### C.M.S. Jack Kelly Affiliated With Constellation Wing

Chief Master Sergeant Jack G. Kelly, son of Mr. and Mrs. C.M. Kelly of 602 Gilmer St., Eastland, is a member of the U.S. Air Force's only EC-121 Constellation wing which has earned the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award.

Sergeant Kelly is an aircraft maintenance superintendent with the Aerospace Defense Command's (DC) 552nd Airborne Early Warning and Control Wing at McClellan AFB, Calif.

The unit - which received the award for exceptionally meritorious service from March 1970 through May 1971 - was cited for accomplishing diversified missions in Southeast Asia, Japan, the Republic of Korea, Iceland, and the continental United States.

Wing personnel fly ADC-directed radar patrol along the West Coast extending the nation's air defense early warning line seaward. They deploy, as needed, to provide radar coverage for inoperative land based radar sites and to close gaps in land based radar systems.

The sergeant will wear a distinctive service ribbon to mark his affiliation with the wing.

Sergeant Kelly, who has completed a year of duty in Vietnam, is a 1949 graduate of Eastland High School.

His wife, Shirley, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F.T. Hightower of 109 E. Williams St., Eastland.

## Conner, Sublett Re-Elected; Creighton, Hanna, Briscoe Lead

### Trout Wins Tax Office

The nominations are in. District Judge Earl Conner Jr. and County Sheriff L.E. Sublett have apparently won re-election without run-offs, according to unofficial returns from seven of the eight voting boxes in the county.

At 10 p.m. Saturday, some 877 votes from the Rising Star voting box had not been reported.

Nancy Trout won over Eddie Pietraszek for County Tax Assessor - Collector, and Bill Hunte, defeated Howard Parsons for Constable Eastland - Olden. J.W. Vinson won the constable post in Ranger. A run off appeared certain in the

Cisco constable race.

State Sen. Tom Creighton, State Rep. Joe Hanna, both lead opponents in Eastland County, and Dolph Briscoe were leader in the county for the governor's post.

Only about 65 percent of the county's voting strength turned out with 5,470 recorded, including the Rising Star votes. A total of 8,884 were registered. Two years ago in the first primary, the county polled 4,459 votes, so the total number is up some 1,000, but the affect of the 18-year-old vote was not immediately determined.

A 10:15 report from the Rising Star newspaper in-

dicates that Briscoe is leading in that box; Conner is leading; Sublett is leading; Trout had 403 to 102; and in the five-man commission race - Curt Smith, 205; Owens, 128; excluding Rising Star totals.

Barefoot Sanders lead the county with 1,800 to Ralph Yarborough's 1,727.

Briscoe polled 2,154 (without Rising Star); Barnes, 777; Farenthold, 584; and Preston Smith, 438.

In the Lt. Gov's race, Bill Hobby lead at 1,754; Wayne Connelly, 1,005; Hall, 479; and Joe Christie, 437.

John Hill was leading Crawford Martin for Attorney General, 1,985 to 1,705.

Sen. Tom Creighton carried all but two (Gorman and Cisco) for a total of 1,941; and Tom Holmes got 1,459. Marsh got 450.

Rep. Joe Hanna ran away with the county with 2,888 and Bill Qualls got 912.

Judge Conner polled 2,608; Bill B. Hart, 994; and Truman Kirk, 904.

Sheriff Sublett got 2,776; Bill Tackett, 757; and Bennie Mosley, 534.

Nancy Trout got 3,107 and Eddie Pietraszek, 784 in the county Tax office race.

The county voted FOR the bussing referendum with 2,617 for and 719 against.

Incumbent Bill Hunter got 1,183 votes and Howard Parsons 197 in the Eastland - Olden Constable's race.

Vinson polled 431 votes to beat John E. Boyd, with 296 for the Constable post in Ranger.

In Cisco, Bill (B.W.) Carr got 394 and S.E. Parkinson, 590, to be apparent run-off contestants in the Constable post there. Roy Edwards got 321 votes.

