E. E. McAlister Honored At Retirement Dinner

E.E. McAlister, District Conservationist at Eastland, where he lived from May, 1951 until June when he moved to 1420 Lockwood, was honored with a retirement dinner in the Robin Room at Tarleton Dining Hall Thursday night, given by SCS personnel of Area Nine and the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District.

Retiring after more than 37 years of dedicated service to conservation, McAlister and his wife Lois and some 70 of their fellow conservationists heard a "This Is Your Life" type of program following the dinner, in which co-workers from various S.C. Districts related experiences shared with him on occasions through the years.

Irving Poff, Area Conservationist, was master of ceremonies for the dinner and program, and presented McAlister with a Certificate of Merit for "his commendable performance in directing operations of the Eastland Work Unit resulting in particularly noteworthy achievements in administering Great Plains Conservation Program and informational activities," signed by State Conservationist E.E. Thomas. Poff also presented the retiring Conservationist with a gift from SCS personnel and District Directors he had worked with, a gun cabinet and a set of insulated coversalls for use in his favorite hobby, hunting.

John Landers of San Saba was the first speaker to relate incidents in the career of Elmo McAlister, followed by Marion Porter and Rowland Madeley of Stephenville, Johnny Aaron of Eastland, Bill Heizer of Dublin, and John Lee, District Conservationist at Rising Star. A 1933 graduate of Texas A&M

University, McAlister attended Tarleton State College for two years, from 1929 to 1931. Starting his career as a Vocational Agriculture teacher, he taught in Boyd and Greenwood before entering the Soil Conservation Service as an Assistant Erosion Specialist in June, 1935 at Lindale. During the next two years he was technician in charge of Brownwood and Garesville, returning to Gatesville in 1937 after serving a six month assignment in Dublin as area agronomist.

He was project conservationist in Midland for over a year before moving to Jacksboro as work conservationist, leaving in April, 1942, to enter the U.S. Army and serving in the South Pacific during World War II. Returning to Dublin in February, 1946, he was work unit conservationist in the Upper Leon SCD until May of 1951 when he was assigned to Eastland.

McAlister and his wife were honored with several send-off events in Eastland territory before retiring to Stephenville, including a barbecue given by the Eastland Community Development group and a dinner given by his Sunday School Class.

McAlister's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C.C. McAlister, live in Stephenville, in the neighborhood where Elmo and Lois have recently purchased their new home. He also owns a farm near Stephenville, on the Alexander road, which figures prominently in his retirement plans.

Attending the dinner were representatives of at least nine of the eleven SCS Work Units McAlister has served, including Gene Gilbreath, chairman, and several Directors of the Upper Leon SCD.

LOOKING FOR A BETTER WAY!

An Editorial
Every serviceman, past and present, knows about the three ways to do things: "The Right way; the Wrong way; and the Army way."

At these crucial planning times, everybody in Eastland is looking for the best way to accomplish the things that need to be accomplished.

Operating on the assumption that every woman has the inherent right to try on more than one pair of shoes before making a final decision, we'd suggest that haste at this time might not be the best route.

The Civic Center - Library Committee has done a lot of work and has made its recommendation to the City Commission, asking that an election be called to decide if Eastland voters want to raise the tax valuations to pay for such a center. Committee members are understandably anxious to see progress.

But we wonder if hurrying at this point and offering a "this or nothing" proposition might be a mistake.

Frankly, our guess is that citizens wouldn't approve equalization on this basis. Equalization is needed, as it always has been, and always will be. Tax equalization is a hopeless task, and taxing agencies need to be constantly working to make their tax structure as realistic as possible. Eastland is no exception.

What if voters voted a resounding "no" on this proposition? Wouldn't it hamper our hopes for the badly needed library facilities and civic center? We think so, and for this reason, propose some alternate thinking, in lieu of the one - shot, "yes or no" proposition.

A first class facility has been recommended. Its price tag stands at roughly \$171,000, and it's designed for present and expandable needs. That's good, and while some of us might like to see a little less deluxe model, it's undoubtedly an overall plan that incorporates the thinking and recommendations from the various groups who will make use of it.

Now to finance that money through general obligation bonds, the cost will exceed \$300,000 over 20 years, and of course, that's not an insurmountable figure. If the city didn't have a bushel - basket full of other projects, either in the works or in the planning stages. There are many who put higher priorities on other projects.

The Commission yielded to the committee's insistence for an election, hedging with the stipulation that no other city obligations be hampered. It's guessed that a separate account would have to be maintained for handling the center - library funds. And presumably, there'd have to be separate voting boxes maintained at an election: one for non - tax payers, and another for tax payers, in keeping with recent court rulings regarding such elections.

Adequate library facilities are needed. The some 15,000 volumes need a good home. General consensus is that the present Women's Club - Library building is in danger of falling down, and perhaps it is, although so far as is known, there's been no such report made by a competent engineer and - or builder.

And a public meeting place for everybody is needed in Eastland. Independent investment in hotel - motel - restaurant facilities will come too, if city service is provided.

And herein is where so many of the inter - connecting details are linked.

The City could be asked tomorrow to provide services to the interchanges for major installations, and for this reason the city must remain as unincumbered as possible in order to be able to develop and assist with the ever continuing growth of our good town. If we're locked down with budget - pinching finances, we might miss some good boats. The Commission specified that funds now being used for other purposes wouldn't be diverted for the center.

