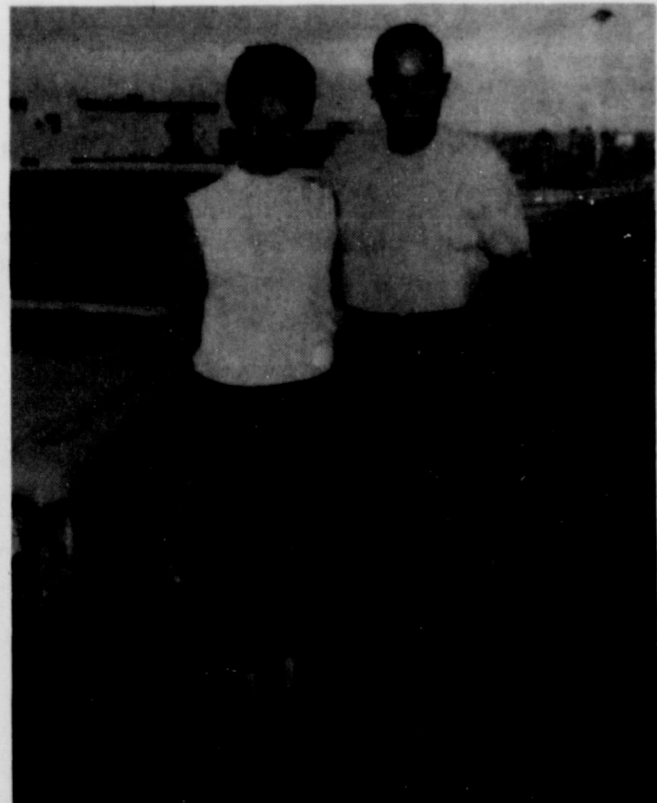

Happy 25th -- Bea and Clint Bray

With a record number of voters on the rolls for the May 6 Primary, there's a great deal of interest a circulating.

Many candidates will be "on stage" when the Eastland County Farm Bureau holds its "Measure the Candidate" program in Eastland Friday evening.

Ed McKay legislative director for the Texas Farm Bureau, will be the moderator at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the Eastland High School auditorium when the Eastland County Farm Bureau conducts its "Measure the candidate" meeting.

Candidates who have confirmed their presence for the Friday night event are: Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, incumbent, and Tom Holmes and B. "Connie" Marsh, who are seeking the office of state senator, 22nd Senatorial District; Joe C. Hanna, Bill Qualls, and Jack Hetzel (Republican), who are seeking election as state representative, 54th District; Earl Conner Jr. (incumbent), Bill B. Hart and Truman P. Kirk, candidates for judge, 91st District Court; Emory C. Walton, candidate for criminal district attorney; L.E. (Lefty) Sublett, Bennie Moseley and Bill Tackett, candidates for Eastland County sheriff; Eddie Pietraszek and Mrs. Nancy Trout, seeking election as Eastland County tax assessor and collector; and Bill Hunter and Howard Parsons, seeking the office of constable, Pct. 1, Eastland.

Eastland County Farm Bureau officials stressed that the meeting is free and all are invited.

The Eastland County political race that is likely to draw the most interest in the Democratic primary is the race for Judge, 91st District Court. Incumbent Earl Conner Jr., a lifelong Eastland resident, is being opposed by attorney Truman Kirk, 47 and Eastland Attorney Bill B. Hart, 47.

Hart is an Eastland County native and the son of the late John S. Hart, a long-time Eastland County political figure and will be trying for his first elective office.

Kirk, who tried unsuccessfully in 1968, for the same judgeship, now lives in Cisco, where he practices law. His wife, Evelyn, teaches in the Cisco public schools.

Conner was appointed judge by Gov. Preston Smith upon retirement of former Judge Frank Sparks June 1, 1968. This will be Conner's second elective term.

Robert Perkins was elected new chairman for the board as well as Virgil Seaberry Vice-Chairman, W.M. Jones Sec. and Winston Boles Assistant Sec.

A new assistant coach was hired by the board of trustees. Donald E. Adair will assume his duties at the end of the semester.

Adair is 32 years old and a 1957 graduate of Hamlin High. Adair received his B.S. degree from North Texas State University. He was a letterman of the track team, as well as being a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha National Social Fraternity. He graduated with a major in Health, Physical Education and Recreation and a minor in Biology. I also have a Driver Education Certificate, stated Adair.

Adair's first coaching position was with the Grandfalls-Royalty School system, a class B school in west Texas. He served as an assistant for four years and was promoted to head coach of all sports in 1966, a position he held for one year. During that year his teams won district in all four sports. The football team had a record of eight wins and one loss. His basketball team posted a 18-10 record and won the district for the first time in twelve years. He also coached the track team and the golf team and they won district in both sports.

The next coaching position held was at Coleman during the 1967-68 school year. His coaching duties were with the B-team line in football and freshman basketball.