Eastland came with about 40 votes of voting as many as Cisco, which had 1,343 and Eastland had 1,307.

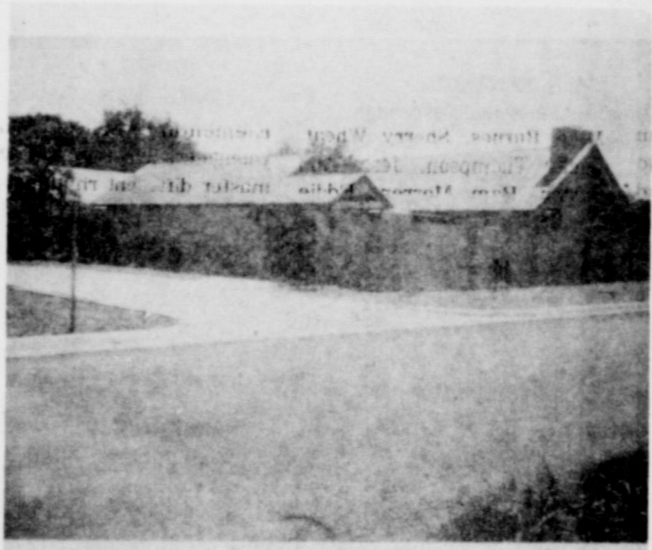
(Ray) Wyatt, 64, died at 6:05 p.m. Friday in an Eastland hospital after a long illness.

**'Lib,' N.Y.C. Topics of Talk For Lions**

Discrimination against women throughout history, related jokingly, were opening remarks for Mrs. Durwood (Emma) Morris in a very impressive talk to members of the Eastland Lions Club at a Tuesday luncheon meet at Sledge's Restaurant.

A staff member for the Eastland County Neighborhood Youth Corps, Mrs. Morris explained that since this unit's organization in 1965, 11,000 youngsters have been served and approximately \$1 million expended through the program. In 1966, Shackelford and Palo Pinto counties were added, and now the County unit includes Stephens, Young and Throckmorton counties, for the central headquarters of the six-county area County School Superintendent O.L. Stamey is the director.

"Our goal," she said, "is to reach every youngster who needs help." And there are many disadvantaged young people who benefit from our help, she explained, giving examples of some of "successes" that the program

claims. Of course there have been some failures, too, she pointed out.

She listed some of the Biblical women who were discriminated against: "Can

you imagine what people were saying about poor Mrs. Noah?"

Hopes are that an adult education program can be started under the E.O.A. program, she said.

J.B. (Tip) Arther was program chairman and introduced Mrs. Morris.

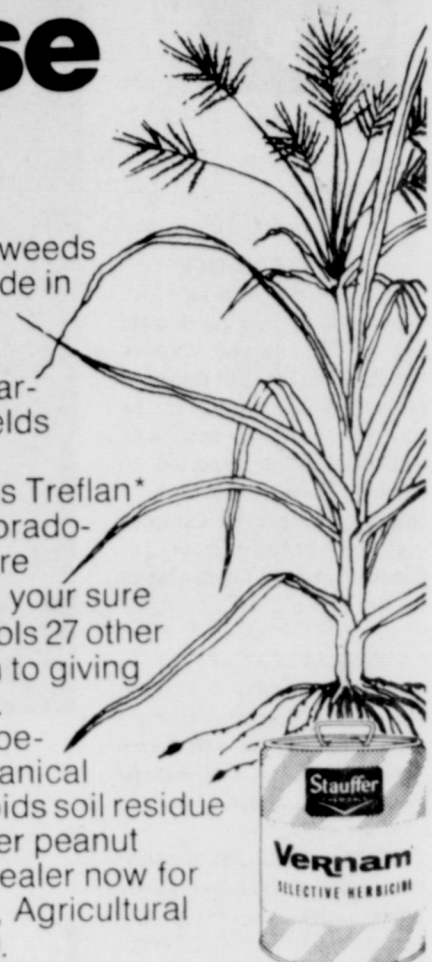

At patriotic functions, music sets the tempo for the serious business that characterizes such events. For, who has not been awe-struck by the resounding strains of our national anthem or God Bless America.

