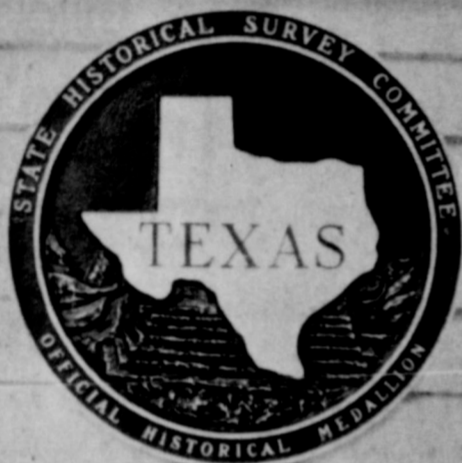

'Yes' Means 'No' In Antibusing Vote

Both the Democratic and Republican primary ballots contain a proposition concerning forced busing, designed for the parties to get a reading on public sentiment.

The forced busing referendum will have no binding effect.

While the words on the two ballots differ, in both cases a vote "for" means the voter opposes forced busing.

THE REFERENDUM proposition on the Democratic ballot reads:

"No public school student shall because of his race, creed or color be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required

busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

The Republican proposition reads:

"ARE YOU in favor of constitutional amendment which would prohibit forced busing of school children or forced consolidation of school districts solely to achieve racial balance?"

Party officials said the propositions were written in such a manner as to permit the voter to respond positively rather than negatively, if they oppose forced busing.

The Republican ballot also includes a referendum proposition for or against daylight saving time.

8,884 Voters Qualified To Make Nominations

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Saturday, May 6, at 11 voting boxes in Eastland County for the First Primary, and the 8,884 qualified voters in this county will have interesting ballots to mark.

The Democrats will be voting at eight boxes and the Republicans will be holding elections in three precincts.

Absentee balloting ended Tuesday at 5 p.m. and at 11 a.m., there had been 121 Democratic and two Republican ballots marked.

As is customary, the Democrats will have a longer ballot in this county. Both ballots have the "busing" referendum and the GOP also offers a voice on "Daylight Saving Time"

Countians will choose between Truman Kirk, Bill Hart and Earl Conner Jr for District Judge; L.E. Sublett, W.W. Tackett and Bennie Mosley for sheriff; and Nancy Trout and Edward Pietraszek for county tax assessor - collector.

Eastland and Olden voter will choose between Bill Hunter and Howard Parsons for constable for Precinct One.

Mrs. Jeanette Harris is unopposed for Precinct One Party Chairman and Mrs. Scot Bailey is unopposed for County Chairman.

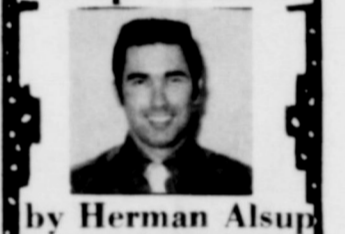
Eastland - Ranger County Commissioner Danny Woods is unopposed but down at Rising Star, there are five seeking the county commission post there.