Adair's next coaching position was at Colorado City where he worked under his former high school coach, Truman Nix. His coaching duties there were with the quarterbacks and defensive secondary as well as being director of the athletic program in junior high and coordinator of the Driver Education program in high school.

While at Colorado City he had the experience of being in a team teaching situation, which was started in 1970 in the junior high school there. He remained in Colorado City three years, 1968-71.

At the present time he is employed by the Mineral Wells, ISD. His coaching duties at Mineral Wells in football are with the varsity linebackers and wide receivers as well as being the head freshman coach in football and basketball, and assistant baseball coach. His teaching duties are four classes of Driver Education.

Adair is married to the former Mildred Day of Eastland. They are the parents of three daughters: Donna 10¹/₂, Janna 4¹/₂, and Tonia 1¹/₂. His wife is an elementary education major and has taught fourth grade, remedial reading, and at present is in charge of the reading program at Austin Jr. High (7th grade) in Mineral Wells. They are members of the Christian Church.

In 1971, the City of Eastland, in cooperation with the Leon-Bosque Resources Conservation and Development Project, made a request for recreational planning assistance from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. I am pleased to inform you that should your city presently desire this assistance, the request for this service in planning the development of the city park will be initiated in the near future. Mr. Ron Moreau, Landscape Architect with the Parks and Wildlife Department will be contacting you soon to schedule a meeting with you and other interested individuals to discuss your park planning assistance needs and to visit the site under consideration for development. I am enclosing a list of items we will need in assisting you in planning your park area. If

these items could be obtained at the time of your meeting with Mr. Moreau it would be most helpful.

We are looking forward to working with you and your city in the development of plans for outdoor recreation opportunities.

Resource material needed to prepare Local Park Planning Assistance Projects:

1. A boundary description of the park area. This may be either a boundary survey map, a copy of the boundary survey

field notes, or an abstract of title containing the survey calls for the boundary of the park site.

2. A contour map of the park site. A contour map with an interval of two feet is desirable.

3. A soils map with a soils description of the park site. It may be possible to obtain this information from your local work unit of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

4. A list designating the location of all utilities available to the park site and the possible location of connection points.

5. A list of recreational activities desired for the park site such as baseball, picnicking, tennis, etc.

6. A description of any easements, leases or other restrictions that would affect the placement of recreational facilities within the park site.

Pietraszek, 50-year-old owner of an Eastland upholstery business.

Eastland County Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton Jr., 40, is unopposed.

The Eastland County Sheriff's race has drawn three prospects. The incumbent sheriff, L.E. "Lefty" Sublett, 64, will be seeking his third term of office. He is opposed by Ranger city policeman Bennie

Moseley, 36 and Eastland County rancher and business man Bill Tackett, 49.

In the constable's race, precinct one - which includes the city of Eastland and the town of Olden four miles east - incumbent Bill Hunter is opposed by Eastland city policeman Howard A. Parsons Jr., 26, a resident of Olden.

In the County Commissioner's race precinct one, Danny Woods, long time incumbent, is running unopposed. However, in precinct three, which includes Rising

Star, there are five hopefuls for the office now held by Buck Collins. Filing were W.G. Reed, former mayor of Rising Star, Curt Smith, George N. Creech, L.T. Owen and A.B. Jones.

Filing for the office of constable, precinct seven, Rising Star, is incumbent W.H. "Hamp" Kornegay and Rising Star City Marshall Arlie Bibby.

Long time Ranger lawman, Johnny Boyd has announced his candidacy for constable, precinct five, which includes Ranger. He will be opposing incumbent Ralph Veal and Ranger policeman J.W. Vinson.

In the constable's race, Cisco

precinct eight, three persons are seeking the seat now held by Bud Dawson. They are S.E. Parkinson, former Cisco Police Chief, B.W. Carr and Roy G. Edwards.

**History Week
Is Proclaimed
In This County**

The State of Texas and Eastland County have a proud and colorful history and an unsurpassed heritage filled with dedication, devotion and individualism.

In recognition of this fact, Gov. Preston Smith and Eastland County Historical Committee Chairman Mike Collins have joined in proclaiming the week of April 30 to May 7, as County History Appreciation Week.

The county's newest marker, dedicating the Comellee Home will be unveiled in ceremonies at 2 p.m. on Sunday, April 30.

Another marker, commemorating the Kentuckians who came to county, has

been approved and is expected to arrive soon for erection at the Eastland City Hall. Mr. Collins said.

These will bring to 14, the number of historical markers in Eastland County.

These include: Shin Oak Springs at Gorman; Ft. Blair at Desdemona; Boom Town at Ranger; Scranton Academy at Scranton; Town Marker at Rising Star; Town Marker at Eastland; Site of the Santa Claus Bank Robbery at Cisco; Conrad Hilton's First Hotel at Cisco; County's First Courthouse - the Stubblefield Building; in Eastland; the Comellee Home in Eastland; McCleskey No. One at Ranger; the Kentuckian Marker at Eastland; the Kokomo School at Kokomo; and Camp Solomon at Cisco.