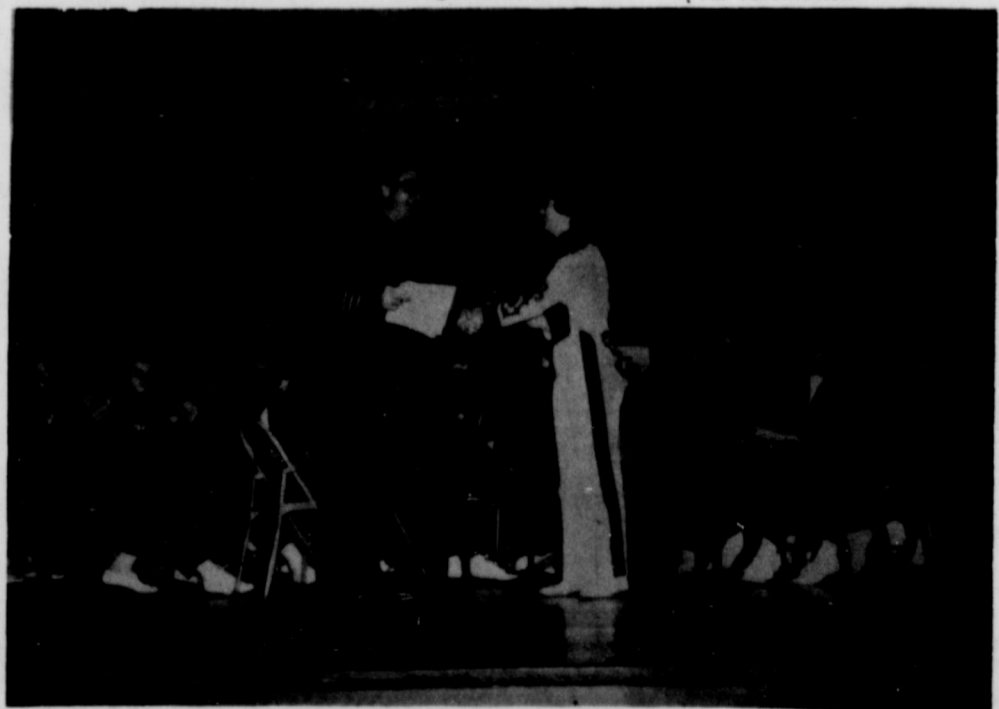
At fraternal meetings, music establishes a foundation for the fellowship of the hour.

## Music Literature Display at Library

The Eastland Public Library has recently purchased a new large steel file to accommodate the historical material which has accumulated. The vertical files are available for research and especially for students. They also include current material from newspapers and magazines.

Each club is preserving its own records and the large metal trunk belonging to the Eastland Music Club contains yearbooks, scrapbooks and other material which is invaluable. Quotes from the files are of special interest in connection with the Music Week observance.

From EASTLAND COUNTY INDEX (Special Music Week edition) May 6, 1928:

6th District, Texas Federation of Music Clubs, was organized in Eastland Public Library room, at the same time the Civic League was having a flower show luncheon in the club room. The district had 45 counties in it, and the new president was elected, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins and the secretary elected Mrs. Grady Pipkin.

At the state convention in Amarilla the Wilda Dragoo Ensemble, Miss Wilda Dragoo, director and Mrs. Charles G. Norton, pianist appeared on the program. Nora Hefley Mahon of Eastland won first place in a poetry contest there.

Sunday May 4, 1930 - -

Special Music Week Edition:

The seventh year of National Music Week will be observed all over the United States. A National Radio Audition is conducted by the Atwater Kent Foundation. The Music Club of Eastland has kept Music Week before the local public through its programs for the preceding six years of National Music Week.

