## Lester Maddox to Speak In Cisco Tuesday

Georgia's controversial former governor, Lester Maddox, who is now the Peach State's lieutenant governor, will be the fourth and final speaker in the 1971-72 Current Affairs Series at Cisco Junior College, according to an announcement by Dr. Leland Willis, CJC President. Maddox is scheduled to appear on the CJC platform on Tuesday evening, April 11, at 8:00 p.m. He will be speaking on the subject of "The True Gap: Honesty, Not Generation".

Other speakers in the college's annual lecture series have included Psychologist Dr. Murray Banks, Miss America of 1971 Miss Phillis George, and John Glenn, America's first astronaut to orbit the earth.

Maddox was born in Atlanta in 1915 and was educated in the public schools and also studied engineering and accounting on his own. He went to work as a newsboy at the age of 12 and by the time he was 19 he was the

supervisor of a large Atlanta industrial plant. He later ventured into real estate and the retail food business.

In 1944 he and his wife, Virginia, opened their first restaurant, known as Lester's Grill, with a total savings of \$400. Later, in 1947, he opened his Pickwick Restaurant. Under Maddox' management there were nine expansions in eight years, and it became one of the most favored restaurants in Georgia. It was here that Maddox became nationally famous in his fight for a property owner's right to serve or refuse to serve persons at his own discretion. Maddox says, "The fight was not for segregation or integration, but was for the rights of every American, regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin, to private property and enterprise." He felt then, and still does, that when he lost, all Americans had part of their liberty stolen away.

## Leon Hale Publishes Second Book - BONNEY'S PLACE, A Contemporary Novel

A country beer joint a few miles off the Interstate to Houston, Texas, is the setting of *Bonney's Place*, a novel by Leon Hale, former Eastland resident.

This is Hale's second book, but his first novel. In 1965, he authored *Turn South at the Second Bridge*, a non-fiction book filled with the lore of the country and people in Southeast Texas.

Bonham J. McCamey Highway Cafe and Grocery (Bon-

ney's Place) is a bare rectangular building set in the midst of cottonwood, oak, and pine trees, which serves as a gathering place for a curious mixture of local patrons. Bonney, the proprietor, serves as father, brother, son, confidant, lover, benefactor, etc. to his "folks", ranging from a "bought" black boy to the local school superintendent, who stops by occasionally because he likes "Suds".

The plot centers around a \$15,000 loan an aged man in a rest home gave an unknown partner to open a pool hall -

tavern type business. When the old man died, he left a note to his son telling him of this transaction and that the man had disappeared with his money. He asked his son to locate "the Bonnie boy" and find out what he did with the money; he added, "I don't think he is crooked, learn what you can about him, then do what you think is right."

John Keller, a Houston businessman, is the son who takes a leave of absence from his job and vows to find the man who took the money and see him "behind bars". He assumes the name Johnny Lancaster and finds himself accepted by Bonney and the "regulars"; later he is deeply indebted to them.

It is a novel, with all the freedom and the power of fiction.

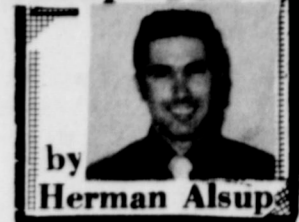
It will surprise and maybe shock many who have come to know Hale through the limitations of 500-word daily columns.

## Alsup's Fables

The 60-member Tarleton State College Symphonic Band will play five concerts next week, Dr. Curtis Owen, director announced.

The band will play concerts Tuesday, April 11, in Winters and Clyde High Schools.

Wednesday the band will play at Eastland High School at 9 a.m., DeLeon High School at 11 a.m., and conclude its tour Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 with a concert at Comanche High School.

You have heard of Band Contest of all kinds. Well this will be the contest of all contests.

A spectacular, first-of-its-kind competition between four of the nation's finest black university show bands for \$25,000 in prizes has been jointly announced by Texas Stadium Corporation and Braniff International.

On Friday night, May 12, Braniff's Battle of the Bands, at Texas Stadium, will match the marching bands of Bishop College of Louisiana, Jackson State College of Jackson, Mississippi, and Southern University of Baton Rouge in a unique entertainment event dedicated to the memory of Louis Armstrong.