Gov. Smith said in his proclamation:

"We owe a great debt to our forefathers; the pioneers and early settlers whose accomplishments have been an inspiration and a guiding light to all Texans.

"All too often, in these modern times, we tend to overlook and fail to recognize and appreciate the labors of these great men and women.

"Increased public appreciation is needed for the men and women who toiled under extreme hardships, and traveled to the far corners of our great state, and established themselves as the pioneers of our proud heritage.

"The Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the two

hundred fifty-four County Historical Survey Committees are working diligently and efficiently to preserve Texas' historic past. The County Committees, this year, are making a special effort to focus public attention to the dramatic course of events in their Counties, thus designating each day of a week for special activities highlighting the various elements of the state preservation program such as the beautification of the approaches to and areas surrounding historic sites and markers; the locating and recording of noteworthy landmarks; honoring pioneers and early settlers; involving the youth in historic work, and touring historical exhibits, sites and markers.

"THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of April 30 to May 7, as COUNTY HISTORY APPRECIATION WEEK in Eastland County, Texas, and urge all citizens to support and participate in the activities of this observance."

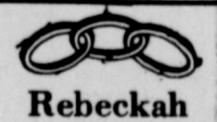

CONSERVATION: THE KEY TO SURVIVAL
By Steve Key, EHS

Farmers now intensify their operations and crop their land more intensively because of the population explosion, rising labor cost, and a narrower margin between cost and return of production.

Labor requirements are now being reduced through the use of larger and specialized equipment. We have now learned to boost our yield by corrective fertilization, proper use of chemicals for insect and weed control, and have improved crop varieties. These things will eventually decrease pressure on the land.

We have now switched, for the most part, two - row planters for six - and - eight - row planters.

We have studied the soil and crops and have begun to get the land's fertility back to normal. Pollution is another main problem to our conservation and wildlife. Air pollution is believed to be a primary cause for the increased death rate from diseases of the respiratory system. There are many ways to prevent pollution and I believe that the people of the world should be interested enough in their land to work for it. We should work with other groups of people to cut down on air pollution.

There are many creeks and rivers that are used for dumping causing diseases in humans and animals that depend on the creek for water. Also many insects carry diseases from the polluted water to humans or animals. There is now permanent land fills for the dumping of trash. One of Eastland's main pollution problems was the old dump ground which spread trash and germs every time the wind blew.

Eastland's people have convinced the City Council to build a permanent land fill and close the old dump down.

Pollution will be one of man's worst enemies if people do not work together against it. It could be a terrible killer.

1,324 Farms Sell \$11 Million

Eastland county showed a total of 1,324 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,283.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 725 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 466 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 394.6 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$53,724.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$11,036,535; in 1964, \$5,162,250.

2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$5,294,897; in 1964, \$1,547,759.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$5,740,809; in 1964, \$3,596,307.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, one of the county's \$2,500 - and - over farms is incorporated.

Historic Connellee Home To Be Dedicated

The Connellee House in Eastland has been recently named a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, it was announced by Lester W. Prokop, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

As a result of meeting the state's requirements for this official designation, a Texas Historical Building Medallion with an interpretive plate, giving a capsule history of the structure, will be affixed to the building.

The dedication date for the marker will be announced by Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee. A certificate designating the building as a Recorded Landmark will be presented at the dedication ceremonies.

The dedication ceremony will be at 2 p.m. Sunday, April 30. Present owners, Judge and Mrs. Austin McCloud, will host an open house following the dedication.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's program of preservation activities. These also include archaeological investigations, small museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. As of 1971 the Survey Committee had erected approximately 5,500 official markers.

The name and location of the present marker will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers.

The marker reads: THE CONNELLEE HOUSE... HOME OF CHARLES U. CONNELLEE (1851 - 1930), WHO OPENED MUCH OF WEST TEXAS TO SETTLEMENT. COMING AS A SURVEYOR FROM KENTUCKY IN 1874, HE PLATTED TOWN OF EASTLAND AND PROMOTED IT AS COUNTY SEAT.

HE BUILT LOWER STORY OF HIS HOME IN 1876, OF LUMBER HAULED FROM DALLAS BY OXWAGON, AND KEPT OPEN HOUSE FOR ALL OF WEST TEXAS.

SECOND STORY WAS ADDED IN 1924. FURTHER REMODELED IN 1956, 1963, 1971. THE STRUCTURE IS PRESERVED BY JUDGE AND MRS. AUSTIN McCLOUD.

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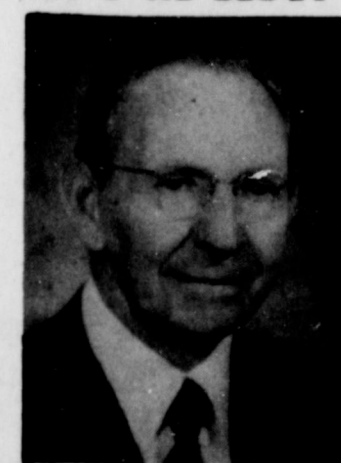