Mrs. W.K. Jackson's picture centers the first page of the six page edition which has on its mast head "Pub. Community Clubhouse". All the ads were obtained by club members and a percentage of the money swelled the treasury. Mrs. Jackson Society Editor of more than one of the Eastland County papers wrote: "Story of the Music Club of Eastland":

"Ten years ago the Civic League of Eastland had a flourishing choral department, directed by Miss Maude Schick (later Mrs. Leonard). Mrs.

E.A. Hill was president of the group. The president of the Civic League, Mrs. Philip Wolfe, invited the choral department to meet in her home, 1021 South Seaman, on Feb. 13, 1929 and consider going into a federated music club form. The following week Mrs. W.K. Jackson who had organized the choral department, called a meeting of the members and invited other friends to her house. A splendid program was presented and at the close a talk was made by the hostess. As a result the MUSIC CLUB launched with flying colors under federation rules. It was March 1929. Mrs. E.A. Hill, Pres. Mrs. Earl Conner, V. Pres; Mrs. Walter Phoebus, sec - treas. and Miss Maud Schick, choral director. FORTY members paid dues that year. The club was a charter club of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs. Presidents for the first ten years were Mrs. E.A. Hill, Mrs. Thurman White, Mrs. P.S. Wolfe, Mrs. Jep Little, Mrs. R.J. Bates, Mrs. T.J. Pitts.

From a later paper - - "The club editor Mrs. Charles Norton, announced the publication in Eastland of the first number of the official Texas Music News - - and she as editor of it, expressed thanks to the club members who addressed and processed the first several issues of the state magazine which existed until very recently when the publication was changed in format and name.

Eastland Telegram carried the announcement of Marene Johnson's election as district president of the Sixth District TFMC and it was during her two year administration that the district was divided as the 45 counties made too cumbersome a group for travel, etc. She is a Life Member of the club here.

The county papers were generous with publicity for Music Week activities throughout the years. The Junior Music clubs were many - Mrs. A.F. Taylor had the Scale Runners and the Beethoven Clubs and they were among the first Junior clubs in the State Federation - being members even before the organization of the District. Mrs. Taylor was a Life Member of the National Federation of Music Clubs.



Two Past State Presidents, Texas Federation of Music Clubs, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins and Mrs. Paul Moss at the Midland Concert of Van Cliburn. Mrs. Moss underwrote the concert and has been a sponsor for many young musicians, especially Van Cliburn. Mrs. Perkins was president when he was a young lad and was present at his winning of the prize in Houston and also at Dallas when he won the Dealey Award and played with the Dallas Symphony. She was in Chatauqua when he played with the symphony there.

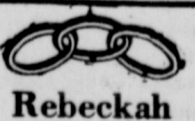

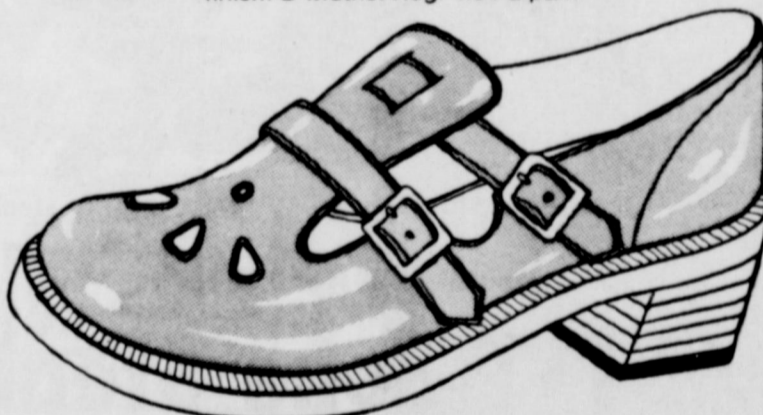

**Gordon's Pot**

"Creative Conservation" is the theme of this year's Soil Stewardship Week which will be observed in Eastland County as well as across the Nation May 7 - 14.

