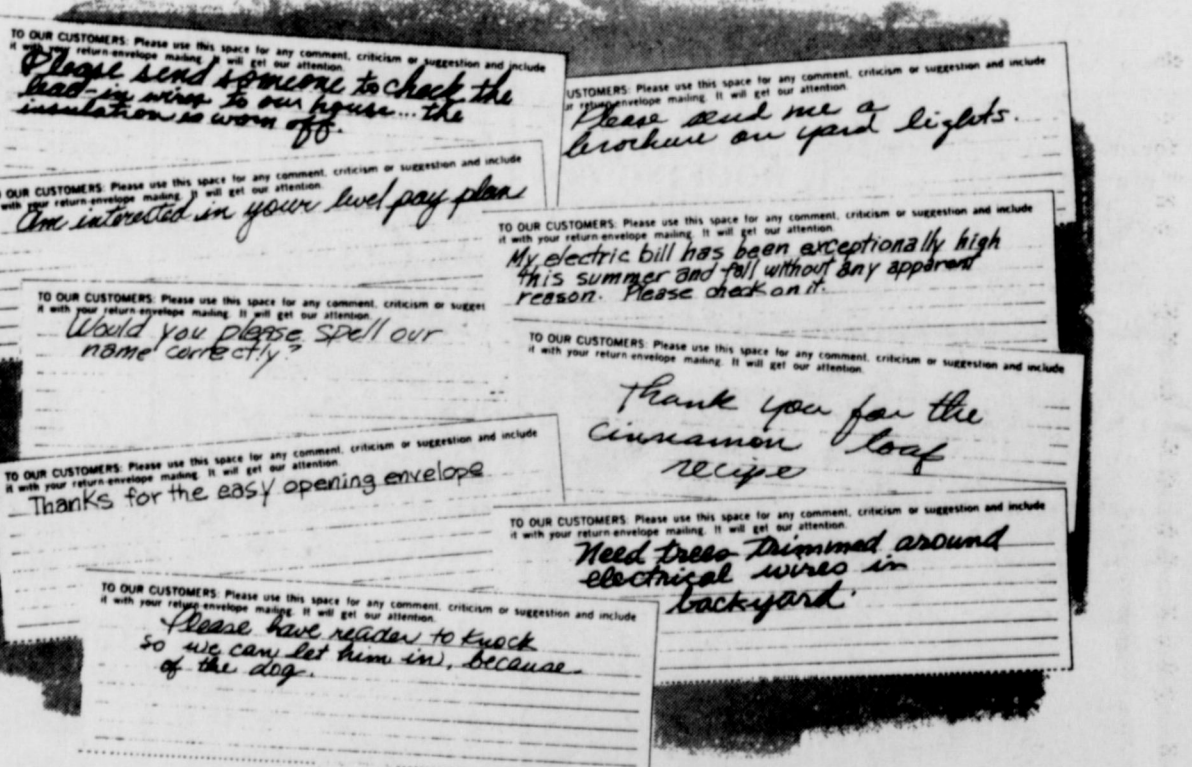
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