We put highest priority on putting sewerage out north so that every citizen has the basic city services. You might like to know that the T&P Railroad is hampering us on that: they haven't granted permission to bore under their right - of - way. (Maybe the City should lower their maximum speed limit through our town until they get around to letting us under.) The city is trying to get that service rendered.

COULD THIS BE THE BETTER WAY?

The Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program has a plan called Community Facilities, which is funded, under which a city could be eligible for a grant of up to two - thirds of the cost of such a project as Eastland's civic center - library, this newspaper has learned.

Certain provisions probably would have to be met including providing facilities for a recreation area for the elderly, and the young, which is an important part of the civic center - library planning.

In the event such a plan were utilized, the city's cost for the \$171,000 facility could be reduced to about \$60,000 or \$70,000 if it is believed.

Details are being sought and will be announced as they become available.

It would seem logical to explore this possibility as early as possible so that initial planning may include provisions laid down by such an assistance program.

Work's coming soon on the new sewer plant as soon as the government gives us a go - ahead. That's to be made available through \$92,000 worth of revenue bonds which won't cost the citizens any more taxes, although it's conceivable that basic rates for sewerage and garbage rates may be raised and brought into line with neighboring cities. Eastland enjoys a low rate right now. Voters overwhelmingly okayed the bonds for the sewer plant when they were given all the information and urged by the commission for passage.

The bond cost for the sewer plant is about 45 percent of the total costs, with the remainder coming from federal and - or state grants and loans. The best way was found for the sewer plant.

Contributing to the development of our Int. 20 interchanges is important and our town will be judged by these approaches for as long as traffic passes at our back door.

Inside the city limits, there's been a lot of development too. New homes, new businesses, and expansions of all kinds. These properties will find their way onto tax roles soon.

July 1 was an important date. It was the deadline for compliance with certain pollution laws, and Eastland is now in the "flight - testing" of its sanitary land fill project south of town. Eastland is one of the few towns that got the jump on the law and shut down its antique burning dump and started burying the refuse. It's working, but it didn't "just happen".

There's 109 little projects the city gets involved in that the average citizen takes for granted. It's like running your kitchen. The city recently bought \$4,000 worth of rock material simply because it became available at a good price, and would be needed in the days ahead.

Another big project upcoming is the development of City Park where a master plan is expected within days. That's a another instance where everybody says "We've got to be doing something", so a plan has been sought and we'll soon know how much, or how little, it'll cost to make the hill into a pride center again.

And of course, there's no end to the routine services provided by your city: cemetery maintenance, street repair, water and sewer service, police and fire protection.

We think that bringing city employee salaries up to par should have a high priority too.

There are so many questions? Would the building of a civic center deter the investment of private money into restaurant meeting facilities in Eastland? Would such a civic center need a permanent, full - time manager - administrator? How would the various clubs and organizations pay "their fair share" for the use of the hall, if as the financing expert suggests, the revenue from the hall should pay the operational costs (utilities, etc.)? Would the center be available for the aged, the young, family reunions, etc?

Of course, these are all questions that can and should be answered.

Just as "finding the best way" can be found.

Many good things have happened in the District since our last letter in April.

First the Camp was beautiful for Camp Meeting in May. The Missionary cottage was completed except for air conditioning. Inside, it is paneled, new ceiling, fluorescent lighting, and carpeted. New roads were built in the trailer park, with some parking pads, the grounds were all mowed. New carpet installed in the Tabernacle.

Everyone had a good time together, at family camp. The services were good, the food was good, the fellowship was good.

These were completion of the roads from cabin no 1 to the dining hall, parking pads at each cabin for unloading cars, 25 parking pads in the trailer park, buying a 32" riding mower to mow where the tractor cannot go, and building a playground with swings, monkey bars, etc.

A workday is set for July 1, to get things ready for State Camp Meeting which begins July 10. If anyone has any playground equipment not in use and would like to donate it to the camp, let someone know and we arrange to get it to the camp. These might include slides, see-saw, merry-go-round, climbing bars, sand box, etc.

We'll need a good turnout for workday. Projects for workday include building swing sets and

SET ASIDE ACREAGE
All producers setting aside acreage from the production of wheat, feed grain or cotton are reminded that no grazing of the set aside acreage is permitted during the period APRIL 30 to OCTOBER 1, 1972. Set aside acreage should be checked frequently so that no unauthorized grazing occurs. Scattered brush and noxious weeds should be controlled. No crop, including hay, is to be harvested from the set aside acreage during the entire year. DO NOT plant maize, hegari, milo or other feed grains on your set aside acreage.

1972 PEANUT CHANGES
Producers are again reminded that skip row rules for 1972 peanuts have been changed. Peanuts planted with a non-competitive crop or with blank rows will be considered solid peanuts for 1972 (unless the planting pattern contains eight rows or more of peanuts AND eight rows or more of non-competitive crops or blank rows.) Rules concerning peanuts growing with competitive crops will continue to be the same as were in effect for 1971.

The final date to certify your planted peanut acreage is AUGUST 1, 1972.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE
Measurement of peanuts after planting is available at this office and cost is very low as compared to a marketing quota penalty. The final date to request measurement service is JULY 14. Requests should be filed and payment made at the ASCS office now.

CROP REPORTS NEEDED
During the year 1972, Eastland County farmers will receive crop questionnaires from the Statistical Reporting Service in Austin. Accurate estimates are of great importance for providing an accurate picture of Eastland County and Texas agriculture. Each farm receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out and return promptly to the SRS.