The week emphasizes man's obligation to God as Stewards of the soil, water and other resources. It is sponsored annually by Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout the country.

With the present - day emphasis and attention given to ecology and protection of the environment, it is especially fitting to reflect on the quality of our lives and the natural resources that sustain us. Conservation is the spirit of all responsible men and concerns the well - being of all communities.

Today more than ever before, high priorities are being placed on pleasant home and community surroundings, conservation of natural resources, and a peaceful landscape. Many people are giving fresh thought to the quality of the world in which we live.

We urge everyone in Eastland County to become more "conservation - minded" and to join with others in supporting efforts and activities that are aimed at improving our quality of life. A good start would be to become involved in promoting and supporting Soil Stewardship Week.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District will begin observance of the special week with a Soil Stewardship breakfast May 8 on Rush Creek in Comanche County. The District Supervisors distributed Soil Stewardship information packets to 30 churches in Eastland and Comanche Counties. If you would like more information on the observance of this week contact your local Soil Conservation Service.

This might be a good time to discuss food prices. A lot is being said about high food prices, but few explanations are being offered.

Consumer demands and tastes have increased drastically in recent years. Higher quality foods are demanded and more convenience items are requested.

Non - food items are also getting a larger share of every dollar spent at the supermarket. Recent studies indicate that about 28 cents of each dollar spent at food outlets goes for non - food items. For example more total money is being spent at supermarkets for paper products and foil than for eggs according to Dr. William Vastine, Food Distribution Specialists at Texas A&M.

Granted, food prices have increased, some three percent last year, and are expected to increase four to four and one half percent in 1972. But not all food items have gone up in price. Consider poultry and dairy products and pork. All these have experienced price declines in recent months, according to information from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Beef prices have increased to the peak level they were in 1952. On the other hand, can you list many other items that are at the same price level that they were 20 years ago?

Cost of producing beef have skyrocketed. Processing and retailing costs have also spiraled. And with consumers demanding more processing

and special packaging, prices of products on the grocery shelf may be quite high compared to a few years ago. In many cases, home preparation may be the answer to higher food prices.

If we were willing to go back to the standard of living 20 years ago, the total food bill might not seem so high. Yet, back then the consumer, was paying 23 cents of his take - home dollar for food as compared with only about 16 cents today.