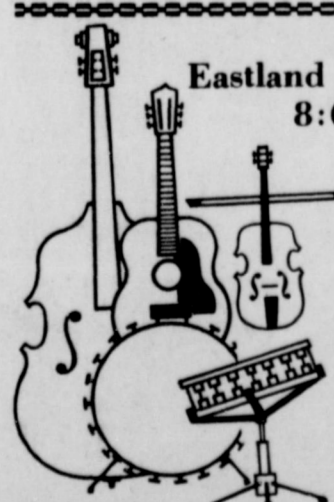

Carbon Methodist Homecoming Called Success

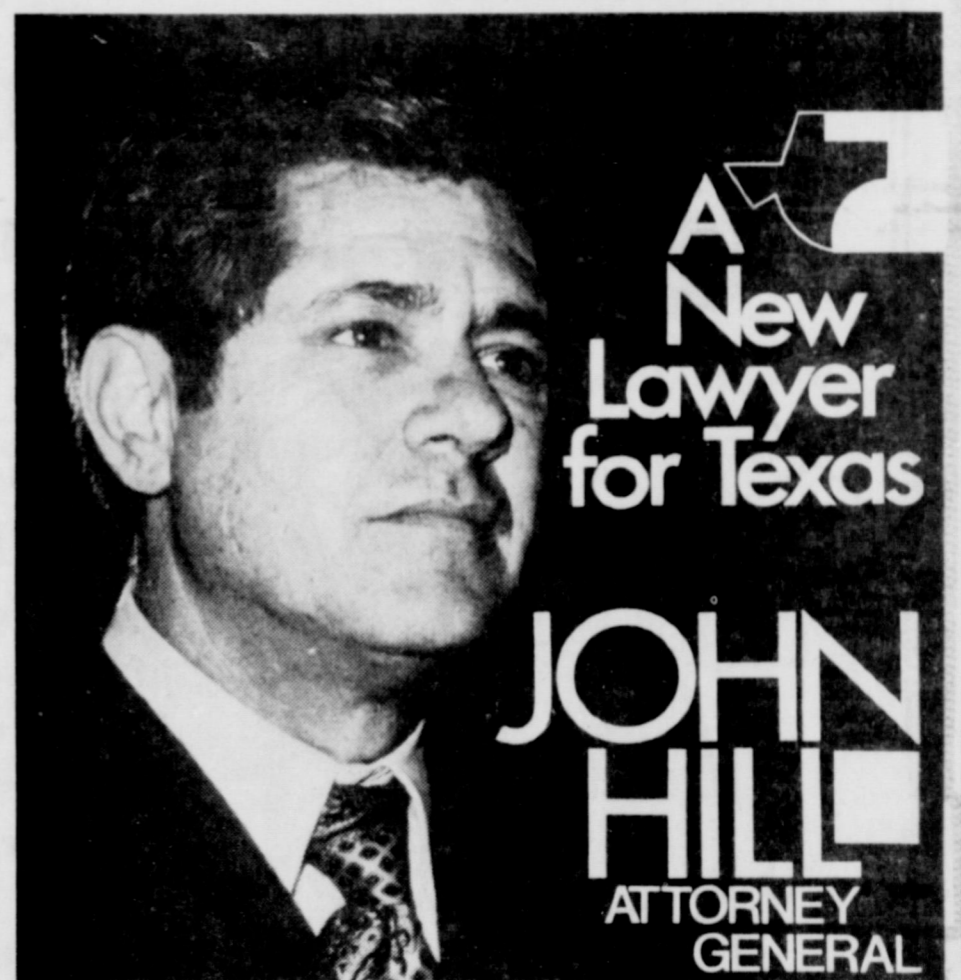

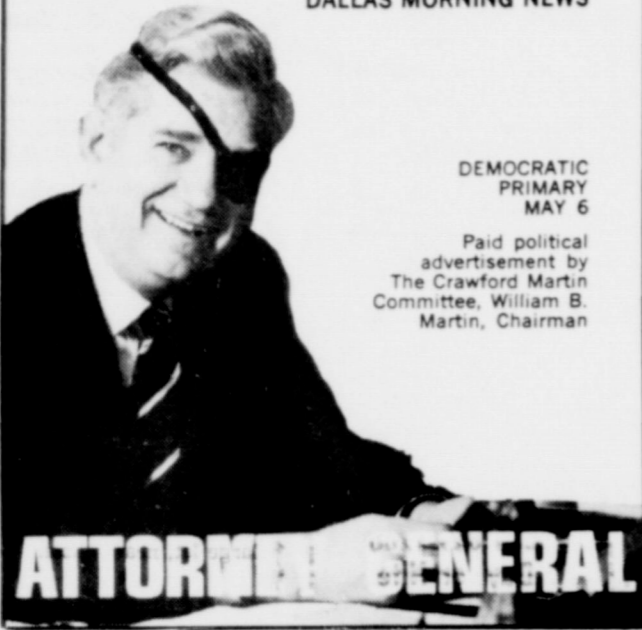