"The Braniff Battle of the Bands will be the most stimulating, exciting and entertaining marching band competition ever conceived," said Texas Stadium General Manager Bert Rose.

"The thousands of football spectators who have witnessed simply a single black university marching band during a half-time period have always been unanimous in their enthusiastic reception. To put four such bands on the same field together competing for sizeable scholastic awards will create an event which is certain to attract thousands of spectators to Texas Stadium and focus national attention on the Dallas-Fort Worth area."

C. Edward Acker, president of Braniff International, said his firm felt strongly that the schools which have provided such outstanding entertainment and music expression through their marching bands not only should be congratulated and recognized, but also their efforts encouraged with meaningful assistance. "That's why there are only winners in Braniff's Battle of the Bands."

The band judged best in that evening's competition will win \$10,000; the second place band \$7,000; and the runners-up will each receive \$4,000.

The financial awards, donated by Braniff International, will be specifically for the music departments of the universities for use as each sees fit - scholarships for academically outstanding high school students in need of aid to pursue a college musical education or financial assistance for deserving students presently enrolled.

Tommy Walker, President of Tommy Walker Productions, for 12 years director of entertainment at Disneyland, and the producer of the pre-game and half-time shows and pageantry at Super Bowls I and IV, will direct and produce the special two-hour show. He will be assisted by Jim Skinner, Entertainment Director of the Dallas Cowboys and of the pre-game and half-time shows at Super Bowl VI.

Walker said that in addition to massed formations which will be utilized both to open and close the show, each band will perform individually for precisely 15 minutes. During this period, the panel of judges will grade the bands on sound, precision, continuity and showmanship. Just prior to their performance, each unit will be inspected by the judges.

## Bank Assets \$13 Million For All-Time Record

All indicators are up at Eastland National Bank where total assets are reported at \$13,399,313.81 - a record high. Deposits gained another million in the first quarter as the bank reports \$12,392,639.89 as of March 31.

Another million dollar gain is reported too in the loan division, moving back upward and reported at \$5,223,189 on the last day of March.

Every figure is up a million notch from the last day of business in 1971.

Assets reported on Dec. 31 were \$12,613,461.19; loans were

\$4,743,861.13; and deposits, \$11,611,679.46.

It's been a steady increase upward in the deposit and total asset departments, with increases logged each quarter since 1968.

Loans were upward too from 1968, but in line with national economic trends, leveled and lowered in 1971. At mid-1971, loans were reported at \$7,310,415.22; and went to \$5,062,763.99 at the end of September last year.

The bank's assets in 1968 were at the \$8 million peg, moving into the \$9 million slot

in 1969; touching \$10 million for the first time in mid-1970. \$11 million was touched on the last day of 1970 and the \$12 million mark was clocked at the end of 1971.

not of the clear-cut textbook variety, but of the complex kind one encounters in everyday life. His central character, Bonney, is one of the most intriguing characters presented in fiction in some time.

In summation, the plot may sound contrived; with Hale's adept handling, it seems logical.

Seldom has a novel been filled with such different yet believable characters. John soon learns that the entire community depends on Bonney for an amazing variety of things. Bonney has the knack of recognizing the secret hungers of other people, and of supplying their needs (one speciality is love-starved women). As John becomes even more deeply involved in Bonney's life, he begins to see another facet: Bonney's great need to be needed.

As the novel moves swiftly to an unexpected double-twist ending, the question arises: Who is the most deserving of sympathy, those so dependent on Bonney, or Bonney?

With perceptive restraint, Hale leaves the question for the reader to ponder.

Bonney's Place is an off-beat, unusual novel, en-

tertaining and thought provoking."

# Gordon Spot

For beautiful roses in your lawn or garden this summer, take steps now to control black spot.

Black spot is the most serious rose disease problem encountered by rose growers. It is

caused by a fungus which leaves a black spot with an irregular margin surrounded by a zone of yellow tissue. In addition to the unsightly black spots on the blossoms, plants may also shed their leaves.