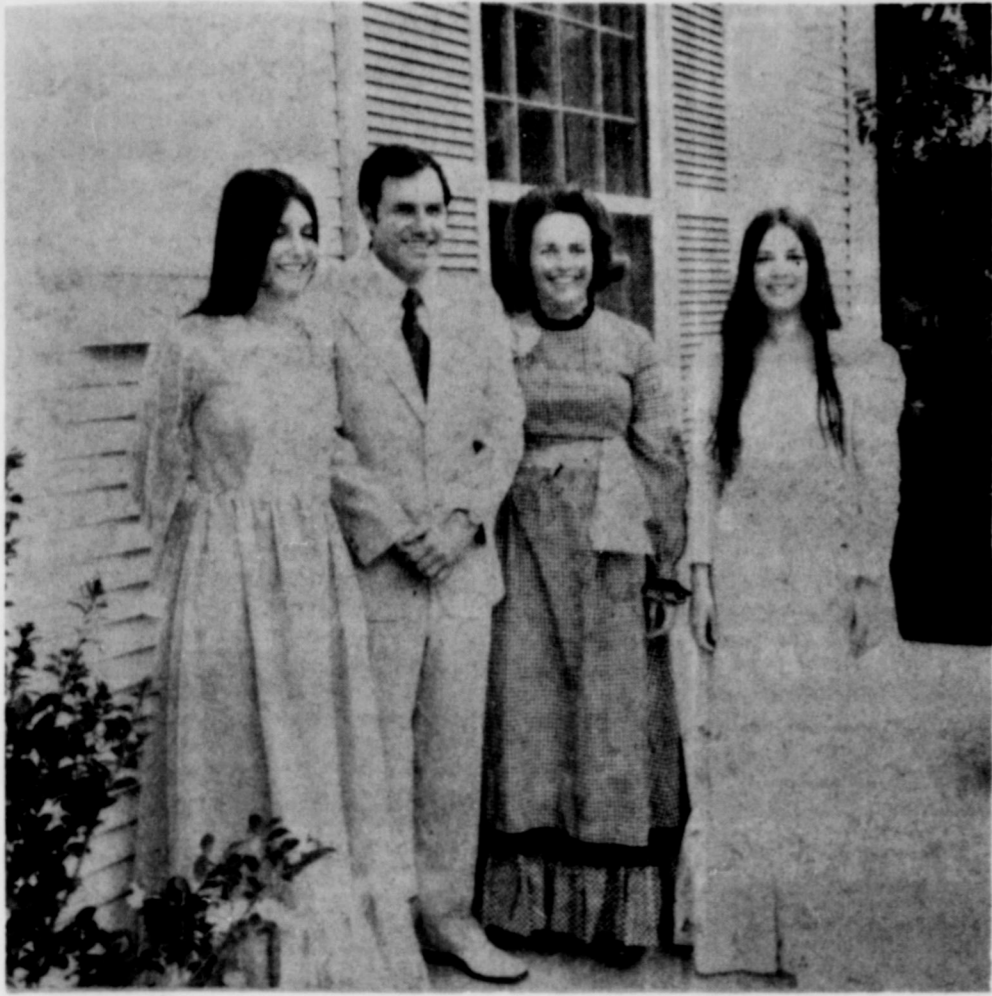

Editor:

# Officials Issue Warnings On Sales Tactics

Sheriff L. E. Sublett and Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton have received complaints recently from citizens of Eastland County concerning unethical door-to-door salesmen.

The most recent complaint involved a couple of door-to-door salesmen who sold a vacuum cleaner to an elderly lady who had relatively little, if any, use for such a machine. As is frequently the case, these men have a bad reputation for their dealings with elderly and unsuspecting people.

As spring and summer are near, there will in all likelihood be other high pressure door-to-door salesmen coming through the county. In the past, some of these people have sold roofing, siding for the home, photographs, vacuum cleaners, sewing machines, insurance, magazines, books and encyclopedias; also, they have offered services such as tree trimming, house construction and repair work, exterminating, etc. In nearly all instances, these fly-by-night operators live out of the county and often their only object is to make a fast buck off of some elderly or unsuspecting person.

One frequently used trick employed by these salesmen is to state that a certain friend or neighbor recommended the particular citizen to them and almost just as often, this is not the case. These unethical salesmen also have numerous other ways to gain a person's confidence, such as telephone calls and mail-outs offering certain merchandise and services free or at greatly reduced prices; then when they receive a citizen's inquiry or answer, they often come out with some kind of story about having already sold all of the particular items or have a much better item or service at a higher price.

Citizens should always remember that there are local and reputable firms to provide any type of building construction and repair work, insurance, etc. Before dealing with unknown salesmen, inquiries should be made of people who might have some knowledge of the reliability of the salesmen. If the salesman is honest and reliable, he will welcome your inquiries; otherwise, he will likely be in a hurry and utilize a high pressure tactic; for example, by stating that he only has one item left, cannot wait for you to spend all that time calling around town, or cannot return at a later date.

Generally, these types of people know just how far they can go without being subjected to criminal charges. Also, as is often the case when a person

realizes that he or she has been taken and might have a civil claim, the salesmen's whereabouts are unknown.

In this connection, citizens are welcome to call the Sheriff or District Attorney and they advise that citizens can also often receive valuable assistance from the local Chamber of Commerce office, bank, police, constable, or local persons in the same line of business as the salesmen.

The Sheriff and the District Attorney urge that all of the citizens be concerned and NOT deal with any such people until appropriate inquiries have been made. A good rule to remember is that a local businessman, whether he be in the exterminating business or selling insurance, has a reputation and standing in the community to maintain.