Begin control measures by

raking and burning all fallen leaves in the spring and removing all old leaves from the rose plants. This will reduce one source of fungus spores that can cause new infections. At the same time, prune the tops of infected roses to eliminate over-wintering infection sites on the upper stems.

In spite of cultural methods, chemical protection will also be required for most hybrid teas. Begin fungicide applications when the first leaves are one-half inch long. Direct sprays so

that both surfaces of the leaves are covered. The degree of black spot control will be no better than the coverage obtained.

Effective spray materials include Benlate, Daconil 2787, Dithane M-45, Phaltan and Zineb. Other fungicides may also be available at your local garden or supply store. Sulphur dust, and old "standby" fungicide, is still used by many growers and is an effective material. However, its use should be discontinued after temperatures reach 85 degrees

F or the leaves will bronze.

This comes under the heading of "Did You Know". Man's greatest rival and deadliest enemy is the insect legion. Insects are the cause of half the world's mortality. Each year insects destroy enough food to supply 200 million people. Insects were responsible for the downfall of ancient Greece, for the laying of the Roman Empire open to conquest, and for wiping out a quarter of the population of Europe.

insects engage an unending war on humanity. Their strength lies in their numbers. There are insects capable of laying over a million eggs per year for as many as 15 years. Others can produce decendants in one year greater than the population of China.

This could be one of the best years for a good fruit crop that we have had in a long time. I hope you are staying with your spray schedule. Fruit trees should have been sprayed at least three times.

It appears that the danger of a killing freeze has passed. Now we can worry about hail destroying the fruit crop.

Most trees have set an extremely large crop of fruit. If

you want large, high quality fruit the young fruit must be thinned. Peaches should be thinned so that there are at least four inches between each peach.

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## Agricultural Producers To Be Praised - Not Blamed

Agricultural producers should be praised -- not blamed -- in the current national controversy over food prices, Sam Kimmell of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, said.

"Productivity in agriculture has been increasing about twice as fast as in industry," the local farm leader said. "This amazing efficiency is basic to our high standard of living."

"Kimmell said that if consumers paid the same proportion of their take home pay for food today as was the case 20 years ago, the food bill for American consumers would be about \$50 billion more per year than is actually the case. "The farmers and ranchers

are proud of the fact that, partly as a result of their record performance, the American consumer today has to spend only about 16 percent of his after-tax dollars for food -- the smallest proportion of income ever achieved here or anywhere in the world," the local Farm Bureau president said.

Kimmell said that cattle prices are now about what they were 20 years ago, and that farm prices in general have risen only about seven percent in that period. He pointed out that money paid to wage earners has increased 340 percent and that business and professional income is up 200 percent over that same period.

"The American farmer has been the best hedge against inflation the American consumer has," the farm leader asserted.

He pointed out that only by increasing both his investment and his efficiency has the farmer been able to stay in business.

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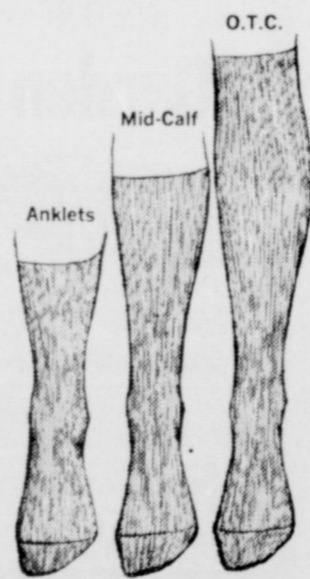

national leaders of either major party, he was successful in his campaign for Georgia's highest office. His administration as Governor was marked by the greatest influx of industry into Georgia in history and by a decided upswing in progress and general prosperity.

Blocked from succeeding himself by a constitutional barrier, Governor Maddox ran for Lieutenant Governor and won by a landslide in 1970, becoming the first governor to ever capture the state's number two office.

Maddox is a Baptist and for many years taught a men's Bible Class in the North Atlanta Baptist Church. He is also a Scottish Rite Mason. He is married to the former Virginia Cox of Birmingham, Alabama. They have four children and also five grandchildren, all of Atlanta.
